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10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 2 of Title 35.1 a section numbered
12 13	35.1-17.1 as follows: § 35.1-17.1. Campgrounds; inherent risks; liability.
13 14	A. As used in this section, "camping" means all aspects of visiting a campground, staying overnight
15	at a campground, and using all areas of a campground.
16	B. A person who goes camping at a campground shall be presumed to have known the inherent risks
17	of camping. Such inherent risks of camping include:
18	1. Features of the natural world, such as trees, tree stumps, roots, brush, rocks, sand, water, soil,
19 20	stinging and biting insects and animals, other wildlife, poisonous or noxious plants, and weather;
20 21	<ol> <li>Uneven or unpredictable terrain;</li> <li>Natural bodies of water and accessories permitting the use of natural bodies of water, including</li> </ol>
22	piers, docks, swimming areas, and aquatic or recreation facilities or areas;
23	4. Another individual at the campground acting in a negligent manner;
24	5. Lack of lighting;
25	6. Campfires, whether in a fire pit or enclosure provided by the campground or makeshift by an
26	individual or group at the campground;
27	7. Violation of safety rules or disregard for signs communicating warnings;
28 29	8. Actions by the individual exceeding his physical limitations or abilities that causes his injuries; and
<b>3</b> 0	9. Animals of other individuals or groups visiting the campground that cause injury, unless the
31	campground has accepted responsibility for care of the animal.
32	C. A campground, an owner or operator of a campground, and any employee or officer of a
33	campground shall be immune from civil liability for acts or omissions related to camping at a
34	campground if a person is injured or killed, or the property of an individual or group is damaged, as a
35 36	result of the inherent risks of camping. D. Notwithstanding subsection C, a campground, an owner or operator of a campground, and any
37	employee or officer of a campground may be held civilly liable under this section if the person or
38	agents of the campground seeking immunity:
39	1. Intentionally cause injury, death, or property damage;
40	2. Act with a willful or wanton disregard for the safety of others or the property of others; or
41 42	3. Fail to conspicuously post warning signs of a dangerous inconspicuous condition known on the
42 43	property if the owner of the campground is aware of the condition by reason of a prior injury involving the same location or the same mechanism of injury.
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
