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991410758 **SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 423** 1 2 AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE 3 (Proposed by the Senate Committee on Rules 4 5 6 7 on February 2, 1999) (Patron Prior to Substitute-Senator Whipple; Senator Hanger [SJR 404] and Senator Hawkins [SJR 337]) Directing the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections and the House Committee on Privileges 8 and Elections to continue their joint subcommittee studying election laws innovations, improved methods to inform voters about ballot issues and candidates, and developments in Virginia's voter 9 10 registration and election processes. 11 WHEREAS, 1998 Senate Joint Resolution 79 requested the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections and the House Committee on Privileges and Elections to study election laws innovations and 12 other matters, and the Committees established a joint subcommittee to implement Senate Joint 13 14 Resolution 79; and 15 WHEREAS, that joint subcommittee has examined innovations in election procedures such as voting 16 by mail, early voting, and on-request absentee voting; has recommended expanded absentee voting 17 opportunities; and has found that a number of new voting techniques are in the early stages of development and warrant further monitoring to determine their impact on the election process; and 18 19 WHEREAS, low voter turnout statistics highlight the need to continue the search for improvements 20 in voting procedures, the election process, and ways to stimulate voter participation, including better 21 ways to inform the electorate about the issues and candidates on the ballot and particularly the 22 constitutional amendments submitted to the voters for approval or rejection; and 23 WHEREAS, the Commonwealth now provides only minimal information to the public about pending 24 constitutional amendments by methods arcane and inadequate: first, by requiring the Clerk of the House of Delegates to send two copies of each proposed amendment to the clerks of the circuit courts who 25 must post one copy on the front door of the courthouse and hold one copy for inspection by the public; 26 27 and second, by requiring the preparation and limited distribution of a neutral explanation of proposed 28 amendments during the 90 days before the voter referendum on the amendment; and 29 WHEREAS, the importance of providing information on the content and impact of proposed 30 constitutional amendments and improvements in communications technology make it timely and 31 appropriate to examine ways to educate the public about pending constitutional amendments; and 32 WHEREAS, in related developments within the Commonwealth in 1998, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission conducted a review of the State Board of Elections and recommended a 33 34 number of changes to improve the operations of the State Board and the Commonwealth's voter 35 registration and election system, and the results of the Commission's review and the implementation of 36 its recommendations merit continued review by the legislature; and WHEREAS, a committee established by the State Board of Elections has reported recommendations 37 38 for the replacement of the current Virginia Voter Registration System (VVRS), including the migration 39 of the VVRS to a database format compatible with information industry standards, an upgrading of the 40 communications network used by the State Board and voter registrars, and follow-up work by a 41 technical committee to examine software, database controls, and registrar training requirements for a new 42 system: and 43 WHEREAS, in looking at the registration process, the voting rights of felons should be considered since 37 states either allow the felon to retain his voting rights or provide for the automatic restoration 44 45 of those rights upon parole; and WHEREAS, these developments nationwide and within the Commonwealth promise new 46 47 opportunities to improve the registration and election process; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That the Senate Committee on **48** 49 Privileges and Elections and the House Committee on Privileges and Elections are requested to continue their joint subcommittee studying election laws innovations, improved methods to inform voters about 50 51 ballot issues and candidates, and developments in Virginia's voter registration and election processes. In conducting its study, the joint subcommittee shall consider the issues raised in Senate Joint Resolution 52 53 No. 404 (1999) and Senate Joint Resolution No. 337 (1999). The members appointed by the Committees 54 and participating with the joint subcommittee pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution 79 shall continue to 55 serve. Staffing shall continue to be provided by the Division of Legislative Services. Technical assistance 56 57 shall be provided by the State Board of Elections. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide 58 assistance to the joint subcommittee, upon request.

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The joint subcommittee shall complete its work in time to submit its findings and recommendations

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- to the Committees and to the Governor and the 2000 Session of the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents. 61 62
