2 3 4 5	A BILL to amend and reenact § 58.1-322 of the Code of Virginia, relating to Virginia taxable income of residents.

10	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
11	1. That § 58.1-322 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
12	§ 58.1-322. Virginia taxable income of residents.
13	A. The Virginia taxable income of a resident individual means his federal adjusted gross income for
14	the taxable year, which excludes combat pay for certain members of the Armed Forces of the United
15	States as provided in § 112 of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, and with the modifications
16	specified in this section.
17 18	B. To the extent excluded from federal adjusted gross income, there shall be added: 1. Interest, less related expenses to the extent not deducted in determining federal income, on
10 19	obligations of any state other than Virginia, or of a political subdivision of any such other state unless
20	created by compact or agreement to which Virginia is a party;
21	2. Interest or dividends, less related expenses to the extent not deducted in determining federal
22	taxable income, on obligations or securities of any authority, commission or instrumentality of the
23	United States, which the laws of the United States exempt from federal income tax but not from state
24 25	income taxes;
25 26	<ul><li>3. Unrelated business taxable income as defined by § 512 of the Internal Revenue Code;</li><li>4. The amount of a lump sum distribution from a qualified retirement plan, less the minimum</li></ul>
27 27	distribution allowance and any amount excludable for federal income tax purposes which is excluded
28	from federal adjusted gross income solely by virtue of an individual's election to use the averaging
29	provisions under § 402 of the Internal Revenue Code;
30	5. through 7. [Repealed.]
31	8. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1990, and before January 1, 1994, any amount
32 33	of self-employment tax deduction under § 164 (f) of the Internal Revenue Code; and 9. The amount required to be included in income for the purpose of computing the partial tax on an
33 34	accumulation distribution pursuant to § 667 of the Internal Revenue Code.
35	C. To the extent included in federal adjusted gross income, there shall be subtracted:
36	1. Income derived from obligations, or on the sale or exchange of obligations, of the United States
37	and on obligations or securities of any authority, commission or instrumentality of the United States to
38	the extent exempt from state income taxes under the laws of the United States including, but not limited
39 40	to, stocks, bonds, treasury bills, and treasury notes, but not including interest on refunds of federal taxes, interest on equipment purchase contracts, or interest on other normal business transactions.
40 41	2. Income derived from obligations, or on the sale or exchange of obligations of this Commonwealth
42	or of any political subdivision or instrumentality of this Commonwealth.
43	3. [Repealed.]
44	4. Benefits received under Title II of the Social Security Act and other benefits subject to federal
45	income taxation solely pursuant to § 86 of the Internal Revenue Code.

58	deducted for federal purposes on account of the provisions of § 280 C (a) of the Internal Revenue Code.
59	7. Any amount included therein which is foreign source income as defined in § 58.1-302.

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8. For taxable years beginning after December 31, 1983, the available portion of total excess cost recovery as defined in former § 58.1-323 B and for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1987, the excess cost recovery amount specified in § 58.1-323.1 B.

9. [Expired.]

64 10. Any amount included therein less than \$600 from a prize awarded by the State Lottery 65 Department.

11. The wages or salaries received by any person for active and inactive service in the National
Guard of the Commonwealth of Virginia, not to exceed the amount of income derived from thirty-nine
calendar days of such service or \$3,000, whichever amount is less; however, only those persons in the
ranks of O3 and below shall be entitled to the deductions specified herein.

12. Amounts received by an individual, not to exceed \$1,000 in any taxable year, as a reward for information provided to a law-enforcement official or agency, or to a nonprofit corporation created exclusively to assist such law-enforcement official or agency, in the apprehension and conviction of perpetrators of crimes. This provision shall not apply to the following: an individual who is an employee of, or under contract with, a law-enforcement agency, a victim or the perpetrator of the crime for which the reward was paid, or any person who is compensated for the investigation of crimes or accidents.

13. [Repealed.]

14. (Expires for taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 2004.) The amount of any qualified agricultural contribution as determined in § 58.1-322.2.

