999439828 **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 648** 1 2 Offered January 21, 1999 3 Requesting the Virginia Department of Health to co-sponsor a forum with other public and private 4 sector organizations on African-American health care access issues. 5 6 Patrons-Melvin, Baker, Brink, Davies, DeBoer, Diamonstein, Hall, Hamilton and Morgan; Senators: 7 Bolling, Gartlan, Lambert, Schrock, Walker and Woods 8 9 Referred to Committee on Health, Welfare and Institutions 10 WHEREAS, the Virginia Department of Health's Office of Minority Health recently completed a 11 study of the health status and conditions of African-Americans (the VDH study) pursuant to Senate Joint 12 Resolution 355 of the 1997 Session of the General Assembly; and 13 14 WHEREAS, based on available health data, there are a number of significant disparities in the health status and conditions of African-Americans and Whites, including life expectancy, heart disease 15 16 mortality, stroke mortality, diabetes, infant mortality, low birth weight, and teenage pregnancy; and 17 WHEREAS, heart disease, cancer, stroke, unintentional and intentional injury, and HIV/AIDS are 18 among the most significant health concerns for African-Americans; and WHEREAS, 20 percent of African-Americans lack health insurance compared to 14 percent of all 19 20 Virginians; and 21 WHEREAS, the VDH study concluded that Virginians as a whole are generally making progress 22 towards the Healthy People 2000 objectives established by the United States Department of Health and 23 Human Services but that, in most cases, these objectives will not be achieved for African-Americans; 24 and 25 WHEREAS, the VDH study also concluded that there is no consistent method for determining the 26 extent to which health promotion activities target African-Americans and whether those activities that do 27 so are effective: and WHEREAS, the VDH study further concluded that eliminating the health disparities currently faced 28 29 by African-Americans would benefit the Commonwealth economically by increasing the number of 30 people who are fit to work and thereby contribute to Virginia's productivity and competitiveness; and WHEREAS, the VDH study also proposed additional discussion of strategies to strengthen the 31 32 African-American family through improvements in access to health care and improvements in behaviors; 33 now, therefore, be it 34 RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Virginia Department of 35 Health be requested to develop a public/private partnership with appropriate state and local government agencies and private health-related organizations to co-sponsor a forum or congress on African-American 36 37 health service access issues. The forum or congress shall address topics such as (i) providing care to 38 African-Americans in public and private settings, (ii) developing strategies to enroll African-Americans 39 in private and public health insurance programs, (iii) recruiting and retaining African-American 40 physicians in Virginia, (iv) developing culturally competent health care services, (v) managed care, (vi) 41 public/private partnerships that increase access to care for African-Americans, and (vii) identifying key 42 health issues related to African-American families; and be it 43 **RESOLVED FURTHER** That the State Health Commissioner report the results and recommendations of the forum or congress on African-American health care access to the State Board of Health and the 44 Joint Commission on Health Care by September 1, 1999, and to the Governor and the 2000 Session of 45 the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems 46 47 for the processing of legislative documents.

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
