8	Virginia and to amend the Code of Virginia by adding in Chapter 4.1 of Title 20 a section numbered
9	20-60.6 and by adding sections numbered 63.1-250.2:1 and 63.1-260.3, relating to child support
10	enforcement; access to obligor information; monetary penalty.
11	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
12 13	1. That §§ 19.2-389, 20-60.3, 20-87.1, 63.1-250, 63.1-250.1, 63.1-252.1, as it is currently effective and as it may become effective, 63.1-274.6, 65.2-531 and 65.2-903 of the Code of Virginia are amended
13 14	and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding in Chapter 4.1 of Title 20 a
15	section numbered 20-60.6 and by adding sections numbered 63.1-250.2:1 and 63.1-260.3 as follows:
16	§ 19.2-389. Dissemination of criminal history record information.
17	A. Criminal history record information shall be disseminated, whether directly or through an
18	intermediary, only to:
19 20	1. Authorized officers or employees of criminal justice agencies, as defined by § 9-169, for purposes of the administration of ariminal justice and the agreening of an amployment amplication or raview of
20 21	of the administration of criminal justice and the screening of an employment application or review of employment by a criminal justice agency with respect to its own employees or applicants, and
22	dissemination to the Virginia Parole Board, pursuant to this subdivision, of such information on all
23	state-responsible inmates for the purpose of making parole determinations pursuant to subdivisions 1, 2,
24	3, and 5 of § 53.1-136 shall include collective dissemination by electronic means every thirty days;
25	2. Such other individuals and agencies which require criminal history record information to
26 27	implement a state or federal statute or executive order of the President of the United States or Governor that expressly refers to criminal conduct and contains requirements and/or exclusions expressly based
28	upon such conduct, except that information concerning the arrest of an individual may not be
29	disseminated to a noncriminal justice agency or individual if an interval of one year has elapsed from
30	the date of the arrest and no disposition of the charge has been recorded and no active prosecution of
31	the charge is pending;
32 33	3. Individuals and agencies pursuant to a specific agreement with a criminal justice agency to provide services required for the administration of criminal justice pursuant to that agreement which shall
33 34	specifically authorize access to data, limit the use of data to purposes for which given, and ensure the
35	security and confidentiality of the data;
36	4. Individuals and agencies for the express purpose of research, evaluative, or statistical activities
37	pursuant to an agreement with a criminal justice agency which shall specifically authorize access to data,
38 39	limit the use of data to research, evaluative, or statistical purposes, and ensure the confidentiality and security of the data;
<b>40</b>	5. Agencies of state or federal government which are authorized by state or federal statute or
41	executive order of the President of the United States or Governor to conduct investigations determining
42	employment suitability or eligibility for security clearances allowing access to classified information;
43	6. Individuals and agencies where authorized by court order or court rule;
44 45	7. Agencies of any political subdivision of the Commonwealth for the conduct of investigations of applicants for public employment, permit, or license whenever, in the interest of public welfare or
46	safety, it is necessary to determine under a duly enacted ordinance if the past criminal conduct of a
47	person with a conviction record would be compatible with the nature of the employment, permit, or
48	license under consideration;
<b>49</b>	8. Public or private agencies when and as required by federal or state law or interstate compact to
50 51	investigate applicants for foster or adoptive parenthood subject to the restriction that the data shall not be further disseminated by the agency to any party other than a federal or state authority or court as
52	may be required to comply with an express requirement of law for such further dissemination;
53	9. To the extent permitted by federal law or regulation, public service companies as defined in
54	§ 56-1, for the conduct of investigations of applicants for employment when such employment involves
55	personal contact with the public or when past criminal conduct of an applicant would be incompatible with the nature of the applicant under consideration.
56 57	with the nature of the employment under consideration; 10. The appropriate authority for purposes of granting citizenship and for purposes of international
57 58	travel, including but not limited to, issuing visas and passports;
<b>59</b>	11. A person requesting a copy of his own criminal history record information as defined in § 9-169

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60 at his cost, except that criminal history record information shall be supplied at no charge to a person

who has applied to be a volunteer (i) with a Virginia affiliate of Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America,(ii) 61 with a volunteer fire company or volunteer rescue squad, (iii) as a court-appointed special advocate, or 62 63 (iv) with the Volunteer Emergency Families for Children;

