AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE (Proposed by the Senate Committee on Rehabilitation and Social Services

on January 24, 2020)

- 5 6 A BILL to amend and reenact § 4.1-206 of the Code of Virginia, relating to alcoholic beverage control; 7 privileges of local special events licensees. 8
 - Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
 - 1. That § 4.1-206 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:

§ 4.1-206. Alcoholic beverage licenses.

A. The Board may grant the following licenses relating to alcoholic beverages generally:

1. Distillers' licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture alcoholic beverages other 12 13 than wine and beer, and to sell and deliver or ship the same, in accordance with Board regulations, in closed containers, to the Board and to persons outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the 14 15 Commonwealth. When the Board has established a government store on the distiller's licensed premises pursuant to subsection D of § 4.1-119, such license shall also authorize the licensee to make a charge to 16 17 consumers to participate in an organized tasting event conducted in accordance with subsection G of § 4.1-119 and Board regulations. 18

2. Limited distiller's licenses, to distilleries that manufacture not more than 36,000 gallons of 19 20 alcoholic beverages other than wine or beer per calendar year, provided (i) the distillery is located on a 21 farm in the Commonwealth on land zoned agricultural and owned or leased by such distillery or its 22 owner and (ii) agricultural products used by such distillery in the manufacture of its alcoholic beverages are grown on the farm. Limited distiller's licensees shall be treated as distillers for all purposes of this 23 24 title except as otherwise provided in this subdivision. For purposes of this subdivision, "land zoned agricultural" means (a) land zoned as an agricultural district or classification or (b) land otherwise 25 permitted by a locality for limited distillery use. For purposes of this subdivision, "land zoned 26 27 agricultural" does not include land zoned "residential conservation." Except for the limitation on land 28 zoned "residential conservation," nothing in this definition shall otherwise limit or affect local zoning 29 authority.

30 3. Fruit distillers' licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to manufacture any alcoholic beverages 31 made from fruit or fruit juices, and to sell and deliver or ship the same, in accordance with Board 32 regulations, in closed containers, to the Board and to persons outside the Commonwealth for resale outside the Commonwealth. 33

34 4. Banquet facility licenses to volunteer fire departments and volunteer emergency medical services 35 agencies, which shall authorize the licensee to permit the consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic 36 beverages on the premises of the licensee by any person, and bona fide members and guests thereof, otherwise eligible for a banquet license. However, lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages shall not be 37 38 purchased or sold by the licensee or sold or charged for in any way by the person permitted to use the 39 premises. Such premises shall be a volunteer fire or volunteer emergency medical services agency 40 station or both, regularly occupied as such and recognized by the governing body of the county, city, or town in which it is located. Under conditions as specified by Board regulation, such premises may be 41 other than a volunteer fire or volunteer emergency medical services agency station, provided such other 42 43 premises are occupied and under the control of the volunteer fire department or volunteer emergency 44 medical services agency while the privileges of its license are being exercised.

5. Bed and breakfast licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to (i) serve alcoholic beverages in 45 dining areas, private guest rooms and other designated areas to persons to whom overnight lodging is 46 47 being provided, with or without meals, for on-premises consumption only in such rooms and areas, and **48** without regard to the amount of gross receipts from the sale of food prepared and consumed on the premises and (ii) permit the consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages by persons to whom 49 overnight lodging is being provided in (a) bedrooms or private guest rooms or (b) other designated areas 50 of the bed and breakfast establishment. For purposes of this subdivision, "other designated areas" 51 includes outdoor dining areas, whether or not contiguous to the licensed premises, which may have more 52 53 than one means of ingress and egress to an adjacent public thoroughfare, provided that such outdoor 54 dining areas are under the control of the licensee and approved by the Board. Such noncontiguous designated areas shall not be approved for any retail license issued pursuant to subdivision A 5 of 55 § 4.1-201. 56

57 6. Tasting licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to sell or give samples of alcoholic beverages of the type specified in the license in designated areas at events held by the licensee. A tasting license 58 59 shall be issued for the purpose of featuring and educating the consuming public about the alcoholic

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beverages being tasted. A separate license shall be required for each day of each tasting event. Notasting license shall be required for conduct authorized by § 4.1-201.1.

7. Museum licenses, which may be issued to nonprofit museums exempt from taxation under
§ 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, which shall authorize the licensee to (i) permit the
consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee by any bona fide
member and guests thereof and (ii) serve alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee to any
bona fide member and guests thereof. However, alcoholic beverages shall not be sold or charged for in
any way by the licensee. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the museum,
regularly occupied and utilized as such.

