13	1. That §§ 16.1-266, 16.1-343, 32.1-127.1:03, 37.1-67.3, 37.1-134.9, 37.1-134.12, and 37.1-134.21 of
14	the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted as follows:
15	§ 16.1-266. Appointment of counsel and guardian ad litem.
16	A. Prior to the hearing by the court of any case involving a child who is alleged to be abused or
17	neglected or who is the subject of an entrustment agreement or a petition seeking termination of residual
18	parental rights or who is otherwise before the court pursuant to subdivision A 4 of § 16.1-241 or
19	§ 63.2-1230, the court shall appoint a discreet and competent attorney-at-law as guardian ad litem to
20 21	represent the child pursuant to § 16.1-266.1.
²¹ 22	B. Prior to the detention review hearing or the adjudicatory or transfer hearing by the court of any case involving a child who is alleged to be in need of services, in need of supervision or delinquent,
$\frac{22}{23}$	such child and his parent, guardian, legal custodian or other person standing in loco parentis shall be
23 24	informed by a judge, clerk or probation officer of the child's right to coursel and of the liability of the
25	parent, guardian, legal custodian or other person standing in loco parentis for the costs of such legal
26	services pursuant to § 16.1-267 and be given an opportunity to:
27	1. Obtain and employ counsel of the child's own choice; or
28	2. If the court determines that the child is indigent within the contemplation of the law pursuant to

51	guardian fails to appear, the court shall consider appointing an attorney-at-law to represent the interests
52 53	of the absent parent or guardian, and the hearing may be held.
55 54	Prior to a hearing at which a child is the subject of an initial foster care plan filed pursuant to § 16.1-281, a foster care review hearing pursuant to § 16.1-282 and a permanency planning hearing
54 55	pursuant to § 16.1-282.1, the court shall consider appointing counsel to represent the child's parent or
55 56	guardian.
57	D. In those cases described in subsections A, B and C which in the discretion of the court require

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counsel or a guardian ad litem to represent the child or children or the parent or guardian or other adult

59 party in addition to the representation provided in those subsections, a discreet and competent 60 attorney-at-law may be appointed by the court as counsel or a guardian ad litem.

61 E. In all other cases which in the discretion of the court require counsel or a guardian ad litem, or 62 both, to represent the child or children or the parent or guardian, discreet and competent attorneys-at-law 63 may be appointed by the court. However, in cases where the custody of a child or children is the subject 64 of controversy or requires determination and each of the parents or other persons claiming a right to 65 custody is represented by counsel, the court shall not appoint counsel or a guardian ad litem to represent the interests of the child or children unless the court finds, at any stage in the proceedings in a specific 66 case, that the interests of the child or children are not otherwise adequately represented. 67

F. Any state or local agency, department, authority or institution and any school, hospital, physician 68 69 or other health or mental health care provider shall permit a guardian ad litem or counsel for the child 70 appointed pursuant to this section to inspect and copy, without the consent of the child or his parents, 71 any records relating to the child whom the guardian or counsel represents upon presentation by him of a copy of the court order appointing him or a court order specifically allowing him such access. Upon 72 request therefor by the guardian ad litem or counsel for the child made at least 72 hours in advance, a 73 mental health care provider shall make himself available to conduct a review and interpretation of the 74 75 child's treatment records which are specifically related to the investigation. Such a request may be made in lieu of or in addition to inspection and copying of the records. 76 77

§ 16.1-343. Involuntary commitment; duties of attorney for the minor.

78 As far as possible in advance of a hearing conducted under § 16.1-344, or an appeal from such a 79 hearing, the minor's attorney shall interview the minor; the minor's parent, if available; the petitioner; 80 and the qualified evaluator. He shall interview all other material witnesses, and examine all relevant 81 diagnostic and other reports.

Any state or local agency, department, authority or institution and any school, hospital, physician or 82 83 other health or mental health care provider shall permit the attorney appointed pursuant to this article 84 to inspect and copy, without the consent of the minor or his parents, any records relating to the minor 85 whom the attorney represents.

86 The obligation of the minor's attorney during the hearing or appeal is to interview witnesses, obtain 87 independent experts when possible, cross-examine adverse witnesses, present witnesses on behalf of the 88 minor, articulate the wishes of the minor, and otherwise fully represent the minor in the proceeding. 89 Counsel appointed by the court shall be compensated in an amount not to exceed \$100. 90

§ 32.1-127.1:03. Health records privacy.

