- 8. Fiscal Implications: The Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy (DMME) administers health and safety, and surface mining reclamation regulatory programs for all non-coal mineral mining operations. It is anticipated that this bill will have an annual nongeneral fund revenue impact of \$90,000 in FY 2020, \$170,000 in FY 2021, \$250,000 in FY 2022, and \$330,000 in FY 2023 and ongoing based on approximately 40,000 disturbed acres annually. The increase in mineral mining fees will support the mineral mining program's administrative costs for the program. It is anticipated that the agency has sufficient nongeneral fund appropriation to expend the additional revenue and a budget amendment is not necessary.
