Summary: Creates the Rare Disease Advisory Council in the executive branch of state government to (i) advise the General Assembly and other agencies, departments, commissions, and authorities in the Commonwealth on the needs of individuals with rare diseases in the Commonwealth; (ii) explore challenges that such individuals face, including delays in obtaining a diagnosis or the receipt of a misdiagnosis, shortages of medical specialists who can provide treatment, and lack of access to therapies and medication used to treat rare diseases; and (iii) secure funding for research for the development of new treatments for rare diseases and support for persons with rare diseases in the Commonwealth.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** This bill would have a fiscal impact on the Commonwealth. The provisions of the bill create the Rare Disease Advisory Council (the Council), which within the first year must convene public hearings, make inquiries, and solicit comments from the general public to assist the Council in understanding rare diseases in Virginia. The Council is also required to research and consult with experts on rare disease to develop policy recommendations, publish a list of accessible resources regarding diagnosis and treatment, and submit an annual report to the Governor and the General Assembly. Furthermore, the bill states that staff to the Council shall be provided by the Virginia Department of Health (VDH), and that all other agencies shall provide assistance upon request. To meet the provisions of the bill, VDH would need a part-time contracted staff person to lead, organize,

implement, and staff the Advisory Council as well as to draft and submit the annual report. VDH has estimated that the cost of the part-time contractor would be \$42,716. The provisions of the bill state that the members of the Council shall serve without compensation or reimbursement, therefore no travel costs were included.
