12	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
13	1. That §§ 3.2-4112, 3.2-4113, 3.2-4114, 3.2-4114.2, 3.2-4115, 3.2-4116, 3.2-4118, 3.2-4119, 3.2-4121,
14	3.2-5145.1, 3.2-5145.2:1, 3.2-5145.4, 3.2-5145.5, 4.1-600, 18.2-247, 18.2-251.1:3, 18.2-371.2, 54.1-3401,
15	54.1-3408.3, 54.1-3423, 54.1-3443, and 54.1-3446 of the Code of Virginia are amended and
16	reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 41.1 of Title 3.2 an

19	Article 1.
20	General Provisions.
21	§ 3.2-4112. Definitions.
22 23	As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning: "Cannabis sativa product" means a product made from any part of the plant Cannabis sativa with a
23 24	concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol that is greater than that allowed by federal law.
2 7 25	"Deal" means to temporarily possess industrial hemp grown in compliance with state or federal law
26	that (i) has not been processed and (ii) was not grown and will not be processed by the person
27	temporarily possessing it.
28	"Dealer" means any person who is registered pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 to deal in
29	industrial hemp. "Dealer" does not include a retail establishment that sells or offers for sale a hemp
30	product.
31	"Dealership" means the location at which a dealer stores or intends to store the industrial hemp in
32	which he deals.
33 34	"Edible hemp product" means any hemp product that is or includes an industrial hemp extract, as defined in § 3.2-5145.1, and that is intended to be consumed orally.
35	"Federally licensed hemp producer" means a person who holds a hemp producer license issued by
36	the U.S. Department of Agriculture pursuant to 7 C.F.R. Part 990.
37	"Grow" means to plant, cultivate, or harvest a plant or crop.
38	"Grower" means any person registered pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 to grow industrial
39	hemp.
40	"Handle" means to temporarily possess industrial hemp grown in compliance with state or federal
41	law that (i) has not been processed and (ii) was not grown by and will not be processed by the person
42	temporarily possessing it.
43	"Handler" means any person who is registered pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 to handle
44 45	industrial hemp. "Handler" does not include a retail establishment that sells or offers for sale a hemp product.
4 6	"Handler's storage site" means the location at which a handler stores or intends to store the
47	industrial hemp he handles.
48	"Hemp product" means a product, including any raw materials from industrial hemp that are used for
49	or added to a food or beverage product, that contains industrial hemp and has completed all stages of
50	processing needed for the product.
51	"Hemp product intended for smoking" means any hemp product intended to be consumed by
52	inhalation.
53 54	"Industrial hemp" means any part of the plant Cannabis sativa, including seeds thereof, whether
54 55	growing or not, with a concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol that is no greater than that allowed by federal law, "Industrial hemp," includes an industrial hemp extract that has not completed all stages of
55 56	federal law. "Industrial hemp" includes an industrial hemp extract that has not completed all stages of processing needed to convert the extract into a hemp product.
50 57	"Process" means to convert industrial hemp into a hemp product.
58	"Processor" means a person registered pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 to process industrial
59	hemp.

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60 "Process site" means the location at which a processor processes or intends to process industrial 61 hemp.

62 "Production field" means the land or area on which a grower or a federally licensed hemp producer 63 is growing or intends to grow industrial hemp.

"Regulated hemp product" means a hemp product intended for smoking or an edible hemp product. 64

65 "Tetrahydrocannabinol" means any naturally occurring or synthetic tetrahydrocannabinol, including 66 its salts, isomers, and salts of isomers whenever the existence of such salts, isomers, and salts of isomers is possible within the specific chemical designation and any preparation, mixture, or substance 67 containing, or mixed or infused with, any detectable amount of tetrahydrocannabinol. "Tetrahydrocannabinol" includes delta-6a(10a), delta-7, delta-8, delta-9, and delta-10 68 69 tetrahydrocannabinol. For the purposes of this definition, "isomer" means the optical, position, and 70 71 geometric isomers.

72 "Topical hemp product" means a hemp product that (i) is intended to be rubbed, poured, sprinkled, 73 or sprayed on, introduced into, or otherwise applied to the human body and (ii) is not a regulated hemp 74 product.

75 "Total tetrahydrocannabinol" means the sum, after the application of any necessary conversion 76 factor, of the percentage by weight of tetrahydrocannabinol and the percentage by weight of 77 tetrahydrocannabinolic acid. 78

Article 2.

Industrial Hemp Crop Production, Handling, and Processing.

§ 3.2-4113. Production of industrial hemp lawful.

A. It is lawful for a grower, his agent, or a federally licensed hemp producer to grow, a dealer 81 handler or his agent to deal in handle, or a processor or his agent to process industrial hemp in the 82 Commonwealth for any lawful purpose. No federally licensed hemp producer or grower or his agent 83 shall be prosecuted under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-247, 18.2-248, 84 85 18.2-248.01, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250 for the possession or growing of industrial hemp or any Cannabis 86 sativa with a tetrahydrocannabinol concentration that does not exceed the total delta 9 87 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration percentage established in federal regulations applicable to negligent violations located at 7 C.F.R. § 990.6(b)(3). No dealer handler or his agent or processor or his agent 88 89 shall be prosecuted under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-247, 18.2-248, 90 18.2-248.01, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250 or issued a summons or judgment for the possession, dealing 91 handling, or processing of industrial hemp. In any complaint, information, or indictment, and in any action or proceeding brought for the enforcement of any provision of Article 1 (§ 18.2-247 et seq.) of Chapter 7 of Title 18.2 or the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.), it shall not be necessary to negate 92 93 94 any exception, excuse, proviso, or exemption contained in this chapter article or the Drug Control Act, and the burden of proof of any such exception, excuse, proviso, or exemption shall be on the defendant. 95 96 B. Nothing in this chapter article shall be construed to authorize any person to violate any federal

97 law or regulation.

98 C. No person shall be prosecuted under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-247, 99 18.2-248, 18.2-248.01, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250 for the involuntary growth of industrial hemp through the 100 inadvertent natural spread of seeds or pollen as a result of proximity to a production field, dealership 101 handler's storage site, or process site. 102

§ 3.2-4114. Regulations.

103 A. The Board may adopt regulations pursuant to this chapter article as necessary to register persons 104 to grow, deal in handle, or process industrial hemp or implement the provisions of this ehapter article.

B. Upon publication by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in the Federal Register of any final rule 105 regarding industrial hemp that materially expands opportunities for growing, producing, or dealing in 106 handling industrial hemp in the Commonwealth, the Board shall immediately adopt amendments 107 108 conforming Department regulations to such federal final rule. Such adoption of regulations by the Board 109 shall be exempt from the provisions of the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.). 110

§ 3.2-4114.2. Authority of Commissioner; notice to law enforcement; report.

111 A. The Commissioner may charge a nonrefundable fee not to exceed \$250 for any application for 112 registration or renewal of registration allowed under this chapter article. The Commissioner may charge a nonrefundable fee for the tetrahydrocannabinol testing allowed under this chapter article. All fees 113 114 collected by the Commissioner shall be deposited in the state treasury.

B. The Commissioner shall adopt regulations establishing a fee structure for a registration issued 115 pursuant to § 3.2-4115. With the exception of § 2.2-4031, no provision of the Administrative Process 116 Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) or public participation guideline adopted pursuant thereto shall apply to the 117 adoption of any regulation pursuant to this subsection. However, prior to adopting any regulation 118 pursuant to this subsection, the Commissioner shall review the recommendation of an advisory panel 119 120 that shall consider the economic impact of any proposed fee amount on the Commonwealth's industrial 121 hemp industry. The advisory panel shall, at a minimum, include (i) an agribusiness representative or

122 organization, (ii) a farming representative or organization, and (iii) a hemp industry representative or 123 organization. Prior to adopting any regulation pursuant to this subsection, the Commissioner shall 124 publish a notice of opportunity to comment in the Virginia Register of Regulations and post the action 125 on the Virginia Regulatory Town Hall. Such notice shall contain (a) a summary of the proposed 126 regulation; (b) the text of the proposed regulation; and (c) the name, address, and telephone number of 127 the agency contact person responsible for receiving public comments. Such notice shall be made at least 128 60 days in advance of the last date prescribed in such notice of submittals of public comment. The 129 legislative review provisions of subsections A and B of § 2.2-4014 shall apply to the promulgation or 130 final adoption process of regulations pursuant to this subsection. The Commissioner shall consider and keep on file all public comments received for any regulation adopted pursuant to this subsection. 131

132 C. The Commissioner may establish an application period for a registration or renewal of registration
 133 allowed under this chapter article.

D. The Commissioner shall notify the Superintendent of State Police of each registration issued by
 the Commissioner under this chapter article and each license submitted to the Commissioner by a
 federally licensed hemp producer.

E. The Commissioner shall forward a copy or appropriate electronic record of each registration
issued by the Commissioner under this chapter article and each license submitted to the Commissioner
by a federally licensed hemp producer to the chief law-enforcement officer of the county or city where
industrial hemp will be grown, dealt handled, or processed.

141 F. The Commissioner may monitor the industrial hemp grown, dealt handled, or processed by a 142 person registered pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 and provide for random sampling and testing 143 of the industrial hemp in accordance with any criteria established by the Commissioner and at the cost 144 of the grower, dealer handler, or processor, for compliance with tetrahydrocannabinol limits and for 145 other appropriate purposes established pursuant to § 3.2-4114. In addition to any routine inspection and 146 sampling, the Commissioner may inspect and sample the industrial hemp at any production field, 147 dealership handler's storage site, or process site during normal business hours without advance notice if 148 he has reason to believe a violation of this chapter *article* is occurring or has occurred.

G. The Commissioner may require a grower, dealer handler, or processor to destroy, at the cost of the grower, dealer handler, or processor and in a manner approved of and verified by the Commissioner, any Cannabis sativa that the grower grows, in which the dealer deals the handler handles, or that the processor processes that has been tested and is found to have a concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol that is greater than that allowed by federal law, or any Cannabis sativa product that the processor produces.

H. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection G, if the provisions of subdivisions 1 and 2 are
included in a plan that (i) is submitted by the Department pursuant to § 10113 of the federal Agriculture
Improvement Act of 2018, P.L. 115-334, (ii) requires the Department to monitor and regulate the
production of industrial hemp in the Commonwealth, and (iii) is approved by the U.S. Secretary of
Agriculture:

160 1. The Commissioner may require a grower, dealer handler, or processor to destroy, at the cost of
161 the grower, dealer handler, or processor and in a manner approved of and verified by the Commissioner,
162 any Cannabis sativa that the grower grows, in which the dealer deals the handler handles, or that the
163 processor processes that has been tested and is found to have a concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol
164 that is greater than 0.6 percent.

165 2. If such a test of Cannabis sativa indicates a concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol that is greater
166 than 0.6 percent but less than one percent, the Commissioner shall allow the grower, dealer handler, or
167 processor to request that the Cannabis sativa be sampled and tested again before he requires its
168 destruction.

169 I. The Commissioner shall advise the Superintendent of State Police or the chief law-enforcement 170 officer of the appropriate county or city when, with a culpable mental state greater than negligence, a 171 grower grows, a dealer deals in *a handler handles*, or a processor processes any Cannabis sativa with a 172 concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol that is greater than that allowed by federal law or a processor 173 produces a Cannabis sativa product.

174 J. The Commissioner may pursue any permits or waivers from the U.S. Drug Enforcement
 175 Administration or appropriate federal agency that he determines to be necessary for the advancement of
 176 the industrial hemp industry.

177 K. The Commissioner may establish a corrective action plan to address a negligent violation of any provision of this chapter *article*.

