12	1. That §§ 24.2-700 and 24.2-701, as they are currently effective and as they shall become effective,
13	of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:
14	§ 24.2-700. (Effective for elections prior to the general election on November 3, 2020) Persons
15	entitled to vote by absentee ballot.
16 17	The following registered voters may vote by absentee ballot in accordance with the provisions of this chapter in any election in which they are qualified to vote:
18	1. Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation or
19	while on personal business or vacation, will be absent from the county or city in which he is entitled to
20	vote;

56	A. The following registered voters may vote by absentee ballot in accordance with the provisions of
57	this chapter in any election in which they are qualified to vote:
58	1. Any person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or occupation or

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while on personal business or vacation, will be absent from the county or city in which he is entitled to vote;

61 2. Any person who is (i) a member of a uniformed service, as defined in § 24.2-452, on active duty,

(ii) temporarily residing outside of the United States, or (iii) the spouse or dependent residing with any person listed in clause (i) or (ii), and who will be absent on the day of the election from the county or city in which he is entitled to vote;

96 § 24.2-701. (Effective for elections prior to the general election on November 3, 2020) 97 Application for absentee ballot.

A. The State Board shall furnish each general registrar with a sufficient number of applications for official absentee ballots. The registrars shall furnish applications to persons requesting them.

100 The State Board shall implement a system that enables eligible persons to request and receive an
 101 absentee ballot application electronically through the Internet. Electronic absentee ballot applications
 102 shall be in a form approved by the State Board.

Except as provided in § 24.2-703, a separate application shall be completed for each election in
which the applicant offers to vote. An application for an absentee ballot may be accepted the later of (i)
months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month prior to
the election in which the applicant is applying to vote.

107 An application that is completed in person at the same time that the applicant registers to vote shall 108 be held and processed no sooner than the fifth day after the date that the applicant registered to vote; 109 however, this requirement shall not be applicable to any person who is qualified to vote absentee under 110 subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700.

111 Any application received before the ballots are printed shall be held and processed as soon as the 112 printed ballots for the election are available.

For the purposes of this chapter, the general registrar's office shall be open a minimum of eight hours between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the first and second Saturday immediately preceding all general elections, except May general elections, and on the Saturday immediately preceding any primary election, May general election, or special election.

117 Unless the applicant is disabled, all applications for absentee ballots shall be signed by the applicant 118 who shall state, subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that to 119 the best of his knowledge and belief the facts contained in the application are true and correct and that 120 he has not and will not vote in the election at any other place in Virginia or in any other state. If the

121 applicant is unable to sign the application, a person assisting the applicant will note this fact on the 122 applicant signature line and provide his signature, name, and address.

B. Applications for absentee ballots shall be completed in the following manner:

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124 1. An application completed in person shall be made not less than three days prior to the election in 125 which the applicant offers to vote and completed only in the office of the general registrar. The 126 applicant shall sign the application in the presence of a registrar. The applicant shall provide one of the 127 forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643. Any applicant who does not show one of 128 the forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643 shall be offered a provisional ballot 129 under the provisions of § 24.2-653. The State Board of Elections shall provide instructions to the general 130 registrar for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of 131 § 24.2-653 and this section.

132 2. Any other application may be made by mail, electronic or telephonic transmission to a facsimile 133 device if one is available to the office of the general registrar or the office of the State Board if a device is not available locally, or other means. The application shall be on a form furnished by the 134 registrar or, if made under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700, may be on a federal postcard application prescribed pursuant to 52 U.S.C. § 20301(b)(2). The federal postcard application may be accepted the 135 136 137 later of (i) 12 months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month 138 prior to the election in which the applicant is applying to vote. The application shall be made to the 139 appropriate registrar no later than 5:00 p.m. on the seventh day prior to the election in which the 140 applicant offers to vote. 141

C. Applications for absentee ballots shall contain the following information:

142 1. The applicant's printed name, the last four digits of the applicant's social security number, and the 143 reason the applicant will be absent or cannot vote at his polling place on the day of the election. 144 However, an applicant completing the application in person shall not be required to provide the last four 145 digits of his social security number;

146 2. A statement that he is registered in the county or city in which he offers to vote and his residence 147 address in such county or city. Any person temporarily residing outside the United States shall provide 148 the last date of residency at his Virginia residence address, if that residence is no longer available to 149 him. Any person who makes application under subdivision 2 of § 24.2-700 who is not a registered voter 150 may file the applications to register and for a ballot simultaneously;

