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VIRGINIA ACTS OF ASSEMBLY - CHAPTER

An Act to amend and reenact §§ 24.2-503, 24.2-507, 24.2-510, 24.2-603, 24.2-700, as it is currently 2 3 effective and as it shall become effective, and 24.2-701, as it is currently effective and as it shall 4 become effective, of the Code of Virginia, relating to extending polling place hours and other related 5 deadlines.

8 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

9 1. That §§ 24.2-503, 24.2-507, 24.2-510, 24.2-603, 24.2-700, as it is currently effective and as it shall 10 become effective, and 24.2-701, as it is currently effective and as it shall become effective, of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows: 11

12 § 24.2-503. Deadlines for filing required statements; extensions.

13 The written statements of qualification and economic interests shall be filed by (i) primary candidates not later than the filing deadline for the primary, (ii) all other candidates for city and town offices to be 14 filled at a May general election by 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the first Tuesday in March, (iii) candidates in 15 special elections by the time of qualifying as a candidate, and (iv) all other candidates by 7:00 8:00 16 17 p.m. on the second Tuesday in June.

A statement shall be deemed to be timely filed if it is mailed postage prepaid to the appropriate 18 19 office by registered or certified mail and if the official receipt therefor, which shall be exhibited on 20 demand, shows mailing within the prescribed time limits.

The State Board may grant an extension of any deadline for filing either or both written statements 21 22 and shall notify all candidates who have not filed their statements of the extension. Any extension shall 23 be granted for a fixed period of time of ten days from the date of the mailing of the notice of the 24 extension. 25

§ 24.2-507. Deadlines for filing declarations and petitions of candidacy.

26 For any office, declarations of candidacy and the petitions therefor shall be filed according to the 27 following schedule: 28

1. For a general election in November, by 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the second Tuesday in June;

2. For a general election in May, by 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the first Tuesday in March;

30 3. For a special election held at the same time as a November general election, either (i) at least 81 31 days before the election or (ii) if the special election is being held at the second November election after 32 the vacancy occurred, by 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the second Tuesday in June before that November election;

33 4. For a special election held at the same time as a May general election, by 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the 34 first Tuesday in March; or

35 5. For a special election held at a time other than a general election, (i) at least 60 days before the 36 election or (ii) within five days of any writ of election or order calling a special election to be held less 37 than 60 days after the issuance of the writ or order. 38

§ 24.2-510. Deadlines for parties to nominate by methods other than primary.

39 For any office, nominations by political parties by methods other than a primary shall be made and 40 completed in the manner prescribed by law according to the following schedule: 41

1. For a general election in November, by 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the second Tuesday in June;

2. For a general election in May, by 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the first Tuesday in March;

43 3. For a special election held at the same time as a November general election, either (i) at least 81 days before the election or (ii) if the special election is held at the second November election after the 44 45 vacancy occurred, by 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the second Tuesday in June before that November election;

4. For a special election held at the same time as a May general election, by 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the 46 47 first Tuesday in March; or

48 5. For a special election held at a time other than a general election, (i) at least 60 days before the 49 election or (ii) within five days of any writ of election or order calling a special election to be held less 50 than 60 days after the issuance of the writ or order.

In the case of all general elections a party shall nominate its candidate for any office by a 51 nonprimary method only within the 47 days immediately preceding the primary date established for 52 53 nominating candidates for the office in question. This limitation shall have no effect, however, on 54 nominations for special elections or pursuant to § 24.2-539.

55 § 24.2-603. Hours polls to be open; closing the polls.

56 At all elections, the polls shall be open at each polling place at 6:00 a.m. on the day of the election HB1678ER

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and closed at 7:00 8:00 p.m. on the same day except as provided for central absentee voter precincts
pursuant to subsection F of § 24.2-712.

59 At 6:45 7:45 p.m., an officer of election shall announce that the polls will close in fifteen 15 60 minutes. The officers of election shall list the names of all qualified voters in line before the polling 61 place at 7:00 8:00 p.m. and permit those voters and no others to vote after 7:00 8:00 p.m.

62 § 24.2-700. (Effective for elections prior to the general election on November 3, 2020) Persons 63 entitled to vote by absentee ballot.