8. Equine sporting event licenses, which may be issued to organizations holding equestrian, hunt and steeplechase events, which shall authorize the licensee to permit the consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee by patrons thereof during such event. However, alcoholic beverages shall not be sold or charged for in any way by the licensee. The privileges of this license shall be (i) limited to the premises of the licensee, regularly occupied and utilized for equestrian, hunt and steeplechase events and (ii) exercised on no more than four calendar days per year.

9. Day spa licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to (i) permit the consumption of lawfully acquired wine or beer on the premises of the licensee by any bona fide customer of the day spa and (ii) serve wine or beer on the premises of the licensee to any such bona fide customer; however, the licensee shall not give more than two five-ounce glasses of wine or one 12-ounce glass of beer to any such customer, nor shall it sell or otherwise charge a fee to such customer for the wine or beer served or consumed. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the day spa regularly occupied and utilized as such.

10. Motor car sporting event facility licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to permit the consumption of lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee by patrons thereof during such events. However, alcoholic beverages shall not be sold or charged for in any way, directly or indirectly, by the licensee. The privileges of this license shall be limited to those areas of the licensee's premises designated by the Board that are regularly occupied and utilized for motor car sporting events.

11. Meal-assembly kitchen license, which shall authorize the licensee to serve wine or beer on the
premises of the licensee to any such bona fide customer attending either a private gathering or a special
event; however, the licensee shall not give more than two five-ounce glasses of wine or two 12-ounce
glasses of beer to any such customer, nor shall it sell or otherwise charge a fee to such customer for the
wine or beer served or consumed. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the
meal-assembly kitchen regularly occupied and utilized as such.

94 12. Canal boat operator license, which shall authorize the licensee to permit the consumption of 95 lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises of the licensee by any bona fide customer 96 attending either a private gathering or a special event; however, the licensee shall not sell or otherwise 97 charge a fee to such customer for the alcoholic beverages so consumed. The privileges of this license 98 shall be limited to the premises of the licensee, including the canal, the canal boats while in operation, 99 and any pathways adjacent thereto. Upon authorization of the licensee, any person may keep and 100 consume his own lawfully acquired alcoholic beverages on the premises in all areas and locations 101 covered by the license.

102 13. Annual arts venue event licenses, to persons operating an arts venue, which shall authorize the 103 licensee participating in a community art walk that is open to the public to serve lawfully acquired wine 104 or beer on the premises of the licensee to adult patrons thereof during such events. However, alcoholic 105 beverages shall not be sold or charged for in any way, directly or indirectly, by the licensee, and the 106 licensee shall not give more than two five-ounce glasses of wine or one 12-ounce glass of beer to any 107 one adult patron. The privileges of this license shall be (i) limited to the premises of the arts venue 108 regularly occupied and used as such and (ii) exercised on no more than 12 calendar days per year.

109 14. Art instruction studio licenses, which shall authorize the licensee to serve wine or beer on the 110 premises of the licensee to any such bona fide customer; however, the licensee shall not give more than 111 two five-ounce glasses of wine or one 12-ounce glass of beer to any such customer, nor shall it sell or 112 otherwise charge a fee to such customer for the wine or beer served or consumed. The privileges of this 113 license shall be limited to the premises of the art instruction studio regularly occupied and utilized as 114 such.

115 15. Commercial lifestyle center license, which may be issued only to a commercial owners' association governing a commercial lifestyle center, which shall authorize any retail on-premises restaurant licensee that is a tenant of the commercial lifestyle center to sell alcoholic beverages to any bona fide customer to whom alcoholic beverages may be lawfully sold for consumption on that portion of the licensed premises of the commercial lifestyle center designated by the Board, including (i) plazas, seating areas, concourses, walkways, or such other similar areas and (ii) the premises of any tenant location of the commercial lifestyle center that is not a retail licensee of the Board, upon approval of

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122 such tenant, but excluding any parking areas. Only alcoholic beverages purchased from such retail 123 on-premises restaurant licensees may be consumed on the licensed premises of the commercial lifestyle 124 center, and such alcoholic beverages shall be contained in paper, plastic, or similar disposable containers 125 with the name or logo of the restaurant licensee that sold the alcoholic beverage clearly displayed. 126 Alcoholic beverages shall not be sold or charged for in any way by the commercial lifestyle center 127 licensee. The licensee shall post appropriate signage clearly demarcating for the public the boundaries of 128 the licensed premises; however, no physical barriers shall be required for this purpose. The licensee shall 129 provide adequate security for the licensed premises to ensure compliance with the applicable provisions 130 of this title and Board regulations.