179 § 3.2-4115. Issuance of registrations; exemption.

A. The Commissioner shall establish a registration program to allow a person to grow, deal in *handle*, or process industrial hemp in the Commonwealth.

182 B. Any person seeking to grow, deal in *handle*, or process industrial hemp in the Commonwealth

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183 shall apply to the Commissioner for a registration on a form provided by the Commissioner. At a 184 minimum, the application shall include: 185

1. The name and mailing address of the applicant;

186 2. The legal description and geographic data sufficient for locating (i) the land on which the 187 applicant intends to grow industrial hemp, (ii) the site at which the applicant intends to deal in handle 188 industrial hemp, or (iii) the site at which the applicant intends to process industrial hemp. A registration 189 shall authorize industrial hemp growth, dealing in handling, or processing only at the location specified 190 in the registration;

191 3. A signed statement indicating whether the applicant has ever been convicted of a felony. A person 192 with a prior felony drug conviction within 10 years of applying for a registration under this section shall 193 not be eligible to be registered;

4. Written consent allowing the sheriff's office, police department, or Department of State Police, if a 194 195 registration is ultimately issued to the applicant, to enter the premises on which the industrial hemp is 196 grown, dealt in handled, or processed to conduct physical inspections of the industrial hemp and to 197 ensure compliance with the requirements of this chapter article. No more than two physical inspections 198 shall be conducted under this subdivision per year, unless a valid search warrant for an inspection has 199 been issued by a court of competent jurisdiction;

5. Written consent allowing the Commissioner or his designee to enter the premises on which the 200 201 industrial hemp is grown, dealt in handled, or processed to conduct inspections and sampling of the 202 industrial hemp to ensure compliance with the requirements of this chapter article;

203 6. A statement of the approximate square footage or acreage of the location he intends to use as a 204 production field, dealership handler's storage site, or process site;

7. Any other information required by the Commissioner; and

8. The payment of a nonrefundable application fee, in an amount set by the Commissioner.

207 C. Each registration issued pursuant to this section shall be valid for a period of one year from the 208 date of issuance and may be renewed in successive years. Each annual renewal shall require the 209 payment of a registration renewal fee, in an amount set by the Commissioner.

210 D. All records, data, and information filed in support of a registration application submitted pursuant 211 to this section and all information on a hemp producer license issued by the U.S. Department of 212 Agriculture submitted to the Commissioner pursuant to this section shall be considered proprietary and 213 excluded from the provisions of the Virginia Freedom of Information Act (§ 2.2-3700 et seq.).

214 E. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection B, no federally licensed hemp producer shall be 215 required to apply to the Commissioner for a registration to grow industrial hemp in the Commonwealth. 216 Each federally licensed hemp producer shall submit to the Commissioner a copy of his hemp producer 217 license issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture pursuant to 7 C.F.R. Part 990.

§ 3.2-4116. Registration conditions.

219 A. A person who is not a federally licensed hemp producer shall obtain a registration pursuant to 220 subsection A of § 3.2-4115 prior to growing, dealing in handling, or processing any industrial hemp in 221 the Commonwealth. 222

B. A person issued a registration pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 shall:

1. Maintain records that reflect compliance with this chapter article;

2. Retain all industrial hemp growing, dealing handling, or processing records for at least three years; 3. Allow his production field, dealership handler's storage site, or process site to be inspected by and

at the discretion of the Commissioner or his designee, the Department of State Police, or the chief 226 227 law-enforcement officer of the locality in which the production field, or dealership handler's storage 228 *site*, or process site exists;

229 4. Allow the Commissioner or his designee to monitor and test the grower's, dealer's handler's, or 230 processor's industrial hemp for compliance with tetrahydrocannabinol levels and for other appropriate 231 purposes established pursuant to § 3.2-4114, at the cost of the grower, dealer handler, or processor; and

232 5. If required by the Commissioner, destroy, at the cost of the grower, dealer handler, or processor 233 and in a manner approved of and verified by the Commissioner, any Cannabis sativa that the grower 234 grows, the dealer deals in handler handles, or the processor processes that has been tested and, 235 following any re-sampling and retesting as authorized pursuant to the provisions of § 3.2-4114.2, is 236 found to have a concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol that is greater than that allowed by federal law, or 237 any Cannabis sativa product that the processor produces. 238

§ 3.2-4118. Forfeiture of industrial hemp grower, handler, or processor registration; violations.

239 A. The Commissioner shall deny the application, or suspend or revoke the registration, of any person 240 who, with a culpable mental state greater than negligence, violates any provision of this chapter article. 241 The Commissioner shall provide reasonable notice of an informal fact-finding conference pursuant to 242 § 2.2-4019 to any person in connection with the denial, suspension, or revocation of a registration.

243 B. If a registration is revoked as the result of an informal hearing, the decision may be appealed, and 244 upon appeal an administrative hearing shall be conducted in accordance with the Administrative Process

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245 Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.). The grower, dealer handler, or processor may appeal a final order to the circuit 246 court in accordance with the Administrative Process Act.

247 C. A person issued a registration pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 who negligently (i) fails to 248 provide a description and geographic data sufficient for locating his production field, dealership 249 handler's storage site, or process site; (ii) grows, deals in handles, or processes Cannabis sativa with a 250 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration greater than that allowed by federal law; or (iii) produces a Cannabis 251 sativa product shall comply with any corrective action plan established by the Commissioner in 252 accordance with the provisions of subsection E. The Commissioner shall not deem a grower negligent if 253 such grower makes reasonable efforts to grow industrial hemp and grows Cannabis sativa with a 254 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration that does not exceed the total delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol 255 concentration percentage established in federal regulations applicable to negligent violations located at 7 256 C.F.R. § 990.6(b)(3).

257 D. A person who grows, deals in handles, or processes industrial hemp and who negligently fails to 258 register pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 shall comply with any corrective action plan established 259 by the Commissioner in accordance with the provisions of subsection E.

260 E. A corrective action plan established by the Commissioner in response to a negligent violation of a 261 provision of this chapter article shall identify a reasonable date by which the person who is the subject 262 of the plan shall correct the negligent violation and shall require such person to report periodically for 263 not less than two calendar years to the Commissioner on the person's compliance with the provisions of 264 this chapter article.

265 F. No person who negligently violates the provisions of this chapter article three times in a five-year 266 period shall be eligible to grow, deal in handle, or process industrial hemp for a period of five years 267 beginning on the date of the third violation. 268

§ 3.2-4119. Eligibility to receive tobacco settlement funds.

269 Industrial hemp growers, dealers handlers, or processors registered under this chapter article or 270 federally licensed hemp producers may be eligible to receive funds from the Tobacco Indemnification 271 and Community Revitalization Fund established pursuant to § 3.2-3106. 272

Article 3.

Virginia Industrial Hemp Fund.

§ 3.2-4121. Virginia Industrial Hemp Fund.

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275 There is hereby created in the state treasury a special nonreverting fund to be known as the Virginia 276 Industrial Hemp Fund, hereafter referred to as "the Fund-" for the purposes of this article. The Fund 277 shall be established on the books of the Comptroller. All moneys levied and collected under the 278 provisions of this chapter shall be paid into the state treasury and credited to the Fund. Interest earned 279 on moneys in the Fund shall remain in the Fund and be credited to it. Any moneys remaining in the 280 Fund, including interest thereon, at the end of each fiscal year shall not revert to the general fund but 281 shall remain in the Fund. Moneys in the Fund shall be used by the Department solely for carrying out 282 the purposes of this chapter. Expenditures and disbursements from the Fund shall be made by the State 283 Treasurer on warrants issued by the Comptroller upon written request signed by the Commissioner. 284

Article 4.

Regulated Hemp Products.

§ 3.2-4122. Annual retail facility registration required.

287 A. The Commissioner shall issue regulated hemp product retail facility registrations, which shall 288 authorize the registration holder to offer for sale or sell a regulated hemp product. No person that does 289 not hold a regulated hemp product retail facility registration shall offer for sale or sell in the 290 Commonwealth (i) a regulated hemp product or (ii) any substance that is intended to be consumed 291 orally or by inhalation that is advertised or labeled as containing an industrial hemp-derived 292 cannabinoid.

293 B. Each registration issued pursuant to this section shall be valid for a period of one year from the 294 date of issuance and may be renewed in successive years.

295 C. An annual regulated hemp product retail facility registration shall be required for each location 296 that offers for sale or sells a regulated hemp product.

297 D. Any person seeking to offer for sale or sell a regulated hemp product in the Commonwealth shall 298 apply to the Commissioner for a regulated hemp product retail facility registration on a form provided 299 by the Commissioner. At a minimum, the application shall include: 300

1. The name and mailing address of the applicant:

301 2. The physical address of the facility from which the applicant intends to offer for sale or sell a 302 regulated hemp product. A registration shall authorize the offering for sale or sale of a regulated hemp 303 product only at the location specified in the registration;

304 3. Written consent allowing the Commissioner or his designee to enter the location from which the 305 regulated hemp product is offered for sale or sold to ensure compliance with the requirements of this

306 article;

307 4. If the applicant intends to offer for sale or sell an edible hemp product, a copy of the permit 308 issued by the Commissioner pursuant to § 3.2-5100; and

309 5. Any other information required by the Commissioner.

E. This section shall not apply to a person authorized to offer for sale or sell products (i) that are 310 311 approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and scheduled in the Drug Control 312 Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or (ii) dispensed pursuant to Article 4.2 (§ 54.1-3442.5 et seq.) of Chapter 34 313 of Title 54.1.

§ 3.2-4123. Product packaging, labeling, and testing. 314

315 A. No person shall offer for sale or sell a regulated hemp product unless the product is:

316 1. Contained in child-resistant packaging, as defined in § 4.1-600;

317 2. Equipped with a label that states, in English and in a font no less than 1/16 of an inch, (i) all 318 ingredients contained in the substance; (ii) the amount of such substance that constitutes a single 319 serving; (iii) the total percentage and milligrams of all tetrahydrocannabinols included in the substance 320 and the total number of milligrams of all tetrahydrocannabinols that are contained in each serving; and 321 (iv) if the substance contains tetrahydrocannabinol, that the product may not be sold to persons younger 322 than 21 years of age; and

323 3. Accompanied by a certificate of analysis, produced by an independent laboratory that is 324 accredited pursuant to standard ISO/IEC 17025 of the International Organization for Standardization by 325 a third-party accrediting body, that states the total tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of the substance 326 or the total tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of the batch from which the substance originates. The certificate of accreditation pursuant to standard ISO/IEC 17025 issued by the third-party accrediting 327 body to the independent laboratory shall be available for review at the location at which the regulated 328 329 hemp product is offered for sale or sold.

330 This subsection shall not (i) apply to products that are approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and scheduled in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or (ii) be construed to 331 332 prohibit any conduct permitted under Article 4.2 (§ 54.1-3442.5 et seq.) of Chapter 34 of Title 54.1.

333 B. No person shall offer for sale or sell a regulated hemp product that depicts or is in the shape of 334 a human, animal, vehicle, or fruit.

335 C. No person shall offer for sale or sell a regulated hemp product that, without authorization, bears, 336 is packaged in a container or wrapper that bears, or is otherwise labeled to bear the trademark, trade 337 name, famous mark as defined in 15 U.S.C. § 1125, or other identifying mark, imprint, or device, or any 338 likeness thereof, of a manufacturer, processor, packer, or distributor of a product intended for human 339 consumption other than the manufacturer, processor, packer, or distributor that did in fact so 340 manufacture, process, pack, or distribute such substance. 341

§ 3.2-4124. Topical hemp products; bittering agent; civil penalty.