64 The following registered voters may vote by absentee ballot in accordance with the provisions of this chapter in any election in which they are qualified to vote:

66 1. Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation or
67 while on personal business or vacation, will be absent from the county or city in which he is entitled to
68 vote;

2. Any person who is (i) a member of a uniformed service, as defined in § 24.2-452, on active duty,
(ii) temporarily residing outside of the United States, or (iii) the spouse or dependent residing with any
person listed in clause (i) or (ii), and who will be absent on the day of the election from the county or
city in which he is entitled to vote;

73 3. Any student attending a school or institution of higher education, or his spouse, who will be74 absent on the day of election from the county or city in which he is entitled to vote;

4. Any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of election because of his disability, illness, or pregnancy;

5. Any person who is confined while awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a misdemeanor,
provided that the trial or release date is scheduled on or after the third day preceding the election. Any
person who is awaiting trial and is a resident of the county or city where he is confined shall, on his
request, be taken to the polls to vote on election day if his trial date is postponed and he did not have
an opportunity to vote absentee;

82 6. Any person who is a member of an electoral board, registrar, officer of election, or custodian of
83 voting equipment;

7. Any duly registered person who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the election
because he is primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who is confined at home;

87 8. Any duly registered person who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the election88 because of an obligation occasioned by his religion;

89 9. Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation, will
90 be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for 11 or more hours
91 of the 13 14 hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603;

92 10. Any person who is a law-enforcement officer, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; firefighter, as defined in § 65.2-102; volunteer firefighter, as defined in § 27-42; search and rescue personnel, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; or emergency medical services personnel, as defined in § 32.1-111.1;

98 12. Any person granted a protective order issued by or under the authority of any court of competent99 jurisdiction.

100 § 24.2-700. (Effective for elections beginning with the general election on November 3, 2020) 101 Persons entitled to vote by absentee ballot.

102 A. The following registered voters may vote by absentee ballot in accordance with the provisions of 103 this chapter in any election in which they are qualified to vote:

104 1. Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation or 105 while on personal business or vacation, will be absent from the county or city in which he is entitled to 106 vote;

107 2. Any person who is (i) a member of a uniformed service, as defined in § 24.2-452, on active duty,
108 (ii) temporarily residing outside of the United States, or (iii) the spouse or dependent residing with any person listed in clause (i) or (ii), and who will be absent on the day of the election from the county or city in which he is entitled to vote;

111 3. Any student attending a school or institution of higher education, or his spouse, who will be 112 absent on the day of election from the county or city in which he is entitled to vote;

4. Any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of election because of his disability, illness, or pregnancy;

5. Any person who is confined while awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a misdemeanor, provided that the trial or release date is scheduled on or after the third day preceding the election. Any person who is awaiting trial and is a resident of the county or city where he is confined shall, on his

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118 request, be taken to the polls to vote on election day if his trial date is postponed and he did not have 119 an opportunity to vote absentee;

6. Any person who is a member of an electoral board, registrar, officer of election, or custodian of voting equipment;

8. Any duly registered person who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the electionbecause of an obligation occasioned by his religion;

be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for 11 or more hours
of the 13 14 hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603;

B. Any registered voter may vote by absentee ballot in person beginning on the second Saturdayimmediately preceding any election in which he is qualified to vote.

140 § 24.2-701. (Effective for elections prior to the general election on November 3, 2020) 141 Application for absentee ballot.

A. The State Board shall furnish each general registrar with a sufficient number of applications for official absentee ballots. The registrars shall furnish applications to persons requesting them.

144 The State Board shall implement a system that enables eligible persons to request and receive an
145 absentee ballot application electronically through the Internet. Electronic absentee ballot applications
146 shall be in a form approved by the State Board.

Except as provided in § 24.2-703, a separate application shall be completed for each election in
which the applicant offers to vote. An application for an absentee ballot may be accepted the later of (i)
12 months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month prior to
the election in which the applicant is applying to vote.

An application that is completed in person at the same time that the applicant registers to vote shall be held and processed no sooner than the fifth day after the date that the applicant registered to vote; however, this requirement shall not be applicable to any person who is qualified to vote absentee under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700.

155 Any application received before the ballots are printed shall be held and processed as soon as the 156 printed ballots for the election are available.

157 For the purposes of this chapter, the general registrar's office shall be open a minimum of eight hours between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the first and second Saturday immediately preceding all general elections, except May general elections, and on the Saturday immediately preceding any primary election, May general election, or special election.

Unless the applicant is disabled, all applications for absentee ballots shall be signed by the applicant who shall state, subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that to the best of his knowledge and belief the facts contained in the application are true and correct and that he has not and will not vote in the election at any other place in Virginia or in any other state. If the applicant is unable to sign the application, a person assisting the applicant will note this fact on the applicant signature line and provide his signature, name, and address.

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B. Applications for absentee ballots shall be completed in the following manner:

168 1. An application completed in person shall be made not less than three days prior to the election in 169 which the applicant offers to vote and completed only in the office of the general registrar. The 170 applicant shall sign the application in the presence of a registrar. The applicant shall provide one of the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643. Any applicant who does not show one of 171 172 the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643 shall be offered a provisional ballot 173 under the provisions of § 24.2-653. The State Board of Elections shall provide instructions to the general 174 registrar for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of 175 § 24.2-653 and this section.