151 3. The complete address to which the ballot is to be sent directly to the applicant, unless the 152 application is made in person at a time when the printed ballots for the election are available and the 153 applicant chooses to vote in person at the time of completing his application. The address given shall be 154 (i) the address of the applicant on file in the registration records; (ii) the address at which he will be 155 located while absent from his county or city; or (iii) the address at which he will be located while 156 temporarily confined due to a disability or illness. No ballot shall be sent to, or in care of, any other 157 person; and

158 4. In the case of a person, or the spouse or dependent of a person, who is on active duty as a 159 member of the uniformed services as defined in § 24.2-452, the branch of service to which he or the 160 spouse belongs; or

161 5. In the case of a student, or the spouse of a student, who is attending a school or institution of higher education, the name of the school or institution of higher education; or 162

163 6. In the case of any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who is unable 164 to go in person to the polls on the day of the election because of his disability, illness, or pregnancy, 165 that he is a person with a disability, illness, or pregnancy; or

7. In the case of a person who is confined awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a 166 167 misdemeanor, the name of the institution of confinement; or

168 8. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for business reasons, the name of his 169 employer or business; or

170 9. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for personal business or vacation 171 reasons, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state or country to which he is traveling; or

172 10. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because he is 173 primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who is confined at 174 home, his relationship to the family member; or

175 11. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because of an 176 obligation occasioned by his religion, that he has an obligation occasioned by his religion; or

177 12. In the case of a person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or 178 occupation, will be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for 179 11 or more hours of the 13 hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603, the name of his 180 business or employer and hours he will be at the workplace and commuting on election day; or

181 13. In the case of a law-enforcement officer, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; firefighter, as defined in **HB208** 

182 § 65.2-102; volunteer firefighter, as defined in § 27-42; search and rescue personnel, as defined in 183 § 18.2-51.1; or emergency medical services personnel, as defined in § 32.1-111.1, that he is a first 184 responder: or

185 14. In the case of a person who has been designated by a political party, independent candidate, or 186 candidate in a primary election to be a representative of the party or candidate inside a polling place on 187 the day of the election pursuant to subsection C of § 24.2-604 and § 24.2-639, the fact that he is so 188 designated; or

189 15. In the case of a person who has been granted a protective order issued by or under the authority 190 of any court of competent jurisdiction, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state of the 191 issuing court; or

192 16. In the case of a person who will be age 65 or older on the date of the election for which an 193 absentee ballot is requested, the person's date of birth.

194 § 24.2-701. (Effective for elections beginning with the general election on November 3, 2020) 195 Application for absentee ballot.

196 A. The State Board shall furnish each general registrar with a sufficient number of applications for 197 official absentee ballots. The registrars shall furnish applications to persons requesting them.

198 The State Board shall implement a system that enables eligible persons to request and receive an 199 absentee ballot application electronically through the Internet. Electronic absentee ballot applications 200 shall be in a form approved by the State Board.

201 Except as provided in § 24.2-703, a separate application shall be completed for each election in which the applicant offers to vote. An application for an absentee ballot may be accepted the later of (i) 202 203 12 months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month prior to 204 the election in which the applicant is applying to vote.

An application that is completed in person at the same time that the applicant registers to vote shall 205 206 be held and processed no sooner than the fifth day after the date that the applicant registered to vote; 207 however, this requirement shall not be applicable to any person who is qualified to vote absentee under 208 subdivision A 2 of § 24.2-700.

209 Any application received before the ballots are printed shall be held and processed as soon as the 210 printed ballots for the election are available.

For the purposes of this chapter, the general registrar's office shall be open a minimum of eight 211 212 hours between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on the first and second Saturday immediately 213 preceding all elections.

214 Unless the applicant is disabled, all applications for absentee ballots shall be signed by the applicant 215 who shall state, subject to felony penalties for making false statements pursuant to § 24.2-1016, that to 216 the best of his knowledge and belief the facts contained in the application are true and correct and that he has not and will not vote in the election at any other place in Virginia or in any other state. If the 217 218 applicant is unable to sign the application, a person assisting the applicant will note this fact on the applicant signature line and provide his signature, name, and address. 219 220

B. Applications for absentee ballots shall be completed in the following manner:

221 1. An application completed in person shall be completed only in the office of the general registrar 222 and signed by the applicant in the presence of a registrar. The applicant shall provide one of the forms 223 of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643. Any applicant who does not show one of the 224 forms of identification specified in subsection B of § 24.2-643 shall be offered a provisional ballot under the provisions of § 24.2-653. The State Board of Elections shall provide instructions to the 225 226 general registrar for the handling and counting of such provisional ballots pursuant to subsection B of 227 § 24.2-653 and this section.