131 16. Confectionery license, which shall authorize the licensee to prepare and sell on the licensed
132 premises for off-premises consumption confectionery that contains five percent or less alcohol by
133 volume. Any alcohol contained in such confectionery shall not be in liquid form at the time such
134 confectionery is sold.

135 17. Local special events license, which may be issued only to a locality, business improvement 136 district, or nonprofit organization and which shall authorize (i) the licensee to permit the consumption of alcoholic beverages within the area designated by the Board for the special event and (ii) any permanent 137 138 retail on-premises licensee that is located within the area designated by the Board for the special event 139 to sell alcoholic beverages within the permanent retail location for consumption in the area designated 140 for the special event, including sidewalks and the premises of businesses not licensed to sell alcoholic 141 beverages at retail, upon approval of such businesses. In determining the designated area for the special 142 event, the Board shall consult with the locality. Local special events licensees shall be limited to $\frac{12}{16}$ 143 special events per year, and the duration of any special event shall not exceed three consecutive days. 144 Only alcoholic beverages purchased from permanent retail on-premises licensees located within the 145 designated area may be consumed at the special event, and such alcoholic beverages shall be contained 146 in paper, plastic, or similar disposable containers that clearly display the name or logo of the retail 147 on-premises licensee from which the alcoholic beverage was purchased. Alcoholic beverages shall not be 148 sold or charged for in any way by the local special events licensee. The local special events licensee 149 shall post appropriate signage clearly demarcating for the public the boundaries of the special event; 150 however, no physical barriers shall be required for this purpose. The local special events licensee shall 151 provide adequate security for the special event to ensure compliance with the applicable provisions of 152 this title and Board regulations.

153 18. Coworking establishment license, which shall authorize the licensee to (i) permit the consumption 154 of lawfully acquired wine or beer between 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on the premises of the licensee by 155 any member and up to two guests of each member, provided that such member and guests are persons 156 who may lawfully consume alcohol and an employee of the coworking establishment is present, and (ii) 157 serve wine and beer on the premises of the licensee between 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. to any member 158 and up to two guests of each member, provided that such member and guests are persons to whom alcoholic beverages may be lawfully served. However, the licensee shall not give more than two 159 160 five-ounce glasses of wine or two 12-ounce glasses of beer to any person, nor shall it sell or otherwise charge a fee for the wine or beer served or consumed. For purposes of this subdivision, the payment of 161 162 membership dues by a member to the coworking establishment shall not constitute a sale or charge for alcohol, provided that the availability of alcohol is not a privilege for which the amount of membership 163 164 dues increases. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the coworking 165 establishment, regularly occupied and utilized as such.

166 19. Bespoke clothier establishment license, which shall authorize the licensee to serve wine or beer 167 for on-premises consumption upon the licensed premises approved by the Board to any member; 168 however, the licensee shall not give more than (i) two five-ounce glasses of wine or (ii) two 12-ounce 169 glasses of beer to any such customer, nor shall it sell or otherwise charge a fee to such customer for the 170 wine or beer served or consumed. For purposes of this subdivision, the payment of membership dues by 171 a member to the bespoke clothier establishment shall not constitute a sale or charge for alcohol, 172 provided that the availability of alcohol is not a privilege for which the amount of membership dues 173 increases. The privileges of this license shall be limited to the premises of the bespoke clothier 174 establishment, regularly occupied and utilized as such.

175 B. Any limited distillery that, prior to July 1, 2016, (i) holds a valid license granted by the Board in 176 accordance with this title and (ii) is in compliance with the local zoning ordinance as an agricultural 177 district or classification or as otherwise permitted by a locality for limited distillery use shall be allowed 178 to continue such use as provided in § 15.2-2307, notwithstanding (a) the provisions of this section or (b) 179 a subsequent change in ownership of the limited distillery on or after July 1, 2016, whether by transfer, 180 acquisition, inheritance, or other means. Any such limited distillery located on land zoned residential conservation prior to July 1, 2016, may expand any existing building or structure and the uses thereof so 181 long as specifically approved by the locality by special exception. Any such limited distillery located on 182

- 183 land zoned residential conservation prior to July 1, 2016, may construct a new building or structure so
- 184 long as specifically approved by the locality by special exception. All such licensees shall comply with 185 the requirements of this title and Board regulations for renewal of such license or the issuance of a new
- 186 license in the event of a change in ownership of the limited distillery on or after July 1, 2016.