12. Administrators and board presidents of and applicants for licensure or registration as a child 64 65 welfare agency as defined in § 63.1-195 for dissemination to the Commissioner of Social Services' 66 representative pursuant to § 63.1-198 for the conduct of investigations with respect to employees of and volunteers at such facilities, caretakers, and other adults living in family day-care homes or homes 67 approved by family day-care systems, and foster and adoptive parent applicants of private child-placing 68 agencies, pursuant to § 63.1-198.1, subject to the restriction that the data shall not be further 69 70 disseminated by the facility or agency to any party other than the data subject, the Commissioner of Social Services' representative or a federal or state authority or court as may be required to comply with 71 72 an express requirement of law for such further dissemination;

73 13. The school boards of the Commonwealth for the purpose of screening individuals who are 74 offered or who accept public school employment;

14. The State Lottery Department for the conduct of investigations as set forth in the State Lottery 75 76 Law (§ 58.1-4000 et seq.);

15. Licensed nursing homes, hospitals and home care organizations for the conduct of investigations 77 78 of applicants for compensated employment in licensed nursing homes pursuant to § 32.1-126.01, hospital 79 pharmacies pursuant to § 32.1-126.02, and home care organizations pursuant to § 32.1-162.9:1, subject to 80 the limitations set out in subsection E;

81 16. Licensed homes for adults, licensed district homes for adults, and licensed adult day-care centers 82 for the conduct of investigations of applicants for compensated employment in licensed homes for adults pursuant to § 63.1-173.2, in licensed district homes for adults pursuant to § 63.1-189.1, and in licensed 83 84 adult day-care centers pursuant to § 63.1-194.13, subject to the limitations set out in subsection F;

85 17. The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the conduct of investigations as set forth in 86 § 4.1-103.1;

87 18. The State Board of Elections and authorized officers and employees thereof in the course of 88 conducting necessary investigations with respect to registered voters, limited to any record of felony 89 convictions:

90 19. The Commissioner of the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse 91 Services for those individuals who are committed to the custody of the Commissioner pursuant to §§ 19.2-169.2, 19.2-169.6, 19.2-176, 19.2-177.1, 19.2-182.2, 19.2-182.3, 19.2-182.8 and 19.2-182.9 for 92 93 the purpose of placement, evaluation, and treatment planning;

20. Any alcohol safety action program certified by the Commission on the Virginia Alcohol Safety 94 95 Action Program for (i) assessments of habitual offenders under § 46.2-360, (ii) interventions with first 96 offenders under § 18.2-251, or (iii) services to offenders under § 18.2-266 or § 18.2-266.1;

97 21. Residential facilities for juveniles regulated or operated by the Department of Social Services, the 98 Department of Education, or the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse 99 Services for the purpose of determining applicants' fitness for employment or for providing volunteer or 100 contractual services;

22. The Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services and 101 102 facilities operated by the Department for the purpose of determining an individual's fitness for 103 employment pursuant to departmental instructions;

104 23. Pursuant to § 22.1-296.3, the governing boards or administrators of private or parochial elementary or secondary schools which are accredited by a statewide accrediting organization 105 recognized, prior to January 1, 1996, by the State Board of Education; and 106

24. The Commissioner of the Department of Social Services for the purpose of locating persons who 107 108 owe child support or who are alleged in a pending paternity proceeding to be a putative father, 109 provided that only the name, address, demographics and social security number of the record holder 110 shall be released; and 111

2425. Other entities as otherwise provided by law.

112 Upon an ex parte motion of a defendant in a felony case and upon the showing that the records 113 requested may be relevant to such case, the court shall enter an order requiring the Central Criminal 114 Records Exchange to furnish the defendant, as soon as practicable, copies of any records of persons 115 designated in the order on whom a report has been made under the provisions of this chapter.