80 16. The amounts of self-employment tax required to be added in computing Virginia taxable income
81 for taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1990, but before January 1, 1994, pursuant to
82 subdivision B 8 of this section, as follows:

a. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1994, and before January 1, 1995, the amount
of self-employment tax added to federal adjusted gross income in taxable years beginning on and after
January 1, 1990, and before January 1, 1991;

b. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1995, and before January 1, 1996, the amount
of self-employment tax added to federal adjusted gross income in taxable years beginning on and after
January 1, 1991, and before January 1, 1992;

c. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1996, and before January 1, 1997, the amount of self-employment tax added to federal adjusted gross income in taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1992, and before January 1, 1993;

d. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1997, and before January 1, 1998, the amount
of self-employment tax added to federal adjusted gross income in taxable years beginning on and after
January 1, 1993, and before January 1, 1994, and any amount of self-employment tax required to be
added back for taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1990, and before January 1, 1994, which
was not subtracted in those taxable years.

97 17. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1995, the amount of "qualified research expenses" or "basic research expenses" eligible for deduction for federal purposes, but which were not deducted, on account of the provisions of § 280 C (c) of the Internal Revenue Code and which shall be available to partners, shareholders of S corporations, and members of limited liability companies to the extent and in the same manner as other deductions may pass through to such partners, shareholders, and members.

103 18. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1995, all military pay and allowances, not
104 otherwise subtracted under this subsection, earned for any month during any part of which such member
105 performed military service in any part of the former Yugoslavia, including the air space above such
106 location or any waters subject to related naval operations, in support of Operation JOINT ENDEAVOR
107 as part of the NATO Peace Keeping Force. Such subtraction shall be available until the taxpayer
108 completes such service.

109 19. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1996, any income received during the taxable 110 year derived from a qualified pension, profit-sharing, or stock bonus plan as described by § 401 of the 111 Internal Revenue Code, an individual retirement account or annuity established under § 408 of the 112 Internal Revenue Code, a deferred compensation plan as defined by § 457 of the Internal Revenue Code, 113 or any federal government retirement program, the contributions to which were deductible from the 114 taxpayer's federal adjusted gross income, but only to the extent the contributions to such plan or 115 program were subject to taxation under the income tax in another state.

20. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1997, any income attributable to a distribution of benefits or a refund from a prepaid tuition contract with the Virginia Higher Education Tuition Trust Fund, created pursuant to Chapter 4.9 (§ 23-38.75 et seq.) of Title 23. The subtraction for any income attributable to a refund shall be limited to income attributable to a refund in the event of a beneficiary's death, disability, or receipt of a scholarship.

121 21. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1998, all military pay and allowances, to the

122 extent included in federal adjusted gross income and not otherwise subtracted, deducted or exempted 123 under this section, earned by military personnel while serving by order of the President of the United 124 States with the consent of Congress in a combat zone or qualified hazardous duty area which is treated 125 as a combat zone for federal tax purposes pursuant to § 112 of the Internal Revenue Code.

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D. In computing Virginia taxable income there shall be deducted from federal adjusted gross income: 127 1. a. The amount allowable for itemized deductions for federal income tax purposes where the 128 taxpayer has elected for the taxable year to itemize deductions on his federal return, but reduced by the 129 amount of income taxes imposed by the Commonwealth or any other taxing jurisdiction and deducted 130 on such federal return and increased by an amount which, when added to the amount deducted under 131 § 170 of the Internal Revenue Code for mileage, results in a mileage deduction at the state level for 132 such purposes at a rate of eighteen cents per mile; or

133 b. Two thousand dollars for taxable years beginning January 1, 1987, through December 31, 1987; 134 \$2,700 for taxable years beginning January 1, 1988, through December 31, 1988; and \$5,000 for 135 married persons (one-half of such amounts in the case of a married individual filing a separate return); 136 and \$3,000 for single individuals for taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1989; provided that 137 the taxpayer has not itemized deductions for the taxable year on his federal income tax return. For 138 purposes of this section, any person who may be claimed as a dependent on another taxpayer's return for 139 the taxable year may compute the deduction only with respect to earned income.

140 2. a. A deduction in the amount of \$700 for taxable years beginning January 1, 1987, through 141 December 31, 1987, and \$800 for taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1988, for each 142 personal exemption allowable to the taxpayer for federal income tax purposes. For taxable years 143 beginning on and after January 1, 1987, each blind or aged taxpayer as defined under § 63 (f) of the 144 Internal Revenue Code shall be entitled to an additional personal exemption.

145 b. An additional deduction of \$200 for taxable years beginning January 1, 1987, through December 146 31, 1987, for each blind or aged taxpayer as defined under § 63 (f) of the Internal Revenue Code. The additional deduction for blind or aged taxpayers allowed under this subdivision and the additional 147 148 personal exemption allowed to blind or aged taxpayers under subdivision 2 a of this subsection shall be 149 allowable regardless of whether the taxpayer itemizes deductions for the taxable year for federal income 150 tax purposes.