342 A. All topical hemp products offered for sale or sold shall contain a bittering agent so as to render 343 the product unpalatable.

344 B. A person who offers for sale or sells a topical hemp product that does not contain a bittering 345 agent is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$500 for each day a violation occurs. Such penalty shall 346 be collected by the Commissioner and the proceeds shall be payable to the State Treasurer for 347 remittance to the Department.

348 C. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection A, a person may offer for sale or sell a topical hemp 349 product that does not contain a bittering agent if the product was manufactured prior to July 1, 2023, and the person provides documentation of the date of manufacture to the Commissioner if requested. 350

351 D. This section shall not apply to a person authorized to offer for sale or sell products that are (i) 352 approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and scheduled in the Drug Control 353 Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or (ii) dispensed pursuant to Article 4.2 (§ 54.1-3442.5 et seq.) of Chapter 34 354 of Title 54.1. 355

§ 3.2-4125. Commissioner to have access to retail facilities.

356 A. For the purpose of identifying violations of this article, the Commissioner shall have access 357 during business hours to all registered regulated hemp product retail facilities and any business that 358 offers for sale or sells a substance intended to be consumed orally or by inhalation that is advertised or 359 labeled as containing an industrial hemp-derived cannabinoid for the purpose of: 360

1. Conducting an inspection; or

361 2. Securing a sample of any regulated hemp product or substance intended to be consumed orally or by inhalation that is advertised or labeled as containing a cannabinoid. The Commissioner shall conduct 362 363 or cause to be conducted examinations or laboratory analysis of such samples.

364 B. This section shall not apply to a person authorized to offer for sale or sell products that are (i) approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and scheduled in the Drug Control 365 Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or (ii) dispensed pursuant to Article 4.2 (§ 54.1-3442.5 et seq.) of Chapter 34 366 367 of Title 54.1.

368 § 3.2-4126. Civil penalties.

369 A. The Commissioner may, in accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.), 370 deny the application for a regulated hemp product retail facility registration or suspend or revoke the regulated hemp product retail facility registration of any person who violates the provisions of this 371 372 article.

373 B. Any person who (i) offers for sale or sells a regulated hemp product without first obtaining a 374 registration to do so from the Commissioner in accordance with § 3.2-4122; (ii) continues to offer for 375 sale or sell a regulated hemp product after revocation or suspension of such registration; (iii) offers for 376 sale or sells a regulated hemp product that has a total tetrahydrocannabinol concentration greater than 377 the amount allowed under Board regulation; (iv) offers for sale or sells a regulated hemp product in 378 violation of § 3.2-4123; or (v) offers for sale or sells a substance intended to be consumed orally or by 379 inhalation that is advertised or labeled as containing an industrial hemp-derived cannabinoid without a 380 regulated hemp product retail facility registration, in addition to any other penalties provided, is subject 381 to a civil penalty not to exceed \$10,000 for each day a violation occurs. Such penalty shall be collected 382 by the Commissioner and the proceeds shall be payable to the State Treasurer for remittance to the 383 Department. 384

§ 3.2-5145.1. Definitions.

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As used in this article, unless the context requires a different meaning:

386 "Food" means any article that is intended for human consumption and introduction into commerce, 387 whether the article is simple, mixed, or compound, and all substances or ingredients used in the 388 preparation thereof. "Food" does not mean drug as defined in § 54.1-3401.

389 "Industrial hemp" means a Cannabis sativa plant that has a concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol 390 that is no greater than that allowed by federal law.

391 "Industrial hemp extract" means an extract (i) of a Cannabis sativa plant that has a concentration of 392 tetrahydrocannabinol that is no greater than that allowed for hemp by federal law and (ii) that is intended for human consumption. "Industrial hemp extract" is not a hemp seed-derived ingredient that is 393 394 approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration or is the subject of a generally recognized as safe 395 notice for which the U.S. Food and Drug Administration had no questions.

396 "Tetrahydrocannabinol" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-4112.

397 "Total tetrahydrocannabinol" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-4112. 398

§ 3.2-5145.2:1. Sellers or manufacturers of industrial hemp extract; penalties.

399 A. Any person who *manufactures*, sells, or offers for sale an industrial hemp extract or food 400 containing an industrial hemp extract shall be subject to the requirements of this chapter and regulations 401 adopted pursuant to this chapter.

402 B. Any person who (i) manufactures, sells, or offers for sale an industrial hemp extract or food 403 containing an industrial hemp extract without first obtaining a permit to do so from the Commissioner **404** pursuant to § 3.2-5100; (ii) continues to manufacture, sell, or offer for sale an industrial hemp extract 405 or food containing an industrial hemp extract after revocation or suspension of such permit; (iii) 406 manufactures, sells, or offers for sale a food that has a total tetrahydrocannabinol concentration that is 407 greater than the amount allowed under Board regulation; (iv) manufactures, offers for sale, or sells in 408 violation of this chapter or a regulation adopted pursuant to this chapter a substance intended to be 409 consumed orally that is advertised or labeled as containing an industrial hemp-derived cannabinoid; or 410 (v) otherwise violates any provision of this chapter or a regulation adopted pursuant to this chapter, in 411 addition to any other penalties provided, is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$10,000 for each day 412 a violation occurs. Such penalty shall be collected by the Commissioner and the proceeds shall be 413 payable to the State Treasurer for remittance to the Department.

414 C. Any person who (i) manufactures, sells, or offers for sale an industrial hemp extract or food 415 containing an industrial hemp extract without first obtaining a permit to do so from the Commissioner 416 pursuant to § 3.2-5100; (ii) continues to manufacture, sell, or offer for sale an industrial hemp extract 417 or food containing an industrial hemp extract after revocation or suspension of such permit; (iii) 418 manufactures, offers for sale, or sells in violation of this chapter or a regulation adopted pursuant to 419 this chapter a substance intended to be consumed orally that is advertised or labeled as containing an 420 industrial hemp-derived cannabinoid; or (iv) otherwise violates any provision of this chapter or a 421 regulation adopted pursuant to this chapter, in addition to any other penalties provided, is guilty of a 422 Class 1 misdemeanor. Each day in which a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

423 D. This section shall not apply to a person authorized to offer for sale or sell products that are (i) 424 approved for marketing by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and scheduled in the Drug Control 425 Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) or (ii) dispensed pursuant to Article 4.2 (§ 54.1-3442.5 et seq.) of Chapter 34 426 of Title 54.1.

427 § 3.2-5145.4. Industrial hemp extract requirements.

428 A. An industrial hemp extract shall (i) be produced from industrial hemp grown in compliance with 455

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429 applicable law and (ii) notwithstanding any authority under federal law to have a greater concentration
430 of tetrahydrocannabinol, have a *total* tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of no greater than 0.3 percent.

431 B. In addition to the requirements of this chapter, an industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract shall comply with regulations adopted by the Board pursuant to § 3.2-5145.5.

433 § 3.2-5145.4:1. Labeling and packaging requirements.

A. An industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract shall be packaged and
equipped with a label that states, in English and in a font no less than 1/16 of an inch, (i) all
ingredients contained in the industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract, (ii)
the amount of such industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract that
constitutes a single serving, and (iii) the number of milligrams and percent of total tetrahydrocannabinol
per serving and number of milligrams and percent of total tetrahydrocannabinol per package.

440 B. Any industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract that contains
441 tetrahydrocannabinol (i) shall be equipped with a label that states that the industrial hemp extract or
442 food containing an industrial hemp extract contains tetrahydrocannabinol and (ii) may not be sold to
443 persons younger than 21 years of age.

C. A manufacturer shall identify each batch of an industrial hemp extract or a food containing an
industrial hemp extract with a unique code for traceability. Julian date coding or any other system
developed and documented by the manufacturer for assigning a unique code to a batch may be used.
The batch identification shall appear and be legible on the label of an industrial hemp extract or food
containing an industrial hemp extract.

D. The label of an industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract shall not contain a claim indicating the product is intended for diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease, which shall render the product a drug, as that term is defined in 21 U.S.C.
§ 321(g)(1). An industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract with a label that contains a claim indicating the product is intended for diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease shall be considered misbranded.

§ 3.2-5145.5. Regulations.

A. The Board is authorized to adopt regulations for the efficient enforcement of this article.

457 B. The Board shall adopt regulations identifying contaminants of an industrial hemp extract or a food458 containing an industrial hemp extract and establishing tolerances for such identified contaminants.

459 C. The Board shall adopt regulations establishing labeling requirements for an industrial hemp extract or a food containing an industrial hemp extract. Such regulations shall require that any industrial hemp 460 461 extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract that contains tetrahydrocannabinol be equipped 462 with a label that states (i) that the industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract contains tetrahydrocannabinol and may not be sold to persons younger than 21 years of age, (ii) all 463 464 ingredients contained in the industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract, (iii) 465 the amount of such industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract that constitutes 466 a single serving, and (iv) the total percentage and milligrams of tetrahydrocannabinol included in the 467 industrial hemp extract or food containing an industrial hemp extract and the number of milligrams of tetrahydrocannabinol that are contained in each serving. 468

469 D. The Board shall adopt regulations establishing batch testing requirements for industrial hemp
470 extracts. The Board shall require that batch testing of industrial hemp extracts be conducted by an
471 independent testing laboratory that meets criteria established by the Board.

472 E. D. With the exception of § 2.2-4031, neither the provisions of the Administrative Process Act 473 (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.) nor public participation guidelines adopted pursuant thereto shall apply to the 474 adoption of any regulation pursuant to this section. Prior to adopting any regulation pursuant to this section, the Board shall publish a notice of opportunity to comment in the Virginia Register of Regulations and post the action on the Virginia Regulatory Town Hall. Such notice of opportunity to 475 476 477 comment shall contain (i) a summary of the proposed regulation; (ii) the text of the proposed regulation; 478 and (iii) the name, address, and telephone number of the agency contact person responsible for receiving public comments. Such notice shall be made at least 60 days in advance of the last date prescribed in 479 480 such notice for submittals of public comment. The legislative review provisions of subsections A and B 481 of § 2.2-4014 shall apply to the promulgation or final adoption process for regulations pursuant to this section. The Board shall consider and keep on file all public comments received for any regulation 482 483 adopted pursuant to this section.

§ 4.1-600. Definitions.

As used in this subtitle, unless the context requires a different meaning:

486 "Advertisement" or " advertising" means any written or verbal statement, illustration, or depiction
487 that is calculated to induce sales of retail marijuana, retail marijuana products, marijuana plants, or
488 marijuana seeds, including any written, printed, graphic, digital, electronic, or other material, billboard,
489 sign, or other outdoor display, publication, or radio or television broadcast.

490 "Authority" means the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority created pursuant to this subtitle.

491 "Board" means the Board of Directors of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority.

492 "Cannabis Control Act" means Subtitle II (§ 4.1-600 et seq.).

493 "Child-resistant" means, with respect to packaging or a container, (i) specially designed or 494 constructed to be significantly difficult for a typical child under five years of age to open and not to be 495 significantly difficult for a typical adult to open and reseal and (ii) for any product intended for more 496 than a single use or that contains multiple servings, resealable.

497 "Cultivation" or "cultivate" means the planting, propagation, growing, harvesting, drying, curing, 498 grading, trimming, or other similar processing of marijuana for use or sale. "Cultivation" or "cultivate" 499 does not include manufacturing or testing.

500 "Edible marijuana product" means a marijuana product intended to be consumed orally, including 501 marijuana intended to be consumed orally or marijuana concentrate intended to be consumed orally.

502 "Immature plant" means a nonflowering marijuana plant that is no taller than eight inches and no 503 wider than eight inches, is produced from a cutting, clipping, or seedling, and is growing in a container. 504 "Licensed" means the holding of a valid license granted by the Authority.

