That § 32.1-46, as it is currently effective and as it shall become effective, of the Code of 11 Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows: 12 \S 32.1-46. (Effective until July 1, 2021) Immunization of patients against certain diseases. 13 14 A. The parent, guardian or person standing in loco parentis of each child within this Commonwealth 15 shall cause such child to be immunized in accordance with the Immunization Schedule developed and 16 published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP), the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), and the American 17 Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP). The required immunizations for attendance at a public or 18 19 private elementary, middle or secondary school, child care center, nursery school, family day care home 20 or developmental center shall be those set forth in the State Board of Health Regulations for the 21 Immunization of School Children. The Board's regulations shall at a minimum require: 1. A minimum of three properly spaced doses of hepatitis B vaccine (HepB). 22 23 2. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of diphtheria toxoid. One dose shall be 24 administered on or after the fourth birthday. 25 3. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of tetanus toxoid. One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. 26 27 4. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of acellular pertussis vaccine. One dose shall 28 be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A booster dose shall be administered prior to entry into the seventh grade. 29 30 5. Two or three primary doses of Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) vaccine, depending on the 31 manufacturer, for children up to 60 months of age. 6. Two properly spaced doses of live attenuated measles (rubeola) vaccine. The first dose shall be 32 33 administered at age 12 months or older. 7. One dose of live attenuated rubella vaccine shall be administered at age 12 months or older. 34 35 8. One dose of live attenuated mumps vaccine shall be administered at age 12 months or older. 36 9. All children born on and after January 1, 1997, shall be required to have one dose of varicella 37 vaccine on or after 12 months. 38 10. Three or more properly spaced doses of oral polio vaccine (OPV) or inactivated polio vaccine 39 (IPV). One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A fourth dose shall be required if 40 the three dose primary series consisted of a combination of OPV and IPV. 11. One to four doses, dependent on age at first dose, of properly spaced pneumococcal conjugate 41 (PCV) vaccine for children up to 60 months of age. 42 43 12. Three doses of properly spaced human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine for females. The first dose shall be administered before the child enters the sixth grade. 44 45 The parent, guardian or person standing in loco parentis may have such child immunized by a physician, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, registered nurse, or licensed practical nurse, or a 46 47 pharmacist who administers pursuant to a valid prescription, or may present the child to the appropriate local health department, which shall administer the vaccines required by the State Board of Health 48 49 Regulations for the Immunization of School Children without charge to the parent of or person standing in loco parentis to the child if (i) the child is eligible for the Vaccines for Children Program or (ii) the 50 51 child is eligible for coverages issued pursuant to Title XVIII of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. 52 § 1395 et seq. (Medicare), Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. § 1396 et seq. (Medicaid), Title XXI of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. § 1397aa et seq. (CHIP), or 10 U.S.C. § 1071 et seq. 53 (CHAMPUS). In all cases in which a child is covered by a health carrier, Medicare, Medicaid, CHIP, or 54 55 CHAMPUS, the Department shall seek reimbursement from the health carrier, Medicare, Medicaid, CHIP, or CHAMPUS for all allowable costs associated with the provision of the vaccine. For the 56 purposes of this section, the Department shall be deemed a participating provider with a managed care 57 58 health insurance plan as defined in § 32.1-137.1.

59 B. A physician assistant, nurse practitioner, registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, pharmacist, or local health department administering a vaccine required by this section shall provide to 60 the person who presents the child for immunizations a certificate that shall state the diseases for which 61 62 the child has been immunized, the numbers of doses given, the dates when administered and any further 63 immunizations indicated.

64 C. The vaccines required by this section shall meet the standards prescribed in, and be administered 65 in accordance with, regulations of the Board.

D. The provisions of this section shall not apply if: 66

1. The parent or guardian of the child objects thereto on the grounds that the administration of 67 immunizing agents conflicts with his religious tenets or practices, unless an emergency or epidemic of 68 69 disease has been declared by the Board;

70 2. The parent or guardian presents a statement from a physician licensed to practice medicine in Virginia, a licensed nurse practitioner, or a local health department that states that the physical condition 71 of the child is such that the administration of one or more of the required immunizing agents would be 72 73 detrimental to the health of the child; or

74 3. Because the human papillomavirus is not communicable in a school setting, a parent or guardian, 75 at the parent's or guardian's sole discretion, may elect for the parent's or guardian's child not to receive 76 the human papillomavirus vaccine, after having reviewed materials describing the link between the 77 human papillomavirus and cervical cancer approved for such use by the Board.

E. For the purpose of protecting the public health by ensuring that each child receives age-appropriate immunizations, any physician, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, licensed institutional health care provider, local or district health department, the Virginia Immunization Information System, and the Department of Health may share immunization and patient locator 78 79 80 81 information without parental authorization, including, but not limited to, the month, day, and year of 82 each administered immunization; the patient's name, address, telephone number, birth date, and social 83 84 security number; and the parents' names. The immunization information; the patient's name, address, telephone number, birth date, and social security number; and the parents' names shall be confidential 85 and shall only be shared for the purposes set out in this subsection. 86

F. The State Board of Health shall review this section annually and make recommendations for 87 88 revision by September 1 to the Governor, the General Assembly, and the Joint Commission on Health 89 Care. 90

§ 32.1-46. (Effective July 1, 2021) Immunization of patients against certain diseases.

A. The parent, guardian or person standing in loco parentis of each child within this Commonwealth 91 shall cause such child to be immunized in accordance with the Immunization Schedule developed and published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP), the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), and the American 92 93 94 95 Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP). The required immunizations for attendance at a public or private elementary, middle or secondary school, child care center, nursery school, family day care home, 96 or developmental center shall be those set forth in the State Board of Health Regulations for the 97 98 Immunization of School Children. The Board's regulations shall at a minimum require: 99

1. A minimum of three properly spaced doses of hepatitis B vaccine (HepB).

2. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of diphtheria toxoid. One dose shall be 100 101 administered on or after the fourth birthday.

