SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39

Offered January 18, 1996

On the death of Benjamin Franklin Kersey, Jr.

WHEREAS, Benjamin Franklin Kersey, Jr., one of the first African-American scoutmasters in Richmond and an American Red Cross board member for many years, died on January 8, 1996; and

10 WHEREAS, while a student at Virginia Union University in 1929, Frank Kersey began his career in 11 the Boy Scouts by serving as scoutmaster to the first African-American scout troop in Virginia; and

WHEREAS, Frank Kersey, who remained active with the Boy Scouts until the 1950s, produced the
 first African-American Eagle Scout in the South, James E. Jackson, and later produced Richmond's
 second African-American Eagle Scout, John M. Brooks; and

WHEREAS, the winner of numerous awards and citations, Frank Kersey was a field executive with
the Boy Scouts from 1935 until 1948 and was honored with the Silver Beaver Award, scouting's highest
adult award; and

18 WHEREAS, in addition to his trailblazing activities in the Boy Scouts, Frank Kersey devoted
 19 countless hours and tremendous energy to the American Red Cross, in which he was active in a variety
 20 of capacities for 65 years; and

21 WHEREAS, Frank Kersey was one of the city's first African-American Red Cross volunteers, was
 22 instrumental in bringing safety classes to the Richmond public schools, was elected to the American Red
 23 Cross Senior Citizen Hall of Fame, and received the Clara Barton Award, the highest recognition for

24 Red Cross volunteers; and 25 WHEPEAS through his many years of work with the Poy Scouts with the American Bad Co

WHEREAS, through his many years of work with the Boy Scouts, with the American Red Cross,
and with numerous other civic organizations, Frank Kersey amply demonstrated his devotion to the
welfare of his neighbors, his city, and the Commonwealth; now, therefore, be it

28 RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the General Assembly mourn29 the passing of a uniquely dedicated and effective Virginian, Benjamin Franklin Kersey, Jr.; and, be it

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the Senate prepare a copy of this resolution for
 presentation to the family of Benjamin Franklin Kersey, Jr., as an expression of the General Assembly's
 abiding respect for his life of service to his community.
