Report. 6 Patrons Prior to Engrossment-Senators Houck, Hanger and Rerras; Delegates: Darner, Hamilton, Landes, McDonnell, Morgan, Rapp and Tata 7 8 Referred to Committee on Rules 9 10 WHEREAS, upon the recommendations of the Virginia Commission on Youth's Study of Children and Youth with Serious Emotional Disturbances Requiring Out-of-Home Placement, House Joint 11 Resolution No. 119 (2000), and the Committee Studying Treatment Options for Offenders with Mental 12 Illness or Substance Abuse Disorders, Senate Joint Resolution No. 440 (2001), the Virginia Commission 13 14 on Youth was directed to study treatment options for offenders with mental illness or substance abuse disorders, pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution No. 99 (2002); and 15 WHEREAS, Senate Joint Resolution No. 99 (2002) also directed the Virginia Commission on Youth 16 to coordinate the collection and dissemination of empirically based information that identifies effective 17 treatment modalities and practices for children, including juvenile offenders with mental health treatment 18 19 needs, symptoms, and disorders; and 20 WHEREAS, to accomplish its work, the Commission appointed representatives to a special study 21 committee, the SJR 99 Advisory Group, to study effective treatment modalities for children with mental 22 disorders, and the Advisory Group met 4 times to receive public comment from consumers, family 23 members, advocates, criminal justice professionals, treatment providers, academic faculty, and other 24 experts; and 25 WHEREAS, in addition to the SJR 99 Advisory Group, the Commission convened a smaller clinical 26 group, which met 7 times to provide specialized expertise and guidance on the substantive aspects of the 27 collection of evidence based treatment modalities for children and adolescents with mental health 28 treatment needs: and 29 WHEREAS, the members of the SJR 99 Advisory Group and Clinical Group have acquired 30 considerable expertise in the treatment needs of children with mental health disorders, and noted that 31 nationally and in Virginia, increased attention has been given to children's mental health and the 32 development of systems of care for children with serious emotional disorders; and 33 WHEREAS, family members, practitioners, and researchers have become increasingly aware that 34 mental health services are an important and necessary support for young children and their families who 35 experience mental, emotional, or behavioral challenges; and 36 WHEREAS, child and adolescent mental health has emerged as a distinct area for service delivery, 37 drawing on the philosophies and practices that characterize other childhood fields, such as early 38 intervention; and 39 WHEREAS, according to estimates by the Virginia Department of Mental Health, Mental 40 Retardation, and Substance Abuse Services, each year more than 75,000 children experience the 41 disabling symptoms of serious mental illness or emotional disturbance; and WHEREAS, there has been a mounting interest in evaluating and developing empirically supported 42 43 treatments for children in response to the noted prevalence of these problems with children; and 44 WHEREAS, the Commonwealth and its localities spend a substantial amount of money each year to 45 provide mental health and substance abuse treatment services to children and adolescents, and the lack of information regarding the effectiveness of such services results in failed treatments and wasted 46 47 resources; and 48 WHEREAS, over the past 30 years, there has been a movement calling for improvement in the 49 "quality of evidence" in studies that claim to benefit children; and 50 WHEREAS, current emphasis on evidence-based practices for mental health treatments indicates that 51 such practices promote effective use of resources, improve the clinician's knowledge, and allow for the 52 identification of health care methods that have been evaluated for effectiveness; and WHEREAS, increased awareness of mental health issues, the demand for the best medical treatment 53 54 at affordable prices, and emphasis on evidence based practices are reasonable and justifiable consumer 55 responses that may provide cost savings; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Delegates concurring. That the Virginia Commission on 56 57 Youth, or its successor in interest, be directed to make empirically based information concerning

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58 effective treatment modalities and practices for children available through the Internet. The Commission

59 shall seek the assistance of the SJR 99 Advisory Group, the Secretary of Health and Human Resources, 60 the Secretary of Public Safety, and the Secretary of Education in posting, maintaining, and biennially

60 the Secretary of Public Safety, and the Secretary of Éducation in posting, maintaining, and biennially 61 updating this information. Such information shall include effective, empirically based, treatment

62 modalities and practices for [children, including] juvenile offenders with mental health treatment needs,

63 symptoms, and disorders; and, be it

RESOLVED FURTHER, That agencies of the Secretariat of Health and Human Resources that
deliver services to children, the Department of Education, and the Department of Juvenile Justice shall
also post this information on their respective websites, provide for the dissemination of the information
in as efficient and cost-effective manner as possible, and ensure access to the information by consumers,
family members, advocates, mental health policy makers, and other interested persons.

69 The Virginia Commission on Youth, or its successor in interest, shall submit to the Division of 70 Legislative Automated Systems an executive summary and report of its progress in meeting the 71 directives of this resolution no later than the first day of the 2004 Regular Session of the General 72 Assembly. The executive summary and report shall be submitted as provided in the procedures of the 73 Division of Legislative Automated Systems for the processing of legislative documents and reports and 74 shell be proted on the Control Assembly whether

74 shall be posted on the General Assembly's website.
