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11	WHEREAS, Lyme disease is considered the most prevalent vector-borne disease in the United States;
12	and
13	WHEREAS, Lyme disease is transmitted through the bite of an infected tick; and
14	WHEREAS, Lyme disease is caused by a spirochete which can be detected through testing of the
15 16	tick if the tick has been removed and stored for testing; and
10	WHEREAS, without the results of such tests many physicians are reluctant to treat for Lyme disease, and others may prescribe antibiotics; and
18	WHEREAS, the indiscriminate use of antibiotics can result and has resulted in the development of
19	resistant organisms; and
20	WHEREAS, Lyme disease is alleged to be underreported and under-treated; and
21	WHEREAS, Lyme disease is a devastating illness which can lead to disability and personal loss of
22	health and income; and
23	WHEREAS, in December of 1998, the federal Food and Drug Administration approved a license for
24	a new vaccine against Lyme disease; and
25	WHEREAS, physicians and the public may not yet be aware of this new vaccine and its potential to
26	prevent the pain and disability of Lyme disease; and
27 28	WHEREAS, although Lyme disease is a reportable disease in Virginia, the Commonwealth does not have a systematic approach at the state level to evaluate the incidence, treatment patterns, validity of the
20 29	reporting, and viable approaches to prevention and treatment of this disease; now, therefore, be it
30	RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the Joint Commission on Health
31	Care [shall be directed], in cooperation with the Virginia Department of Health, examine issues
32	relating to the incidence, reporting, treatment, and prevention of Lyme disease in the Commonwealth [,
33	including,. The study shall examine] but not [be] limited to, (i) the incidence of Lyme disease in
34	Virginia; (ii) whether Lyme disease is underreported in Virginia; (iii) if Lyme disease appears to be
35	underreported in Virginia, why, and what steps can be taken to ensure the accurate reporting of Lyme
36	disease; (iv) what assistance is available from the federal government for prevention, e.g., from the
37 38	Centers for Disease Control, and for treatment, e.g., through the National Institutes of Health; (v) the
39	extent to which Virginia is accessing any available federal support for the prevention and treatment of Lyme disease; (vi) the most appropriate use of and access to all available support for prevention and

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All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the Joint Commission, upon request.

The Joint Commission shall complete its work in time to submit its findings and recommendations to **43** 44 the Governor and the 2000 Session of the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of the 45 Division of Legislative Automated Systems for processing legislative documents.
