4	A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 16.1-253 and 16.1-253.2 of the Code of Virginia, relating to violations
5	of protective orders; preliminary child protective order.

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10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That §§ 16.1-253 and 16.1-253.2 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:
12	§ 16.1-253. Preliminary protective order.
13	A. Upon the motion of any person or upon the court's own motion, the court may issue a preliminary
14	protective order, after a hearing, if necessary to protect a child's life, health, safety or normal
15	development pending the final determination of any matter before the court. The order may require a
16	child's parents, guardian, legal custodian, other person standing in loco parentis or other family or
17	household member of the child to observe reasonable conditions of behavior for a specified length of
18	time. These conditions shall include any one or more of the following:
19	1. To abstain from offensive conduct against the child, a family or household member of the child or
20	any person to whom custody of the child is awarded;
21	2. To cooperate in the provision of reasonable services or programs designed to protect the child's
22	life, health or normal development;
23	3. To allow persons named by the court to come into the child's home at reasonable times designated
24	by the court to visit the child or inspect the fitness of the home and to determine the physical or
25 26	emotional health of the child;
20 27	4. To allow visitation with the child by persons entitled thereto, as determined by the court; 5. To refrain from acts of commission or omission which tend to endanger the child's life, health or

<b>2</b> 9	6. To refrain from such contact with the child or family or household members of the child, as the
30	court may deem appropriate, including removal of such person from the residence of the child.
31	However, prior to the issuance by the court of an order removing such person from the residence of the
32	child, the petitioner must prove by a preponderance of the evidence that such person's probable future
33	conduct would constitute a danger to the life or health of such child, and that there are no less drastic
34	alternatives which could reasonably and adequately protect the child's life or health pending a final
35	determination on the petition; or
36	7. To grant the person on whose behalf the order is issued the possession of any companion animal
37	as defined in § 3.2-6500 if such person meets the definition of owner in § 3.2-6500.
38	B. A preliminary protective order may be issued ex parte upon motion of any person or the court's
39	own motion in any matter before the court, or upon petition. The motion or petition shall be supported
40	by an affidavit or by sworn testimony in person before the judge or intake officer which establishes that
41	the child would be subjected to an imminent threat to life or health to the extent that delay for the
42	provision of an adversary hearing would be likely to result in serious or irremediable injury to the
43	child's life or health. If an ex parte order is issued without an affidavit being presented, the court, in its
44	order, shall state the basis upon which the order was entered, including a summary of the allegations
45	made and the court's findings. Following the issuance of an ex parte order the court shall provide an
46	adversary hearing to the affected parties within the shortest practicable time not to exceed five business
47 48	days after the issuance of the order.
40 49	C. Prior to the hearing required by this section, notice of the hearing shall be given at least 24 hours in advance of the hearing to the guardian ad litem for the child, to the parents, guardian, legal custodian,
<b>50</b>	or other person standing in loco parentis of the child, to any other family or household member of the
50 51	child to whom the protective order may be directed and to the child if he or she is 12 years of age or
52	older. The notice provided herein shall include (i) the time, date and place for the hearing and (ii) a
5 <u>7</u>	specific statement of the factual circumstances which allegedly necessitate the issuance of a preliminary
54	protective order.
55	D. All parties to the hearing shall be informed of their right to counsel pursuant to § 16.1-266.
56	E. At the hearing the child, his or her parents, guardian, legal custodian or other person standing in
57	loco parentis and any other family or household member of the child to whom notice was given shall
58	have the right to confront and cross-examine all adverse witnesses and evidence and to present evidence

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**59** on their own behalf.

60 F. If a petition alleging abuse or neglect of a child has been filed, at the hearing pursuant to this section the court shall determine whether the allegations of abuse or neglect have been proven by a 61 preponderance of the evidence. Any finding of abuse or neglect shall be stated in the court order. 62 63 However, if, before such a finding is made, a person responsible for the care and custody of the child, 64 the child's guardian ad litem or the local department of social services objects to a finding being made 65 at the hearing, the court shall schedule an adjudicatory hearing to be held within 30 days of the date of the initial preliminary protective order hearing. The adjudicatory hearing shall be held to determine 66 whether the allegations of abuse and neglect have been proven by a preponderance of the evidence. 67 Parties who are present at the hearing shall be given notice of the date set for the adjudicatory hearing 68 69 and parties who are not present shall be summoned as provided in § 16.1-263. The adjudicatory hearing shall be held and an order may be entered, although a party to the hearing fails to appear and is not 70 71 represented by counsel, provided personal or substituted service was made on the person, or the court 72 determines that such person cannot be found, after reasonable effort, or in the case of a person who is 73 without the Commonwealth, the person cannot be found or his post office address cannot be ascertained 74 after reasonable effort.

