That §§ 22.1-202 and 22.1-208.01 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted, and that 13 the Code of Virginia is amended by adding a section numbered 22.1-202.1 as follows: 14 § 22.1-202. Instruction in history and principles of flags of United States and Virginia; pledge of 15 allegiance to American flag; guidelines developed by the Board. 16 A. Instruction in the history and principles of the flag of the United States and the flag of the 17 Commonwealth shall be given in one or more grades in every school division. The instruction shall 18 include the pledge of allegiance and the appropriate etiquette and conventions for respecting the dignity 19 20 and appropriate display of such flags. In a manner consistent with the laws and constitutions of Virginia and the United States and in 21 22 recognition of the civic heritage of the United States of America, all students shall be required to learn 23 the Pledge of Allegiance and to demonstrate such knowledge. In addition, local school divisions shall 24 ensure that students receive age-appropriate instruction in (i) the recognition of the texts and music to traditional American patriotic songs, including the national anthem, [and appropriate respect therefor,] "America the Beautiful," "God Bless America," "America (My Country 'Tis of Thee)," and "Battle Hymn 25 26 27 of the Republic"; and (ii) the historical significance of patriotic holidays, including Veterans' Day, 28 Memorial Day, Columbus Day, Independence Day, Martin Luther King's birthday, and Presidents' Day. 29 B. To promote compliance with constitutional restrictions as well as observance of constitutional 30 rights, the Board of Education shall, in consultation with the Office of the Attorney General, develop guidelines on constitutional rights and restrictions relating to the recitation of the pledge of allegiance to 31 32 the American flag in public schools. 33 The Board's guidelines shall include, but shall not be limited to, provisions which address the 34 following: the initiative and involvement of local school boards, individual schools, administrators, 35 teachers, and students; the propriety and constitutionality of any recitation or participation requirements; 36 appropriate etiquette and conventions for respecting the dignity and appropriate display of the flag of the 37 United States and the flag of the Commonwealth; and relevant state and federal constitutional concerns, 38 such as freedom of speech and religion. 39 These guidelines shall not be subject to the requirements of the Administrative Process Act 40 (§ 2.2-4000 et seq.). However, to provide appropriate opportunity for involvement by the general public, teachers, and local school boards, the Board of Education shall conduct public hearings prior to 41 establishing such guidelines. Thirty days prior to conducting such hearings, the Board shall give written 42 notice by mail of the date, time, and place of the hearings to all local school boards and any other 43 44 persons requesting to be notified of the hearings and publish notice of its intention to hold such hearings in the Virginia Register of Regulations. Interested parties shall be given reasonable opportunity to be 45 heard and present information prior to the adoption of such guidelines. 46 C. Each school board shall require the daily recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance in each classroom 47 of the school division and shall ensure that the flag of the United States is in place in each such 48 49 classroom. Each school board shall determine the appropriate time during the school day for the recitation of the Pledge. During such Pledge of Allegiance, students shall stand and recite the Pledge 50 51 while facing the flag with their right hands over their hearts or in an appropriate salute if in uniform; 52 however, no student shall be compelled to recite the Pledge if he, his parent or legal guardian objects on 53 religious, philosophical or other grounds to his participating in this exercise. Students who are thus exempt from reciting the Pledge shall remain quietly standing or sitting at their desks while others recite 54 55 the Pledge and shall make no display that disrupts or distracts others who are reciting the Pledge. School boards shall provide appropriate accommodations for students who are unable to comply with the 56 57 procedures described herein due to disability.

58 The school board's code of conduct shall apply to disruptive behavior during the recitation of the

59 Pledge in the same manner as provided for other circumstances of such behavior.

60 D. The Office of the Attorney General shall intervene on behalf of local school boards and shall 61 provide legal defense of the provisions of this section. 62

§ 22.1-202.1. Display of United States flag.

63 The flag of the United States [shall may] be displayed in each public school classroom in the 64 Commonwealth. Local school boards shall develop and implement policies to address the respectful 65 display of the flag; classroom and assembly spaces in which the flag is to be displayed to facilitate instruction regarding the flag and the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance pursuant to § 22.1-202; the 66 identification of spaces, such as resource rooms and other areas, in which the flag need not be 67 displayed; and such other issues as may be deemed necessary and appropriate. 68 69

§ 22.1-208.01. Character education required.

70 A. Each school board shall establish, within its existing programs, a character education program in 71 its schools. The purpose of the character education program shall be to instill in students civic virtues 72 and personal character traits so as to improve the learning environment, promote student achievement, 73 reduce disciplinary problems, and develop civic-minded students of high character. The components of 74 each program shall be developed in cooperation with the students, their parents, and the community at 75 large. The basic character traits taught may include (i) trustworthiness, including honesty, integrity, reliability, and loyalty; (ii) respect, including the precepts of the Golden Rule, tolerance, and courtesy; 76 77 (iii) responsibility, including hard work, economic self-reliance, accountability, diligence, perseverance, and self-control; (iv) fairness, including justice, consequences of bad behavior, principles of nondiscrimination, and freedom from prejudice; (v) caring, including kindness, empathy, compassion, 78 79 80 consideration, generosity, and charity; and (vi).

81 Character education shall include instruction in citizenship, including patriotism; the Pledge of 82 Allegiance;; respect for the American flag;; concern for the common good;; respect for authority and the 83 law;; appreciation for the unique nature of the American culture's valuing of and belief in freedom and 84 respect for individual rights and liberties, including political, economic, and religious freedom, and freedom of speech, as contrasted with other societies' and cultures' lacking of such freedoms; and 85 community-mindedness. Such citizenship concepts shall be incorporated in appropriate portions of the 86 87 K-12 curriculum, including the Standards of Learning.

88 Classroom instruction may be used to supplement a character education program; however, each 89 program shall be interwoven into the school procedures and environment and structured to instruct 90 primarily through example, illustration, and participation, in such a way as to complement the Standards 91 of Learning.

92 This provision is intended to educate students regarding those core civic values and virtues which are 93 efficacious to civilized society and are common to the diverse social, cultural, and religious groups of 94 the Commonwealth. Nothing herein shall be construed as requiring or authorizing the indoctrination in 95 any particular religious or political belief.

96 B. The Board of Education shall establish criteria for character education programs, consistent with 97 the provisions of this section. To assist school divisions in implementing character education programs 98 and practices that are designed to promote the development of personal qualities as set forth in this 99 section and the Standards of Quality and that will improve family and community involvement in the public schools, the Board of Education shall also establish, within the Department of Education, the 100 101 Commonwealth Character Initiative. The Board shall provide resources and technical assistance to school 102 divisions regarding successful character education programs and shall (i) identify and analyze effective character education programs and practices and (ii) collect and disseminate among school divisions 103 information regarding such programs and practices and potential funding and support sources. The Board 104 105 may also provide resources supporting professional development for administrators and teachers in the 106 delivery of any character education programs.

107 C. The Board of Education shall award, with such funds as are appropriated for this purpose, grants 108 to school boards for the implementation of innovative character education programs.
