**3. Committee:** Passed both houses

**4. Title:** Earned sentence credits; revocation of suspended sentence.

**5. Summary:** Effective July 1, 2022, law will allow a maximum of 4.5 sentence credits to be earned for each 30 days served on a sentence for certain crimes enumerated in § 53.1-202.3, which establishes prerequisites for and the rate at which sentence credits may be earned. The bill clarifies that the maximum allowance of 4.5 sentence credits to be earned for each 30 days served will apply to a conviction for any of the offenses listed in § 53.1-202.3.