151 3. A deduction equal to the amount of employment-related expenses upon which the federal credit is 152 based under § 21 of the Internal Revenue Code for expenses for household and dependent care services 153 necessary for gainful employment.

154 4. An additional \$1,000 deduction for each child residing for the entire taxable year in a home under 155 permanent foster care placement as defined in Chapter 10 (§ 63.1-195 et seq.) of Title 63.1, provided the 156 taxpayer can also claim the child as a personal exemption under § 151 of the Internal Revenue Code.

157 5. Effective for all taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1990, a deduction in the amount 158 of \$12,000 for taxpayers age sixty-five or older, or \$6,000 for taxpayers age sixty-two through sixty-four, less any amount received pursuant to the (i) Social Security Act or (ii) Railroad Retirement 159 160 Act and treated for federal income tax purposes as equivalent to social security. Beginning in taxable year 1992 through taxable year 1993, the \$12,000 and \$6,000 deduction amounts shall be indexed 161 162 annually in each such taxable year by an amount equivalent to the most recent percentage increase in 163 the social security wage base.

164 Effective for the taxable year beginning January 1, 1994, a deduction in the amount of \$12,944 for 165 taxpayers age sixty-five or older, or \$6,472 for taxpayers age sixty-two through sixty-four. Effective for 166 the taxable year beginning January 1, 1995, a deduction in the amount of \$10,000 for taxpayers age sixty-five or older, or \$5,000 for taxpayers age sixty-two through sixty-four. Effective for all taxable 167 168 years beginning on or after January 1, 1996, a deduction in the amount of \$12,000 for taxpayers age 169 sixty-five or older, or \$6,000 for taxpayers age sixty-two through sixty-four.

170 Beginning in taxable year 1995, the deduction under this subdivision shall not be reduced by any 171 amount received pursuant to the (i) Social Security Act or (ii) Railroad Retirement Act and treated for 172 federal income tax purposes as equivalent to social security.

173 6. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1997, the amount an individual pays as a fee 174 for an initial screening to become a possible bone marrow donor, if (i) the individual is not reimbursed 175 for such fee or (ii) the individual has not claimed a deduction for the payment of such fee on his federal 176 income tax return.

177 7. a. (Effective for taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1996.) A deduction shall be 178 allowed to the purchaser for the amount paid during the taxable year for a prepaid tuition contract 179 entered into with the Virginia Higher Education Tuition Trust Fund, pursuant to Chapter 4.9 (§ 23-38.75 180 et seq.) of Title 23. The amount deducted on any individual income tax return in any taxable year shall be limited to \$2,000 per prepaid tuition contract. No deduction shall be allowed pursuant to this section 181 if such payments are deducted on the purchaser's federal income tax return. The deduction allowed 182

183 under this section shall not be transferable. If the purchase price exceeds \$2,000, the remainder may be carried forward and subtracted in future taxable years until the purchase price has been fully deducted; 184

185 however, in no event shall the amount deducted in any taxable year exceed \$2,000 per contract. 186 Notwithstanding the statute of limitations on assessments contained in § 58.1-312, any deduction taken

187 hereunder shall be subject to recapture in the taxable year or years in which distributions or refunds are

188 made for any reason other than (i) to pay qualified higher education expenses, as defined in § 529 of the 189 Internal Revenue Code or (ii) the beneficiary's death, disability, or receipt of a scholarship.

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b. (Effective for taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 1996.) The amount paid for a prepaid tuition contract during taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1996, but before January 191 192 1, 1998, shall be deducted in taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1998, and shall be subject 193 to the limitations set out in subdivision 7 a.

8. For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 2000, the total amount an individual actually 194 195 contributed in funds to the Virginia Public School Construction Grants Program and Fund, established in Chapter 11.1 (§ 22.1-175.1 et seq.) of Title 22.1, provided the individual has not claimed a deduction for 196 197 such amount on his federal income tax return.

198 E. There shall be added to or subtracted from federal adjusted gross income (as the case may be) the 199 individual's share, as beneficiary of an estate or trust, of the Virginia fiduciary adjustment determined 200 under § 58.1-361.

201 F. There shall be added or subtracted, as the case may be, the amounts provided in § 58.1-315 as 202 transitional modifications.
