Patron-Callahan Referred to Committee on Health, Welfare and Institutions 9 10 WHEREAS, the rising cost of health care in the United States and in the Commonwealth of Virginia 11 is of concern to the General Assembly and to all citizens of the Commonwealth; and WHEREAS, the need to identify ways to control medical costs, including the cost of medical 12 laboratory work, while assuring access to quality health care is currently the focus of attention in the 13 14 United States Congress and in numerous states, including the Commonwealth; and 15 WHEREAS, the General Assembly has previously authorized preferred provider organizations and 16 other forms of managed health care systems; and WHEREAS, the theory of such managed health care systems is that as a result of the benefit 17 incentives favoring services of contracted providers, providers included in such networks will experience 18 increased business volume and thus be willing to accept discounted rates as well as to participate in 19 20 insurers' utilization management programs; and 21 WHEREAS, it is widely reported that some managed health care systems are restricting medical 22 laboratory work to a few large laboratories for all testing needs; and 23 WHEREAS, such practices eliminate the competitive benefits offered by the inclusion of smaller, HJ233 24 independent laboratories; and 25 ŴHEREAS, key managed health care system models proposed at the federal level and under 26 examination by the states would offer laboratory contracts to large laboratories — which are either 27 controlled by or are the subsidiaries of big business; and 28 WHEREAS, such a restrictive model would devastate the thousands of community-based laboratories 29 and would ultimately mean the loss of many hundred of thousands of jobs that are currently held by the 30 people who work there: and 31 WHEREAS, competition at all levels of managed health care systems is essential to assure quality 32 service and to reduce costs; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the Joint Commission on Health 33 34 Care, in cooperation with other appropriate state agencies and private groups, study the impact of 35 managed health care systems' practices concerning the utilization of medical laboratories on (i) the 36 Commonwealth's efforts to contain costs while assuring quality health care and (ii) competition in the 37 marketplace among medical laboratories. 38 The Joint Commission on Health Care shall complete its work in time to submit its findings and 39 recommendations to the Governor and the 1995 Session of the General Assembly as provided in the 40 procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for processing legislative documents.