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"Licensee" means any person to whom a license has been granted by the Authority. "Manufacturing" or "manufacture" means the production of marijuana products or the blending, 506 507 infusing, compounding, or other preparation of marijuana and marijuana products, including marijuana 508 extraction or preparation by means of chemical synthesis. "Manufacturing" or "manufacture" does not 509 include cultivation or testing.

510 "Marijuana" means any part of a plant of the genus Cannabis, whether growing or not, its seeds or 511 resin; and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of such plant, its seeds, its resin, or any extract containing one or more cannabinoids. "Marijuana" does not include (i) the 512 513 mature stalks of such plant, fiber produced from such stalk, or oil or cake made from the seed of such 514 plant, unless such stalks, fiber, oil, or cake is combined with other parts of plants of the genus Cannabis-515 "Marijuana" does not include (i); (ii) industrial hemp, as defined in § 3.2-4112, that is possessed by a 516 person registered pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 or his agent or (ii); (iii) industrial hemp, as 517 defined in § 3.2-4112, that is possessed by a person who holds a hemp producer license issued by the 518 U.S. Department of Agriculture pursuant to 7 C.F.R. Part 990; (iv) a hemp product, as defined in 519 § 3.2-4112, containing a *total* tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of no greater than 0.3 percent that is 520 derived from industrial hemp, as defined in § 3.2-4112, that is grown, dealt handled, or processed in 521 compliance with state or federal law; (v) an industrial hemp extract, as defined in § 3.2-5145.1; or (vi) 522 any substance containing a tetrahydrocannabinol isomer or salts of such isomer where such 523 tetrahydrocannabinol isomer or salts of such isomer have been placed by the Board of Pharmacy into 524 one of the schedules set forth in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) pursuant to § 54.1-3443.

525 "Marijuana concentrate" means marijuana that has undergone a process to concentrate one or more 526 active cannabinoids, thereby increasing the product's potency. Resin from granular trichomes from a 527 marijuana plant is a concentrate for purposes of this subtitle.

"Marijuana cultivation facility" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to cultivate, label, and 528 529 package retail marijuana; to purchase or take possession of marijuana plants and seeds from other 530 marijuana cultivation facilities; to transfer possession of and sell retail marijuana, immature marijuana 531 plants, and marijuana seeds to marijuana wholesalers and retail marijuana stores; to transfer possession 532 of and sell retail marijuana, marijuana plants, and marijuana seeds to other marijuana cultivation 533 facilities; to transfer possession of and sell retail marijuana to marijuana manufacturing facilities; and to 534 sell immature marijuana plants and marijuana seeds to consumers for the purpose of cultivating 535 marijuana at home for personal use.

536 "Marijuana establishment" means a marijuana cultivation facility, a marijuana testing facility, a 537 marijuana manufacturing facility, a marijuana wholesaler, or a retail marijuana store.

538 "Marijuana manufacturing facility" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to manufacture, label, 539 and package retail marijuana and retail marijuana products; to purchase or take possession of retail 540 marijuana from a marijuana cultivation facility or another marijuana manufacturing facility; and to 541 transfer possession of and sell retail marijuana and retail marijuana products to marijuana wholesalers, 542 retail marijuana stores, or other marijuana manufacturing facilities.

543 "Marijuana paraphernalia" means all equipment, products, and materials of any kind that are either 544 designed for use or are intended for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, 545 manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, strength testing, analyzing, 546 packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into 547 the human body marijuana.

548 "Marijuana products" means (i) products that are composed of marijuana and other ingredients and 549 are intended for use or consumption, ointments, and tinctures or (ii) marijuana concentrate.

"Marijuana testing facility" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to develop, research, or test 550 marijuana, marijuana products, and other substances. 551

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552 "Marijuana wholesaler" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to purchase or take possession of 553 retail marijuana, retail marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, and marijuana seeds from a 554 marijuana cultivation facility, a marijuana manufacturing facility, or another marijuana wholesaler and to 555 transfer possession and sell or resell retail marijuana, retail marijuana products, immature marijuana 556 plants, and marijuana seeds to a marijuana cultivation facility, marijuana manufacturing facility, retail 557 marijuana store, or another marijuana wholesaler.

558 "Non-retail marijuana" means marijuana that is not cultivated, manufactured, or sold by a licensed 559 marijuana establishment.

560 "Non-retail marijuana products" means marijuana products that are not manufactured and sold by a561 licensed marijuana establishment.

⁵⁶² "Place or premises" means the real estate, together with any buildings or other improvements thereon,
⁵⁶³ designated in the application for a license as the place at which the cultivation, manufacture, sale, or
⁵⁶⁴ testing of retail marijuana or retail marijuana products shall be performed, except that portion of any
⁵⁶⁵ such building or other improvement actually and exclusively used as a private residence.

⁵⁶⁶ "Public place" means any place, building, or conveyance to which the public has, or is permitted to
⁵⁶⁷ have, access, including restaurants, soda fountains, hotel dining areas, lobbies and corridors of hotels,
⁵⁶⁸ and any park, place of public resort or amusement, highway, street, lane, or sidewalk adjoining any
⁵⁶⁹ highway, street, or lane.

570 "Residence" means any building or part of a building or structure where a person resides, but does
571 not include any part of a building that is not actually and exclusively used as a private residence, nor
572 any part of a hotel or club other than a private guest room thereof.

573 "Retail marijuana" means marijuana that is cultivated, manufactured, or sold by a licensed marijuana 574 establishment.

575 "Retail marijuana products" means marijuana products that are manufactured and sold by a licensed576 marijuana establishment.

577 "Retail marijuana store" means a facility licensed under this subtitle to purchase or take possession of
578 retail marijuana, retail marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds from a
579 marijuana cultivation facility, marijuana manufacturing facility, or marijuana wholesaler and to sell retail
580 marijuana, retail marijuana products, immature marijuana plants, or marijuana seeds to consumers.

581 "Sale" and "sell" includes soliciting or receiving an order for; keeping, offering, or exposing for sale;
 582 peddling, exchanging, or bartering; or delivering otherwise than gratuitously, by any means, retail
 583 marijuana or retail marijuana products.

584 "Special agent" means an employee of the Virginia Cannabis Control Authority whom the Board has designated as a law-enforcement officer pursuant to this subtitle.

586 "Testing" or "test" means the research and analysis of marijuana, marijuana products, or other
587 substances for contaminants, safety, or potency. "Testing" or "test" does not include cultivation or
588 manufacturing.

"Tetrahydrocannabinol" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-4112.

"Total tetrahydrocannabinol" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-4112.

591 § 18.2-247. Use of terms "controlled substances," "marijuana," "Schedules I, II, III, IV, V, and 592 VI," "imitation controlled substance," and "counterfeit controlled substance" in Title 18.2.

A. Wherever the terms "controlled substances" and "Schedules I, II, III, IV, V, and VI" are used in
Title 18.2, such terms refer to those terms as they are used or defined in the Drug Control Act
(§ 54.1-3400 et seq.).

596 B. The term "imitation controlled substance" when used in this article means (i) a counterfeit
597 controlled substance or (ii) a pill, capsule, tablet, or substance in any form whatsoever which is not a
598 controlled substance subject to abuse, and:

599 1. Which by overall dosage unit appearance, including color, shape, size, marking and packaging or
by representations made, would cause the likelihood that such a pill, capsule, tablet, or substance in any
other form whatsoever will be mistaken for a controlled substance unless such substance was introduced
into commerce prior to the initial introduction into commerce of the controlled substance which it is
alleged to imitate; or

604 2. Which by express or implied representations purports to act like a controlled substance as a
605 stimulant or depressant of the central nervous system and which is not commonly used or recognized for
606 use in that particular formulation for any purpose other than for such stimulant or depressant effect,
607 unless marketed, promoted, or sold as permitted by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

C. In determining whether a pill, capsule, tablet, or substance in any other form whatsoever, is an
"imitation controlled substance," there shall be considered, in addition to all other relevant factors,
comparisons with accepted methods of marketing for legitimate nonprescription drugs for medicinal
purposes rather than for drug abuse or any similar nonmedicinal use, including consideration of the
packaging of the drug and its appearance in overall finished dosage form, promotional materials or
representations, oral or written, concerning the drug, and the methods of distribution of the drug and

615 D. E. The term "counterfeit controlled substance" means a controlled substance that, without
authorization, bears, is packaged in a container or wrapper that bears, or is otherwise labeled to bear, the
trademark, trade name, or other identifying mark, imprint or device or any likeness thereof, of a drug
manufacturer, processor, packer, or distributor other than the manufacturer, processor, packer, or
distributor who did in fact so manufacture, process, pack or distribute such drug.

F. The term "tetrahydrocannabinol" means any naturally occurring or synthetic
tetrahydrocannabinol, including its salts, isomers, and salts of isomers whenever the existence of such
salts, isomers, and salts of isomers is possible within the specific chemical designation and any
preparation, mixture, or substance containing, or mixed or infused with, any detectable amount of
tetrahydrocannabinol. "Tetrahydrocannabinol" includes delta-6a(10a), delta-7, delta-8, delta-9, and
delta-10-tetrahydrocannibinol. For the purposes of this definition, "isomer" means the optical, position,
and geometric isomers.

643 G. The term "total tetrahydrocannabinol" means the sum, after the application of any necessary 644 conversion factor, of the percentage by weight of tetrahydrocannabinol and the percentage by weight of 645 tetrahydrocannabinolic acid.

H. The Department of Forensic Science shall determine the proper methods for detecting the concentration of delta 9-tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) tetrahydrocannabinol in substances for the purposes of this title, Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1, and §§ § 54.1-3401 and 54.1-3446. The testing methodology shall use post-decarboxylation testing or other equivalent method and shall consider the potential conversion of delta 9-tetrahydrocannibinol tetrahydrocannabinolic acid (THC-A) into THC tetrahydrocannabinol. The test result shall include the total available THC derived from the sum of the THC and THC-A content.

653 § 18.2-251.1:3. Possession or distribution of cannabis oil, or industrial hemp; laboratories; 654 Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Department of Law employees.

A. No person employed by an analytical laboratory to retrieve, deliver, or possess cannabis oil or 655 656 industrial hemp samples from a permitted pharmaceutical processor, a registered industrial hemp grower, 657 a federally licensed hemp producer, or a registered industrial hemp processor for the purpose of 658 performing required testing shall be prosecuted under Chapter 11 (§ 4.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 4.1 or § 18.2-248, 18.2-248.1, 18.2-250, or 18.2-255 for the possession or distribution of cannabis oil or 659 660 industrial hemp or for storing cannabis oil or industrial hemp for testing purposes in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Board of Pharmacy and the Board of Agriculture and Consumer **661** 662 Services.

663 B. No employee of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services *or of the Department of* 664 *Law* shall be prosecuted under § 18.2-247, 18.2-248, 18.2-248.01, 18.2-248.1, or 18.2-250 for the 665 possession or distribution of industrial hemp *or any substance containing tetrahydrocannabinol* when 666 possession of industrial hemp *or any substance containing tetrahydrocannabinol* is necessary in the 667 performance of his duties.

§ 18.2-371.2. Prohibiting purchase or possession of tobacco products, nicotine vapor products, alternative nicotine products, and hemp products intended for smoking by a person under 21 years of age or sale of tobacco products, nicotine vapor products, alternative nicotine products, and hemp products intended for smoking to persons under 21 years of age; civil penalties.

A. No person shall sell to, distribute to, purchase for, or knowingly permit the purchase by any
person less than 21 years of age, knowing or having reason to believe that such person is less than 21
years of age, any tobacco product, nicotine vapor product, alternative nicotine product, or hemp product

675 intended for smoking.