91 A. There is hereby recognized a patient's an individual's right of privacy in the content of a patient's 92 medical record his health records. Patient Health records are the property of the provider health care 93 entity maintaining them, and, except when permitted by this section or by another provision of state or federal law, no provider health care entity, or other person working in a health care setting, may 94 95 disclose the an individual's health records of a patient.

96 Patient Health records shall not be removed from the premises where they are maintained without the 97 approval of the provider health care entity that maintains such health records, except in accordance with 98 a court order or subpoena consistent with § 8.01-413 C or with this section or in accordance with the 99 regulations relating to change of ownership of *patient health* records promulgated by a health regulatory 100 board established in Title 54.1.

101 No person to whom disclosure of patient health records was made by a patient or a provider are 102 disclosed shall redisclose or otherwise reveal the *health* records of a patient an individual, beyond the 103 purpose for which such disclosure was made, without first obtaining the patient's individual's specific consent authorization to such redisclosure. This redisclosure prohibition shall not, however, prevent (i) 104 any provider health care entity who receives health records from another provider health care entity 105 from making subsequent disclosures as permitted under this section and the federal Department of 106 107 Health and Human Services regulations relating to the electronic transmission of data and patient privacy 108 protected health information promulgated by the United States Department of Health and Human Services as required by the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA) (42 109 U.S.C. § 1320d et seq.) or (ii) any provider health care entity from furnishing health records and 110 aggregate or other data, from which patient- individually identifying prescription information has been 111 removed, encoded or encrypted, to qualified researchers, including, but not limited to, pharmaceutical 112 113 manufacturers and their agents or contractors, for purposes of clinical, pharmaco-epidemiological, 114 pharmaco-economic, or other health services research. 115

B. As used in this section:

116 "Agent" means a person who has been appointed as a patient's an individual's agent under a power 117 of attorney for health care or an advance directive under the Health Care Decisions Act (§ 54.1-2981 et 118 seq.).

119 'Certification" means a written representation that is delivered by hand, by first-class mail, by 120 overnight delivery service, or by facsimile if the sender obtains a facsimile-machine-generated 121 confirmation reflecting that all facsimile pages were successfully transmitted.

122 "Guardian" means a court-appointed guardian of the person.

123 "Health services" includes, but is not limited to, examination, diagnosis, evaluation, treatment, 124 pharmaceuticals, aftercare, habilitation or rehabilitation and mental health therapy of any kind."Parent" 125 means a biological, adoptive or foster parent.

126 "Patient" means a person who is receiving or has received health services from a provider.

127 "Patient identifying prescription information" means all prescriptions, drug orders or any other 128 prescription information that specifically identifies an individual patient.

129 "Health care clearinghouse" means, consistent with the definition set out in 45 C.F.R. § 160.103, a public or private entity, such as a billing service, repricing company, community health management 130 information system or community health information system, and "value-added" networks and switches, 131 132 that performs either of the following functions: (i) processes or facilitates the processing of health information received from another entity in a nonstandard format or containing nonstandard data 133 134 content into standard data elements or a standard transaction; or (ii) receives a standard transaction 135 from another entity and processes or facilitates the processing of health information into nonstandard format or nonstandard data content for the receiving entity. 136

137 "Health care entity" means any health care provider, health plan or health care clearinghouse.

138 "ProviderHealth care provider" shall have the same meaning as set forth means those entities listed 139 in the definition of "health care provider" in § 8.01-581.1, except that state-operated facilities shall also **140** be considered *health care* providers for the purposes of this section. Provider Health care provider shall 141 also include all persons who are licensed, certified, registered or permitted by any of the health 142 regulatory boards within the Department of Health Professions, except persons regulated by the Board of 143 Funeral Directors and Embalmers or the Board of Veterinary Medicine.

144 "Health plan" means an individual or group plan that provides, or pays the cost of, medical care. 145 "Health plan" shall include any entity included in such definition as set out in 45 C.F.R. § 160.103.

146 "RecordHealth record" means any written, printed or electronically recorded material maintained by a 147 provider health care entity in the course of providing health services to a patient an individual 148 concerning the patient individual and the services provided. "RecordHealth record" also includes the 149 substance of any communication made by a patient an individual to a provider health care entity in 150 confidence during or in connection with the provision of health services to a patient or information 151 otherwise acquired by the provider health care entity about a patient an individual in confidence and in 152 connection with the provision of health services to the patient individual.

