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9	Whereas, the Commonwealth had a moratorium on new nursing home or extended care facilities for
10	an extended period in the 1980s and 1990s; and
11	Whereas, a number of exceptions to this moratorium were approved for application submission by
12	the General Assembly; and
13	Whereas, as a condition of some application submission exceptions, the law required restrictions on
14	admissions of Medicaid recipients and, in the case of continuing care providers, of private pay patients;
15	and Whenever in continuing one communities the contract holders are almost almost almost almost almost almost almost
16 17	Whereas, in continuing care communities, the early contract holders are almost always admitted to ambulatory environments; and
18	Whereas, in modern times, many senior citizens are in good physical condition and health; therefore,
19	the contract holders frequently do not need nursing home care until many years after entering the
20	continuing care community; and
21	Whereas, prior to filling the nursing home with contract holders, the operation of nursing home units
22	in continuing care communities may only be feasible if other private pay patients may be admitted to
23	the nursing home; now, therefore,
24	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

20 27	Notwithstanding the provisions of subdivision 6 of § 32.1-102.3:2 as in effect on June 30, 1996, the Commissioner of Health may accept and approve a request to amend the conditions of a certificate of

2 9	pursuant to Chapter 49 (§ 38.2-4900 et seq.) of Title 38.2 for an increase in beds in which nursing
30	facility or extended care services are provided to allow such continuing care provider to continue, until
31	July 1, 2004, to admit patients, other than continuing care contract holders, with whom the facility has
32	an agreement with the individual responsible for the patient for private payment of the costs upon the
33	following conditions being met: (i) the continuing care community is established for the care of retired
34	military personnel and their families and (ii) the facility's bond requires that the nursing home unit
35	maintain a ninety percent occupancy rate.