Tobacco products, nicotine vapor products, alternative nicotine products, and hemp products intended for smoking may be sold from a vending machine only if the machine is (i) posted with a notice, in a conspicuous manner and place, indicating that the purchase or possession of such products by persons under 21 years of age is unlawful and (ii) located in a place that is not open to the general public and is not generally accessible to persons under 21 years of age. An establishment that prohibits the presence of persons under 21 years of age unless accompanied by a person 21 years of age or older is not open to the general public.

683 B. No person less than 21 years of age shall attempt to purchase, purchase, or possess any tobacco **684** product, nicotine vapor product, alternative nicotine product, or hemp product intended for smoking. The provisions of this subsection shall not be applicable to the possession of tobacco products, nicotine **685** 686 vapor products, alternative nicotine products, or hemp products intended for smoking by a person less 687 than 21 years of age (i) making a delivery of tobacco products, nicotine vapor products, alternative 688 nicotine products, or hemp products intended for smoking in pursuance of his employment or (ii) as part 689 of a scientific study being conducted by an organization for the purpose of medical research to further 690 efforts in cigarette and tobacco use prevention and cessation and tobacco product regulation, provided that such medical research has been approved by an institutional review board pursuant to applicable **691** federal regulations or by a research review committee pursuant to Chapter 5.1 (§ 32.1-162.16 et seq.) of **692** 693 Title 32.1. This subsection shall not apply to purchase, attempt to purchase, or possession by a 694 law-enforcement officer or his agent when the same is necessary in the performance of his duties.

695 C. No person shall sell a tobacco product, nicotine vapor product, alternative nicotine product, or 696 hemp product intended for smoking to any individual who does not demonstrate, by producing a driver's 697 license or similar photo identification issued by a government agency, that the individual is at least 21 years of age. Such identification is not required from an individual whom the person has reason to **698** 699 believe is at least 21 years of age or who the person knows is at least 21 years of age. Proof that the person demanded, was shown, and reasonably relied upon a photo identification stating that the 700 701 individual was at least 21 years of age shall be a defense to any action brought under this subsection. In 702 determining whether a person had reason to believe an individual is at least 21 years of age, the trier of 703 fact may consider, but is not limited to, proof of the general appearance, facial characteristics, behavior, 704 and manner of the individual.

705 This subsection shall not apply to mail order or Internet sales, provided that the person offering the 706 tobacco product, nicotine vapor product, alternative nicotine product, or hemp product intended for 707 smoking for sale through mail order or the Internet (i) prior to the sale of the tobacco product, nicotine 708 vapor product, alternative nicotine product, or hemp product intended for smoking verifies that the 709 purchaser is at least 21 years of age through a commercially available database that is regularly used by 710 businesses or governmental entities for the purpose of age and identity verification and (ii) uses a 711 method of mailing, shipping, or delivery that requires the signature of a person at least 21 years of age 712 before the tobacco product, nicotine vapor product, alternative nicotine product, or hemp product 713 intended for smoking will be released to the purchaser.

714 D. The provisions of subsections B and C shall not apply to the sale, giving, or furnishing of any 715 tobacco product, nicotine vapor product, alternative nicotine product, or hemp product intended for 716 smoking to any active duty military personnel who are 18 years of age or older. An identification card 717 issued by the Armed Forces of the United States shall be accepted as proof of age for this purpose.

E. A violation of subsection A or C by an individual or by a separate retail establishment that
involves a nicotine vapor product, alternative nicotine product, hemp product intended for smoking, or
tobacco product other than a bidi is punishable by a civil penalty not to exceed \$100 for a first
violation, a civil penalty not to exceed \$200 for a second violation, and a civil penalty not to exceed
\$500 for a third or subsequent violation.

723 A violation of subsection A or C by an individual or by a separate retail establishment that involves 724 the sale, distribution, or purchase of a bidi is punishable by a civil penalty in the amount of \$500 for a 725 first violation, a civil penalty in the amount of \$1,000 for a second violation, and a civil penalty in the 726 amount of \$2,500 for a third or subsequent violation. Where a defendant retail establishment offers 727 proof that it has trained its employees concerning the requirements of this section, the court shall 728 suspend all of the penalties imposed hereunder. However, where the court finds that a retail 729 establishment has failed to so train its employees, the court may impose a civil penalty not to exceed 730 \$1,000 in lieu of any penalties imposed hereunder for a violation of subsection A or C involving a 731 nicotine vapor product, alternative nicotine product, hemp product intended for smoking, or tobacco 732 product other than a bidi.

A violation of subsection B is punishable by a civil penalty not to exceed \$100 for a first violation
and a civil penalty not to exceed \$250 for a second or subsequent violation. A court may, as an
alternative to the civil penalty, and upon motion of the defendant, prescribe the performance of up to 20
hours of community service for a first violation of subsection B and up to 40 hours of community

737 service for a second or subsequent violation. If the defendant fails or refuses to complete the community
738 service as prescribed, the court may impose the civil penalty. Upon a violation of subsection B, the
739 judge may enter an order pursuant to subdivision A 9 of § 16.1-278.8.

740 Any attorney for the Commonwealth of the county or city in which an alleged violation occurred
741 may bring an action to recover the civil penalty, which shall be paid into the state treasury. Any
742 law-enforcement officer may issue a summons for a violation of subsection A, B, or C.

743 F. 1. Cigarettes and hemp products intended for smoking shall be sold only in sealed packages provided by the manufacturer, with the required health warning. The proprietor of every retail 744 745 establishment that offers for sale any tobacco product, nicotine vapor product, alternative nicotine 746 product, or hemp product intended for smoking shall post in a conspicuous manner and place a sign or 747 signs indicating that the sale of tobacco products, nicotine vapor products, alternative nicotine products, 748 or hemp products intended for smoking to any person under 21 years of age is prohibited by law. Any 749 attorney for the county, city, or town in which an alleged violation of this subsection occurred may 750 enforce this subsection by civil action to recover a civil penalty not to exceed \$50 \$500. The civil 751 penalty shall be paid into the local treasury. No filing fee or other fee or cost shall be charged to the 752 county, city, or town which instituted the action.

753 2. For the purpose of compliance with regulations of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health
754 Services Administration published at 61 Federal Register 1492, the Department of Agriculture and
755 Consumer Services may promulgate regulations which allow the Department to undertake the activities
756 necessary to comply with such regulations.

757 3. Any attorney for the county, city, or town in which an alleged violation of this subsection
758 occurred may enforce this subsection by civil action to recover a civil penalty not to exceed \$100 \$500.
759 The civil penalty shall be paid into the local treasury. No filing fee or other fee or cost shall be charged
760 to the county, city, or town which instituted the action.

G. Nothing in this section shall be construed to create a private cause of action.

H. Agents of the Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Authority designated pursuant to § 4.1-105may issue a summons for any violation of this section.

I. As used in this section:

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"Alternative nicotine product" means any noncombustible product containing nicotine that is intended
for human consumption, whether chewed, absorbed, dissolved, or ingested by any other means.
"Alternative nicotine product" does not include any nicotine vapor product, tobacco product, or product
regulated as a drug or device by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) under Chapter V (21
U.S.C. § 351 et seq.) of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

"Bidi" means a product containing tobacco that is wrapped in temburni leaf (diospyros melanoxylon)
or tendu leaf (diospyros exculpra), or any other product that is offered to, or purchased by, consumers as
a bidi or beedie.

"Hemp product" means the same as that term is defined in § 3.2-4112.

774 "Nicotine vapor product" means any noncombustible product containing nicotine that employs a 775 heating element, power source, electronic circuit, or other electronic, chemical, or mechanical means, 776 regardless of shape or size, that can be used to produce vapor from nicotine in a solution or other form. 777 "Nicotine vapor product" includes any electronic cigarette, electronic cigar, electronic cigarillo, electronic 778 pipe, or similar product or device and any cartridge or other container of nicotine in a solution or other 779 form that is intended to be used with or in an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar, electronic cigarillo, 780 electronic pipe, or similar product or device. "Nicotine vapor product" does not include any product 781 regulated by the FDA under Chapter V (21 U.S.C. § 351 et seq.) of the Federal Food, Drug, and 782 Cosmetic Act.

"Tobacco product" means any product made of tobacco and includes cigarettes, cigars, smokeless
tobacco, pipe tobacco, bidis, and wrappings. "Tobacco product" does not include any nicotine vapor
product, alternative nicotine product, or product that is regulated by the FDA under Chapter V (21
U.S.C. § 351 et seq.) of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

787 "Wrappings" includes papers made or sold for covering or rolling tobacco or other materials for788 smoking in a manner similar to a cigarette or cigar.

789 § 54.1-3401. Definitions.

As used in this chapter, unless the context requires a different meaning:

791 "Administer" means the direct application of a controlled substance, whether by injection, inhalation,
792 ingestion, or any other means, to the body of a patient or research subject by (i) a practitioner or by his
793 authorized agent and under his direction or (ii) the patient or research subject at the direction and in the
794 presence of the practitioner.

795 "Advertisement" means all representations disseminated in any manner or by any means, other than
796 by labeling, for the purpose of inducing, or which are likely to induce, directly or indirectly, the
797 purchase of drugs or devices.

798 "Agent" means an authorized person who acts on behalf of or at the direction of a manufacturer, 799 distributor, or dispenser. It does not include a common or contract carrier, public warehouseman, or 800 employee of the carrier or warehouseman.

801 "Anabolic steroid" means any drug or hormonal substance, chemically and pharmacologically related 802 to testosterone, other than estrogens, progestins, corticosteroids, and dehydroepiandrosterone.

803 "Animal" means any nonhuman animate being endowed with the power of voluntary action.

804 "Automated drug dispensing system" means a mechanical or electronic system that performs 805 operations or activities, other than compounding or administration, relating to pharmacy services, 806 including the storage, dispensing, or distribution of drugs and the collection, control, and maintenance of 807 all transaction information, to provide security and accountability for such drugs.

"Biological product" means a virus, therapeutic serum, toxin, antitoxin, vaccine, blood, blood component or derivative, allergenic product, protein other than a chemically synthesized polypeptide, or 808 809 810 analogous product, or arsphenamine or any derivative of arsphenamine or any other trivalent organic 811 arsenic compound, applicable to the prevention, treatment, or cure of a disease or condition of human 812 beings.

813 "Biosimilar" means a biological product that is highly similar to a specific reference biological 814 product, notwithstanding minor differences in clinically inactive compounds, such that there are no clinically meaningful differences between the reference biological product and the biological product that 815 816 has been licensed as a biosimilar pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 262(k) in terms of safety, purity, and potency of the product. 817 818

"Board" means the Board of Pharmacy.

819 "Bulk drug substance" means any substance that is represented for use, and that, when used in the compounding, manufacturing, processing, or packaging of a drug, becomes an active ingredient or a finished dosage form of the drug; however, "bulk drug substance" shall not include intermediates that 820 821 822 are used in the synthesis of such substances.

"Change of ownership" of an existing entity permitted, registered, or licensed by the Board means (i) 823 the sale or transfer of all or substantially all of the assets of the entity or of any corporation that owns 824 825 or controls the entity; (ii) the creation of a partnership by a sole proprietor, the dissolution of a partnership, or change in partnership composition; (iii) the acquisition or disposal of 50 percent or more 826 827 of the outstanding shares of voting stock of a corporation owning the entity or of the parent corporation 828 of a wholly owned subsidiary owning the entity, except that this shall not apply to any corporation the 829 voting stock of which is actively traded on any securities exchange or in any over-the-counter market; 830 (iv) the merger of a corporation owning the entity or of the parent corporation of a wholly-owned 831 subsidiary owning the entity with another business or corporation; or (v) the expiration or forfeiture of a 832 corporation's charter.

