4	A BILL to amend and reenact § 22.1-274.2 of the Code of Virginia, relating to school board policies;
5	epinephrine; accessibility.

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10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That § 22.1-274.2 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
12	§ 22.1-274.2. Possession and self-administration of inhaled asthma medications and epinephrine
13	by certain students or school board employees.
14	A. Local school boards shall develop and implement policies permitting a student with a diagnosis of
15	asthma or anaphylaxis, or both, to possess and self-administer inhaled asthma medications or
16	auto-injectable epinephrine, or both, as the case may be, during the school day, at school-sponsored
17	activities, or while on a school bus or other school property. Such policies shall include, but not be
18	limited to, provisions for:
19	1. Written consent of the parent, as defined in § 22.1-1, of a student with a diagnosis of asthma or
20	anaphylaxis, or both, that the student may self-administer inhaled asthma medications or auto-injectable
21	epinephrine, or both, as the case may be.
22	2. Written notice from the student's primary care provider or medical specialist, or a licensed
23	physician or licensed nurse practitioner that (i) identifies the student; (ii) states that the student has a
24	diagnosis of asthma or anaphylaxis, or both, and has approval to self-administer inhaled asthma
25	medications or auto-injectable epinephrine, or both, as the case may be, that have been prescribed or
26	authorized for the student; (iii) specifies the name and dosage of the medication, the frequency in which
27	it is to be administered and certain circumstances which may warrant the use of inhaled asthma
28	medications or auto-injectable epinephrine, such as before exercising or engaging in physical activity to
29	prevent the onset of asthma symptoms or to alleviate asthma symptoms after the onset of an asthma
30	episode; and (iv) attests to the student's demonstrated ability to safely and effectively self-administer
31	inhaled asthma medications or auto-injectable epinephrine, or both, as the case may be.
32	3. Development of an individualized health care plan, including emergency procedures for any
33	life-threatening conditions.
34	4. Consultation with the student's parent before any limitations or restrictions are imposed upon a
35 36	student's possession and self-administration of inhaled asthma medications and auto-injectable
30 37	epinephrine, and before the permission to possess and self-administer inhaled asthma medications and
37 38	auto-injectable epinephrine at any point during the school year is revoked. 5. Self-administration of inhaled asthma medications and auto-injectable epinephrine to be consistent
38 39	with the purposes of the Virginia School Health Guidelines and the Guidelines for Specialized Health
40	Care Procedure Manuals, which are jointly issued by the Department of Education and the Department
41	of Health.
42	6. Disclosure or dissemination of information pertaining to the health condition of a student to school
43	board employees to comply with §§ 22.1-287 and 22.1-289 and the federal Family Education Rights
44	and Privacy Act of 1974, as amended, 20 U.S.C. § 1232g, which govern the disclosure and
45	dissemination of information contained in student scholastic records.
46	B. The permission granted a student with a diagnosis of asthma or anaphylaxis, or both, to possess
47	and self-administer inhaled asthma medications or auto-injectable epinephrine, or both, shall be effective
48	for one school year. Permission to possess and self-administer such medications shall be renewed
49	annually. For the purposes of this section, "one school year" means 365 calendar days.
50	C. By the beginning of the 2013-2014 school year, local Local school boards shall adopt and
51	implement policies for the possession and administration of epinephrine in every school, to be
52	administered by any school nurse, employee of the school board, employee of a local governing body,
53	or employee of a local health department who is authorized by a prescriber and trained in the
54	administration of epinephrine to any student believed to be having an anaphylactic reaction. Such
55	policies shall require that at least one school nurse, employee of the school board, employee of a local
56	governing body, or employee of a local health department who is authorized by a prescriber and trained
57	in the administration of epinephrine has the means to access at all times during regular school hours
58	any such epinephrine that is stored in a locked or otherwise generally inaccessible container or area.

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