153 "Health services" means, but shall not be limited to, examination, diagnosis, evaluation, treatment, 154 pharmaceuticals, aftercare, habilitation or rehabilitation and mental health therapy of any kind, as well 155 as payment or reimbursement for any such services.

156 "Individual" means a patient who is receiving or has received health services from a health care 157 entity.

158 "Individually identifying prescription information" means all prescriptions, drug orders or any other 159 prescription information that specifically identifies an individual.

160 "Parent" means a biological, adoptive or foster parent.

161 C. Except as specifically provided herein, the provisions of this section shall not apply to any of the 162 following:

163 1. The status of and release of information governed by §§ 65.2-604 and 65.2-607 of the Virginia 164 Workers' Compensation Act; 165

2. Except where specifically provided herein. The *health* records of minor patients minors; or

166 3. The release of juvenile *health* records to a secure facility or a shelter care facility pursuant to 167 § 16.1-248.3. 168

D. Providers Health care entities may disclose the health records of a patient:

169 1. As set forth in subsection E of this section, pursuant to the written consent authorization of the 170 patient individual or in the case of a minor patient, his custodial parent, guardian or other person 171 authorized to consent to treatment of minors pursuant to § 54.1-2969; also, in emergency cases or 172 situations where it is impractical to obtain the patient's an individual's written consent authorization, 173 pursuant to the patient's individual's oral consent authorization for a health care provider or health plan 174 to discuss the patient's *individual's health* records with a third party specified by the patient *individual*;

175 2. In compliance with a subpoena issued in accord with subsection H of this section, pursuant to 176 court order upon good cause shown or in compliance with a subpoena issued pursuant to subsection C 177 of § 8.01-413;

3. In accord with subsection F of § 8.01-399 including, but not limited to, situations where disclosure 178 179 is reasonably necessary to establish or collect a fee or to defend a provider health care entity or the 180 provider's health care entity's employees or staff against any accusation of wrongful conduct; also as 181 required in the course of an investigation, audit, review or proceedings regarding a provider's health

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182 care entity's conduct by a duly authorized law-enforcement, licensure, accreditation, or professional 183 review entity:

184 4. In testimony in accordance with §§ 8.01-399 and 8.01-400.2;

185 5. In compliance with the provisions of \S 8.01-413;

6. As required or authorized by law relating to public health activities, health oversight activities, 186 187 serious threats to health or safety, or abuse, neglect or domestic violence, relating to contagious disease, 188 public safety, and suspected child or adult abuse reporting requirements, including, but not limited to, those contained in §§ 32.1-36, 32.1-36.1, 32.1-40, 32.1-41, 32.1-127.1:04, 32.1-276.5, 32.1-283, 32.1-283.1, 37.1-98.2, 53.1-40.10, 54.1-2403.3, 54.1-2506, 54.1-2906, 54.1-2907, 54.1-2966, 189 190 191 54.1-2966.1, 54.1-2967, 54.1-2968, 63.2-1606 and 63.2-1509;

192 7. Where necessary in connection with the care of the patient individual, including in the 193 implementation of a hospital routine contact process for organ donation pursuant to subdivision B. 4. of 194 § 32.1-127;

195 8. In the normal course of business in accordance with accepted standards of practice within the 196 health services setting; however, the maintenance, storage, and disclosure of the mass of prescription 197 dispensing records maintained in a pharmacy registered or permitted in Virginia shall only be accomplished in compliance with §§ 54.1-3410, 54.1-3411 and 54.1-3412; 198 199

9. When the patient individual has waived his right to the privacy of the medical health records;

200 10. When examination and evaluation of a patient an individual are undertaken pursuant to judicial 201 or administrative law order, but only to the extent as required by such order;

202 11. To the guardian ad litem and any attorney representing the respondent in the course of a 203 guardianship proceeding of an adult patient authorized who is the respondent in a proceeding under 204 Article 1.1 (§ 37.1-134.6 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 37.1;

205 12. To the attorney appointed by the court to represent a patient in an individual who is or has been 206 a patient who was the subject of a civil commitment proceeding under § 37.1-67.3 or a judicial authorization for treatment proceeding pursuant to § 37.1-134.21; 207