116 Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter to the contrary, upon a written request sworn to before an officer authorized to take acknowledgments, the Central Criminal Records Exchange or the 117 118 criminal justice agency in cases of offenses not required to be reported to the Exchange, shall furnish a copy of conviction data covering the person named in the request to the person making the request; 119 120 however, such person on whom the data is being obtained shall consent in writing, under oath, to the making of such request. A person receiving a copy of his own conviction data may utilize or further 121

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disseminate that data as he deems appropriate. In the event no conviction data is maintained on the datasubject, the person making the request shall be furnished at his cost a certification to that effect.

B. Use of criminal history record information disseminated to noncriminal justice agencies under this section shall be limited to the purposes for which it was given and may not be disseminated further.

126 C. No criminal justice agency or person shall confirm the existence or nonexistence of criminal127 history record information for employment or licensing inquiries except as provided by law.

128 D. Criminal justice agencies shall establish procedures to query the Central Criminal Records 129 Exchange prior to dissemination of any criminal history record information on offenses required to be 130 reported to the Central Criminal Records Exchange to ensure that the most up-to-date disposition data is 131 being used. Inquiries of the Exchange shall be made prior to any dissemination except in those cases 132 where time is of the essence and the normal response time of the Exchange would exceed the necessary 133 time period. A criminal justice agency to whom a request has been made for the dissemination of 134 criminal history record information that is required to be reported to the Central Criminal Records 135 Exchange may direct the inquirer to the Central Criminal Records Exchange for such dissemination. 136 Dissemination of information regarding offenses not required to be reported to the Exchange shall be 137 made by the criminal justice agency maintaining the record as required by § 15.1-135.1.

E. Criminal history information provided to licensed nursing homes, hospitals and to home care
organizations pursuant to subdivision A 15 shall be limited to the convictions on file with the Exchange
for any offense specified in §§ 32.1-126.01, 32.1-126.02 and 32.1-162.9:1.

F. Criminal history information provided to licensed adult care residences, licensed district homes for adults, and licensed adult day-care centers pursuant to subdivision A 16 shall be limited to the convictions on file with the Exchange for any offense specified in §§ 63.1-173.2, 63.1-189.1 or § 63.1-194.13.

145 § 20-60.3. Contents of support orders.

All orders directing the payment of child or spousal support, including those orders confirming
separation agreements, entered on or after October 1, 1985, whether they are original orders or
modifications of existing orders, shall contain the following:

149 1. Notice that support payments may be withheld as they become due pursuant to § 20-79.1 or 150 § 20-79.2, from earnings as defined in § 63.1-250, without further amendments of this order or having to 151 file an application for services with the Department of Social Services; however, absence of such notice 152 in an order entered prior to July 1, 1988, shall not bar withholding of support payments pursuant to 153 § 20-79.1;

154 2. Notice that support payments may be withheld pursuant to Chapter 13 (§ 63.1-249 et seq.) of Title
155 63.1 without further amendments to the order upon application for services with the Department of
156 Social Services; however, absence of such notice in an order entered prior to July 1, 1988, shall not bar
157 withholding of support payments pursuant to Chapter 13 of Title 63.1;

158 3. The names and dates of birth of each child to whom a duty of support is then owed by the person159 responsible for support;

160 4. If known, the name, date of birth and social security number of each parent of the child and, if different and if known, the name, date of birth and social security number of the person responsible for 161 162 support and, unless otherwise ordered, the current address and place of employment of each such parent or responsible person shall provide a residential and, if different, mailing address, residential and 163 164 employer telephone number, driver's license number, and the name and address of his or her employer; 165 however, when a protective order has been issued or the Department otherwise finds reason to believe 166 that a party is at risk of physical or emotion harm from the other party, information other than the 167 name of the party at risk shall not be included in the notice;

168 5. On and after July 1, 1994, notice that a petition may be filed for suspension of any license, 169 certificate, registration or other authorization to engage in a profession, trade, business or occupation 170 issued by the Commonwealth to a person responsible for support as provided in § 63.1-263.1 upon a 171 delinquency for a period of ninety days or more or in an amount of \$5,000 or more. The order shall 172 indicate whether either or both parents currently hold such an authorization and, if so, the type of 173 authorization held;

6. The amount of periodic support expressed in fixed sums, together with the payment interval, thedate payments are due, and the date the first payment is due;

