10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That §§ 19.2-392.2 and 19.2-392.4 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as
12	follows:
13	§ 19.2-392.2. Expungement of police and court records.
14	A. If a person is charged with the commission of a crime or any offense defined in Title 18.2, and
15	1. Is (i) the person is acquitted, $\Theta$
16	2. A; (ii) a nolle prosequi is taken or; (iii) the charge is otherwise dismissed, including dismissal by
17	accord and satisfaction pursuant to § 19.2-151; or (iv) (a) the person is convicted of a violation of
18 19	§ 4.1-305 or 18.2-250.1 or charged under either section and the charge is deferred and dismissed, (b) the norman way under 21 ways of age on the date of the insident leading to the completion or dismissed
<b>20</b>	the person was under 21 years of age on the date of the incident leading to the conviction or dismissal, (c) all court costs and fines and all orders of restitution have been satisfied, and (d) five years have
<b>20</b> <b>21</b>	passed since the date of completion of all terms of sentencing and probation, he may file a petition
22	setting forth the relevant facts and requesting expungement of the police records and the court records
23	relating to the charge <i>or conviction</i> .
24	B. If any person whose name or other identification has been used without his consent or
25	authorization by another person who has been charged or arrested using such name or identification, he
26	may file a petition with the court disposing of the charge for relief pursuant to this section. Such person
27	shall not be required to pay any fees for the filing of a petition under this subsection. A petition filed
28	under this subsection shall include one complete set of the petitioner's fingerprints obtained from a
29 30	law-enforcement agency. C. The petition with a copy of the warrant or indictment if reasonably available shall be filed in the
31	circuit court of the county or city in which the case was disposed of by acquittal or being otherwise
32	dismissed and shall contain, except where not reasonably available, the date of arrest and the name of
33	the arresting agency. Where this information is not reasonably available, the petition shall state the
34	reason for such unavailability. The petition shall further state the specific criminal charge or conviction
35	to be expunded, the date of final disposition of the charge or conviction as set forth in the petition, the
36	petitioner's date of birth, and the full name used by the petitioner at the time of arrest.
37	D. A copy of the petition shall be served on the attorney for the Commonwealth of the city or
38	county in which the petition is filed. The attorney for the Commonwealth may file an objection or
39 40	answer to the petition or may give written notice to the court that he does not object to the petition within 21 days after it is served on him
40	within 21 days after it is served on him. E. The petitioner shall obtain from a law-enforcement agency one complete set of the petitioner's
42	fingerprints and shall provide that agency with a copy of the petition for expungement. The
43	law-enforcement agency shall submit the set of fingerprints to the Central Criminal Records Exchange
44	(CCRE) with a copy of the petition for expungement attached. The CCRE shall forward under seal to
45	the court a copy of the petitioner's criminal history, a copy of the source documents that resulted in the
46	CCRE entry that the petitioner wishes to expunge, and the set of fingerprints. Upon completion of the
47	hearing, the court shall return the fingerprint card to the petitioner. If no hearing was conducted, upon
48	the entry of an order of expungement or an order denying the petition for expungement, the court shall
49 50	cause the fingerprint card to be destroyed unless, within 30 days of the date of the entry of the order, the neticioner requests the return of the fingerprint card in person from the clerk of the court or provides
50 51	the petitioner requests the return of the fingerprint card in person from the clerk of the court or provides the clerk of the court a self-addressed, stamped envelope for the return of the fingerprint card.
52	F. After receiving the criminal history record information from the CCRE, the court shall conduct a
53	hearing on the petition. If the court finds that the continued existence and possible dissemination of
54	information relating to the arrest, <i>charge, or conviction</i> of the petitioner causes or may cause
55	circumstances which that constitute a manifest injustice to the petitioner, it shall enter an order requiring
56	the expungement of the police and court records, including electronic records, relating to the arrest,
57	charge, or conviction. Otherwise, it shall deny the petition. However, if the petitioner has no prior
58	criminal record and the arrest, charge, or conviction was for a misdemeanor violation, the petitioner

