10 WHEREAS, John N. Sturdivant, president of the American Federation of Government Employees 11 and a longtime resident of Fairfax County, died on October 28, 1997; and 12

WHEREAS, born in Philadelphia and raised in Bridgeport, Connecticut, John Sturdivant graduated 13 14 from Antioch College, studied law at George Washington University, and served in the U.S. Air Force; 15 and

16 WHEREAS, shortly after the beginning of his career with the federal government, John Sturdivant 17 became active in local politics and trade unionism, serving for eight years as president of the American Federation of Government Employees' Local 1754 in Winchester, Virginia; and 18

WHEREAS, his remarkable skills and evident leadership abilities inevitably led John Sturdivant to 19 20 the national office of AFGE, where he served in a variety of positions before becoming president in 21 1988: and

22 WHEREAS, John Sturdivant's tenure as president of AFGE coincided with turbulent times for federal employees, and his strength, his perseverance, and his leadership were constantly tested; and 23

24 WHEREAS, John Sturdivant led the effort to ease a 57-year-old ban on political activities for federal 25 workers and was a key player in the negotiations to end the two recent and highly controversial federal 26 government shut-downs; and

WHEREAS, in addition to his near-decade of exemplary service as president of an organization 27 28 representing over 600,000 federal employees, John Sturdivant served as vice president of the executive 29 council of the AFL-CIO, of which the AFGE is a major part; and

30 WHEREAS, one of the highest ranking African-Americans in the labor movement, John Sturdivant 31 received the Spirit of Democracy award from the National Coalition on Black Voter Participation and 32 was appointed by President Clinton to the National Partnership Council, an initiative to improve 33 labor-management relations in the executive branch; and 34

WHEREAS, John Sturdivant was also active in politics, serving on the Democratic Party's national committee and on the Fairfax County and Virginia central committees; and

36 WHEREAS, throughout a career that spanned more than 35 years, John Sturdivant remained true to 37 his ideals; served his constituents with skill, passion, and integrity; and left an indelible mark on both 38 the federal government and the American labor movement; now, therefore, be it

39 RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the General Assembly note with 40 great sadness the passing of John N. Sturdivant; and, be it

41 RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Clerk of the House of Delegates prepare a copy of this resolution 42 for presentation to the family of John N. Sturdivant as an expression of the abiding respect in which his memory is held by the members of the General Assembly. 43

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