176 7. An order for health care coverage, including the health insurance policy information, for dependent
177 children pursuant to §§ 20-108.1 and 20-108.2 if available at reasonable cost as defined in § 63.1-250
178 and a statement as to whether there is an order for health care coverage for a spouse or former spouse;

8. If support arrearages exist, (i) to whom an arrearage is owed and the amount of the arrearage, (ii)
the period of time for which such arrearage is calculated, and (iii) a direction that all payments are to be
credited to current support obligations first, with any payment in excess of the current obligation applied
to arrearages;

183 9. If child support payments are ordered to be paid through the Department of Social Services, and 184 unless the court for good cause shown orders otherwise, the parties shall give each other and the 185 Department of Social Services at least thirty days' written notice, in advance, of any change of address 186 and any change of telephone number within thirty days after the change;

10. If child support payments are ordered to be paid through the Department of Social Services, a 187 188 provision requiring a delinquent obligor to keep the Department of Social Services informed of the name 189 and, address and telephone number of his current employer;

190 11. The separate amounts due to each person under the order, unless the court specifically orders a 191 unitary award of child and spousal support due or the order affirms a separation agreement containing 192 provision for such unitary award;

193 12. Notice that in determination of a support obligation, the support obligation as it becomes due and 194 unpaid creates a judgment by operation of law; and

13. Notice that on and after July 1, 1994, the Department of Social Services may, pursuant to 195 Chapter 13 of Title 63.1 and in accordance with § 20-108.2 and § 63.1-252.2, initiate a review of the 196 197 amount of support ordered by any court. 198

§ 20-60.6. When delivery of notice to party at last known address sufficient.

199 In any subsequent child support enforcement proceeding between the parties, upon sufficient showing 200 that diligent effort was made to ascertain the location of a party, that party may be served with any 201 required notice by delivery of the written notice to that party's residential or business address as filed 202 with the court pursuant to § 20-60.3 or the Department of Social Services, or if changed, as shown in 203 the records of the Department of Social Services. However, any person served with notice as provided 204 in this section may challenge, in a subsequent judicial proceeding, an order entered based upon such service on the grounds that he did not receive the notice and enforcement of the order would constitute 205 206 manifest injustice.

207 § 20-87.1. Department of Social Services may obtain information from other state agencies, public 208 service corporations and companies; disclosure of such information.

209 To assist in locating parents who have deserted their children and other persons liable for support of 210 dependents and not withstanding the provisions of the Privacy Protection Act (§ 2.1-377 et seq.), the Department of Social Services may request and shall receive information from the records of all 211 212 departments, boards, bureaus or other agencies or entities of this Commonwealth, including local 213 government agencies, and customer records of all public service corporations and companies as defined 214 in § 56-1, financial institutions, and cable television companies.

215 These departments, boards, bureaus, agencies, corporations, and companies entities are authorized to 216 provide such information as is necessary for this purpose. Only information directly bearing on the 217 identity and whereabouts of a person owing or asserted to be owing an obligation of support shall be requested and used or transmitted by the Department of Social Services pursuant to the authority 218 219 conferred by this section. The Department of Social Services may make such information available only 220 to public officials and agencies of this Commonwealth, other states and the political subdivisions of this 221 Commonwealth and other states seeking to locate parents who have deserted their children and other 222 persons liable for support of dependents for the purpose of enforcing their liability for support. 223

§ 63.1-250. Definitions.

224 Unless a different meaning is plainly required by the context, the following words and phrases as 225 hereinafter used in this chapter shall have the following meanings:

226 "Administrative order" means a noncourt-ordered legally enforceable support obligation having the 227 force and effect of a support order established by the court.

228 "Assignment of rights" means the legal procedure whereby an individual assigns support rights to the 229 Commonwealth on behalf of a dependent child or spouse and dependent child.

"Authorization to seek or enforce a support obligation" means a signed authorization to the 230 231 Commonwealth to seek or enforce support on behalf of a dependent child or a spouse and dependent 232 child or on behalf of a person deemed to have submitted an application by operation of law.

233 "Caretaker" means a parent, relative, guardian or other person whose needs are included in a public 234 assistance payment under the aid to families with dependent children program.

