**4. Title:** Licensed

**5. Summary:** Defines "practice of licensed certified midwifery" and directs the Boards of Medicine and Nursing to establish criteria for the licensure and renewal of a license as a certified midwife. The bill requires that licensed certified midwives practice in consultation with a licensed physician in accordance with a practice agreement. The bill also directs the Department of Health Professions to convene a work group to study the licensure and regulation of certified nurse midwives, certified midwives, and certified professional midwives to determine the appropriate licensing entity for such professionals. The bill requires the Department to report its findings and conclusions to the Governor and the General Assembly by November 1, 2021.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** This bill, as amended, would have a nongeneral fund impact on the Commonwealth. The Department of Health Professions would require one position to process new registrants and meet the provisions of the bill estimated at \$66,000 including fringe benefits. While this new profession would be jointly regulated with the Board of Medicine, the functions of licensing and discipline would be handled by the staff of the Board of Nursing. Fees for registration of a licensed certified midwife would be set at a level comparable to fees for professions jointly licensed by the Boards of Nursing and Medicine and would cover the costs of the position. The Boards are at capacity reviewing applications for the certified and licensed professions they presently regulate and therefore do not have sufficient staff to register this additional population. Any impact on the Board to adopt regulations can be handled within existing resources.

**11. Other Comments:** HB1953, as introduced by Delegate Gooditis, is a companion bill.