208 13. To the attorney and/or guardian ad litem of a minor patient who represents such minor in any 209 judicial or administrative proceeding, provided that if the court or administrative hearing officer has 210 entered an order granting the attorney or guardian ad litem this right and such attorney or guardian ad litem presents evidence to the provider health care entity of such order: 211

212 14. With regard to the Court-Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) program, a minor's *health* records 213 in accord with § 9.1-156;

214 15. To an agent appointed under a patient's an individual's power of attorney or to an agent or 215 decision maker designated in a patient's an individual's advance directive for health care or for decisions 216 on anatomical gifts and organ, tissue or eye donation or to any other person consistent with the 217 provisions of the Health Care Decisions Act (§ 54.1-2981 et seq.);

16. To third-party payors and their agents for purposes of reimbursement;

219 17. As is necessary to support an application for receipt of health care benefits from a governmental 220 agency or as required by an authorized governmental agency reviewing such application or reviewing 221 benefits already provided or as necessary to the coordination of prevention and control of disease, 222 injury, or disability and delivery of such health care benefits pursuant to § 32.1-127.1:04;

18. Upon the sale of a medical practice as provided in § 54.1-2405; or upon a change of ownership 223 224 or closing of a pharmacy pursuant to regulations of the Board of Pharmacy;

225 19. In accord with § 54.1-2400.1 B, to communicate a patient's an individual's specific and 226 immediate threat to cause serious bodily injury or death of an identified or readily identifiable person;

227 20. To the patient individual who is the subject of the health record, except as provided in subsections E and F of this section and subsection B of § 8.01-413; 228

21. In the case of substance abuse records, when permitted by and in conformity with requirements of federal law found in 42 U.S.C. § 290dd-2 and 42 C.F.R. Part 2; 229 230

231 22. In connection with the work of any entity established as set forth in § 8.01-581.16 to evaluate the 232 adequacy or quality of professional services or the competency and qualifications for professional staff 233 privileges:

234 23. If the *health* records are those of a deceased or mentally incapacitated patient *individual* to the 235 personal representative or executor of the deceased patient individual or the legal guardian or committee 236 of the incompetent or incapacitated patient individual or if there is no personal representative, executor, 237 legal guardian or committee appointed, to the following persons in the following order of priority: a spouse, an adult son or daughter, either parent, an adult brother or sister, or any other relative of the 238 239 deceased patient individual in order of blood relationship;

24. For the purpose of conducting record reviews of inpatient hospital deaths to promote identification of all potential organ, eye, and tissue donors in conformance with the requirements of 240 241 242 applicable federal law and regulations, including 42 C.F.R. § 482.45, (i) to the health care provider's 243 designated organ procurement organization certified by the United States Health Care Financing

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Administration and (ii) to any eye bank or tissue bank in Virginia certified by the Eye Bank Associationof America or the American Association of Tissue Banks;

246 25. To the Office of the Inspector General for Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance247 Abuse Services pursuant to Chapter 16 (§ 37.1-255 et seq.) of Title 37.1;

248 26. (Expires July 1, 2006) To an entity participating in the activities of a local health partnership authority established pursuant to Article 6.1 (§ 32.1-122.10:001 et seq.) of Chapter 4 of Title 32.1, pursuant to subdivision D 1 of this section; and

27. To law-enforcement officials by each licensed emergency medical services agency, (i) when the patient *individual* is the victim of a crime or (ii) when the patient *individual* has been arrested and has received emergency medical services or has refused emergency medical services and the *health* records consist of the prehospital patient care report required by § 32.1-116.1.

255 E. Requests for copies of medical *health* records shall (i) be in writing, dated and signed by the 256 requester; (ii) identify the nature of the information requested; and (iii) include evidence of the authority 257 of the requester to receive such copies and identification of the person to whom the information is to be 258 disclosed. The provider health care entity shall accept a photocopy, facsimile, or other copy of the original signed by the requestor as if it were an original. Within 15 days of receipt of a request for 259 260 copies of medical health records, the provider health care entity shall do one of the following: (i) furnish such copies to any requester authorized to receive them; (ii) inform the requester if the 261 262 information does not exist or cannot be found; (iii) if the provider health care entity does not maintain a 263 record of the information, so inform the requester and provide the name and address, if known, of the 264 provider health care entity who maintains the record; or (iv) deny the request (a) under subsection F, (b) 265 on the grounds that the requester has not established his authority to receive such *health* records or 266 proof of his identity, or (c) as otherwise provided by law. Procedures set forth in this section shall apply 267 only to requests for *health* records not specifically governed by other provisions of this Code, federal 268 law or state or federal regulation.