102 3. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of tetanus toxoid. One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. 103

4. A minimum of three or more properly spaced doses of acellular pertussis vaccine. One dose shall 104 be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A booster dose shall be administered prior to entry into 105 the seventh grade. 106

107 5. Two or three primary doses of Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) vaccine, depending on the manufacturer, for children up to 60 months of age. 108

6. Two properly spaced doses of live attenuated measles (rubeola) vaccine. The first dose shall be 109 110 administered at age 12 months or older.

7. One dose of live attenuated rubella vaccine shall be administered at age 12 months or older.

8. One dose of live attenuated mumps vaccine shall be administered at age 12 months or older.

113 9. Two properly spaced doses of varicella vaccine. The first dose shall be administered at age 12 months or older. 114

115 10. Three or more properly spaced doses of oral polio vaccine (OPV) or inactivated polio vaccine (IPV). One dose shall be administered on or after the fourth birthday. A fourth dose shall be required if 116 the three dose primary series consisted of a combination of OPV and IPV. 117

11. One to four doses, dependent on age at first dose, of properly spaced pneumococcal conjugate 118 119 (PCV) vaccine for children up to 60 months of age.

12. Two doses of properly spaced human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine. The first dose shall be 120

121 administered before the child enters the seventh grade.

122 13. Two or three properly spaced doses of rotavirus vaccine, depending on the manufacturer, for 123 children up to eight months of age.

124 14. Two properly spaced doses of hepatitis A vaccine (HAV). The first dose shall be administered at 125 age 12 months or older.

126 15. Two properly spaced doses of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MenACWY). The first dose127 shall be administered prior to entry to seventh grade. The second dose shall be administered prior to128 entry to twelfth grade.

129 The parent, guardian or person standing in loco parentis may have such child immunized by a 130 physician, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, registered nurse, or licensed practical nurse, or a 131 pharmacist who administers pursuant to a valid prescription, or may present the child to the appropriate local health department, which shall administer the vaccines required by the State Board of Health 132 133 Regulations for the Immunization of School Children without charge to the parent of or person standing 134 in loco parentis to the child if (i) the child is eligible for the Vaccines for Children Program or (ii) the child is eligible for coverages issued pursuant to Title XVIII of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. 135 136 § 1395 et seq. (Medicare), Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. § 1396 et seq. (Medicaid), Title XXI of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. § 1397aa et seq. (CHIP), or 10 U.S.C. § 1071 et seq. 137 138 (CHAMPUS). In all cases in which a child is covered by a health carrier, Medicare, Medicaid, CHIP, or 139 CHAMPUS, the Department shall seek reimbursement from the health carrier, Medicare, Medicaid, 140 CHIP, or CHAMPUS for all allowable costs associated with the provision of the vaccine. For the 141 purposes of this section, the Department shall be deemed a participating provider with a managed care 142 health insurance plan as defined in § 32.1-137.1.

B. A physician, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, registered nurse, licensed practical nurse,
pharmacist, or local health department administering a vaccine required by this section shall provide to
the person who presents the child for immunizations a certificate that shall state the diseases for which
the child has been immunized, the numbers of doses given, the dates when administered and any further
immunizations indicated.

148 C. The vaccines required by this section shall meet the standards prescribed in, and be administered 149 in accordance with, the State Board of Health Regulations for the Immunization of School Children. The 150 State Board of Health shall amend the State Board of Health Regulations for the Immunization of 151 School Children as necessary from time to time to maintain conformity with evidence-based, routinely 152 recommended vaccinations for children. The adoption of such regulations shall be exempt from the 153 requirements of Article 2 (§ 2.2-4006 et seq.) of the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.). 154 However, the Department shall (i) provide a Notice of Intended Regulatory Action and (ii) provide for a 155 60-day public comment period prior to the Board's adoption of the regulations.

156 D. The provisions of this section shall not apply if:

157 1. The parent or guardian of the child objects thereto on the grounds that the administration of
 158 immunizing agents conflicts with his religious tenets or practices, unless an emergency or epidemic of
 159 disease has been declared by the Board;

160 2. The parent or guardian presents a statement from a physician licensed to practice medicine in
161 Virginia, a licensed nurse practitioner, or a local health department that states that the physical condition
162 of the child is such that the administration of one or more of the required immunizing agents would be
163 detrimental to the health of the child; or

3. Because the human papillomavirus is not communicable in a school setting, a parent or guardian, at the parent's or guardian's sole discretion, may elect for the parent's or guardian's child not to receive the human papillomavirus vaccine, after having reviewed materials describing the link between the human papillomavirus and cervical cancer approved for such use by the Board.

E. For the purpose of protecting the public health by ensuring that each child receives 168 age-appropriate immunizations, any physician, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, licensed institutional health care provider, local or district health department, the Virginia Immunization 169 170 171 Information System, and the Department of Health may share immunization and patient locator 172 information without parental authorization, including, but not limited to, the month, day, and year of each administered immunization; the patient's name, address, telephone number, birth date, and social 173 174 security number; and the parents' names. The immunization information; the patient's name, address, 175 telephone number, birth date, and social security number; and the parents' names shall be confidential 176 and shall only be shared for the purposes set out in this subsection.

F. The State Board of Health shall review this section annually and make recommendations forrevision by September 1 to the Governor, the General Assembly, and the Joint Commission on HealthCare.
