- 8. Fiscal Implications: The Virginia Department of Health has stated that any increase in cost to amend regulations can be absorbed within existing resources. Additionally, it is assumed that the provisions of this legislation would not apply to Medicaid services and as such there is no expected fiscal impact on the Department of Medicaid Assistance Services (DMAS). DMAS indicates that the VDH licensing standards do not apply to Medicaid reimbursement rules. DMAS must be required to make such changes in the Commonwealth's Medicaid state plan, which must also be approved by the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). Further, if DMAS attempted to allow telephonic supervision (outside of the COVID emergency) without CMS approval, then DMAS would not be able to draw down federal match for any personal care services associated with a telephonic supervisory visit.
