12 13	Whereas, the Commonwealth of Virginia elected to participate in the Master Settlement Agreement
14	with participating manufacturers of tobacco products; and
15	Whereas, pursuant to the Master Settlement Agreement, the Commonwealth is expected to receive
16	substantial payments from the participating manufacturers of tobacco products; and
17	Whereas, the payments should be dedicated to improving the public health of all residents of the
18	Commonwealth; and Whenever under the terms of the Mester Settlement Agreement the participating manufacturers of
19 20	Whereas, under the terms of the Master Settlement Agreement the participating manufacturers of tobacco products will be released from legal liability for a broad range of past, present, and future state
20 21	health claims, including claims arising from exposure to secondhand smoke; and
22	Whereas, the Master Settlement Agreement does not provide for the restriction of secondhand smoke;
23	and
24	Whereas, establishing an independent foundation to administer the payments from the participating
25 26	manufacturers of tobacco products pursuant to the Master Settlement Agreement will ensure the
26 27	provision of appropriate public oversight; now, therefore, Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
28	1. That § 2.1-1.5 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted, and that the Code of Virginia
29	is amended by adding in Title 32.1 a chapter numbered 14, consisting of sections numbered
30	32.1-354 through 32.1-365, as follows:

CHAPTER 14.

VIRGINIA TOBACCO SETTLEMENT FOUNDATION.

- 140 § 32.1-354. Definitions.
- 141 As used in this chapter, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 142 "Board" means the Board of Trustees of the Foundation.
- "Director" means the director of the Foundation appointed pursuant to § 32.1-358. 143
- 144 "Foundation " means the Virginia Tobacco Settlement Foundation.
- "Fund" means the Virginia Tobacco Settlement Fund established pursuant to § 32.1-360. 145
- 146 "Master Settlement Agreement" means the settlement agreement dated November 23, 1998, between 147 the Commonwealth and leading tobacco product manufacturers, including any amendment or successor 148 thereto.
- § 32.1-355. Virginia Tobacco Settlement Foundation created; purposes. 149
- 150 The Virginia Tobacco Settlement Foundation is hereby created as a body politic and corporate to 151 have such powers and duties as hereinafter provided. The Foundation is established for the purpose of 152 administering the portion of the payments received by the Commonwealth under the Master Settlement 153 Agreement that are earmarked for controlling and preventing the use of tobacco products and to ensure 154 that any public or private entity receiving money under the Master Settlement Agreement establishes and 155 maintains policies supporting reductions in the use of tobacco and in exposure to secondhand smoke.
- 156 § 32.1-356. Powers of the Foundation.
- 157 The Foundation shall have the following general powers:
- 158 1. To have succession until dissolved by the General Assembly, in which event title to the properties of the Foundation, both real and personal, shall, insofar as consistent with existing contractual 159 160 obligations and subject to all other legally enforceable claims or demands by or against the Foundation, 161 pass to and become vested in the Commonwealth;
- 162 2. To sue and be sued in contractual matters in its own name;
- 3. To promulgate regulations as it deems necessary for the administration of its functions in 163 164 accordance with the Administrative Process Act (§ 9-6.14:1 et seq.);
- 165 4. To accept, hold, and administer distributions of money under the Master Settlement Agreement 166 and other money, securities, or other property appropriated, given, or bequeathed to the Foundation, 167 absolutely or in trust, for the purposes for which the Foundation is created. The Foundation shall not 168 engage in any business except in the furtherance of its objectives;
- 169 5. To enter into contracts generally and to execute all instruments necessary or appropriate to carry 170 out its purposes;
- 171 6. To appoint and prescribe the duties of such officers, agents, and employees as may be necessary 172 to carry out its functions, and to fix and pay such compensation to them for their services as the Foundation may determine; and 173
- 174 7. To perform any lawful acts necessary or appropriate to carry out the purposes of the Foundation. 175
 - § 32.1-357. Board of Trustees; appointment; officers.
- 176 A. The Foundation shall be governed and administered by a Board of Trustees consisting of fifteen 177 members. Two members shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Delegates from among the 178 membership of the House of Delegates, one representing rural interests and one representing urban 179 interests, for terms concurrent with the term for which they have been elected to office; two members 180 shall be appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections, one representing rural interests 181 and one representing urban interests, from among the membership of the Senate for terms concurrent 182 with the term for which they have been elected to office; and eleven other members appointed by the

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Governor, subject to confirmation by the General Assembly, for four-year terms as follows: (i) five 183 designated representatives of public health agencies, such as the American Cancer Society, American Heart Association, American Lung Association of Virginia, Medical Society of Virginia, Virginia 184 185 186 Thoracic Society, and the Virginia Nurses Association; (ii) four health professionals in the fields of oncology, cardiology, pulmonary medicine, and pediatrics; and (iii) two youths. Vacancies in the 187 188 membership of the Board shall be filled by appointment of the entity initially making the appointment 189 for the unexpired portion of the term. No member shall be eligible to serve for more than two successive 190 five-year terms; however, after the expiration of a term of four years or less, or after the expiration of 191 the remainder of a term to which he was appointed to fill a vacancy, two additional terms may be 192 served by such member if appointed thereto. Immediately after such appointment, the members shall 193 enter upon the performance of their duties.

