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11	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
12	1. That §§ 2.2-4002, 2.2-4103, 28.2-201, 28.2-409, and 28.2-410 of the Code of Virginia are
13	amended and reenacted as follows:
14 15	<b>§ 2.2-4002. Exemptions from chapter generally.</b> A. Although required to comply with § 2.2-4103 of the Virginia Register Act (§ 2.2-4100 et seq.),
16	the following agencies shall be exempted from the provisions of this chapter, except to the extent that
17	they are specifically made subject to §§ 2.2-4024, 2.2-4030, and 2.2-4031:
18	1. The General Assembly.
19	2. Courts, any agency of the Supreme Court, and any agency that by the Constitution is expressly
20	granted any of the powers of a court of record.
21	3. The Department of Game and Inland Fisheries in promulgating regulations regarding the
22	management of wildlife and for all case decisions rendered pursuant to any provisions of Chapters 2 $(5, 20, 1, 200, st, seq)$ and $(7, 6)$
23 24	(§ 29.1-200 et seq.), 3 (§ 29.1-300 et seq.), 4 (§ 29.1-400 et seq.), 5 (§ 29.1-500 et seq.), and 7 (§ 29.1-700 et seq.) of Title 29.1.
25	4. The Virginia Housing Development Authority.
26	5. Municipal corporations, counties, and all local, regional or multijurisdictional authorities created
27	under this Code, including those with federal authorities.

77 B. Agency action relating to the following subjects shall be exempted from the provisions of this 78 chapter: 79

1. Money or damage claims against the Commonwealth or agencies thereof.

80 2. The award or denial of state contracts, as well as decisions regarding compliance therewith.

81 3. The location, design, specifications or construction of public buildings or other facilities.

4. Grants of state or federal funds or property. 82

83 5. The chartering of corporations.

84 6. Customary military, militia, naval or police functions.

85 7. The selection, tenure, dismissal, direction or control of any officer or employee of an agency of 86 the Commonwealth. 87

8. The conduct of elections or eligibility to vote.

9. Inmates of prisons or other such facilities or parolees therefrom.

89 10. The custody of persons in, or sought to be placed in, mental health facilities or penal or other 90 state institutions as well as the treatment, supervision, or discharge of such persons.

91 11. Traffic signs, markers or control devices.

92 12. Instructions for application or renewal of a license, certificate, or registration required by law. 93

13. Content of, or rules for the conduct of, any examination required by law.

14. The administration of pools authorized by Chapter 47 (§ 2.2-4700 et seq.). 94

95 15. Any rules for the conduct of specific lottery games, so long as such rules are not inconsistent with duly adopted regulations of the Virginia Lottery Board, and provided that such regulations are 96 97 published and posted.

98 16. Orders condemning or closing any shellfish, finfish, or crustacea growing area and the shellfish, 99 finfish or crustacea located thereon pursuant to Article 2 (§ 28.2-803 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 28.2.

17. Any operating procedures for review of child deaths developed by the State Child Fatality 100 101 Review Team pursuant to § 32.1-283.1, any operating procedures for review of adult deaths developed by the Adult Fatality Review Team pursuant to § 32.1-283.5, and any operating procedures for review of 102 adult deaths developed by the Maternal Mortality Review Team pursuant to § 32.1-283.8. 103

18. The regulations for the implementation of the Health Practitioners' Monitoring Program and the 104 activities of the Health Practitioners' Monitoring Program Committee pursuant to Chapter 25.1 (§ 105 54.1-2515 et seq.) of Title 54.1. 106

107 19. The process of reviewing and ranking grant applications submitted to the Commonwealth 108 Neurotrauma Initiative Advisory Board pursuant to Article 12 (§ 51.5-178 et seq.) of Chapter 14 of Title 109 51.5.

20. Loans from the Small Business Environmental Compliance Assistance Fund pursuant to Article 4 110 111 (§ 10.1-1197.1 et seq.) of Chapter 11.1 of Title 10.1.

21. The Virginia Breeders Fund created pursuant to § 59.1-372. 112

113 22. The types of pari-mutuel wagering pools available for live or simulcast horse racing.

114 23. The administration of medication or other substances foreign to the natural horse.

