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10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 22.1-209.1:4 as follows:
12	§ 22.1-209.1:4. Virginia Innovative Remedial Education Pilot Program created.
13	A. With such funds as may be appropriated for this purpose, the Board of Education shall establish
14	the Virginia Innovative Remedial Education Pilot Program (the "Program") to explore innovative
15	options and instructional approaches for the remediation of students with academic deficiencies. On and
16	after July 1, 1997, the Program shall consist of up to ten pilot projects located in regions throughout
17	the state to provide equitable geographical distribution of such projects. Grants for all such projects
18	shall be awarded on a competitive basis to applicants responding to requests for proposals, giving
19	priority to applicant school divisions that propose to explore creative alternatives and new,
20	pedagogically sound instructional methods to address the following: (i) the educational needs of students
21	who are educationally at-risk or who have failed the Literacy Passport Test; (ii) students who have been
$\overline{22}$	identified for remediation, pursuant to §§ 22.1-253.13:1, 22.1-254, and 22.1-254.01; or (iii) barriers to
$\overline{23}$	effective remediation of students with academic deficiencies. The Board of Education shall promulgate
$\frac{23}{24}$	regulations for the implementation of the program. [The Board shall promulgate such regulations to be
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	effective in 280 days or less of the enactment of this section.]
26	B. Upon appropriation of funds for the purposes of this section, the Department of Education shall
27	issue a request for proposals for projects to pilot creative alternatives and new, pedagogically sound
28	instructional methods for remediating students. The first such grants shall be awarded by [July 1, 1997
29	January 1, 1998]. Applications for grants shall include the following components:
30	1. Specific, measurable goals and objectives and an evaluation component to determine the
31	effectiveness of such innovative pilot projects in accelerating the academic achievement of participating
32	students, reducing the need for remediation, increasing the number of students who pass the Literacy
33	Passport Test, and reducing problems associated with poor student academic performance.
34	2. A plan for the attraction and participation of teachers specially trained to work with at-risk
35	students, and supportive administrators and staff.
36	3. A current program of staff development and training.
37	4. A procedure for obtaining the participation in and support for the Program by the pupil's parent
38	and his family.
39	5. A curriculum developed to accommodate new teaching strategies; student-initiated and group
40	5. A currentiation developed to accommodate new reacting strategies, statem-initiated and group
	learning; intensive, accelerated instruction designed to establish high standards and academic
41	achievement for participating students; mentoring and individual tutoring; and the use of manipulatives
42	and educational technology.
43	6. The integration of year-round remediation into the regular school year which focuses primarily on
44	providing intensive, two-week intervals for remediation.
45	7. Instruction designed to meet the special learning needs and characteristics of students identified
46	for remedial summer school.
47	8. A low pupil-teacher ratio to promote a high level of interaction between the students and the
48	teacher.
49	9. A procedure for providing pre- and post-testing and early intervention services at the fourth grade
50	level, and for disseminating the best educational practices resulting from such pilot projects.
51	10. The identification of and solutions to barriers to remediation, such as transportation, length of
52	the remedial summer school program, and attendant social and economic problems of students and their
53	families.
55 54	11. Community outreach to build strong school, business, and community partnerships; to develop
5 5	joint ventures and linkages between schools and institutions of higher education; to promote parental
56	involvement in the educational process; and to emphasize local solutions to local problems.
57 59	12. The number of children who may be assigned to the pilot program.
58 50	13. A plan for transitioning the participating students into the relevant school division's regular
59	program, or into advanced-level classes.

C. The Board shall require submission of interim evaluation reports of each pilot program
biannually and shall compile these reports and other program materials and report the status of such
programs on a periodic basis to the relevant standing committees and subcommittees of the General
Assembly. The Board shall report the effectiveness of such programs and their components annually to
the Governor and the General Assembly, beginning on [December 1, 1997 October 1, 1998].