194 B. The members shall elect annually a chairman and vice chairman from among the membership. 195 The chairman, or in his absence, the vice chairman, shall preside at all meetings of the Board. A 196 majority of the members of the Board serving at any one time shall constitute a quorum for the 197 transaction of business. The Board shall meet annually or more frequently at the call of the chairman.

198 C. Members of the Board shall receive compensation for their services at the rate provided in 199 § 2.1-20.3 and shall receive reimbursement for actual expenses incurred in the performance of their 200 duties on behalf of the Board. Such compensation and expenses shall be paid from the Fund.

201 D. Members of the Board and employees of the Foundation shall be subject to the standards of 202 conduct set forth in the State and Local Government Conflict of Interests Act (§ 2.1-639.1 et seq.) and 203 may be removed from office for inefficiency, neglect of duty or misconduct in the manner set forth 204 therein. 205

§ 32.1-358. Appointment of director.

206 The Foundation shall employ a director, who shall also be the secretary of the Board. The director 207 shall be appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the Board. The director shall administer, manage and direct the affairs and business of the Foundation in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, 208 209 subject to the policies, control and direction of the Board. The Board may employ technical experts and 210 such other officers, agents and employees, permanent and temporary, as it may require, and shall 211 determine their qualifications, duties and compensation. The Board may delegate to one or more of its 212 agents or employees such administrative duties as it may deem proper. The actual expenses incurred in 213 the performance of such duties shall be paid from the Fund. 214

§ 32.1-359. Duties of the Board.

The Board shall perform the following duties:

216 1. Establish specific criteria and procedures governing decisions by the Foundation to distribute the 217 moneys in the Fund to entities for use in controlling and preventing the use of tobacco and secondhand 218 smoke:

219 2. Establish requirements that every recipient of money under the Master Settlement Agreement 220 establish and maintain policies that reduce tobacco use and reduce exposure to secondhand smoke;

221 3. Evaluate the proposals for the use of the assets of the Fund in accordance with the criteria 222 established by the Board and the provisions of this chapter; and 223

4. Evaluate the implementation and results of all efforts receiving support from the Foundation.

§ 32.1-360. Virginia Tobacco Settlement Fund.

225 There is hereby created in the state treasury a special nonreverting fund to be known as the Virginia 226 Tobacco Settlement Fund. The Fund shall be established on the books of the Comptroller. Moneys in the 227 Fund shall be subject to expenditure by the Foundation without further appropriation. Such portion of 228 the moneys received under the Master Settlement Agreement as is earmarked for controlling and 229 preventing the use of tobacco shall be paid into the state treasury and credited to the Fund. The Fund 230 shall also consist of any moneys appropriated from the general fund, grants and donations received by the Board, and other moneys received by the State Treasurer and designated for deposit in the Fund. 231 232 Interest earned on moneys in the Fund shall remain in the Fund and be credited to it. Any moneys 233 remaining the Fund, including interest thereon, at the end of each fiscal year shall not revert to the 234 general fund but shall remain in the Fund. Moneys in the Fund shall be used solely for the purposes of 235 controlling and preventing the use of tobacco by residents of the Commonwealth, including but not 236 limited to educational and awareness programs on the health effects of tobacco use and enforcement of 237 laws restricting the distribution of tobacco products to minors. Expenditures and disbursements from the 238 Fund shall be made by the State Treasurer on warrants issued by the Comptroller upon written request 239 signed by the chairman of the Board or the director. 240

§ 32.1-361. Use of funds distributed under Master Settlement Agreement.

241 Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, any public or private entity utilizing any 242 moneys received by the Commonwealth pursuant to the Master Settlement Agreement shall be required, 243 as a condition precedent to the release of such funds to such entity, to establish and maintain policies to 244 support the reduction of tobacco use and reduce exposure to secondhand smoke. The Foundation shall

(i) establish criteria for determining whether an entity's policies support the reduction of tobacco use 245 246 and reduce exposure to secondhand smoke and (ii) monitor the distribution of such moneys to ensure 247

that the recipients of such funds are in compliance with the provisions of this section. § 32.1-362. Audit. 248

249 The accounts of the Foundation shall be audited annually by the Auditor of Public Accounts, or his 250 legally authorized representatives. Copies of the annual audit shall be distributed to the Governor and

251 to the Chairmen of the House Committee on Appropriations and the Senate Committee on Finance.

252 § 32.1-363. Forms of accounts and records.

253 The accounts and records of the Foundation showing the receipt and disbursement of funds from 254 whatever source derived shall be in such form as the Auditor of Public Accounts prescribes.

255 § 32.1-364. Reports to the Governor and General Assembly.

256 The Foundation shall submit a report annually to the Governor and the General Assembly. The 257 report shall include information regarding research efforts supported by the Foundation and 258 expenditures from the Fund.

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§ 32.1-365. Public purpose. The exercise of the powers granted by this chapter shall be in all respects for the benefit of the 260 261 inhabitants of the Commonwealth and for the promotion of their safety, health, welfare, knowledge, 262 convenience and prosperity.

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