Any preliminary protective order issued shall remain in full force and effect pending the adjudicatoryhearing.

77 G. If at the preliminary protective order hearing held pursuant to this section the court makes a 78 finding of abuse or neglect and a preliminary protective order is issued, a dispositional hearing shall be held pursuant to § 16.1-278.2. The court shall forthwith, but in all cases no later than the end of the 79 80 business day on which the order was issued, enter and transfer electronically to the Virginia Criminal 81 Information Network the respondent's identifying information and the name, date of birth, sex, and race of each protected person provided to the court. A copy of the preliminary protective order containing 82 83 any such identifying information shall be forwarded forthwith to the primary law-enforcement agency 84 responsible for service and entry of protective orders. Upon receipt of the order by the primary 85 law-enforcement agency, the agency shall forthwith verify and enter any modification as necessary to the identifying information and other appropriate information required by the Department of State Police 86 87 into the Virginia Criminal Information Network established and maintained by the Department of State 88 Police pursuant to Chapter 2 (§ 52-12 et seq.) of Title 52 and the order shall be served forthwith on the 89 allegedly abusing person in person as provided in § 16.1-264 and due return made to the court. 90 However, if the order is issued by the circuit court, the clerk of the circuit court shall forthwith forward 91 an attested copy of the order containing the respondent's identifying information and the name, date of birth, sex, and race of each protected person provided to the court to the primary law-enforcement agency providing service and entry of protective orders and upon receipt of the order, the primary 92 93 94 law-enforcement agency shall enter the name of the person subject to the order and other appropriate 95 information required by the Department of State Police into the Virginia Criminal Information Network 96 established and maintained by the Department pursuant to Chapter 2 (§ 52-12 et seq.) of Title 52 and the order shall be served forthwith upon the allegedly abusing person in person as provided in 97 98 § 16.1-264. Upon service, the agency making service shall enter the date and time of service and other 99 appropriate information required by the Department of State Police into the Virginia Criminal Information Network and make due return to the court. The preliminary order shall specify a date for 100 101 the dispositional hearing. The dispositional hearing shall be scheduled at the time of the hearing pursuant to this section, and shall be held within 60 days of this hearing. If an adjudicatory hearing is 102 103 requested pursuant to subsection F, the dispositional hearing shall nonetheless be scheduled at the 104 hearing pursuant to this section. All parties present at the hearing shall be given notice of the date and 105 time scheduled for the dispositional hearing; parties who are not present shall be summoned to appear as 106 provided in § 16.1-263.

H. Nothing in this section enables the court to remove a child from the custody of his or her parents,
guardian, legal custodian or other person standing in loco parentis, except as provided in § 16.1-278.2,
and no order hereunder shall be entered against a person over whom the court does not have
jurisdiction.

I. Neither a law-enforcement agency, the attorney for the Commonwealth, a court nor the clerk's office, nor any employee of them, may disclose, except among themselves, the residential address, telephone number, or place of employment of the person protected by the order or that of the family of such person, except to the extent that disclosure is (i) required by law or the Rules of the Supreme Court, (ii) necessary for law-enforcement purposes, or (iii) permitted by the court for good cause.

J. Violation of any order issued pursuant to this section shall constitute be punishable as contempt of
 court. However, if the violation involves an act or acts of commission or omission that endangers the
 child's life, health, or normal development or results in bodily injury to the child, it shall be punishable
 as a Class 1 misdemeanor.