235 "Child support services" includes any civil, criminal or administrative action taken by the Division of 236 Child Support Enforcement to establish, modify, enforce, or collect child support, or child and spousal 237 support.

238 'Commissioner" means the Commissioner of the State Department of Social Services, his designee or 239 authorized representative.

240 "Court order" means any judgment or order of any court having jurisdiction to order payment of 241 support or an order of a court of comparable jurisdiction of another state ordering payment of a set or 242 determinable amount of support moneys.

243 "Debt" means the total unpaid support obligation established by court order, administrative process or by the payment of public assistance and owed by a responsible person to either the Commonwealth or 244

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245 to his dependent(s).

246 "Department" means the State Department of Social Services.

247 "Dependent child" means any person who meets the eligibility criteria set forth in § 63.1-105, whose 248 support rights have been assigned or whose authorization to seek or enforce a support obligation has 249 been given to the Commonwealth and whose support is required by Titles 16.1 and 20.

250 "Director" means the Commissioner of the State Department of Social Services, his designee or 251 authorized representative.

252 "Disposable earnings" means that part of the earnings due and payable of any individual remaining 253 after the deduction from those earnings of any amount required by law to be withheld.

254 "Earnings" means current or future income due from the responsible person's employer and 255 compensation paid or payable for personal services, whether denominated as wages, salary, commission, 256 bonus, or otherwise, and specifically includes periodic payments currently being made by the responsible 257 person pursuant to pension or retirement programs, unemployment compensation benefits, workers' 258 compensation benefits, debts owed the responsible person and any income or profits due the responsible 259 person from any source, including gambling, lotteries, prizes or any other windfall or other payment of 260 any type, except where excluded by state or federal law.

261 "Financial institution" means a depository institution, an institution-affiliated party, any federal 262 credit union or state credit union including an institution-affiliated party of such a credit union, and any 263 benefit association, insurance company, safe deposit company, money-market mutual fund, or similar 264 entity authorized to do business in this Commonwealth.

265 "Financial records" includes, but is not limited to, records held by employers showing earnings, profit 266 sharing contributions and benefits paid or payable and records held by financial institutions, 267 broker-dealers and other institutions and entities showing bank accounts, IRA and separate contributions, 268 gross winnings, dividends, interest, distributive share, stocks, bonds, agricultural subsidies, royalties, 269 prizes and awards held for or due and payable to a responsible person.

"Health care coverage" means any plan providing hospital, medical or surgical care coverage for 270 271 dependent children provided such coverage is available and can be obtained by a responsible person, as 272 that term is defined in this section, at a reasonable cost.

273 "Mistake of fact" means an error in the identity of the payor or the amount of current support or 274 arrearage.

275 "Net income" means that income remaining after the following deductions have been taken from 276 gross income: federal income tax, state income tax, federal income compensation act benefits, any union 277 dues where collection thereof is required under federal law, and any other amounts required by law. 278

"Payee" means any person to whom spousal or child support is to be paid.

279 "Reasonable cost" pertaining to health care coverage means available through employers, unions or 280 other groups without regard to service delivery mechanism.

"Responsible person" means any obligor or person obligated under Virginia law for support of a 281 282 dependent child or the child's caretaker.

283 § 63.1-250.1. Authority to issue certain orders.

284 A. In the absence of a court order, the Department of Social Services shall have the authority to 285 issue orders directing the payment of child, and child and spousal support and, if available at reasonable 286 cost as defined in § 63.1-250, to require a provision for health care coverage for dependent children of 287 the obligor, which shall include the requirements specified for employers pursuant to subdivision A 5 of 288 § 20-79.3. Liability for child support shall be determined retroactively for the period measured from the 289 date the order directing payment is delivered to the sheriff or process server for service upon the 290 obligor.

291 In ordering the payment of child support, the Department shall set such support at the amount 292 resulting from computation pursuant to the guideline set out in § 20-108.2, subject to the provisions of 293 § 63.1-264.2.

294 B. When a payee, as defined in § 63.1-250, no longer has physical custody of a child, the 295 Department of Social Services shall have the authority to redirect child support payments to a caretaker, 296 relative or individual who has physical custody of the child when an assignment of rights has been 297 made to the Department or an application for services has been made by such caretaker, relative, or 298 individual with the Division of Child Support Enforcement.

