WHEREAS, living for most of her life in the long shadow cast by her prominent and powerful husband, Katherine Philpott relied on her native intelligence, keen sense of humor, and extraordinary grace to establish and maintain her own distinct personality; and

WHEREAS, blessed with a unique capacity for making people feel welcome and comfortable, Katherine Philpott will be remembered with great fondness and respect by the many individuals who were the focus of her attention; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the General Assembly note with great sadness the passing of a wonderful lady and an outstanding representative of the Commonwealth, Katherine S. Philpott; and, be it