176 2. Any other application may be made by mail, electronic or telephonic transmission to a facsimile
177 device if one is available to the office of the general registrar or the office of the State Board if a
178 device is not available locally, or other means. The application shall be on a form furnished by the

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registrar or, if made under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700, may be on a federal postcard application prescribed pursuant to 52 U.S.C. § 20301(b)(2). The federal postcard application may be accepted the 179 180 later of (i) 12 months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month 181 prior to the election in which the applicant is applying to vote. The application shall be made to the 182 183 appropriate registrar no later than 5.00 p.m. on the seventh day prior to the election in which the 184 applicant offers to vote. 185

C. Applications for absentee ballots shall contain the following information:

186 1. The applicant's printed name, the last four digits of the applicant's social security number, and the 187 reason the applicant will be absent or cannot vote at his polling place on the day of the election. 188 However, an applicant completing the application in person shall not be required to provide the last four 189 digits of his social security number;

190 2. A statement that he is registered in the county or city in which he offers to vote and his residence address in such county or city. Any person temporarily residing outside the United States shall provide the last date of residency at his Virginia residence address, if that residence is no longer available to 191 192 193 him. Any person who makes application under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700 who is not a registered voter 194 may file the applications to register and for a ballot simultaneously;

195 3. The complete address to which the ballot is to be sent directly to the applicant, unless the 196 application is made in person at a time when the printed ballots for the election are available and the 197 applicant chooses to vote in person at the time of completing his application. The address given shall be (i) the address of the applicant on file in the registration records; (ii) the address at which he will be 198 199 located while absent from his county or city; or (iii) the address at which he will be located while 200 temporarily confined due to a disability or illness. No ballot shall be sent to, or in care of, any other 201 person; and

202 4. In the case of a person, or the spouse or dependent of a person, who is on active duty as a 203 member of the uniformed services as defined in § 24.2-452, the branch of service to which he or the 204 spouse belongs; or

205 5. In the case of a student, or the spouse of a student, who is attending a school or institution of 206 higher education, the name of the school or institution of higher education; or

207 6. In the case of any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who is unable 208 to go in person to the polls on the day of the election because of his disability, illness, or pregnancy, 209 that he is a person with a disability, illness, or pregnancy; or

7. In the case of a person who is confined awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a 210 misdemeanor, the name of the institution of confinement; or 211

212 8. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for business reasons, the name of his 213 employer or business; or

214 9. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for personal business or vacation 215 reasons, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state or country to which he is traveling; or

216 10. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because he is 217 primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who is confined at 218 home, his relationship to the family member; or

219 11. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because of an 220 obligation occasioned by his religion, that he has an obligation occasioned by his religion; or

221 12. In the case of a person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or 222 occupation, will be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for 223 11 or more hours of the $\frac{13}{14}$ hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603, the name of his 224 business or employer and hours he will be at the workplace and commuting on election day; or

225 13. In the case of a law-enforcement officer, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; firefighter, as defined in 226 65.2-102; volunteer firefighter, as defined in § 27-42; search and rescue personnel, as defined in 227 § 18.2-51.1; or emergency medical services personnel, as defined in § 32.1-111.1, that he is a first 228 responder; or

229 14. In the case of a person who has been designated by a political party, independent candidate, or 230 candidate in a primary election to be a representative of the party or candidate inside a polling place on 231 the day of the election pursuant to subsection C of § 24.2-604 and § 24.2-639, the fact that he is so 232 designated; or

233 15. In the case of a person who has been granted a protective order issued by or under the authority 234 of any court of competent jurisdiction, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state of the 235 issuing court.

236 § 24.2-701. (Effective for elections beginning with the general election on November 3, 2020) 237 Application for absentee ballot.

238 A. The State Board shall furnish each general registrar with a sufficient number of applications for official absentee ballots. The registrars shall furnish applications to persons requesting them. 239

240 The State Board shall implement a system that enables eligible persons to request and receive an 241 absentee ballot application electronically through the Internet. Electronic absentee ballot applications 242 shall be in a form approved by the State Board.

243 Except as provided in § 24.2-703, a separate application shall be completed for each election in 244 which the applicant offers to vote. An application for an absentee ballot may be accepted the later of (i) 245 12 months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month prior to 246 the election in which the applicant is applying to vote.

An application that is completed in person at the same time that the applicant registers to vote shall 247 248 be held and processed no sooner than the fifth day after the date that the applicant registered to vote; 249 however, this requirement shall not be applicable to any person who is qualified to vote absentee under 250 subdivision A 2 of § 24.2-700.

253 For the purposes of this chapter, the general registrar's office shall be open a minimum of eight 254 hours between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the first and second Saturday immediately 255 preceding all elections.