115 24. Any rules adopted by the Charitable Gaming Board for the approval and conduct of game variations for the conduct of raffles, bingo, network bingo, and instant bingo games, provided that such 116 rules are (i) consistent with Article 1.1.1 (§ 18.2-340.15 et seq.) of Chapter 8 of Title 18.2 and (ii) 117 118 published and posted.

119 C. Minor changes to regulations published in the Virginia Administrative Code under the Virginia Register Act (§ 2.2-4100 et seq.), made by the Virginia Code Commission pursuant to § 30-150, shall be 120

121 exempt from the provisions of this chapter. 122

§ 2.2-4103. Agencies to file regulations with Registrar; other duties; failure to file.

123 It shall be the duty of every agency to have on file with the Registrar the full text of all of its 124 currently operative regulations, together with the dates of adoption, revision, publication, or amendment 125 thereof and such additional information requested by the Commission or the Registrar for the purpose of 126 publishing the Virginia Register of Regulations and the Virginia Administrative Code. Thereafter, 127 coincidentally with the issuance thereof, each agency shall from day to day so file, date, and supplement 128 all new regulations and amendments, repeals, or additions to its previously filed regulations. The filed 129 regulations shall (i) indicate the laws they implement or carry out, (ii) designate any prior regulations 130 repealed, modified, or supplemented, (iii) state any special effective or terminal dates, and (iv) be 131 accompanied by a statement or certification, either in original or electronic form, that the regulations are 132 full, true, and correctly dated. No regulation or amendment or repeal thereof shall be effective until filed 133 with the Registrar.

134 Orders condemning or closing any shellfish, finfish or crustacea growing area and the shellfish, 135 finfish or crustacea located thereon pursuant to Article 2 (§ 28.2-803 et seq.) of Chapter 8, of Title 28.2, 136 which are exempt from the requirements of the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) as 137 provided in subsection B of  $\S$  2.2-4002, shall be effective on the date specified by the promulgating 138 agency. Such orders shall continue to be filed with the Registrar either before or after their effective 139 dates in order to satisfy the need for public availability of information respecting the regulations of state 140 agencies.

141 An order setting a date of closure for the Chesapeake Bay purse seine fishery for Atlantic menhaden 142 for reduction purposes pursuant to § 28.2-1000.2, which is exempt from the requirements of the Administrative Process Act as provided by subsection A of §-2.2-4002, shall be effective on the date 143 144 specified. Such orders shall be filed with the Registrar for prompt publication.

145 In addition, each agency shall itself (i) (a) maintain a complete list of all of its currently operative 146 regulations for public consultation, (ii) (b) make available to public inspection a complete file of the full 147 texts of all such regulations, and (iii) (c) allow public copying thereof or make copies available either 148 without charge, at cost, or on payment of a reasonable fee. Each agency shall also maintain as a public 149 record a complete file of its regulations that have been superseded on and after June 1, 1975.

150 Where regulations adopt textual matter by reference to publications other than the Federal Register or 151 Code of Federal Regulations, the agency shall (i) (1) file with the Registrar copies of the referenced 152 publications, (ii) (2) state on the face of or as notations to regulations making such adoptions by 153 reference the places where copies of the referred publications may be procured, and (iii) (3) make copies 154 of such referred publications available for public inspection and copying along with its other regulations.

155 Unless he finds that there are special circumstances requiring otherwise, the Governor, in addition to 156 the exercise of his authority to see that the laws are faithfully executed, may, until compliance with this 157 chapter is achieved, withhold the payment of compensation or expenses of any officer or employee of 158 any agency in whole or part whenever the Commission certifies to him that the agency has failed to 159 comply with this section or this chapter in stated respects, to respond promptly to the requests of the 160 Registrar, or to comply with the regulations of the Commission.

161 § 28.2-201. Authority of Commission to make regulations, establish licenses, and prepare fishery 162 management plans; accept federal grants; enforcement; penalty for violation of regulation. 163

The Commission may:

164 1. Promulgate Adopt regulations, including those for taking seafood, necessary to promote the general 165 welfare of the seafood industry and to conserve and promote the seafood and marine resources of the Commonwealth. The Commission may also promulgate adopt regulations necessary for the conservation 166 167 and reasonable use of surf clams.

