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960356649 **SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48** 1 2 Offered January 19, 1996 3 Establishing a joint subcommittee to study the feasibility of developing a public affairs network to 4 provide television coverage of the General Assembly and other government proceedings. 5 6 Patrons-Earley and Quayle; Delegates: Forbes, Jones, J.C., Nelms, Robinson and Spruill 7 8 Referred to the Committee on Rules 9 10 WHEREAS, Article I, Section 2 of the Virginia Constitution holds "That all power is vested in, and 11 consequently derived from, the people..."; and WHEREAS, while government is best served by an electorate that is knowledgeable about important 12 public issues, staying well-informed about the rapid economic, social, cultural, and environmental 13 changes is increasingly difficult; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the smooth functioning of democracy depends largely on the ability of citizens to 16 monitor the actions of their elected representatives to ensure accountability; and 17 WHEREAS, because the majority of Virginians, like most Americans, rely on television as their principal source of news and information, the lack of readily accessible programming can lead to voter 18 19 apathy; and 20 WHEREAS, in 1979 the Cable Satellite Public Affairs Network (C-SPAN) began to distribute 21 gavel-to-gavel coverage of the United States House of Representatives via satellite to cable television 22 systems nationwide, and today has expanded to bring coverage of the United States Senate through 23 C-SPAN2: and 24 WHEREAS, a number of states, including California, Pennsylvania, and Texas, have successfully 25 instituted public affairs broadcasting systems to televise legislative sessions, press conferences, meetings of city councils and county boards of supervisors, election coverage, and special programs to provide 26 27 in-depth analysis of significant issues; now, therefore, be it 28 RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That a joint subcommittee be established to study the feasibility of developing a public affairs network in Virginia to televise coverage 29 30 of the General Assembly and other government proceedings. The subcommittee shall include in its study, but not be limited to, (i) a survey of public affairs coverage in Virginia and other states, (ii) a 31 32 public opinion poll to sample potential viewer interest in gavel-to-gavel coverage, and (iii) an implementation plan for providing enhanced public affairs programming in Virginia. The joint subcommittee shall consist of 15 members as follows: four members of the Senate, to be appointed by 33 34 35 the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections; six member of the House of Delegates, to be 36 appointed by the Speaker of the House; the Director of the Department of Information Technology or 37 his designee; a representative of the Virginia Public Telecommunication Board, to be appointed by the 38 Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections; and three citizens members, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House. Appointments shall be bipartisan with equal representation from both the majority 39 40 and minority parties. The subcommittee shall elect a chairman from among its legislative members and 41 shall work in consultation with the public telecommunications organizations in Virginia. 42 All agencies of the Commonwealth shall, upon request, assist the joint subcommittee in the conduct 43 of its study. The direct costs of this study shall not exceed \$8,250. 44 The subcommittee shall submit its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the 1997 45 Session of the General Assembly in accordance with procedures of the Division of Legislative 46 47 Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents. Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint **48** Rules Committee. The Committee may withhold or delay the period for the conduct of the study. 49