833 'Co-licensed partner" means a person who, with at least one other person, has the right to engage in 834 the manufacturing or marketing of a prescription drug, consistent with state and federal law.

835 "Compounding" means the combining of two or more ingredients to fabricate such ingredients into a 836 single preparation and includes the mixing, assembling, packaging, or labeling of a drug or device (i) by 837 a pharmacist, or within a permitted pharmacy, pursuant to a valid prescription issued for a medicinal or 838 therapeutic purpose in the context of a bona fide practitioner-patient-pharmacist relationship, or in 839 expectation of receiving a valid prescription based on observed historical patterns of prescribing and 840 dispensing; (ii) by a practitioner of medicine, osteopathy, podiatry, dentistry, or veterinary medicine as 841 an incident to his administering or dispensing, if authorized to dispense, a controlled substance in the 842 course of his professional practice; or (iii) for the purpose of, or as incident to, research, teaching, or 843 chemical analysis and not for sale or for dispensing. The mixing, diluting, or reconstituting of a manufacturer's product drugs for the purpose of administration to a patient, when performed by a 844 practitioner of medicine or osteopathy licensed under Chapter 29 (§ 54.1-2900 et seq.), a person 845 846 supervised by such practitioner pursuant to subdivision A 6 or 19 of § 54.1-2901, or a person supervised 847 by such practitioner or a licensed nurse practitioner or physician assistant pursuant to subdivision A 4 of 848 § 54.1-2901 shall not be considered compounding.

849 "Controlled substance" means a drug, substance, or immediate precursor in Schedules I through VI of 850 this chapter. The term shall not include distilled spirits, wine, malt beverages, or tobacco as those terms 851 are defined or used in Title 3.2 or Title 4.1. The term "controlled substance" includes a controlled 852 substance analog that has been placed into Schedule I or II by the Board pursuant to the regulatory 853 authority in subsection D of § 54.1-3443.

"Controlled substance analog" means a substance the chemical structure of which is substantially 854 855 similar to the chemical structure of a controlled substance in Schedule I or II and either (i) which has a 856 stimulant, depressant, or hallucinogenic effect on the central nervous system that is substantially similar to or greater than the stimulant, depressant, or hallucinogenic effect on the central nervous system of a 857 858 controlled substance in Schedule I or II or (ii) with respect to a particular person, which such person 859 represents or intends to have a stimulant, depressant, or hallucinogenic effect on the central nervous 860 system that is substantially similar to or greater than the stimulant, depressant, or hallucinogenic effect on the central nervous system of a controlled substance in Schedule I or II. "Controlled substance 861 862 analog" does not include (a) any substance for which there is an approved new drug application as defined under § 505 of the federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (21 U.S.C. § 355) or that is generally 863 864 recognized as safe and effective pursuant to §§ 501, 502, and 503 of the federal Food, Drug, and 865 Cosmetic Act (21 U.S.C. §§ 351, 352, and 353) and 21 C.F.R. Part 330; (b) with respect to a particular 866 person, any substance for which an exemption is in effect for investigational use for that person under 867 § 505 of the federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act to the extent that the conduct with respect to that 868 substance is pursuant to such exemption; or (c) any substance to the extent not intended for human 869 consumption before such an exemption takes effect with respect to that substance.

870 "DEA" means the Drug Enforcement Administration, U.S. Department of Justice, or its successor 871 agency.

872 "Deliver" or "delivery" means the actual, constructive, or attempted transfer of any item regulated by 873 this chapter, whether or not there exists an agency relationship, including delivery of a Schedule VI 874 prescription device to an ultimate user or consumer on behalf of a medical equipment supplier by a 875 manufacturer, nonresident manufacturer, wholesale distributor, nonresident wholesale distributor, 876 warehouser, nonresident warehouser, third-party logistics provider, or nonresident third-party logistics 877 provider at the direction of a medical equipment supplier in accordance with § 54.1-3415.1.

878 "Device" means instruments, apparatus, and contrivances, including their components, parts, and 879 accessories, intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease in 880 man or animals or to affect the structure or any function of the body of man or animals.

881 "Dialysis care technician" or "dialysis patient care technician" means an individual who is certified 882 by an organization approved by the Board of Health Professions pursuant to Chapter 27.01 883 (§ 54.1-2729.1 et seq.) and who, under the supervision of a licensed physician, nurse practitioner, **884** physician assistant, or a registered nurse, assists in the care of patients undergoing renal dialysis 885 treatments in a Medicare-certified renal dialysis facility.

886 "Dialysis solution" means either the commercially available, unopened, sterile solutions whose 887 purpose is to be instilled into the peritoneal cavity during the medical procedure known as peritoneal 888 dialysis, or commercially available solutions whose purpose is to be used in the performance of 889 hemodialysis not to include any solutions administered to the patient intravenously.

890 "Dispense" means to deliver a drug to an ultimate user or research subject by or pursuant to the 891 lawful order of a practitioner, including the prescribing and administering, packaging, labeling, or 892 compounding necessary to prepare the substance for that delivery. However, dispensing shall not include 893 the transportation of drugs mixed, diluted, or reconstituted in accordance with this chapter to other sites 894 operated by such practitioner or that practitioner's medical practice for the purpose of administration of 895 such drugs to patients of the practitioner or that practitioner's medical practice at such other sites. For 896 practitioners of medicine or osteopathy, "dispense" shall only include the provision of drugs by a 897 practitioner to patients to take with them away from the practitioner's place of practice.

- 898 "Dispenser" means a practitioner who dispenses.
- "Distribute" means to deliver other than by administering or dispensing a controlled substance. 899
- 900 "Distributor" means a person who distributes.

901 "Drug" means (i) articles or substances recognized in the official United States Pharmacopoeia 902 National Formulary or official Homeopathic Pharmacopoeia of the United States, or any supplement to 903 any of them; (ii) articles or substances intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or **904** prevention of disease in man or animals; (iii) articles or substances, other than food, intended to affect 905 the structure or any function of the body of man or animals; (iv) articles or substances intended for use 906 as a component of any article specified in clause (i), (ii), or (iii); or (v) a biological product. "Drug" 907 does not include devices or their components, parts, or accessories.

908 "Drug product" means a specific drug in dosage form from a known source of manufacture, whether 909 by brand or therapeutically equivalent drug product name.

910 "Electronic prescription" means a written prescription that is generated on an electronic application 911 and is transmitted to a pharmacy as an electronic data file; Schedule II through V prescriptions shall be 912 transmitted in accordance with 21 C.F.R. Part 1300.

913 "Facsimile (FAX) prescription" means a written prescription or order that is transmitted by an 914 electronic device over telephone lines that sends the exact image to the receiving pharmacy in hard copy 915 form.

"FDA" means the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

916 917 "Immediate precursor" means a substance which the Board of Pharmacy has found to be and by 918 regulation designates as being the principal compound commonly used or produced primarily for use, and which is an immediate chemical intermediary used or likely to be used in the manufacture of a 919 920 controlled substance, the control of which is necessary to prevent, curtail, or limit manufacture.

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921 "Interchangeable" means a biosimilar that meets safety standards for determining interchangeability
 922 pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 262(k)(4).

923 "Label" means a display of written, printed, or graphic matter upon the immediate container of any
924 article. A requirement made by or under authority of this chapter that any word, statement, or other
925 information appear on the label shall not be considered to be complied with unless such word,
926 statement, or other information also appears on the outside container or wrapper, if any, of the retail
927 package of such article or is easily legible through the outside container or wrapper.

"Labeling" means all labels and other written, printed, or graphic matter on an article or any of its containers or wrappers, or accompanying such article.

"Manufacture" means the production, preparation, propagation, conversion, or processing of any item
regulated by this chapter, either directly or indirectly by extraction from substances of natural origin, or
independently by means of chemical synthesis, or by a combination of extraction and chemical
synthesis, and includes any packaging or repackaging of the substance or labeling or relabeling of its
container. This term does not include compounding.

935 "Manufacturer" means every person who manufactures, a manufacturer's co-licensed partner, or a936 repackager.

937 "Marijuana" means any part of a plant of the genus Cannabis whether growing or not, its seeds, or 938 its resin; and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of such plant, its 939 seeds, its resin, or any extract containing one or more cannabinoids. "Marijuana" does not include (i) the 940 mature stalks of such plant, fiber produced from such stalk, or oil or cake made from the seeds of such 941 plant, unless such stalks, fiber, oil, or cake is combined with other parts of plants of the genus Cannabis-942 Marijuana does not include (i); (ii) industrial hemp, as defined in § 3.2-4112, that is possessed by a person registered pursuant to subsection A of § 3.2-4115 or his agent, (ii); (iii) industrial hemp, as 943 defined in § 3.2-4112, that is possessed by a person who holds a hemp producer license issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture pursuant to 7 C.F.R. Part 990, or (iii); (iv) a hemp product, as defined 944 945 946 in § 3.2-4112, containing a *total* tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of no greater than 0.3 percent that is 947 derived from industrial hemp, as defined in § 3.2-4112, that is grown, dealt handled, or processed in 948 compliance with state or federal law; (v) an industrial hemp extract, as defined in § 3.2-5145.1; or (vi) 949 any substance containing a tetrahydrocannabinol isomer or salts of such isomer where such 950 tetrahydrocannabinol isomer or salts of such isomer have been placed by the Board of Pharmacy into 951 one of the schedules set forth in the Drug Control Act (§ 54.1-3400 et seq.) pursuant to § 54.1-3443.

"Medical equipment supplier" means any person, as defined in § 1-230, engaged in the delivery to
the ultimate consumer, pursuant to the lawful order of a practitioner, of hypodermic syringes and
needles, medicinal oxygen, Schedule VI controlled devices, those Schedule VI controlled substances with
no medicinal properties that are used for the operation and cleaning of medical equipment, solutions for
peritoneal dialysis, and sterile water or saline for irrigation.

"Narcotic drug" means any of the following, whether produced directly or indirectly by extraction 957 958 from substances of vegetable origin, or independently by means of chemical synthesis, or by a 959 combination of extraction and chemical synthesis: (i) opium, opiates, and any salt, compound, derivative, or preparation of opium or opiates; (ii) any salt, compound, isomer, derivative, or preparation thereof 960 961 which is chemically equivalent or identical with any of the substances referred to in clause (i), but not including the isoquinoline alkaloids of opium; (iii) opium poppy and poppy straw; (iv) coca leaves and 962 963 any salt, compound, derivative, or preparation of coca leaves, and any salt, compound, isomer, 964 derivative, or preparation thereof which is chemically equivalent or identical with any of these 965 substances, but not including decocainized coca leaves or extraction of coca leaves which do not contain 966 cocaine or ecgonine.

"New drug" means (i) any drug, except a new animal drug or an animal feed bearing or containing a 967 968 new animal drug, the composition of which is such that such drug is not generally recognized, among 969 experts qualified by scientific training and experience to evaluate the safety and effectiveness of drugs, 970 as safe and effective for use under the conditions prescribed, recommended, or suggested in the labeling, 971 except that such a drug not so recognized shall not be deemed to be a "new drug" if at any time prior 972 to the enactment of this chapter it was subject to the Food and Drugs Act of June 30, 1906, as 973 amended, and if at such time its labeling contained the same representations concerning the conditions 974 of its use, or (ii) any drug, except a new animal drug or an animal feed bearing or containing a new 975 animal drug, the composition of which is such that such drug, as a result of investigations to determine 976 its safety and effectiveness for use under such conditions, has become so recognized, but which has not, 977 otherwise than in such investigations, been used to a material extent or for a material time under such 978 conditions.