168 2. Establish new licenses and fees commensurate with other licenses in an amount not to exceed 169 \$100 for any device used for taking or catching seafood in the tidal waters of the Commonwealth when 170 the device (i) is not otherwise licensed in this title and (ii) is used for commercial purposes. The 171 Commission may specify, when issuing such licenses, any restrictions or control over the devices or the 172 persons operating the device.

173 3. Establish fees for permits required for delayed or limited entry fisheries, shellfish relaying, 174 scientific collections, and for the administrative transfer of these permits among fisherman, where 175 applicable.

176 4. Beginning July 1, 2004, and not more frequently than every three years thereafter, increase fees 177 for tidal fisheries licenses and permits that are authorized under this title or by regulation promulgated 178 adopted pursuant to Article 2 (§ 28.2-209 et seq.) of this chapter. Any fee increase for such licenses and 179 permits shall be capped at \$5 or a percentage equal to the increase in the Consumer Price Index calculated from the time the fee was last set or adjusted, whichever is greater. Beginning July 1, 2004, 180 any amounts generated from the increases in commercial fishing licenses and permits shall be paid into 181

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182 the Marine Fishing Improvement Fund for the purposes authorized by § 28.2-208, and any amounts 183 generated from the increases in recreational fishing licenses shall be paid into the Virginia Saltwater 184 Recreational Fishing Development Fund for the purposes authorized by § 28.2-302.3. The Commission 185 may charge nonresidents a higher fee than residents for purchase of any of the fishing licenses issued pursuant to §§ 28.2-302.2, 28.2-302.2:1, 28.2-302.6, 28.2-302.7, 28.2-302.8, 28.2-302.10, and 186 187 28.2-302.10:1. The fee charged to a nonresident shall be no greater than twice the Virginia resident fee. 188 The Commission may prohibit the sale of the private boat license established by § 28.2-302.7 to a 189 nonresident whose boat is not registered in Virginia.

190 5. The Commission shall ensure that increases in licenses and fees are equitably distributed among 191 resource user groups.

192 6. Prepare fishery management plans containing evaluations of regulatory management options, based 193 upon scientific, economic, biological, and sociological information, and use them in the development of 194 regulations. The Commissioner may appoint a fisheries advisory committee and its chairman, consisting of representatives of the various fishery user groups, to assist in the preparation and implementation of 195 the fishery management plans. The Commission may expend funds to compensate the members of the 196 197 committee pursuant to § 2.2-2825.

198 7. Provide for enforcement of any regulation governing surf clams by any law-enforcement officer of 199 any agency of the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions or by any law-enforcement officer of any 200 agency of the federal government. Enforcement agreements with other agencies or political subdivisions 201 shall be stated in the regulation.

202 8. The Commonwealth hereby assents to the provisions of the Federal Aid in Sport Fish Restoration 203 Act of August 9, 1950 (16 U.S.C. §§ 777-777k), as amended. The Commission is authorized to perform all such acts as may be necessary for the establishment and implementation of cooperative fish 204 restoration and management projects as defined by these federal statutes and the implementing 205 206 regulations promulgated adopted thereunder.

207 Notwithstanding any provision of Chapter 4 (28.2-400 et seq.), the Commission shall have the 208 exclusive authority to manage Atlantic menhaden and shall adopt regulations necessary for its 209 management, including those necessary to comply with the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission 210 Interstate Fishery Management Plan for Atlantic Menhaden. 211

§ 28.2-409. Menhaden fishing prohibited in certain areas; exception.

212 A. Except as provided in subsection B of this section or as otherwise provided by regulation, it shall 213 be is unlawful to take or catch menhaden with purse nets in the following waters:

214 1. In the Piankatank River and its tributaries above and west of a line beginning at the northernmost, 215 as measured from the low-water mark, edge of land known as Gwynn's Island at or near the mouth of 216 Kibble Pond, thence in a northerly direction in a straight line to the easternmost edge of high land on 217 Stingray Point; 218

2. In the Rappahannock River and its tributaries above and west of the R.O. Norris, Jr., Bridge;

3. In the York River and its tributaries above and west of a line extending northwardly from the 219 220 western line of Goodwin Islands through the western line of Ellen Island to the northern bank of the 221 York:

4. In the East, North, Ware and Severn Rivers and their tributaries; and

223 5. In Cape Charles harbor eastward of a line from the western tip of the jetty on the southern side of 224 the channel to the westernmost tip of the jetty on the northern side of the channel; in Kings Creek and 225 Cherrystone inlet eastward of a line from the western end of the jetty on the north side of Cape Charles harbor to the southern end of Wescoat Point; in Mattawoman and Hungars Creek eastward of a line 226 227 from the northwesternmost tip of land in Old Town Neck to Great Neck Point; in Nassawadox Creek 228 eastward of a line from Shooting Point to Nassawadox Point; in Occohannock Creek eastward of a line from Sparrow Point to the southernmost tip of Powells Bluff; in Nandua Creek eastward of a line from 229 230 the northernmost point of Milbys Point to the southwesternmost point of land in Hacks Neck, said line 231 having a true bearing of 027°; in Pungoteague Creek eastward of a line from Bluff Point to the 232 southeasternmost point of Finneys Island; in Onancock Creek eastward of a line from Thicket Point to 233 Ware Point; in Chesconessex Creek eastward of a line from the northernmost point of Sound Beach to 234 the northwesternmost point of Beach Island; in Deep Creek, Hunting Creek and Guilford Creek eastward 235 of a line from the easternmost tip of Russel Island to Halfmoon Point to Peters Point to Simpson Point 236 to Flood Point to Ebb Point to the mouth of Great Gut; in Messongo Creek eastward of a line from 237 South Point to North Point in the Virginia portion of the Pocomoke River northeast of a line from Long Point to Virginia-Maryland spar buoy "A"; in the Great Wicomico River from the mouth of Whay's Creek to Sandy Point; in Dividing Creek, Prentice Creek and Jarvis Creek westward of a line from 238 239 Hughlett Point to Jarvis Point; in Indian Creek and Henrys Creek westward of a line from the 240 southeasternmost point of land on the eastern side of the mouth of Henrys Creek to the easternmost 241 242 point of Fleets Bay Neck; in Dymers Creek westward of a line from the southernmost point of Grog Island to the easternmost point of Poplar Neck; in Tabbs Creek westward of the line across the mouth 243

of the creek at its narrowest point; in Horn Harbor and Dyer Creek westward of a line from the
southernmost tip of Beach Point to the northernmost point on the south side of the mouth of Dyer
Creek; in Back Creek, Clarkston Creek, Chisman Creek, Poquoson River, Bennett Creek, and adjacent
waters westward of a line from the southeasternmost point of Goodwin Islands to the westernmost point of
Cow Island; in Back River westward of a line from Plumtree Point to the westernmost point of
Northend Point; in Little Creek southward of a line from the north point of the west jetty to the north
point of the east jetty; in Lynnhaven Bay southward of the Lynnhaven Inlet Bridge on U. S. Route 60.

251 B. During the period from the first Monday in May through the third Friday in November, vessels 252 under seventy gross tons which are licensed in accordance with subdivision 1 of § 28.2-402 are 253 authorized to take or catch menhaden in the following waters: in the Rappahannock River eastward and 254 southward from a line extending from Towles Point to Burnham Wharf and from Orchard Point to 255 Towles Point; in Dividing Creek eastward from a line extending from Jarvis Point to Ditchley Pump 256 House; in Indian Creek eastward from a line directly across the creek at Rappahannock Oyster 257 Company; in Dymers Creek eastward from a line directly across the creek at the eastern end of Standard 258 Products dock.

259 § 28.2-410. Closed season for menhaden fishing; forbidden nets; penalty.

260 Except as provided in § 28.2-409 or as otherwise provided by regulation, it is unlawful for any 261 person to take or catch with a purse net in the waters of this the Commonwealth, or waters within its jurisdiction, menhaden between the Saturday following the third Friday in November and the Sunday 262 263 preceding the first Monday in May. However, in the waters east of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel 264 within the three-mile limit of the Virginia shoreline such prohibition shall be between the Friday before 265 Christmas and the Sunday preceding the first Monday in May. It is also unlawful for any person to use 266 any purse net or other net having a stretched mesh of less than  $\frac{1}{3/4}$  one and three quarters inches. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. 267