299 C. The Department of Social Services shall have the authority, upon notice from the Department of 300 Medical Assistance Services, to use any existing enforcement mechanisms provided by this chapter to 301 collect the wages, salary, or other employment income or to withhold amounts from state tax refunds of 302 any obligor who has not used payments received from a third party to reimburse, as appropriate, either 303 the other parent of such child or the provider of such services, to the extent necessary to reimburse the 304 Department of Medical Assistance Services.

305 D. The Department may order the obligor and payee to notify each other or the Department upon

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306 request of current gross income as defined in § 20-108.2 and any other pertinent information which may 307 affect child support amounts. For good cause shown, the Department may order that such information be 308 provided to the Department and made available to the parties for inspection in lieu of the parties' 309 providing such information directly to each other.

310 E. The Department shall develop procedures governing the method and timing of periodic review and 311 adjustment of child support orders established or enforced or both pursuant to Title IV-D of the Social 312 Security Act. The Department shall, at the request of either parent subject to the order or of a state child support enforcement agency, initiate a review of such order, and initiate appropriate action to adjust such 313 314 order in accordance with the provisions of § 20-108.2 and subject to the provisions of § 63.1-264.2.

F. The In order to provide essential information for whatever establishment or enforcement actions 315 are necessary for the collection of child support, the Commissioner, the Director of the Division of 316 Child Support Enforcement and district managers of Division of Child Support Enforcement offices shall 317 318 have the right to (i) subpoen a financial records of, or other information relating to, the responsible 319 person and obligee from any person, firm, corporation, association, or political subdivision or department 320 of the Commonwealth and  $\overline{to}$  (ii) summons the responsible parent and obligee to appear in the Division's 321 offices to provide essential information for whatever establishment or enforcement actions are necessary for the collection of child support. The Commissioner, Director and district managers may also subpoena 322 323 copies of state and federal income tax returns. The district managers shall be trained in the correct use 324 of the subpoena process prior to exercising subpoena authority. A civil penalty not to exceed \$1,000 may 325 be assessed by the Commissioner for a failure to respond to a subpoena issued pursuant to this 326 subsection.

327 G. In the absence of a court order, the Department may establish an administrative support order on 328 an out-of-state obligor if the obligor and the obligee maintained a matrimonial domicile within the 329 Commonwealth. The Department may also take action to enforce an administrative or court order on an out-of-state obligor. Service of such actions shall be in accordance with the provisions of §§ 8.01-296, 330 331 8.01-327, or § 8.01-329, or by certified mail, return receipt requested, in accordance with 332 § 63.1-250.2:1.

333 H. If a support order has been issued in another state but the obligor, the obligee, and the child now 334 live in the Commonwealth, the Department may (i) enforce the order without registration, using all 335 enforcement remedies available under Chapter 13 (§ 63.1-249 et seq.) of Title 63.1 and (ii) register the 336 order in the appropriate tribunal of the Commonwealth for enforcement or modification.

337 § 63.1-250.2:1. When delivery of notice to party at last known address may be deemed sufficient. 338 In any subsequent child support enforcement proceeding between the parties, upon sufficient showing 339 that diligent effort was made to ascertain the location of a party, that party may be served with any 340 required notice by delivery of the written notice to that party's residential or business address as filed 341 with the court pursuant to § 20-60.3 or the Department of Social Services, or if changed, as shown in 342 the records of the Department of Social Services. However, any person served with notice as provided 343 in this section may challenge, in a subsequent judicial proceeding, an order entered based upon such 344 service on the grounds that he did not receive the notice and enforcement of the order would constitute 345 manifest injustice.

§ 63.1-252.1. Notice of administrative support order; contents; hearing; modification.

§ 63.1-260.3. Data exchange agreements authorized; immunity.

