2	AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE
3 4	(Proposed by the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Natural Resources
4 5	on January 30, 1995) (Patron Prior to Substitute—Senator Howell)
6	A BILL to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Chapter 11.1 of Title 10.1 an article numbered 3,
7	consisting of sections numbered 10.1-1193 through 10.1-1197, relating to promotion and
8	coordination of watershed planning and permitting.
9	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
10	1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 11.1 of Title 10.1 an article
11 12	numbered 3, consisting of sections numbered 10.1-1193 through 10.1-1197 as follows: Article 3.
12	Watershed Planning and Permitting Promotion and Coordination.
14	§ 10.1-1193. Watershed planning; watershed permitting; promotion and coordination.
15	A. The Department, with the assistance of the Watershed Planning and Permitting Coordination Task
16	Force, shall undertake such efforts it deems necessary and appropriate to coordinate the watershed-level
17	activities conducted by state and local agencies and authorities and to foster the development of
18 10	watershed planning by localities. To aid in the coordination and promotion of these activities, the
19 20	Department shall to the extent practicable in its discretion: 1. Promote and coordinate state and local agencies' and authorities' efforts to undertake watershed
2 1	planning and watershed permitting;
22	2. Acquire, maintain and make available informational resources on watershed planning;
23	3. Promote the continuation of research and dialogue on what is entailed in watershed planning and
24	watershed permitting;
25 26	4. Identify sources and methods for providing local officials with technical assistance in watershed planning;
20 27	5. Encourage and foster training of local officials in watershed planning;
28	6. Develop recommendations for needed regulatory and legislative changes to assist local
29	governments in developing and implementing watershed planning;
30	7. Identify barriers to watershed planning and watershed permitting, including state policies,
31 32	regulations and procedures, and recommend alternatives to overcome such obstacles; 8. Develop, foster and coordinate approaches to watershed permitting.
33	B. The Department shall report annually its watershed planning and permitting activities, findings
34	and recommendations and those of the Task Force to the Governor and the General Assembly.
35	§ 10.1-1194. Watershed Planning and Permitting Coordination Task Force created; membership;
36	duties.
37 38	A. There is hereby created the Watershed Planning and Permitting Coordination Task Force and shall be referred to in this article as the Task Force. The Task Force shall be composed of the
38 39	Directors, or their designees, of the Department of Environmental Quality, the Department of
4 0	Conservation and Recreation, the Department of Forestry and the Chesapeake Bay Local Assistance
41	Department.
42	B. The Task Force shall meet at least quarterly on such dates and times as the members determine.
43 44	A majority of the Task Force shall constitute a quorum. C. The Task Force shall undertake such measures and activities it deems necessary and appropriate
44 45	to see that the functions of the agencies represented therein, and to the extent practicable of other
46	agencies of the Commonwealth, and the efforts of state and local agencies and authorities in watershed
47	planning and watershed permitting are coordinated and promoted.
48	<i>§10.1-1195.</i> Watershed planning and permitting advisory panels.
49 50	The Task Force may name qualified persons to advisory panels to assist it in carrying out its
50 51	responsibilities. Panels shall include members representing different areas of interest and expertise in watershed planning and watershed permitting including representatives of local governments, planning
51 52	district commissions, industry, development interests, education, environmental and public interest
53	groups and the scientific community found in Virginia universities.
54	§ 10.1-1196. Guiding definition and principles.
55	A. The Department, the Task Force and any advisory panels appointed by the Task Force shall be
56 57	guided by the following definition of watershed planning: "Watershed planning" is the process of studying the environmental and land use features of a watershed to identify those areas that should be
57 58	protected and preserved, measures to be utilized to protect such areas, and the character of development
59	in order to avoid and minimize disruption of natural systems. Its focus is not on directing development

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to particular parcels of land but rather to identify critical resources, and measures to protect those
resources, so that development, when it does occur, will not negatively impact water resources. In so
doing watershed planning uses and protects ecological processes to lessen the need for structural
control methods that require capital costs and maintenance. By including consideration of a watershed
and its characteristics, cumulative impacts and interjurisdictional issues are more effectively managed
than when solely relying on single-site-permit approaches. Watershed planning can be an important tool
for maintaining environmental integrity, economic development and watershed permitting.

B. The Department, the Task Force and any advisory panels appointed by the Task Force shall be 67 guided by the principles contained in the following statement: Stream systems tend to reflect the **68** character of the watershed they drain. Unchecked physical conversion in a watershed accompanying 69 urbanization leads to degraded streams and wetlands. As urbanization continues to spread across the 70 state, natural vegetation, slope and water retention characteristics are replaced by impervious surfaces 71 disrupting the dynamic balance of the natural hydrologic cycle. Poorly planned development can 72 increase peak storm flows and runoff volume, lower water quality and aesthetics, and cause flooding 73 74 and degradation of downstream communities and ecosystems.

75 § 10.1-1197. Cooperation of state agencies.

76 All agencies of the Commonwealth shall cooperate with the Department and the Task Force and, 77 upon request, assist the Department and the Task Force in the performance of their efforts in 78 coordinating and promoting watershed planning and watershed permitting.