269 F. Except as provided in subsection B of § 8.01-413, copies of a patient's an individual's health 270 records shall not be furnished to such patient *individual* or anyone authorized to act on the patient's 271 individual's behalf where when the patient's attending individual's treating physician or the patient's 272 individual's treating clinical psychologist has made a part of the patient's individual's record a written 273 statement that, in his opinion the exercise of his professional judgment, the furnishing to or review by 274 the patient individual of such health records would be injurious reasonably likely to endanger the 275 patient's health or well-being life or physical safety of the individual or another person, or that such 276 health record makes reference to a person who is not a health care provider and the access requested 277 would be reasonably likely to cause substantial harm to such referenced person. If any custodian of 278 medical records health care entity denies a request for copies of health records based on such statement, 279 the custodian shall permit examination and copying of the medical record by another such physician or 280 elinical psychologist selected by the patient health care entity shall inform the individual of the 281 individual's right to designate, in writing, at his own expense, another reviewing physician or clinical 282 *psychologist*, whose licensure, training and experience relative to the patient's *individual's* condition are 283 at least equivalent to that of the physician or clinical psychologist upon whose opinion the denial is based. The person or entity denying the request shall inform the patient of the patient's right to select 284 285 another reviewing physician or clinical psychologist under this subsection who designated reviewing 286 physician or clinical psychologist shall make a judgment as to whether to make the health record 287 available to the patient *individual*.

288 The health care entity denving the request shall also inform the individual of the individual's right to 289 request in writing that such health care entity designate, at its own expense, a physician or clinical 290 psychologist, whose licensure, training, and experience relative to the individual's condition are at least 291 equivalent to that of the physician or clinical psychologist upon whose professional judgment the denial 292 is based and who did not participate in the original decision to deny the health records, who shall make 293 a judgment as to whether to make the health record available to the individual. The health care entity 294 shall comply with the judgment of the reviewing physician or clinical psychologist. The health care 295 entity shall permit copying and examination of the health record by such other physician or clinical 296 psychologist designated by either the individual at his own expense or by the health care entity at its 297 expense.

Any health record copied for review by the any such designated physician or clinical psychologist selected by the patient shall be accompanied by a statement from the custodian of the health record that the patient's attending individual's treating physician or clinical psychologist determined that the patient's individual's review of his health record would be injurious to the patient's health or well-being reasonably likely to endanger the life or physical safety of the individual or would be reasonably likely to cause substantial harm to a person referenced in the health record who is not a health care provider.
G. A written consent authorization to allow release of patient an individual's health records may, but

334	information disclosed under this authorization might be redisclosed by a recipient is a provider who
335	makes a disclosure permitted by law and may, as a result of such disclosure, no longer be protected to
336	the same extent as such health information was protected by law while solely in the possession of the
337	health care entity.

345	1. Unless excepted from these provisions in subdivision 9, no party to a civil, criminal or
346	administrative action or proceeding shall request the issuance of a subpoena duces tecum for another
347	party's medical health records or cause a subpoena duces tecum to be issued by an attorney unless a
348	copy of the request for the subpoena or a copy of the attorney-issued subpoena is provided to the other
349	party's counsel or to the other party if pro se, simultaneously with filing the request or issuance of the
350	subpoena. No party to an action or proceeding shall request or cause the issuance of a subpoena duces
351	tecum for the medical health records of a nonparty witness unless a copy of the request for the
352	subpoena or a copy of the attorney-issued subpoena is provided to the nonparty witness simultaneously
353	with filing the request or issuance of the attorney-issued subpoena.
354	No subpoena duces tecum for medical health records shall set a return date earlier than 15 days from
355	the date of the subpoena except by order of a court or administrative agency for good cause shown.