478 The Commissioner of the Department is authorized and shall, as feasible, enter into agreements with 479 financial institutions doing business in the Commonwealth to develop and operate, in conjunction with 480 such financial institutions, a data match system using automated data exchanges to the maximum extent **481** feasible. Pursuant to a data match system, a financial institution shall provide on a periodic basis, but 482 no more frequently than every three months, the account title, record address, social security number or 483 other taxpayer identification number, for any person in arrears in the payment of child support who is identified by the Department of Social Services in the request by social security number or other 484 485 taxpayer identification number. 486

Any such agreement shall provide for the following:

1. The financial institution shall be obligated to match only those accounts for which a social 487 488 security number or taxpayer identification number is provided by the Department, and shall have no 489 obligation to match or identify any account based on a person's name or any other identifying 490 information.

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491 2. The financial institution shall provide the account title, record address, social security number or 492 taxpayer identification number for any account matching the social security number and taxpayer identification number provided by the Department. It shall be the Department's responsibility to 493 494 determine whether such account is an account subject to a lien, or order to withhold and deliver in 495 accordance with the provisions of this chapter.

496 3. The financial institution shall be given a reasonable time in which to respond to each data match 497 request, based upon the capabilities of the financial institution to handle the data match system, but in 498 no event less than thirty days.

499 4. The financial institution shall have no obligation to hold, encumber, or surrender assets in any 500 account based on a match until it is served with a lien or order to withhold and deliver in accordance 501 with the provisions of this chapter.

502 The Department is authorized to pay a reasonable fee to a financial institution for conducting the 503 data match, not to exceed the actual costs incurred by such financial institution and may assess and 504 recover actual costs incurred from responsible persons identified as a result of the data match.

505 A financial institution providing information in accordance with this section shall not be liable to 506 any account holder or other person for any disclosure of information to the Department, for encumbering or surrendering any assets held by such financial institution in response to a lien or order 507 508 to withhold and deliver issued by the Department, or for any other action taken pursuant to this section, 509 including individual or mechanical errors, provided such action does not constitute gross negligence or 510 willful misconduct.

511 For purposes of this section, "account" means a demand deposit account, checking or negotiable 512 withdrawal order account, savings account, time deposit account, or money-market mutual fund account 513 maintained in this Commonwealth.

514 § 63.1-274.6. Central unit for information and administration; cooperation enjoined; availability of 515 records.

516 The Department of Social Services is authorized and directed to establish a central unit within the 517 Department to administer the Title IV, D State Plan according to 45 C.F.R. 302.12. The central unit 518 shall have the *statewide jurisdiction and* authority to: 519

1. Establish a registry for the receipt of information;

2. Answer interstate inquiries concerning responsible persons;

521 3. Coordinate and supervise departmental activities in relation to responsible persons to ensure 522 effective cooperation with law enforcement agencies; and

523 4. Contract and enter into cooperative agreements with individuals and agencies in order that they 524 may assist the Department in its responsibilities. 525

The central unit within the Department shall supervise offices whose primary functions are:

1. Location of absent responsible persons.

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527 2. Assessment of the ability of responsible persons to pay child or child and spousal support and to 528 obtain health care coverage for dependent children.

529 3. Establishment, modification and enforcement of support obligations including health care coverage 530 for dependent children, through administrative action.

531 4. Preparation of individual cases for court action existing under all laws of the Commonwealth.

532 5. Ensuring on a consistent basis that support continues in all cases in which support is assessed 533 administratively or ordered by the court.

534 6. Provision of its services in establishing paternity and establishing and enforcing support 535 obligations equally to public-assisted and nonpublic-assisted families.

536 To effectuate the purposes of this section, the Commissioner may request and shall receive from 537 state, county and local agencies within and without the Commonwealth, including but not limited to such 538 agencies and entities responsible for vital records; tax and revenue; real and titled personal property; 539 authorizations to engage in a business, trade, profession or occupation; employment security; motor 540 vehicle licensing and registration; public assistance programs and corrections, all information and 541 assistance as authorized by this chapter. Solely for the purposes of obtaining motor vehicle licensing and 542 reistration information from entities within and without the Commonwealth, the Division of Child 543 Support Enforcment shall be deemed to be a criminal justice agency. With respect to individuals who 544 owe child support or are alleged in a pending paternity proceeding to be a putative father, the 545 Commissioner may request and shall receive the names and addresses of such individuals and the names 546 and addresses of such individuals' employers as appearing in the customer records of public utilities, 547 cable television companies and financial institutions. All state, county and city agencies, officers and 548 employees shall cooperate in the location of responsible persons who have abandoned or deserted, or are 549 failing to support, children and their caretakers and shall on request supply the Department with all information on hand relative to the location, income, *benefits* and property of such responsible persons, 550 551 notwithstanding any provision of law making such information confidential. A civil penalty not to exceed

552 \$1,000 may be assessed by the Commissioner for a failure to respond to a request for information made 553 in accordance with this section.

