**4. Title:** Capital murder

**5. Summary:** The substitute bill provides that no person charged with capital murder under the provisions of § 18.2-31 subsection A. where the offender was 18 years of age or older at the time of the offense will receive punishment less than the mandatory minimum term of confinement for life.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** The substitute bill would require a mandatory minimum term of confinement for life for any person charged with capital murder under § 18.2-31 subsection A.

The provisions of the bill are not expected to impact the trial preparation or the manner in which the attorney for the Commonwealth tries a case. Therefore, no resulting fiscal impact is expected.

The Virginia Criminal Sentencing Commission (“Commission”) has determined, pursuant to §30-19.1:4 of the Code of Virginia, that the substitute bill is not likely to have an impact on state-responsible (prison) bed space nor local responsible (jail) bed space. In addition, the Commission concluded the substitute bill is not likely to impact the bed space of juvenile direct care and juvenile detention facilities.
