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HOUSE BILL NO. 1677

AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

(Proposed by the House Committee on Conservation and Natural Resources

on February 3, 1999)

(Patron Prior to Substitute—Delegate Morgan)

A BILL to amend and reenact § 10.1-1455 the Code of Virginia, relating to medical wastes; penalties.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That § 10.1-1455 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:

§ 10.1-1455. Penalties and enforcement.

A. Any person who violates any provision of this chapter, any condition of a permit or certification, 10 11 or any regulation or order of the Board shall, upon such finding by an appropriate circuit court, be assessed a civil penalty of not more than \$25,000 for each day of such violation. All civil penalties 12 under this section shall be recovered in a civil action brought by the Attorney General in the name of 13 the Commonwealth. Such civil penalties shall be paid into the state treasury and deposited by the State 14 15 Treasurer into the Virginia Environmental Emergency Response Fund pursuant to Chapter 25 16 (§ 10.1-2500 et seq.) of this title.

17 B. In addition to the penalties provided above, any person who knowingly transports any hazardous waste or regulated medical waste to an unpermitted facility; who knowingly transports, treats, stores, or 18 19 disposes of hazardous waste or regulated medical waste without a permit or in violation of a permit; or 20 who knowingly makes any false statement or representation in any application, disclosure statement, 21 label, manifest, record, report, permit, or other document filed, maintained, or used for purposes of 22 hazardous waste or regulated medical waste program compliance shall be guilty of a felony punishable 23 by a term of imprisonment of not less than one year nor more than five years and a fine of not more than \$25,000 for each violation, either or both. The provisions of this subsection shall be deemed to 24 25 constitute a lesser included offense of the violation set forth under subsection H I. 26

Each day of violation of each requirement shall constitute a separate offense.

27 C. The Board is authorized to issue orders to require any person to comply with the provisions of 28 any law administered by the Board, the Director or the Department, any condition of a permit or 29 certification, or any regulations promulgated by the Board or to comply with any case decision, as 30 defined in § 9-6.14:4, of the Board or Director. Any such order shall be issued only after a hearing with 31 at least thirty days' notice to the affected person of the time, place and purpose thereof. Such order shall 32 become effective not less than fifteen days after mailing a copy thereof by certified mail to the last 33 known address of such person. The provisions of this section shall not affect the authority of the Board 34 to issue separate orders and regulations to meet any emergency as provided in § 10.1-1402.

35 D. Any person willfully violating or refusing, failing or neglecting to comply with any regulation or 36 order of the Board or the Director, any condition of a permit or certification or any provision of this 37 chapter shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor unless a different penalty is specified.

38 Any person violating or failing, neglecting, or refusing to obey any lawful regulation or order of the 39 Board or the Director, any condition of a permit or certification or any provision of this chapter may be 40 compelled in a proceeding instituted in an appropriate court by the Board or the Director to obey such regulation, permit, certification, order or provision of this chapter and to comply therewith by injunction, 41 42 mandamus, or other appropriate remedy.

43 E. Without limiting the remedies which may be obtained in this section, any person violating or 44 failing, neglecting or refusing to obey any injunction, mandamus or other remedy obtained pursuant to this section shall be subject, in the discretion of the court, to a civil penalty not to exceed \$25,000 for 45 each violation. Such civil penalties shall be paid into the state treasury and deposited by the State 46 47 Treasurer into the Virginia Environmental Emergency Response Fund pursuant to Chapter 25 of this title. Each day of violation of each requirement shall constitute a separate offense. Such civil penalties **48** may, in the discretion of the court assessing them, be directed to be paid into the treasury of the county, 49 city or town in which the violation occurred, to be used to abate environmental pollution in such manner 50 as the court may, by order, direct, except that where the owner in violation is the county, city or town 51 itself, or its agent, the court shall direct the penalty to be paid into the state treasury and deposited by 52 53 the State Treasurer into the Virginia Environmental Emergency Response Fund pursuant to Chapter 25 54 of this title.

55 F. With the consent of any person who has violated or failed, neglected or refused to obey any regulation or order of the Board or the Director, any condition of a permit or any provision of this 56 chapter, the Board may provide, in an order issued by the Board against such person, for the payment of 57 civil charges for past violations in specific sums, not to exceed the limits specified in this section. Such 58 59 civil charges shall be instead of any appropriate civil penalty which could be imposed under this section.

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60 Such civil charges shall be paid into the state treasury and deposited by the State Treasurer into the61 Virginia Environmental Emergency Response Fund pursuant to Chapter 25 of this title.

62 G. In addition to all other available remedies, the Board may issue special orders, as defined in 63 § 10.1-1182, for the violation of: (i) any law or regulation administered by the Board; (ii) any condition 64 of a permit or certificate issued pursuant to this chapter; or (iii) any case decision or order of the Board. 65 The Board may issue special orders only after at least two consecutive notices of the same violations 66 have been issued without satisfactory compliance and a fact-finding proceeding has been held with reasonable notice to the affected persons of the time, place and purpose thereof. Special orders shall 67 become effective five days after having been delivered to the affected persons or mailed by certified 68 mail to the last known address of such persons. Should the Board find that any person is adversely 69 70 affecting the public health, safety or welfare, the Board shall, after a reasonable attempt to give notice, declare a state of emergency and may issue, without a hearing, an emergency special order directing the 71 72 person to cease the activity immediately and shall within ten days hold a hearing, after reasonable notice 73 as to the time and place thereof to the person, to affirm, modify, amend or cancel the emergency special order. If the Board finds that a person who has been issued a special order or an emergency special 74 75 order is not complying with the special order's terms, the Board may utilize the enforcement and penalty provisions of this article to secure compliance. 76

H. In addition to all other available remedies, the Department and generators of recycling residues
shall have standing to seek enforcement by injunction of conditions which are specified by applicants in
order to receive the priority treatment of their permit applications pursuant to § 10.1-1408.1.

80 I. Any person who knowingly transports, treats, stores, disposes of, or exports any hazardous waste or regulated medical waste in violation of this chapter or in violation of the regulations promulgated by 81 82 the Board and who knows at the time that he thereby places another person in imminent danger of death or serious bodily injury, shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a felony punishable by a term of imprisonment of not less than two years nor more than fifteen years and a fine of not more than 83 84 85 \$250,000, either or both. A defendant that is not an individual shall, upon conviction of violating this section, be subject to a fine not exceeding the greater of one million dollars or an amount that is three 86 87 times the economic benefit realized by the defendant as a result of the offense. The maximum penalty 88 shall be doubled with respect to both fine and imprisonment for any subsequent conviction of the same 89 person.

90 J. Criminal prosecutions under this chapter shall be commenced within three years after discovery of the offense, notwithstanding the provisions of any other statute.

92 K. The Board shall be entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys' fees and costs in any action
93 brought by the Board under this section in which it substantially prevails on the merits of the case,
94 unless special circumstances would make an award unjust.

2. That the provisions of this act may result in a net increase in periods of imprisonment in state
correctional facilities. Pursuant to § 30-19.1:4, the estimated amount of the necessary appropriation
is \$0 in FY 2009.