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59 shall be entitled, in the absence of good cause shown to the contrary by the Commonwealth, to 60 expungement of the police and court records relating to the arrest, charge, or conviction and the court shall enter an order of expungement. If the attorney for the Commonwealth of the county or city in 61 which the petition is filed (i) gives written notice to the court pursuant to subsection D that he does not 62 63 object to the petition and (ii) when the charge to be expunded is a felony, stipulates in such written 64 notice that the continued existence and possible dissemination of information relating to the arrest of the 65 petitioner causes or may cause circumstances which that constitute a manifest injustice to the petitioner, 66 the court may enter an order of expungement without conducting a hearing.

67 G. The Commonwealth shall be made party defendant to the proceeding. Any party aggrieved by the decision of the court may appeal, as provided by law in civil cases.

H. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, when the *a* charge is dismissed because the court finds that the person arrested or charged is not the person named in the summons, warrant, indictment, or presentment, the court dismissing the charge shall, upon motion of the person improperly arrested or charged, enter an order requiring expungement of the police and court records relating to the charge. Such order shall contain a statement that the dismissal and expungement are ordered pursuant to this subsection and shall be accompanied by the complete set of the petitioner's fingerprints filed with his petition. Upon the entry of such order, it shall be treated as provided in subsection K.

1. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, upon receiving a copy pursuant to § 2.2-402
of an absolute pardon for the commission of a crime that a person did not commit, the court shall enter
an order requiring expungement of the police and court records relating to the charge and conviction.
Such order shall contain a statement that the expungement is ordered pursuant to this subsection. Upon
the entry of such order, it shall be treated as provided in subsection K.

J. Upon receiving a copy of a writ vacating a conviction pursuant to § 19.2-327.5 or 19.2-327.13, the court shall enter an order requiring expungement of the police and court records relating to the charge and conviction. Such order shall contain a statement that the expungement is ordered pursuant to this subsection. Upon the entry of the order, it shall be treated as provided in subsection K.

K. Upon the entry of an order of expungement, the clerk of the court shall cause a copy of such order to be forwarded to the Department of State Police, which shall, pursuant to rules and regulations adopted pursuant to § 9.1-134, direct the manner by which the appropriate expungement or removal of such records shall be effected.

89 L. Costs shall be as provided by § 17.1-275, but shall not be recoverable against the Commonwealth.
90 If the court enters an order of expungement, the clerk of the court shall refund to the petitioner such costs paid by the petitioner.

M. Any order entered where (i) the court or parties failed to strictly comply with the procedures set forth in this section or (ii) the court enters an order of expungement contrary to law, shall be voidable upon motion and notice made within three years of the entry of such order.

## 95 § 19.2-392.4. Prohibited practices by employers, educational institutions, agencies, etc., of state 96 and local governments.

A. An employer or educational institution shall not, in any application, interview, or otherwise, require an applicant for employment or admission to disclose information concerning any arrest or, criminal charge against him, or conviction that has been expunged. An applicant need not, in answer to any question concerning any arrest or, criminal charge that has not resulted in a conviction, or conviction, include a reference to or information concerning arrests or, charges, or convictions that have been expunged.

103 B. Agencies, officials, and employees of the state and local governments shall not, in any application, interview, or otherwise, require an applicant for a license, permit, registration, or 104 105 governmental service to disclose information concerning any arrest or, criminal charge against him, or 106 conviction that has been expunged. An applicant need not, in answer to any question concerning any 107 arrest or, criminal charge that has not resulted in a conviction, or conviction, include a reference to or 108 information concerning arrests, charges, or convictions that have been expunged. Such an application 109 may not be denied solely because of the applicant's refusal to disclose information concerning any arrest 110 or, criminal charge against him, or conviction that has been expunged.

111 C. A person who willfully violates this section is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor for each violation.
