**5. Summary:** The bill increases the jury duty allowance from \$30 to \$50 per day

**8. Fiscal Implications:** According to the Office of Executive Secretary of the Supreme Court (OES), the amount expended for jurors in circuit courts during fiscal year (FY) 2019 (the most recent year unaffected by the pandemic) was \$2,288,658. As of December 31, 2022, the fiscal year 2023 juror payments totaled \$1,152,935 (see table below), which slightly exceeds FY 2019 payments at the mid-fiscal year point.

If this legislation were to go into effect, and juries were empaneled at the FY 2019 pre-pandemic rate, OES estimates the general fund fiscal impact to the Criminal Fund would increase by \$1,525,772 in FY2024. Additionally, according to the OES, the estimated \$1,525,772 amount does not reflect any increase in the number of defendants who may choose to opt for jury trials due to SB5007 (Chapter 43, 2021 Special Session I), criminal justice sentencing reform bill, which provided that in a criminal case the court shall ascertain the extent of the punishment

unless the accused has requested that the jury ascertain punishment or was found guilty of capital murder. It also provided that if a jury cannot agree on a punishment, the court must fix the punishment.
