9	WHEREAS, on March 25, 1821, Greece began its struggle for independence from nearly four
10	centuries of political domination by the Ottoman Empire; and
11	WHEREAS, nearly a decade later, the Hellenic Republic won its independence and has since joined
12	with the United States and other nations in celebrating the form of government created by the ancient
13	Greeks more than 2,000 years ago; and
14	WHEREAS, as the inventor of democracy and the home of much of the western world's greatest
15 16	literature, art, and philosophy, the nation of Greece has profoundly influenced western civilization for
10	more than two millennia; and WHEREAS, it is entirely appropriate that Virginia, birthplace of American democracy, join with the
18	United States and the other freedom-loving nations of the world in celebrating, at the turn of the
19	millennium, the anniversary of the rebirth of democracy in the country where it was born; now,
20	therefore, be it
21	RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the General Assembly hereby