256 Unless the applicant is disabled, all applications for absentee ballots shall be signed by the applicant 257 who shall state, subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that to 258 the best of his knowledge and belief the facts contained in the application are true and correct and that 259 he has not and will not vote in the election at any other place in Virginia or in any other state. If the 260 applicant is unable to sign the application, a person assisting the applicant will note this fact on the 261 applicant signature line and provide his signature, name, and address. 262

B. Applications for absentee ballots shall be completed in the following manner:

263 1. An application completed in person shall be completed only in the office of the general registrar 264 and signed by the applicant in the presence of a registrar. The applicant shall provide one of the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643. Any applicant who does not show one of the 265 266 forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643 shall be offered a provisional ballot under the provisions of § 24.2-653. The State Board of Elections shall provide instructions to the general 267 268 registrar for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of 269 § 24.2-653 and this section.

270 2. Any other application may be made by mail, electronic or telephonic transmission to a facsimile 271 device if one is available to the office of the general registrar or the office of the State Board if a 272 device is not available locally, or other means. The application shall be on a form furnished by the 273 registrar or, if made under subdivision A 2 of § 24.2-700, may be on a federal postcard application 274 prescribed pursuant to 52 U.S.C. § 20301(b)(2). The federal postcard application may be accepted the 275 later of (i) 12 months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month prior to the election in which the applicant is applying to vote. The application shall be made to the 276 277 appropriate registrar no later than 5.00 p.m. on the seventh day prior to the election in which the applicant offers to vote. 278 279

C. Applications for absentee ballots shall contain the following information:

280 1. The applicant's printed name, the last four digits of the applicant's social security number, and the 281 reason the applicant will be absent or cannot vote at his polling place on the day of the election. 282 However, an applicant completing the application in person shall not be required to provide the last four 283 digits of his social security number;

284 2. A statement that he is registered in the county or city in which he offers to vote and his residence 285 address in such county or city. Any person temporarily residing outside the United States shall provide 286 the last date of residency at his Virginia residence address, if that residence is no longer available to 287 him. Any person who makes application under subdivision A 2 of § 24.2-700 who is not a registered 288 voter may file the applications to register and for a ballot simultaneously;

289 3. The complete address to which the ballot is to be sent directly to the applicant, unless the 290 application is made in person at a time when the printed ballots for the election are available and the 291 applicant chooses to vote in person at the time of completing his application. The address given shall be 292 (i) the address of the applicant on file in the registration records; (ii) the address at which he will be 293 located while absent from his county or city; or (iii) the address at which he will be located while 294 temporarily confined due to a disability or illness. No ballot shall be sent to, or in care of, any other 295 person; and

296 4. In the case of a person, or the spouse or dependent of a person, who is on active duty as a 297 member of the uniformed services as defined in § 24.2-452, the branch of service to which he or the 298 spouse belongs; or

299 5. In the case of a student, or the spouse of a student, who is attending a school or institution of 300 higher education, the name of the school or institution of higher education; or

301 6. In the case of any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who is unable
302 to go in person to the polls on the day of the election because of his disability, illness, or pregnancy,
303 that he is a person with a disability, illness, or pregnancy; or

304 7. In the case of a person who is confined awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a 305 misdemeanor, the name of the institution of confinement; or

8. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for business reasons, the name of hisemployer or business; or

308 9. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for personal business or vacation309 reasons, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state or country to which he is traveling; or

310 10. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because he is primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who is confined at home, his relationship to the family member; or

313 11. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because of an obligation occasioned by his religion, that he has an obligation occasioned by his religion; or

12. In the case of a person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or
occupation, will be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for
11 or more hours of the 13 14 hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603, the name of his
business or employer and hours he will be at the workplace and commuting on election day; or

319 13. In the case of a law-enforcement officer, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; firefighter, as defined in § 65.2-102; volunteer firefighter, as defined in § 27-42; search and rescue personnel, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; or emergency medical services personnel, as defined in § 32.1-111.1, that he is a first responder; or

14. In the case of a person who has been designated by a political party, independent candidate, or
candidate in a primary election to be a representative of the party or candidate inside a polling place on
the day of the election pursuant to subsection C of § 24.2-604 and § 24.2-639, the fact that he is so
designated; or

327 15. In the case of a person who has been granted a protective order issued by or under the authority328 of any court of competent jurisdiction, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state of the329 issuing court.

330 D. An application shall not be required for any registered voter appearing in person to cast an
 absentee ballot during the period beginning on the second Saturday immediately preceding the election
 in which he is offering to vote.

333 2. That the provisions of this act shall not become effective unless reenacted by the 2021 Session ofthe General Assembly.