120 K. The court shall forthwith, but in all cases no later than the end of the business day on which the

order was issued, enter and transfer electronically to the Virginia Criminal Information Network the 121 122 respondent's identifying information and the name, date of birth, sex, and race of each protected person 123 provided to the court. A copy of the preliminary protective order containing any such identifying 124 information shall be forwarded forthwith to the primary law-enforcement agency responsible for service 125 and entry of protective orders. Upon receipt of the order by the primary law-enforcement agency, the 126 agency shall forthwith verify and enter any modification as necessary to the identifying information and 127 other appropriate information required by the Department of State Police into the Virginia Criminal 128 Information Network established and maintained by the Department pursuant to Chapter 2 (§ 52-12 et 129 seq.) of Title 52 and the order shall be served forthwith on the allegedly abusing person in person as 130 provided in § 16.1-264 and due return made to the court. However, if the order is issued by the circuit 131 court, the clerk of the circuit court shall forthwith forward an attested copy of the order containing the 132 respondent's identifying information and the name, date of birth, sex, and race of each protected person 133 provided to the court to the primary law-enforcement agency providing service and entry of protective 134 orders and upon receipt of the order, the primary law-enforcement agency shall enter the name of the 135 person subject to the order and other appropriate information required by the Department of State Police 136 into the Virginia Criminal Information Network established and maintained by the Department pursuant 137 to Chapter 2 (§ 52-12 et seq.) of Title 52 and the order shall be served forthwith on the allegedly 138 abusing person in person as provided in § 16.1-264. Upon service, the agency making service shall enter 139 the date and time of service and other appropriate information required by the Department of State 140 Police into the Virginia Criminal Information Network and make due return to the court. The 141 preliminary order shall specify a date for the full hearing.

142 Upon receipt of the return of service or other proof of service pursuant to subsection C of 143 § 16.1-264, the clerk shall forthwith forward an attested copy of the preliminary protective order to the 144 primary law-enforcement agency and the agency shall forthwith verify and enter any modification as 145 necessary into the Virginia Criminal Information Network as described above. If the order is later 146 dissolved or modified, a copy of the dissolution or modification order shall also be attested, forwarded forthwith to the primary law-enforcement agency responsible for service and entry of protective orders, 147 148 and upon receipt of the order by the primary law-enforcement agency, the agency shall forthwith verify 149 and enter any modification as necessary to the identifying information and other appropriate information 150 required by the Department of State Police into the Virginia Criminal Information Network as described 151 above and the order shall be served forthwith and due return made to the court.

  - § 16.1-253.2. Violation of provisions of protective orders; penalty.

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154 A. In addition to any other penalty provided by law, any person who violates any provision of a protective order issued pursuant to § 16.1-253, 16.1-253.1, 16.1-253.4, 16.1-278.14, or 16.1-279.1 or 155 156 subsection B of § 20-103, when such violation involves a provision of the protective order that prohibits 157 such person from (i) going or remaining upon land, buildings, or premises; (ii) further acts of family 158 abuse; or (iii) committing a criminal offense, or which prohibits contacts by the respondent with the 159 allegedly abused person or family or household members of the allegedly abused person as the court 160 deems appropriate, is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. The punishment for any person convicted of a 161 second offense of violating a protective order, when the offense is committed within five years of the 162 prior conviction and when either the instant or prior offense was based on an act or threat of violence, shall include a mandatory minimum term of confinement of 60 days. Any person convicted of a third or 163 164 subsequent offense of violating a protective order, when the offense is committed within 20 years of the 165 first conviction and when either the instant or one of the prior offenses was based on an act or threat of violence is guilty of a Class 6 felony and the punishment shall include a mandatory minimum term of 166 167 confinement of six months. The mandatory minimum terms of confinement prescribed for violations of 168 this section shall be served consecutively with any other sentence.

B. In addition to any other penalty provided by law, any person who, while knowingly armed with a firearm or other deadly weapon, violates any provision of a protective order with which he has been served issued pursuant to § 16.1-253, 16.1-253.1, 16.1-253.4, 16.1-278.14, or 16.1-279.1 or subsection B of § 20-103 is guilty of a Class 6 felony.

173 C. If the respondent commits an assault and battery upon any party protected by the protective order 174 resulting in bodily injury to the party or stalks any party protected by the protective order in violation of 175 § 18.2-60.3, he is guilty of a Class 6 felony. Any person who violates such a protective order by 176 furtively entering the home of any protected party while the party is present, or by entering and 177 remaining in the home of the protected party until the party arrives, is guilty of a Class 6 felony, in 178 addition to any other penalty provided by law.

D. Upon conviction of any offense hereunder for which a mandatory minimum term of confinement is not specified, the person shall be sentenced to a term of confinement and in no case shall the entire term imposed be suspended. Upon conviction, the court shall, in addition to the sentence imposed, enter

a protective order pursuant to § 16.1-279.1 for a specified period not exceeding two years from the dateof conviction.

E. A violation of this section may be prosecuted in the jurisdiction where the protective order was
 issued or in any county or city where any act constituting the violation of the protective order occurred.
