10	WHEREAS, the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States was ratified 150 years
11	ago, on February 3, 1870, forbidding the denial of United States citizens' right to vote "on account of
12	race, color, or previous condition of servitude" and providing constitutionally for the right to vote for
13	African American men; and
14	WHEREAS, the nation's founders asserted in the United States Declaration of Independence "that all
15	men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that
16	among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness"; but these ideals did not extend to enslaved
17	persons, formerly enslaved persons, or their descendants; and
18	WHEREAS, the Thirteenth Amendment, ratified on December 6, 1865, formally encoded the
19	abolition of slavery, an institution that spanned nearly 250 years in the British colonies and the new
20	nation; the Fourteenth Amendment, ratified on July 9, 1868, granted citizenship to "all persons born or
21 22	naturalized in the United States" and required equal protection under the law for all persons within the states' jurisdiction; and
22 23	WHEREAS, the Fifteenth Amendment was the last of the three Reconstruction Amendments passed
23 24	in the wake of the American Civil War to build a foundation for the newly reunited nation, inclusive of
25	rights for formerly enslaved persons and their descendants; and
26	WHEREAS, the passage of the Fifteenth Amendment and the granting of the right to vote to African
27	American men enabled the election of African American legislators to the General Assembly, to both
28	the Senate and the House of Delegates, and enabled African American Virginians to have a voice in
29	Virginia's legislature; and
30	WHEREAS, the right to vote and the power it afforded to African American voters was resisted,
31	particularly in the American South, and in spite of the constitutionally guaranteed right, African
32	American voters were deliberately disenfranchised, including by Jim Crow laws that included poll taxes
33	and literacy tests designed to make the polls inaccessible to African American voters; and
34	WHEREAS, the suppression of the vote disenfranchised African Americans for decades following
35	Reconstruction, such that in Virginia no African Americans were elected to the General Assembly from
36 37	1890 until 1969; and WHEREAS, the right to vote guaranteed by the Fifteenth Amendment had to be continually fought
37 38	for following Reconstruction and through the Civil Rights Movement, and such right was encoded again
39	in the form of the Twenty-fourth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, ratified in 1964,
40	abolishing poll taxes, and the Voting Rights Act of 1965, prohibiting discriminatory voting practices;

42	WHEREAS, the right of citizens to vote is a fundamental component of American democracy, a right
43	that has historically been denied and suppressed, and a right that must be continually defended and
44	protected; now, therefore, be it
45	RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the General Assembly hereby
46	commemorate the 150th anniversary of the ratification of the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution
47	of the United States; and, be it
48 49	RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the House of Delegates transmit a copy of this resolution to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Chairman and Executive Director of the State Council of
49 50	Higher Education for Virginia, the Chancellor of the Virginia Community College System, the Executive
50 51	Director of the Virginia State Conference NAACP, and the Executive Director of the American Civil
52	Liberties Union of Virginia, requesting that they further disseminate copies of this resolution to their
53	respective constituents so that they may be apprised of the sense of the General Assembly of Virginia in
54	this matter.

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