Any public or private person, partnership, firm, corporation or association, any financial institution 554 555 and any political subdivision, department or other entity of the Commonwealth who in good faith and in 556 the absence of gross negligence, willful misconduct or breach of an ethical duty, provide information 557 requested pursuant to this section shall be immune from liability, civil or criminal, that might otherwise 558 result from the release of such information to the Department.

559 Any records established pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be available only to the 560 Attorney General, prosecuting attorneys, and courts of competent jurisdiction and agencies in other states engaged in the enforcement of support of children and their caretakers. Information pertaining to actions 561 taken on behalf of recipients of child support services may be disclosed to the recipient and other parties 562 pursuant to State Board regulations. The State Board shall promulgate regulations regarding the release 563 564 of information to parties involved in administrative proceedings pursuant to this chapter, taking into account the health and safety of the parties to whom the information is related, and such releases of 565 information shall be permitted, notwithstanding the provisions of the Privacy Protection Act, Chapter 26 566 567 (§ 2.1-377 et seq.) of Title 2.1. Information may also be disclosed to authorized persons, in accordance 568 with 42 U.S.C. § 663, in cases of unlawful taking or restraint of a child.

569 The Division of Child Support Enforcement shall provide support payment arrearage information on 570 responsible persons, as defined in § 63.1-250, to consumer credit bureaus and consumer credit reporting 571 agencies, upon their request, provided that the accumulated arrearage is at least \$1,000. Advance notice 572 shall be sent to the responsible person of the proposed release of arrearage information. The notice shall 573 include information on the procedures available to the responsible person for contesting the accuracy of 574 the arrearage information. 575

§ 65.2-531. Assignments of compensation; exemption from creditors' claims.

576 A. No claim for compensation under this title shall be assignable. All compensation and claims 577 therefor shall be exempt from all claims of creditors, even if the compensation is used for purchase of 578 shares in a credit union, or deposited into an account with a financial institution or other organization 579 accepting deposits and is thereby commingled with other funds. Compensation However, benefits paid 580 under  $\frac{8}{5.2-500}$  and  $\frac{65.2-502}{502}$  in compensation or in compromise of a claim for compensation under 581 this title shall be subject to claims for spousal and child support subject to the same exemptions allowed 582 for earnings in § 34-29.

583 B. Upon an order of garnishment, attachment or other levy addressed to a financial institution in 584 which the principal defendant claims to have exempt funds hereunder, the principal defendant may file 585 an answer asserting the exemption hereunder. From the time of service of such garnishment, attachment 586 or levy, the financial institution, until further order of the court, shall hold the amount subject to such 587 garnishment, attachment or levy, or such lesser amount or sum as it may have, which amount shall be 588 set forth in its answer. It shall hold such amount free of any person drawing against such funds whether 589 by check against such account or otherwise. The financial institution shall be subject to such further 590 order or subpoena for discovery of its records, for which it shall be entitled an order or agreement for 591 compensation for the expense of such service, and in a case deemed appropriate to the court by such an 592 order directing deposit of funds or further security prior to such records being ordered produced. 593

§ 65.2-903. Records not public.

594 The records of the Commission, insofar as they refer to accidents, injuries and settlements, shall not 595 be open to the public but only to the parties satisfying the Commission of their interest in such records 596 and their right to inspect them; however, the Commission shall make its records about an injured 597 employee available to the Virginia Employment Commission if it requests and the Department of Social 598 Services, if either entity requests such records. The Commission shall promulgate rules to ensure that 599 information for the purpose of determining eligibility for employment shall not be provided without the 600 written consent of the employee.