979 "Nuclear medicine technologist" means an individual who holds a current certification with the
980 American Registry of Radiological Technologists or the Nuclear Medicine Technology Certification
981 Board.

982 "Official compendium" means the official United States Pharmacopoeia National Formulary, official

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983 Homeopathic Pharmacopoeia of the United States, or any supplement to any of them.

984 "Official written order" means an order written on a form provided for that purpose by the U.S. Drug
985 Enforcement Administration, under any laws of the United States making provision therefor, if such order forms are authorized and required by federal law, and if no such order form is provided then on an official form provided for that purpose by the Board of Pharmacy.

"Opiate" means any substance having an addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability similar to morphine or being capable of conversion into a drug having such addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability. It does not include, unless specifically designated as controlled under Article 4 (§ 54.1-3437 et seq.), the dextrorotatory isomer of 3-methoxy-n-methylmorphinan and its salts
(dextromethorphan). It does include its racemic and levorotatory forms.

993 "Opium poppy" means the plant of the species Papaver somniferum L., except the seeds thereof.

994 "Original package" means the unbroken container or wrapping in which any drug or medicine is
995 enclosed together with label and labeling, put up by or for the manufacturer, wholesaler, or distributor
996 for use in the delivery or display of such article.

997 "Outsourcing facility" means a facility that is engaged in the compounding of sterile drugs and is
998 currently registered as an outsourcing facility with the U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services and
999 that complies with all applicable requirements of federal and state law, including the Federal Food,
1000 Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

1001 "Person" means both the plural and singular, as the case demands, and includes an individual, 1002 partnership, corporation, association, governmental agency, trust, or other institution or entity.

1003 "Pharmacist-in-charge" means the person who, being licensed as a pharmacist, signs the application
1004 for a pharmacy permit and assumes full legal responsibility for the operation of the relevant pharmacy in
1005 a manner complying with the laws and regulations for the practice of pharmacy and the sale and
1006 dispensing of controlled substances; the "pharmacist-in-charge" shall personally supervise the pharmacy
1007 and the pharmacy's personnel as required by § 54.1-3432.

1008 "Poppy straw" means all parts, except the seeds, of the opium poppy, after mowing.

"Practitioner" means a physician, dentist, licensed nurse practitioner pursuant to § 54.1-2957.01,
licensed physician assistant pursuant to § 54.1-2952.1, pharmacist pursuant to § 54.1-3300, TPA-certified
optometrist pursuant to Article 5 (§ 54.1-3222 et seq.) of Chapter 32, veterinarian, scientific investigator,
or other person licensed, registered, or otherwise permitted to distribute, dispense, prescribe and
administer, or conduct research with respect to a controlled substance in the course of professional
practice or research in the Commonwealth.

1015 "Prescriber" means a practitioner who is authorized pursuant to §§ 54.1-3303 and 54.1-3408 to issue a prescription.

1017 "Prescription" means an order for drugs or medical supplies, written or signed or transmitted by word
1018 of mouth, telephone, telegraph, or other means of communication to a pharmacist by a duly licensed
1019 physician, dentist, veterinarian, or other practitioner authorized by law to prescribe and administer such
1020 drugs or medical supplies.

1021 "Prescription drug" means any drug required by federal law or regulation to be dispensed only
 1022 pursuant to a prescription, including finished dosage forms and active ingredients subject to § 503(b) of
 1023 the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (21 U.S.C. § 353(b)).

1024 "Production" or "produce" includes the manufacture, planting, cultivation, growing, or harvesting of a controlled substance or marijuana.

1026 "Proprietary medicine" means a completely compounded nonprescription drug in its unbroken, 1027 original package which does not contain any controlled substance or marijuana as defined in this chapter 1028 and is not in itself poisonous, and which is sold, offered, promoted, or advertised directly to the general 1029 public by or under the authority of the manufacturer or primary distributor, under a trademark, trade 1030 name, or other trade symbol privately owned, and the labeling of which conforms to the requirements of 1031 this chapter and applicable federal law. However, this definition shall not include a drug that is only 1032 advertised or promoted professionally to licensed practitioners, a narcotic or drug containing a narcotic, 1033 a drug that may be dispensed only upon prescription or the label of which bears substantially the statement "Warning — may be habit-forming," or a drug intended for injection. 1034

1035 "Radiopharmaceutical" means any drug that exhibits spontaneous disintegration of unstable nuclei 1036 with the emission of nuclear particles or photons and includes any non-radioactive reagent kit or 1037 radionuclide generator that is intended to be used in the preparation of any such substance, but does not 1038 include drugs such as carbon-containing compounds or potassium-containing salts that include trace 1039 quantities of naturally occurring radionuclides. The term also includes any biological product that is 1040 labeled with a radionuclide or intended solely to be labeled with a radionuclide.

1041 "Reference biological product" means the single biological product licensed pursuant to 42 U.S.C.
1042 § 262(a) against which a biological product is evaluated in an application submitted to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for licensure of biological products as biosimilar or interchangeable pursuant to

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1044 42 U.S.C. § 262(k).

1045 "Sale" includes barter, exchange, or gift, or offer therefor, and each such transaction made by any 1046 person, whether as an individual, proprietor, agent, servant, or employee.

1047 "Tetrahydrocannabinol" means any naturally occurring or synthetic tetrahydrocannabinol, including 1048 its salts, isomers, and salts of isomers whenever the existence of such salts, isomers, and salts of 1049 isomers is possible within the specific chemical designation and any preparation, mixture, or substance 1050 containing, or mixed or infused with, any detectable amount of tetrahydrocannabinol. "Tetrahydrocannabinol" includes delta-6a(10a), delta-7, delta-8, delta-9, and delta-10 1051 tetrahydrocannabinol. For the purposes of this definition, "isomer" means the optical, position, and 1052 1053 geometric isomers.

1054 "Therapeutically equivalent drug products" means drug products that contain the same active 1055 ingredients and are identical in strength or concentration, dosage form, and route of administration and that are classified as being therapeutically equivalent by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration 1056 pursuant to the definition of "therapeutically equivalent drug products" set forth in the most recent 1057 1058 edition of the Approved Drug Products with Therapeutic Equivalence Evaluations, otherwise known as 1059 the "Orange Book."

1060 "Third-party logistics provider" means a person that provides or coordinates warehousing of or other 1061 logistics services for a drug or device in interstate commerce on behalf of a manufacturer, wholesale 1062 distributor, or dispenser of the drug or device but does not take ownership of the product or have 1063 responsibility for directing the sale or disposition of the product.

"Total tetrahydrocannabinol" means the sum, after the application of any necessary conversion 1064 factor, of the percentage by weight of tetrahydrocannabinol and the percentage by weight of 1065 tetrahydrocannabinolic acid. 1066

"USP-NF" means the current edition of the United States Pharmacopeia-National Formulary.

1068 "Warehouser" means any person, other than a wholesale distributor, manufacturer, or third-party 1069 logistics provider, engaged in the business of (i) selling or otherwise distributing prescription drugs or 1070 devices to any person who is not the ultimate user or consumer and (ii) delivering Schedule VI 1071 prescription devices to the ultimate user or consumer pursuant to § 54.1-3415.1. No person shall be 1072 subject to any state or local tax by reason of this definition.

1073 Wholesale distribution" means (i) distribution of prescription drugs to persons other than consumers 1074 or patients and (ii) delivery of Schedule VI prescription devices to the ultimate user or consumer 1075 pursuant to § 54.1-3415.1, subject to the exemptions set forth in the federal Drug Supply Chain Security 1076 Act.

1077 "Wholesale distributor" means any person other than a manufacturer, a manufacturer's co-licensed 1078 partner, a third-party logistics provider, or a repackager that engages in wholesale distribution.

The words "drugs" and "devices" as used in Chapter 33 (§ 54.1-3300 et seq.) and in this chapter 1079 1080 shall not include surgical or dental instruments, physical therapy equipment, X-ray apparatus, or glasses 1081 or lenses for the eyes.

1082 The terms "pharmacist," "pharmacy," and "practice of pharmacy" as used in this chapter shall be 1083 defined as provided in Chapter 33 (§ 54.1-3300 et seq.) unless the context requires a different meaning. 1084 § 54.1-3408.3. Certification for use of cannabis oil for treatment.

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A. As used in this section:

1086 "Botanical cannabis" means cannabis that is composed wholly of usable cannabis from the same parts 1087 of the same chemovar of cannabis plant.

1088 "Cannabis oil" means any formulation of processed Cannabis plant extract, which may include 1089 industrial hemp extracts, including isolates and distillates, acquired by a pharmaceutical processor pursuant to § 54.1-3442.6, or a dilution of the resin of the Cannabis plant that contains no more than 10 1090 milligrams of delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol per dose. "Cannabis oil" does not include industrial hemp, as 1091 1092 defined in § 3.2-4112, that is grown, dealt handled, or processed in compliance with state or federal law, 1093 unless it has been grown and processed in the Commonwealth by a registered industrial hemp processor 1094 and acquired and formulated by a pharmaceutical processor.

1095 "Cannabis product" means a product that is (i) produced by a pharmaceutical processor, registered 1096 with the Board, and compliant with testing requirements and (ii) composed of cannabis oil or botanical 1097 cannabis.

1098 "Designated caregiver facility" means any hospice or hospice facility licensed pursuant to 1099 § 32.1-162.3, or home care organization as defined in § 32.1-162.7 that provides pharmaceutical services 1100 or home health services, private provider licensed by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services pursuant to Article 2 (§ 37.2-403 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 37.2, assisted 1101 1102 living facility licensed pursuant to § 63.2-1701, or adult day care center licensed pursuant to § 63.2-1701. 1103

1104 "Practitioner" means a practitioner of medicine or osteopathy licensed by the Board of Medicine, a 1105 physician assistant licensed by the Board of Medicine, or a nurse practitioner jointly licensed by the

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1106 Board of Medicine and the Board of Nursing.

"Registered agent" means an individual designated by a patient who has been issued a written
certification, or, if such patient is a minor or a vulnerable adult as defined in § 18.2-369, designated by
such patient's parent or legal guardian, and registered with the Board pursuant to subsection G.

"Úsable cannabis" means any cannabis plant material, including seeds, but not (i) resin that has been
extracted from any part of the cannabis plant, its seeds, or its resin; (ii) the mature stalks, fiber produced
from the stalks, or any other compound, manufacture, salt, or derivative, mixture, or preparation of the
mature stalks; or (iii) oil or cake made from the seeds of the plant.

1114 B. A practitioner in the course of his professional practice may issue a written certification for the use of cannabis products for treatment or to alleviate the symptoms of any diagnosed condition or 1115 disease determined by the practitioner to benefit from such use. The practitioner shall use his 1116 professional judgment to determine the manner and frequency of patient care and evaluation and may 1117 1118 employ the use of telemedicine, provided that the use of telemedicine includes the delivery of patient 1119 care through real-time interactive audio-visual technology. If a practitioner determines it is consistent 1120 with the standard of care to dispense botanical cannabis to a minor, the written certification shall 1121 specifically authorize such dispensing. If not specifically included on the initial written certification, 1122 authorization for botanical cannabis may be communicated verbally or in writing to the pharmacist at 1123 the time of dispensing.

1124 C. The written certification shall be on a form provided by the Board of Pharmacy. Such written 1125 certification shall contain the name, address, and telephone number of the practitioner; the name and 1126 address of the patient issued the written certification; the date on which the written certification was 1127 made; and the signature or authentic electronic signature of the practitioner. Such written certification 1128 issued pursuant to subsection B shall expire no later than one year after its issuance unless the 1129 practitioner provides in such written certification an earlier expiration. A written certification shall not be 1130 issued to a patient by more than one practitioner during any given time period.

