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| 12 | Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: |
| 13 | 1. That § 56-1.2 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia |
| 14 | is amended by adding sections numbered 56-1.2:2, 56-232.2:2, and 56-594.3 as follows: |
| 15 | § 56-1.2. Persons and school boards not designated as public utility, public service corporation, |
| 16 | etc. |
| 17 | The terms public utility, public service corporation, or public service company, as used in Chapters 1 |
| 18 | (§ 56-1 et seq.), 10 (§ 56-232 et seq.), 10.1 (§ 56-265.1 et seq.), and 10.2:1 (§ 56-265.13:1 et seq.) of |
| 19 | this title, shall not refer to: |
| 20 | 1. Any person who owns or operates property and provides electricity, natural gas, water, or sewer |
| 21 | service to residents or tenants on the property, provided that (i) the electricity, natural gas, water or |
| 22 | sewer service provided to the residents or tenants is purchased by the person from a public utility, |
| 23 | public service corporation, public service company, or person licensed by the Commission as a |
| 24 | competitive provider of energy services, or a county, city or town, or other publicly regulated political |
| 25 | subdivision or public body, (ii) the person or his agent charges to the resident or tenant on the property |
| 26 | only that portion of the person's utility charges for the electricity, natural gas, water, or sewer service |
| 27 28 | which is attributable to usage by the resident or tenant on the property, and additional service charges permitted by § 55-226.2, and (iii) the person maintains three years' billing records for such charges; or |

| 47 | § 56-1.2:2. Retail sale of electricity in connection with the sale of a renewable generation facility |

| 49 | A. As used in this section and §§ 56-1.2 and 56-232.2:2, unless the context requires a different |
| 50 | meaning: |
| 51 | "Renewable energy facility" means a facility that generates electricity derived entirely from sources |
| 52 | of renewable energy as defined in § 56-576. |
| 53 | "Third-party power purchase agreement" means a power purchase agreement under which a seller |
| 54 | sells electricity to a customer as a means of providing third-party financing of the costs of a renewable |
| 55 | energy facility located on premises owned or leased by a customer. |
| 56 | B. The retail sale of electricity generated at a renewable energy facility to a customer who is |
| 57 | purchasing or leasing the renewable energy facility by a person who is not a public utility, public |
| 58 | service corporation, or public service company shall not constitute the retail sale of electricity if the |

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59 sale is conducted pursuant to a program conducted by the Commission under § 56-594.3.

60 § 56-232.2:2. Regulation of third-party power purchase agreements.

61 The Commission shall not regulate or prescribe the rates, charges, and fees for the retail sale by any 62 person that is not a public service corporation of electric energy generated on site entirely from sources 63 of renewable energy at retail to a customer pursuant to a third-party power purchase agreement entered 64 into pursuant to a program conducted under § 56-594.3. Sales of electricity by public utilities to persons 65 who are not public service corporations pursuant to third-party power purchase agreements shall continue to be regulated by the Commission to the same extent as are other services provided by public 66 67 utilities. The Commission may adopt regulations implementing this section.

- **68** § 56-594.3. Third-party power purchase agreements.
- A. As used in this section, unless the context requires a different meaning: 69

"Renewable energy facility" means a facility that generates electricity derived entirely from sources 70 71 of renewable energy as defined in § 56-576.

72 "Seller" means a person that owns or operates a renewable energy facility located on premises 73 owned or leased by a customer.

74 "Third-party power purchase agreement" means a power purchase agreement under which a seller 75 sells electricity to a customer as a means of providing third-party financing of the costs of a renewable 76 energy facility located on premises owned or leased by a customer.

77 B. The Commission shall conduct programs for each electric utility under which a seller shall be permitted to sell the electricity generated from a renewable energy facility exclusively to the customer 78 79 on whose premises the renewable energy facility is located under a third-party power purchase 80 agreement, subject to the following terms, conditions, and restrictions:

81 1. A renewable energy facility that is the subject of a third-party power purchase agreement under the program shall serve only one customer, and a third-party power purchase agreement under the 82 83 program shall not serve multiple customers;

2. The customer under a third-party power purchase agreement under the program shall be subject 84 85 to the interconnection and other requirements imposed on eligible customer-generators pursuant to subsection C of § 56-594, including the requirement that the customer bear the reasonable costs, as 86 87 determined by the Commission, of the items described in clauses (a), (b), and (c) of subsection C of § 88 56-594:

89 3. A third-party power purchase agreement under the program shall not be valid unless it conforms 90 in all respects to the requirements of the program conducted under the provisions of this section and 91 unless the electric utility in whose service territory the renewable energy facility will be located is 92 provided written notice of the parties' intent to enter into a third-party power purchase agreement not 93 less than 30 days prior to the agreement's proposed effective date; and

94 4. An affiliate of an electric utility shall be permitted to offer and enter into third-party power 95 purchase agreements on the same basis as may any other person that satisfies the requirements of being 96 a seller under a third-party power purchase agreement under the program.

97 C. The Commission shall review the program in 2019 and every two years thereafter during the 98 program.

99 D. Any third-party power purchase agreement that is not entered into pursuant to the program is 100 prohibited in an electric utility's service territory, unless such third-party power purchase agreement is 101 entered into between a licensed supplier and a retail customer pursuant to § 56-577 where such supplier 102 is responsible for serving 100 percent of the load requirements for each retail customer account it 103 serves.

104 E. Nothing in this section shall be construed as (i) rendering any person, by virtue of its selling 105 electric power to a customer under a third-party power purchase agreement entered into pursuant to the 106 program established under this section, a public utility or a competitive service provider; (ii) imposing a 107 requirement that such a person meet 100 percent of the load requirements for each retail customer 108 account it serves; or (iii) affecting third-party power purchase agreements in effect prior to July 1, 109 2018.

110 F. Nothing in this section shall abridge any rights of either party to an agreement between an 111 electric utility and a group purchasing organization acting on behalf of Virginia local governments 112 regarding the purchase of electric service.

113 G. The Commission may adopt such rules or establish such guidelines as may be necessary for its general administration of the program established under this section. 114

2. That Chapters 358 and 382 of the Acts of Assembly of 2013, as amended by Chapter 803 of the 115 Acts of Assembly of 2017, are repealed. 116

3. That the repeal of Chapters 358 and 382 of the Acts of Assembly of 2013, as amended by Chapter 803 of the Acts of Assembly of 2017, shall not affect the validity of any third-party power 117

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purchase agreement entered into prior to July 1, 2018, under a pilot project authorized pursuant 119

to Chapters 358 and 382 of the Acts of Assembly of 2013. 120
