3	(Proposed by the Senate Committee on Education and Health
4	on March 3, 2022)
5	(Patron Prior to Substitute—Delegate Greenhalgh)
6	A BILL to amend and reenact §§ 9.1-184, 22.1-79.4, and 22.1-280.2:3 of the Code of Virginia, relating
7 8	to public elementary and secondary schools; threat assessment team membership; law-enforcement liaison for certain school administrators.
9	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
10	1. That §§ 9.1-184, 22.1-79.4, and 22.1-280.2:3 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted
11	as follows:
12	§ 9.1-184. Virginia Center for School and Campus Safety created; duties.
13	A. From such funds as may be appropriated, the Virginia Center for School and Campus Safety (the
14	Center) is hereby established within the Department. The Center shall:
15	1. Provide training for Virginia public school personnel in school safety, on evidence-based
16 17	antibullying tactics based on the definition of bullying in § 22.1-276.01, and in the effective identification of students who may be at risk for violent behavior and in need of special services or
17 18	assistance;
19	2. Serve as a resource and referral center for Virginia school divisions by conducting research,
20	sponsoring workshops, and providing information regarding current school safety concerns, such as
21	conflict management and peer mediation, bullying as defined in § 22.1-276.01, school facility design and
22	technology, current state and federal statutory and regulatory school safety requirements, and legal and
23	constitutional issues regarding school safety and individual rights;
24 25	3. Maintain and disseminate information to local school divisions on effective school safety initiatives in Virginia and across the nation;
23 26	4. Develop a case management tool for the collection and reporting of data by threat assessment
27	teams pursuant to § 22.1-79.4;
28	5. Collect, analyze, and disseminate various Virginia school safety data, including school safety audit
29	information submitted to it pursuant to § 22.1-279.8, collected by the Department and, in conjunction
30	with the Department of Education, information relating to the activities of school resource officers
31 32	submitted pursuant to § 22.1-279.10; 6. Encourage the development of partnerships between the public and private sectors to promote
32 33	school safety in Virginia;
34	7. Provide technical assistance to Virginia school divisions in the development and implementation of
35	initiatives promoting school safety, including threat assessment-based protocols with such funds as may
36	be available for such purpose;
37	8. Develop a memorandum of understanding between the Director of the Department of Criminal
38 39	Justice Services and the Superintendent of Public Instruction to ensure collaboration and coordination of
40	roles and responsibilities in areas of mutual concern, such as school safety audits and crime prevention; 9. Provide training for and certification of school security officers, as defined in § 9.1-101 and
41	consistent with § 9.1-110;
42	10. Develop, in conjunction with the Department of State Police, the Department of Behavioral
43	Health and Developmental Services, and the Department of Education, a model critical incident response
44	training program for public school personnel and others providing services to schools that shall also be
45 46	made available to private schools in the Commonwealth; 11. In consultation with the Department of Education, provide schools with a model policy for the
40	establishment of threat assessment teams, including procedures for the assessment of and intervention
48	with students whose behavior poses a threat to the safety of school staff or students; and
49	12. Develop a model memorandum of understanding setting forth the respective roles and
50	responsibilities of local school boards and local law-enforcement agencies regarding the use of school
51	resource officers. Such model memorandum of understanding may be used by local school boards and
52 53	local law-enforcement agencies to satisfy the requirements of <i>subsection A of</i> § 22.1-280.2:3.
53 54	B. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall cooperate with the Center and, upon request, assist the Center in the performance of its duties and responsibilities.
55	§ 22.1-79.4. Threat assessment teams and oversight committees.
56	A. Each local school board shall adopt policies for the establishment of threat assessment teams,
57	including the assessment of and intervention with individuals whose behavior may pose a threat to the
58	safety of school staff or students consistent with the model policies developed by the Virginia Center for
59	School and Campus Safety (the Center) in accordance with § 9.1-184. Such policies shall include

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60 procedures for referrals to community services boards or health care providers for evaluation or 61 treatment, when appropriate.

62 B. The superintendent of each school division may establish a committee charged with oversight of 63 the threat assessment teams operating within the division, which may be an existing committee 64 established by the division. The committee shall include individuals with expertise in human resources, 65 education, school administration, mental health, and law enforcement.

66 C. Each division superintendent shall establish, for each school, a threat assessment team that shall 67 include persons with expertise in counseling, instruction, school administration, and law enforcement 68 and, in the case of any school in which a school resource officer is employed, at least one such school resource officer. Threat assessment teams may be established to serve one or more schools as 69 70 determined by the division superintendent. Each team shall (i) provide guidance to students, faculty, and 71 staff regarding recognition of threatening or aberrant behavior that may represent a threat to the 72 community, school, or self; (ii) identify members of the school community to whom threatening 73 behavior should be reported; and (iii) implement policies adopted by the local school board pursuant to 74 subsection A.

75 D. Upon a preliminary determination that a student poses a threat of violence or physical harm to 76 self or others, a threat assessment team shall immediately report its determination to the division superintendent or his designee. The division superintendent or his designee shall immediately attempt to 77 78 notify the student's parent or legal guardian. Nothing in this subsection shall preclude school division 79 personnel from acting immediately to address an imminent threat.

80 E. Each threat assessment team established pursuant to this section shall collect and report to the 81 Center quantitative data on its activities using the case management tool developed by the Center.

F. Upon a preliminary determination by the threat assessment team that an individual poses a threat 82 83 of violence to self or others or exhibits significantly disruptive behavior or need for assistance, a threat assessment team may obtain criminal history record information, as provided in §§ 19.2-389 and 19.2-389.1, and health records, as provided in § 32.1-127.1:03. No member of a threat assessment team 84 85 86 shall redisclose any criminal history record information or health information obtained pursuant to this 87 section or otherwise use any record of an individual beyond the purpose for which such disclosure was 88 made to the threat assessment team. 89

§ 22.1-280.2:3. School boards; safety and security personnel.

90 A. The school board in each school division in which the local law-enforcement agency employs 91 school resource officers, as defined in § 9.1-101, shall enter into a memorandum of understanding with 92 such local law-enforcement agency that sets forth the powers and duties of such school resource officers. 93 The provisions of such memorandum of understanding shall be based on the model memorandum of 94 understanding developed by the Virginia Center for School and Campus Safety pursuant to subdivision 95 A 12 of § 9.1-184, which may be modified by the parties in accordance with their particular needs. Each 96 such school board and local law-enforcement agency shall review and amend or affirm such 97 memorandum at least once every two years or at any time upon the request of either party. Each school 98 board shall ensure the current division memorandum of understanding is conspicuously published on the 99 division website and provide notice and opportunity for public input during each memorandum of 100 understanding review period.

B. The chief local law-enforcement officer for any local school division in which a public elementary 101 102 or secondary school does not employ a school resource officer, as defined in § 9.1-101, shall designate 103 a law-enforcement officer to receive, either in-person or online, the training set forth in subsection E of 104 § 22.1-279.8. Such officer shall serve as the law-enforcement liaison for the school administrator described in subsection E of § 22.1-279.8. 105
