Othercomments: Duringthelegislativedebates, opponents of the billar gued that it would make the Commonweal thrulner able to law suits, because it sets up an 'irrefutable presumption' based on a nundefined class. Because the recurrently exists a very clear, highly regulated process for qualifying for in -state tuition, it is problematic to forbida class of individuals from being able to make an evidentiary showing, in effect preventing them from using the process that is in place. This argument has prevailed in several legal cases over the last few years. It was also noted that the bill would pose a problem for the private in stitutions and the Tuition Assistance Grant program, as well as for public in stitutions of higher education.
