3. Committee: Rehabilitation and Social Services

4. Title: Mandatory reporters of child abuse or neglect; prenatal substance exposure.

5. Summary: Requires any health care provider in a licensed hospital who reports suspected child abuse or neglect resulting from prenatal substance exposure to (i) develop and document a written discharge plan and substance-abuse treatment referral for the mother and (ii) notify, subject to restrictions in federal law, the community services board of the jurisdiction in which the mother resides to appoint a discharge plan manager. The bill provides that such reports shall not constitute a per se finding of child abuse or neglect.

7. Fiscal Impact Estimates: None.

8. Fiscal Implications: This legislation does not have a fiscal impact, as it only clarifies that reports do not constitute a per se finding of child abuse and duplicate responsibilities also set out in § 32.1-127 and § 63.2-1506, Code of Virginia.
