999314138 **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 682** 1 2 AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE 3 (Proposed by the House Committee on Health, Welfare and Institutions 4 on February 6, 1999) 5 6 (Patron Prior to Substitute—Delegate Brink) Directing the Joint Commission on Health Care to study the need to collect workforce data on nurse 7 practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and certified 8 nurse aides. 9 WHEREAS, quality health care depends on geographic and demographic access to competent health 10 care professionals; and 11 WHEREAS, the General Assembly passed legislation during the 1998 Session requiring the Board of Medicine to collect, compile, and disseminate, upon request, information on the practice of each 12 physician licensed in the Commonwealth; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the Board of Nursing knows how many health care nurse practitioners, clinical nurse 15 specialists, registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and certified nurse aides are regulated and where 16 they live, but has little or no information on whether they actively practice, any areas of specialty they 17 may have, or their practice demographics; and 18 WHEREAS, there are various private efforts to collect geographic and demographic data on the practice of nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and 19 20 certified nurse aides, but these efforts are not coordinated; and 21 WHEREAS, this lack of coordination of data-collection efforts makes it difficult to demonstrate the 22 access Virginians have to nurses and other nursing-field professionals, or to identify any areas that may 23 have access problems; and 24 WHEREAS, nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, and registered nurses play a vital role in 25 Virginia's health care delivery system, and frequently are the patient's point of entry into the health care 26 system; and 27 WHEREAS, nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, and registered nurses provide primary and 28 preventive care; and 29 WHEREAS, the General Assembly, state agencies, and other public policy makers frequently are 30 called upon to make decisions that affect or are affected by geographic and demographic access to 31 health care for Virginians; and 32 WHEREAS, health care decision-makers in the private sector also make decisions that are influenced 33 by geographical access to health care; and 34 WHEREAS, since this geographic and demographic information is only recently available about 35 physicians in the Commonwealth, but is not available about nurses and other nursing-field professionals, public policy and business decisions often must be made based on inadequate information or 36 37 assumptions that may or may not be accurate; now, therefore, be it 38 RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Joint Commission on Health 39 Care be directed to study the need to collect workforce data on nurse practitioners, clinical nurse 40 specialists, registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and certified nurse aides. 41 The Joint Commission's study shall include, but not be limited to, an examination of (i) what data 42 are currently available on these regulated nurses and other nursing-field professionals; (ii) where gaps exist in current data collection efforts; (iii) what other states are doing in the area of data collection on 43 nurses and other nursing-field professionals; (iv) what additional specific geographic, demographic or 44 other information on nurses and other nursing-field professionals would enable the public and private 45 sectors to make more-informed health care policy and business decisions; (v) what additional kinds of 46 data on nurses and other nursing-field professionals would be the most useful; (vi) the various 47 **48** mechanisms that could be utilized to collect these data; and (vii) the cost of collecting any data deemed useful. The Joint Commission shall also recommend what data, if any, should be collected; the most 49 50 efficient method to collect, compile, and analyze such data; and, based on an analysis of the costs and 51 benefits of such information, whether the Commonwealth should participate in this data collection. The Joint Commission shall request the Legislative Coalitions of Virginia Nurses and its member 52 53 organizations to assist with and participate in this study. 54 All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Joint Commission, upon request. 55 The Joint Commission on Health Care shall complete its work in time to submit its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the 2000 Session of the General Assembly as provided in the 56 procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative 57 58 documents.

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
