002723508 **SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 173** 1 2 Offered January 24, 2000 3 Establishing a joint subcommittee to study the regulatory responsibilities, policies, and activities of the 4 5 6 7 State Corporation Commission. Patron-Norment 8 Referred to Committee on Rules 9 10 WHEREAS, the 1902 Constitution of Virginia created the State Corporation Commission (the 11 Commission), enumerating in detail its duties and procedures and vesting the Commission with legislative, judicial, and executive powers; and 12 WHEREAS, the Commission exercises legislative authority when it makes rules or sets rates, judicial 13 14 authority when it acts as a court of record and holds formal hearings, and executive authority in its 15 day-to-day administration, and WHEREAS, despite the exercise of these powers, the Commission is not part of the legislative, 16 17 judicial, and executive branches of government and; therefore, is in effect a fourth branch of Virginia 18 state government: and WHEREAS, when it was created in 1903, the Commission had two primary functions, the regulation 19 20 of rates and services of railroads and the issuance of corporate charters with a budget of \$24,000 and 21 five employees: and 22 WHEREAS, since that time the Commission's jurisdiction has expanded significantly as a result of 23 legislative amendments and constitutional amendments to include the regulation of energy, insurance, 24 securities, corporate filings, communications, financial institutions, and railroads; and 25 WHEREAS, the Commission has a current staff of 560 and an annual operating budget of approximately \$51 million; and 26 WHEREAS, despite the growth of the Commission over the years and the ever increasing impact its 27 28 policies have on the economy and lives of the citizens of the Commonwealth, it remains the only 29 department of government for which no external assessment is routinely made showing the the impact 30 its actions have had or will have on the economy and the lives of citizens of the Commonwealth, or whether alternative approaches would allow the Commission to achieve its legitimate goals while having 31 32 less impact; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring, That a joint subcommittee be 33 established to study the regulatory responsibilities, policies, and activities of the State Corporation Commission and the impact of such policies and activities on the lives of the citizens of the 34 35 Commonwealth. The joint subcommittee shall be composed of nine members, which shall include five 36 37 legislative members and four nonlegislative citizen as follows: two members of the Senate, to be 38 appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections; three members of the House of 39 Delegates, to be appointed by the Speaker; two citizens to be appointed by the Senate Committee on 40 Privileges and Elections; and two citizens to be appointed by the Speaker. 41 The direct costs of this study shall not exceed \$9,900. The Division of Legislative Services shall provide staff support for the study. The State Corporation 42 Commission shall provide such assistance and information as is needed for the work of the joint 43 subcommittee. All agencies of the Commonwealth shall provide assistance to the joint subcommittee, 44 45 upon request. The joint subcommittee shall complete its work in time to submit its findings and recommendations 46 47 to the Governor and the 2001 Session of the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents. **48** Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint 49 Rules Committee. The Committee may withhold expenditures or delay the period for the conduct of the 50 51 study.
