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11	WHEREAS, the Legislative Support Commission is charged with the statutory responsibility of
12	supervising the operation of the General Assembly Building, the Capitol Hostesses, the Capitol Police
13 14	Force and entering into certain contracts and agreements; and WUEDEAS Virginia's Conital and its related activities and buildings offer a prime apportunity to
14	WHEREAS, Virginia's Capitol and its related activities and buildings offer a prime opportunity to teach Virginians and other visitors about the history and significance of the oldest continuous sitting
16	legislative body in the New World; and
17	WHEREAS, the Capitol Building is the City of Richmond's number one tourist attraction with over
18	200,000 persons attending Capitol tours annually; and
19 20	WHEREAS, a more structured, educational approach for school groups and other visitors may benefit
20 21	members of the General Assembly, legislative staff, the Capitol Police, and the citizens of Virginia; now, therefore, be it
$\frac{21}{22}$	RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the Legislative Support
$\overline{23}$	Commission, two members from the Education Committee of the House of Delegates, appointed by the
24	Speaker of the House in accordance with the principles of proportional representation contained in the
25	Rules of the House of Delegates; and one member of the Senate Committee on Education and Health,
26 27	appointed by the Senate Committee on Privileges and Elections, are requested to examine the educational activities, including Capitol tours, that take place in and around the Capitol for school
28	groups, individual students, seniors, and other visitors.
2 9	In conducting its examination, the group shall determine the problems existing in the current
30	processes for conducting tours and in dealing with the large numbers of students and visitors that come
31	to the Capitol each year, particularly during the legislative sessions when space and member and staff
32	time is limited, and investigate and develop alternatives to the present process for dealing with these
33 34	large crowds. The examination shall approach the Capitol complex as an educational opportunity to
34 35	present its history to visitors and students by providing a quality-controlled, standardized tour so as to enhance the working of the General Assembly by controlling noise, congestion and security during the
36	sessions and interims.
37	The direct costs of this study shall not exceed \$7,500, such costs to be proportionately divided
38	between the Clerk's office of the House of Delegates and the Senate.
39	The Division of Legislative Services shall provide staff support for the study. All agencies of the
40 41	Commonwealth shall provide assistance upon request. The Commission's work shall be completed by November 1, 2001 and written findings and
41 42	recommendations presented to the Governor and the General Assembly as provided in the procedures of
43	the Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents.
44	Implementation of this resolution is subject to subsequent approval and certification by the Joint
45	Rules Committee. The Committee may withhold expenditures or delay the period for the conduct of the
46	study.
