3	Requesting the State Department of Health to co-sponsor a forum with other public and private sector
4	organizations on African-American health care access issues.

10 11	WITEDEAS the State Deportment of Health's Office of Minemity Health recently completed a study
11	WHEREAS, the State Department of Health's Office of Minority Health recently completed a study of the health status and conditions of African Americans pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution No. 355
12	{1997} Session of the General Assembly; and
13 14	WHEREAS, based on available health data, there are a number of significant disparities in the health
15	status and conditions of African Americans and [Whites Caucasians], including life expectancy, heart
16	disease mortality, stroke mortality, diabetes, infant mortality, low birth weight, and teenage pregnancy;
17	and
18	WHEREAS, heart disease, cancer, stroke, unintentional and intentional injury, and HIV/AIDS are
19	among the most significant health concerns for African Americans; and
20	WHEREAS, 20 percent of African Americans lack health insurance compared to 14 percent of all
21	Virginians; and
22	WHEREAS, the Department's study concluded that Virginians as a whole are generally making
23	progress towards the Healthy People 2000 objectives established by the United States Department of
24 25	Health and Human Services but that, in most cases, these objectives will not be achieved for African
25 26	Americans; and WHEREAS, the study concluded that there is no consistent method for determining the extent to
20 27	which health promotion activities target African Americans and whether those activities that do so are
28	effective; and
29	WHEREAS, the study further concluded that eliminating the health disparities currently faced by
30	African Americans would benefit the Commonwealth economically by increasing the number of people
31	who are fit to work and thereby contribute to Virginia's productivity and competitiveness; and
32	WHEREAS, the study also proposed additional discussion of strategies to strengthen the
33	African-American family through improvements in access to health care and improvements in behaviors;
34	now, therefore, be it
35	RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the State Department of Health
36	be requested to develop a public/private partnership with appropriate state and local government agencies
37 38	and private health-related organizations to co-sponsor a forum or Congress on African-American health service access issues. The forum or congress shall address topics such as (i) providing care to African
30 39	Americans in public and private settings, (ii) developing strategies to enroll African Americans in private
40	and public health insurance programs, (iii) recruiting and retaining African-American physicians in
41	Virginia, (iv) developing culturally competent health care services, (v) managed care, (vi) public/private
42	partnerships that increase access to care for African Americans, and (vii) identifying key health issues
43	related to African-American families; and, be it
44	RESOLVED FURTHER, That the State Health Commissioner report the results and recommendations
45	of the forum or congress on African-American health care access to the State Board of Health and the
46	Joint Commission on Health Care by September 1, 1999, and to the Governor and the 2000 Session of
47	the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems
48	for the processing of legislative documents.

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