D. No practitioner shall be prosecuted under § 18.2-248 or 18.2-248.1 for the issuance of a certification for the use of cannabis products for the treatment or to alleviate the symptoms of a patient's diagnosed condition or disease pursuant to a written certification issued pursuant to subsection B. Nothing in this section shall preclude the Board of Medicine from sanctioning a practitioner for failing to properly evaluate or treat a patient's medical condition or otherwise violating the applicable standard of care for evaluating or treating medical conditions.

E. A practitioner who issues a written certification to a patient pursuant to this section shall register with the Board and shall hold sufficient education and training to exercise appropriate professional judgment in the certification of patients. The Board shall not limit the number of patients to whom a practitioner may issue a written certification. The Board may report information to the applicable licensing board on unusual patterns of certifications issued by a practitioner.

F. No patient shall be required to physically present the written certification after the initial dispensing by any pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility under each written certification, provided that the pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility maintains an electronic copy of the written certification. Pharmaceutical processors and cannabis dispensing facilities shall electronically transmit, on a monthly basis, all new written certifications received by the pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility to the Board.

1148 G. A patient, or, if such patient is a minor or a vulnerable adult as defined in § 18.2-369, such 1149 patient's parent or legal guardian, may designate an individual to act as his registered agent for the 1150 purposes of receiving cannabis products pursuant to a valid written certification. Such designated 1151 individual shall register with the Board. The Board may set a limit on the number of patients for whom 1152 any individual is authorized to act as a registered agent.

H. Upon delivery of a cannabis product by a pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility
to a designated caregiver facility, any employee or contractor of a designated caregiver facility, who is
licensed or registered by a health regulatory board and who is authorized to possess, distribute, or
administer medications, may accept delivery of the cannabis product on behalf of a patient or resident
for subsequent delivery to the patient or resident and may assist in the administration of the cannabis
product to the patient or resident as necessary.

1159 I. Information obtained under the registration process shall be confidential and shall not be subject to 1160 the disclosure provisions of the Virginia Freedom of Information Act (§ 2.2-3700 et seq.). However, 1161 reasonable access to registry information shall be provided to (i) the Chairmen of the House Committee 1162 for Courts of Justice and the Senate Committee on the Judiciary, (ii) state and federal agencies or local 1163 law enforcement for the purpose of investigating or prosecuting a specific individual for a specific 1164 violation of law, (iii) licensed practitioners or pharmacists, or their agents, for the purpose of providing patient care and drug therapy management and monitoring of drugs obtained by a patient, (iv) a 1165 pharmaceutical processor or cannabis dispensing facility involved in the treatment of a patient, or (v) a 1166

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1167 registered agent, but only with respect to information related to such patient.

1168 § 54.1-3423. Board to issue registration unless inconsistent with public interest; authorization to 1169 conduct research; application and fees.

1170 A. The Board shall register an applicant to manufacture or distribute controlled substances included in Schedules I through V unless it determines that the issuance of that registration would be inconsistent 1171 1172 with the public interest. In determining the public interest, the Board shall consider the following 1173 factors:

1174 1. Maintenance of effective controls against diversion of controlled substances into other than 1175 legitimate medical, scientific, or industrial channels; 1176

2. Compliance with applicable state and local law;

1177 3. Any convictions of the applicant under any federal and state laws relating to any controlled 1178 substance:

1179 4. Past experience in the manufacture or distribution of controlled substances, and the existence in 1180 the applicant's establishment of effective controls against diversion;

1181 5. Furnishing by the applicant of false or fraudulent material in any application filed under this 1182 chapter;

1183 6. Suspension or revocation of the applicant's federal registration to manufacture, distribute, or 1184 dispense controlled substances as authorized by federal law; and 1185

7. Any other factors relevant to and consistent with the public health and safety.

1186 B. Registration under subsection A does not entitle a registrant to manufacture and distribute 1187 controlled substances in Schedule I or II other than those specified in the registration.

1188 C. Practitioners must be registered to conduct research or laboratory analysis with controlled 1189 substances in Schedules II through VI, tetrahydrocannabinol, or marijuana. Practitioners registered under federal law to conduct research with Schedule I substances, other than tetrahydrocannabinol marijuana, 1190 1191 may conduct research with Schedule I substances within this the Commonwealth upon furnishing the 1192 evidence of that federal registration.

1193 D. The Board may register other persons or entities to possess controlled substances listed on 1194 Schedules II through VI upon a determination that (i) there is a documented need, (ii) the issuance of 1195 the registration is consistent with the public interest, (iii) the possession and subsequent use of the controlled substances complies with applicable state and federal laws and regulations, and (iv) the 1196 1197 subsequent storage, use, and recordkeeping of the controlled substances will be under the general 1198 supervision of a licensed pharmacist, practitioner of medicine, osteopathy, podiatry, dentistry, or 1199 veterinary medicine as specified in the Board's regulations. The Board shall consider, at a minimum, the 1200 factors listed in subsection A of this section in determining whether the registration shall be issued. Notwithstanding the exceptions listed in § 54.1-3422 A, the Board may mandate a controlled substances 1201 registration for sites maintaining certain types and quantities of Schedules II through VI controlled 1202 substances as it may specify in its regulations. The Board shall promulgate regulations related to 1203 1204 requirements or criteria for the issuance of such controlled substances registration, storage, security, 1205 supervision, and recordkeeping.

1206 E. The Board may register a public or private animal shelter as defined in § 3.2-6500 to purchase, 1207 possess, and administer certain Schedule II through VI controlled substances approved by the State 1208 Veterinarian for the purpose of euthanizing injured, sick, homeless, and unwanted domestic pets and 1209 animals and to purchase, possess, and administer certain Schedule VI drugs and biological products for 1210 the purpose of preventing, controlling, and treating certain communicable diseases that failure to control 1211 would result in transmission to the animal population in the shelter. Controlled substances used for euthanasia shall be administered only in accordance with protocols established by the State Veterinarian 1212 1213 and only by persons trained in accordance with instructions by the State Veterinarian. The list of Schedule VI drugs and biological products used for treatment and prevention of communicable diseases 1214 1215 within the shelter shall be determined by the supervising veterinarian of the shelter and the drugs and 1216 biological products shall be administered only pursuant to written protocols established or approved by the supervising veterinarian of the shelter and only by persons who have been trained in accordance 1217 with instructions established or approved by the supervising veterinarian. The shelter shall maintain a 1218 1219 copy of the approved list of drugs and biological products, written protocols for administering, and 1220 training records of those persons administering drugs and biological products on the premises of the 1221 shelter.

1222 F. The Board may register a crisis stabilization unit established pursuant to § 37.2-500 or 37.2-601 1223 and licensed by the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services to maintain a stock of 1224 Schedule VI controlled substances necessary for immediate treatment of patients admitted to the crisis 1225 stabilization unit, which may be accessed and administered by a nurse pursuant to a written or oral order 1226 of a prescriber in the absence of a prescriber. Schedule II through Schedule V controlled substances 1227 shall only be maintained if so authorized by federal law and Board regulations.

G. The Board may register an entity at which a patient is treated by the use of instrumentation and

1229 diagnostic equipment through which images and medical records may be transmitted electronically for 1230 the purpose of establishing a bona fide practitioner-patient relationship and is prescribed Schedule II 1231 through VI controlled substances when such prescribing is in compliance with federal requirements for 1232 the practice of telemedicine and the patient is not in the physical presence of a practitioner registered 1233 with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration. In determining whether the registration shall be issued, 1234 the Board shall consider (i) the factors listed in subsection A, (ii) whether there is a documented need 1235 for such registration, and (iii) whether the issuance of the registration is consistent with the public 1236 interest.

1237 H. Applications for controlled substances registration certificates and renewals thereof shall be made 1238 on a form prescribed by the Board and such applications shall be accompanied by a fee in an amount to 1239 be determined by the Board.

1240 I. Upon (i) any change in ownership or control of a business, (ii) any change of location of the 1241 controlled substances stock, (iii) the termination of authority by or of the person named as the 1242 responsible party on a controlled substances registration, or (iv) a change in the supervising practitioner, 1243 if applicable, the registrant or responsible party shall immediately surrender the registration. The 1244 registrant shall, within 14 days following surrender of a registration, file a new application and, if 1245 applicable, name the new responsible party or supervising practitioner.

1246 § 54.1-3443. Board to administer article.

1247 A. The Board shall administer this article and may add substances to or deschedule or reschedule all 1248 substances enumerated in the schedules in this article pursuant to the procedures of the Administrative 1249 Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.). In making a determination regarding a substance, the Board shall 1250 consider the following:

- 1251 1. The actual or relative potential for abuse;
- 1252 2. The scientific evidence of its pharmacological effect, if known;
- 1253 3. The state of current scientific knowledge regarding the substance;
- 1254 4. The history and current pattern of abuse; 1255
 - 5. The scope, duration, and significance of abuse;
- 1256 6. The risk to the public health;
- 1257 7. The potential of the substance to produce psychic or physical dependence; and

1258 8. Whether the substance is an immediate precursor of a substance already controlled under this 1259 article.

1260 B. After considering the factors enumerated in subsection A, the Board shall make findings and issue 1261 a regulation controlling the substance if it finds the substance has a potential for abuse.

1262 C. If the Board designates a substance as an immediate precursor, substances which are precursors of 1263 the controlled precursor shall not be subject to control solely because they are precursors of the 1264 controlled precursor.

1265 D. If the Board, in consultation with the Department of Forensic Science, determines the substance 1266 shall be placed into Schedule I or II pursuant to § 54.1-3445 or 54.1-3447, the Board may amend its 1267 regulations pursuant to Article 2 (§ 2.2-4006 et seq.) of the Administrative Process Act. Prior to making 1268 such amendments, the Board shall conduct a public hearing. At least 30 days prior to conducting such 1269 hearing, it shall post notice of the hearing on the Virginia Regulatory Town Hall and shall send notice 1270 of the hearing to any persons requesting to be notified of a regulatory action. In the notice, the Board 1271 shall include a list of all substances it intends to schedule by regulation. The Board shall notify the 1272 House Committee for Courts of Justice and the Senate Committee on the Judiciary of any new substance 1273 added to Schedule I or II pursuant to this subsection. Any substance added to Schedule I or II pursuant to this subsection shall remain on Schedule I or II for a period of 18 months. Upon expiration of such 1274 1275 18-month period, such substance shall be descheduled unless a general law is enacted adding such 1276 substance to Schedule I or II. Nothing in this subsection shall preclude the Board from adding 1277 substances to or descheduling or rescheduling all substances enumerated in the schedules pursuant to the 1278 provisions of subsections A, B, and E.

1279 E. If any substance is designated, rescheduled, or descheduled as a controlled substance under federal 1280 law and notice of such action is given to the Board, the Board may similarly control the substance under 1281 this chapter after the expiration of 30 days from publication in the Federal Register of a final or interim 1282 final order or rule designating a substance as a controlled substance or rescheduling or descheduling a 1283 substance by amending its regulations in accordance with the requirements of Article 2 (§ 2.2-4006 et 1284 seq.) of the Administrative Process Act. Prior to making such amendments, the Board shall post notice 1285 of the hearing on the Virginia Regulatory Town Hall and shall send notice of the hearing to any persons 1286 requesting to be notified of a regulatory action. The Board shall include a list of all substances it intends 1287 to schedule by regulation in such notice.

1288 F. Authority to control under this section does not extend to distilled spirits, wine, malt beverages, or 1289 tobacco as those terms are defined or used in Title 4.1.