228 2. Any other application may be made by mail, electronic or telephonic transmission to a facsimile 229 device if one is available to the office of the general registrar or the office of the State Board if a device is not available locally, or other means. The application shall be on a form furnished by the 230 231 registrar or, if made under subdivision A 2 of § 24.2-700, may be on a federal postcard application prescribed pursuant to 52 U.S.C. § 20301(b)(2). The federal postcard application may be accepted the 232 233 later of (i) 12 months before an election or (ii) the day following any election held in the twelfth month 234 prior to the election in which the applicant is applying to vote. The application shall be made to the 235 appropriate registrar no later than 5.00 p.m. on the seventh day prior to the election in which the applicant offers to vote. 236 237

C. Applications for absentee ballots shall contain the following information:

238 1. The applicant's printed name, the last four digits of the applicant's social security number, and the 239 reason the applicant will be absent or cannot vote at his polling place on the day of the election. 240 However, an applicant completing the application in person shall not be required to provide the last four 241 digits of his social security number;

242 2. A statement that he is registered in the county or city in which he offers to vote and his residence 243 address in such county or city. Any person temporarily residing outside the United States shall provide the last date of residency at his Virginia residence address, if that residence is no longer available to
him. Any person who makes application under subdivision A 2 of § 24.2-700 who is not a registered
voter may file the applications to register and for a ballot simultaneously;

3. The complete address to which the ballot is to be sent directly to the applicant, unless the application is made in person at a time when the printed ballots for the election are available and the applicant chooses to vote in person at the time of completing his application. The address given shall be (i) the address of the applicant on file in the registration records; (ii) the address at which he will be located while absent from his county or city; or (iii) the address at which he will be located while temporarily confined due to a disability or illness. No ballot shall be sent to, or in care of, any other person; and

4. In the case of a person, or the spouse or dependent of a person, who is on active duty as a member of the uniformed services as defined in § 24.2-452, the branch of service to which he or the spouse belongs; or

257 5. In the case of a student, or the spouse of a student, who is attending a school or institution of higher education, the name of the school or institution of higher education; or

6. In the case of any duly registered person with a disability, as defined in § 24.2-101, who is unable to go in person to the polls on the day of the election because of his disability, illness, or pregnancy, that he is a person with a disability, illness, or pregnancy; or

262 7. In the case of a person who is confined awaiting trial or for having been convicted of a misdemeanor, the name of the institution of confinement; or

8. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for business reasons, the name of hisemployer or business; or

9. In the case of a person who will be absent on election day for personal business or vacationreasons, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state or country to which he is traveling; or

10. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because he is
primarily and personally responsible for the care of an ill or disabled family member who is confined at
home, his relationship to the family member; or

11. In the case of a person who is unable to go to the polls on the day of election because of anobligation occasioned by his religion, that he has an obligation occasioned by his religion; or

12. In the case of a person who, in the regular and orderly course of his business, profession, or
occupation, will be at his place of work and commuting to and from his home to his place of work for
11 or more hours of the 13 hours that the polls are open pursuant to § 24.2-603, the name of his
business or employer and hours he will be at the workplace and commuting on election day; or

13. In the case of a law-enforcement officer, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; firefighter, as defined in § 65.2-102; volunteer firefighter, as defined in § 27-42; search and rescue personnel, as defined in § 18.2-51.1; or emergency medical services personnel, as defined in § 32.1-111.1, that he is a first responder; or

14. In the case of a person who has been designated by a political party, independent candidate, or
candidate in a primary election to be a representative of the party or candidate inside a polling place on
the day of the election pursuant to subsection C of § 24.2-604 and § 24.2-639, the fact that he is so
designated; or

15. In the case of a person who has been granted a protective order issued by or under the authorityof any court of competent jurisdiction, the name of the county or city in Virginia or the state of theissuing court; or

288 16. In the case of a person who will be age 65 or older on the date of the election for which an289 absentee ballot is requested, the person's date of birth.

290 D. An application shall not be required for any registered voter appearing in person to cast an
 291 absentee ballot during the period beginning on the second Saturday immediately preceding the election
 292 in which he is offering to vote.

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
