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HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 566

AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE

(Proposed by the Joint Conference Committee on February 27, 1999)

(Patron Prior to Substitute—Delegate Hamilton)

Establishing a special task force of the Commission on Educational Accountability to study the educational needs of the 21st century.

8 WHEREAS, the demands of an increasingly competitive 21st century global marketplace will 9 challenge Virginia's system of public education to prepare its students to learn, adapt, and expand their 10 skills in the workforce; and

WHEREAS, because the "fundamental goal of the public schools," as articulated in the Standards of Quality, is to "enable each student to develop the skills that are necessary for success in school and 11 12 preparation for life," it is essential that our public schools equip students with the tools that will allow 13 them to wisely choose among the options of directly entering the workforce, obtaining postsecondary 14 15 technical education or training, attending college, graduate, or professional school, or combining these 16 objectives; and

17 WHEREAS, the Standards of Quality direct school boards to infuse throughout the K-12 curricula career education programs that "promote knowledge of careers and all types of employment 18 opportunities including, but not limited to, apprenticeships, the military, and career education schools, 19 20 and emphasize the advantages of completing school with marketable skills"; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to § 22.1-209, local school boards are required to "make available to secondary 21 students employment counseling and placement services to furnish information relating to the 22 23 employment opportunities available to students graduating from or leaving the public schools in the 24 school division which shall include all types of employment opportunities, including, but not limited to, 25 apprenticeships, the military, and career education schools"; and

WHEREAS, supplementing these career planning efforts are programs created pursuant to 26 § 22.1-209.01 to prepare students for "postsecondary education eligibility, employment, and advanced 27 technical skills training," as well as career guidance counseling designed to "furnish information on 28 available employment opportunities to all students," as required by § 22.1-253.13:1 D, and pupil 29 30 personnel services for grades K-12 to aid students in their educational, social, and career development pursuant to § 22.1-253.13:2 D; and 31

32 WHEREAS, recognizing the importance of workforce development training programs, the Governor 33 of Virginia has directed the Secretary of Commerce and Trade to review such programs in an effort to 34 promote economic development efforts in the Commonwealth; and

35 WHEREAS, the President of the State Board of Education has acknowledged the need for all 36 students to be held to a standard of learning that will enhance the skills and abilities of students entering 37 the workforce or pursuing higher education; and

38 WHEREAS, to increase the quality of public education in Virginia and to improve coordination 39 between public education and workforce development training, it is imperative to build on those existing 40 and revised standards, programs, and initiatives that ensure the greatest educational and professional 41 development opportunities; and

42 WHEREAS, while Virginia has made great progress in increasing educational quality and in preparing its young people for the world of work with the implementation of revised Standards of 43 Learning for mathematics, English, science, and history and social science in 1995, new Standards of 44 Accreditation for public schools in 1997, and in a broad range of workforce training initiatives, further 45 study is needed to determine ways to enhance linkages between public education and workforce 46 47 development and to assist students in acquiring necessary work habits, developing marketable skills, coordinating courses of study, and identifying career goals; and **48**

WHEREAS, Senate Joint Resolution 498 (1999) establishes the Commission on Educational 49 50 Accountability, which has been charged to address a myriad of issues related to and impacting the 51 Standards of Quality, the Standards of Learning, and the Standards of Accreditation; and

WHEREAS, due to the complexity of the issues and the interaction of public policies affecting 52 53 public education, it is necessary that a special task force be established to assist the Commission in its 54 work, and that the Commission collaborate and coordinate its work with other legislative study committees examining related matters to avoid duplication; now, therefore, be it 55

RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That a special task force of the 56 57 Commission on Educational Accountability to study the educational needs of the 21st century be established. The special task force shall be composed of 15 members, which shall include five legislative 58 59 members, five nonlegislative members, and five ex officio members as follows: three members of the

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60 House of Delegates, of whom two shall also be appointed to serve on the Commission on Educational Accountability, pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution 498 (1999), in accordance with the principles of 61 Rule 16 of the Rules of the House of Delegates, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House; two 62 63 members of the Senate, of whom one shall also be appointed to serve on the Commission on Educational Accountability, pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution 498 (1999), to be appointed by the 64 65 Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections; five citizens representing business, education, and 66 industry, to be appointed by the Governor; the Secretary of Education; the Secretary of Commerce and Trade; the Superintendent of Public Instruction; the Chancellor of the Virginia Community College 67 System; and the Director of the State Council of Higher Education, who shall serve ex officio with full 68 69 voting privileges.

70 The special task force shall study (i) the integration of the Standards of Learning with middle and 71 high school curricula and programs that focus on workforce development skills; (ii) the availability of 72 these middle and high school workforce development opportunities to students across the Commonwealth; (iii) the adequacy of current curricula, program resources, and technology in the public 73 schools statewide; (iv) staffing and state and local funding levels for middle and high school workforce 74 development programs; (v) the efficacy of current state and local coordination and governance of middle 75 and high school workforce development programs; (vi) the need for training and technical assistance for 76 workforce development educators; (vii) the use of the Standards of Learning and national business and 77 78 industry standards to enhance the quality of such curricula and programs; and (viii) such other issues as 79 it deems appropriate. The special task force shall regularly apprise the Commission on Educational 80 Accountability regarding its deliberations, findings, and recommendations on a schedule to be 81 determined by the Commission.

82 The Division of Legislative Services shall provide staff support for the study. The Department of
83 Education, the Virginia Business Education Partnership, the Virginia Community College System, and
84 the State Council of Higher Education shall provide technical assistance for the study. All agencies of

85 the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the special task force, upon request.

86 The direct costs of this study shall not exceed 20,000.

87 The special task force shall submit its interim findings and recommendations to the Commission on88 Educational Accountability by November 1, 2000, and its final report by November 1, 2001.

89 Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint90 Rules Committee. The Committee may withhold expenditures or delay the period for the conduct of the91 study.
