12	1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 56-235.6 as follows: § 56-235.6. Local exchange service within a metropolitan statistical area.
13	A. All telephone companies providing local exchange service within a metropolitan statistical area
11 12 13 14	(MSA) as defined by the United States Office of Management and Budget shall provide MSA-wide
15	contiguous service to all telephone subscribers within the MSA. The rate for such service shall be based
16	on a flat monthly charge not to exceed ten percent of the highest-rate group as established by the
17	Commission, notwithstanding the establishment of a lower rate if deemed appropriate by the
	Commission for any or all exchanges affected. There will be no additional measured, per minute, or
19	other charge associated with the MSA-wide service.
20	B. The Commission may, at its option, test this plan for a period of not more than three years from
21 22	date of implementation, provided the test area incorporates the Hampton Roads MSA which includes the
23	Cities of Chesapeake, Hampton, Newport News, Norfolk, Poquoson, Portsmouth, Suffolk, Virginia Beach and Williamsburg; the Counties of Gloucester, Isle of Wight, James City, Mathews and York; and
23 24	Currituck County, North Carolina.