In instances where medical *health* records being subpoended are those of a pro se party or nonparty

 witness together with the copy of the request for subpoend, or a copy of the subpoend in the case of an

attorney-issued subpoena, a statement informing them of their rights and remedies. The statement shallinclude the following language and the heading shall be in boldface capital letters:

367 NOTICE TO **PATIENT***INDIVIDUAL*

The attached document means that (insert name of party requesting or causing issuance of the 368 369 subpoena) has either asked the court or administrative agency to issue a subpoena or a subpoena has 370 been issued by the other party's attorney to your doctor Θ , other health care providers (names of health 371 care providers inserted here) or other health care entity (name of health care entity to be inserted here) 372 requiring them to produce your medical health records. Your doctor or, other health care provider or 373 other health care entity is required to respond by providing a copy of your medical health records. If you believe your health records should not be disclosed and object to their disclosure, you have the 374 375 right to file a motion with the clerk of the court or the administrative agency to quash the subpoena. If 376 you elect to file a motion to quash, such motion must be filed within 15 days of the date of the request 377 or of the attorney-issued subpoena. You may contact the clerk's office or the administrative agency to 378 determine the requirements that must be satisfied when filing a motion to quash and you may elect to 379 contact an attorney to represent your interest. If you elect to file a motion to quash, you must notify 380 your doctor or, other health care provider(s), or other health care entity, that you are filing the motion 381 so that the *health care* provider or *health care entity* knows to send the *health* records to the clerk of 382 court or administrative agency in a sealed envelope or package for safekeeping while your motion is 383 decided.

398 THAT THE TIME FOR FILING A MOTION TO QUASH HAS ELAPSED AND THAT:

400 ANY MOTION TO QUASH HAS BEEN RESOLVED BY THE COURT OR THE 401 ADMINISTRATIVE AGENCY AND THE DISCLOSURES SOUGHT ARE CONSISTENT WITH 402 SUCH RESOLUTION.

403 IF YOU RECEIVE NOTICE THAT YOUR PATIENT THE INDIVIDUAL WHOSE HEALTH
404 RECORDS ARE BEING REQUESTED HAS FILED A MOTION TO QUASH THIS SUBPOENA, OR
405 IF YOU FILE A MOTION TO QUASH THIS SUBPOENA, YOU MUST SEND THE HEALTH
406 RECORDS ONLY TO THE CLERK OF THE COURT OR ADMINISTRATIVE AGENCY THAT
407 ISSUED THE SUBPOENA OR IN WHICH THE ACTION IS PENDING AS SHOWN ON THE
408 SUBPOENA USING THE FOLLOWING PROCEDURE:

In the event the court or 431 administrative agency grants the motion to quash, the *health* records shall be returned to the health care 432 provider entity in the same sealed envelope in which they were delivered to the court or administrative 433 agency. In the event that a judge or administrative agency orders the sealed envelope to be opened to 434 review the *health* records in camera, a copy of the order shall accompany any *health* records returned to 435 the provider health care entity. The health records returned to the provider health care entity shall be in 436 a securely sealed envelope.

5. If no motion to quash is filed within 15 days of the date of the request or of the attorney-issued subpoena, the party on whose behalf the subpoena was issued shall have the duty to certify to the subpoenaed health care provider entity that the time for filing a motion to quash has elapsed and that no motion to quash was filed. Any provider health care entity receiving such certification shall have the duty to comply with the subpoena duces tecum by returning the specified medical health records by either the return date on the subpoena or 5 days after receipt of the certification, whichever is later.

443 6. In the event that the individual whose *health* records are being sought files a motion to quash the 444 subpoena, the court or administrative agency shall decide whether good cause has been shown by the 445 discovering party to compel disclosure of the patient's private individual's health records over the 446 patient's individual's objections. Concurrent with the court or administrative agency's resolution of a motion to quash, if 451 452 subpoenaed medical health records have been submitted by a health care provider entity to the court or 453 administrative agency in a sealed envelope, the court or administrative agency shall: (i) upon 454 determining that no submitted medical health records should be disclosed, return all submitted medical 455 *health* records to the provider *health care entity* in a sealed envelope; (ii) upon determining that all 456 submitted medical health records should be disclosed, provide all the submitted medical health records 457 to the party on whose behalf the subpoena was issued; or (iii) upon determining that only a portion of 458 the submitted medical health records should be disclosed, provide such portion to the party on whose 459 behalf the subpoena was issued and return the remaining medical health records to the provider health 460 *care entity* in a sealed envelope.

461 8. Following the court or administrative agency's resolution of a motion to quash, the party on whose
462 behalf the subpoena duces tecum was issued shall have the duty to certify in writing to the subpoenaed
463 health care provider *entity* a statement of one of the following:

a. All filed motions to quash have been resolved by the court or administrative agency and the
disclosures sought in the subpoena duces tecum are consistent with such resolution; and, therefore, the
medical *health* records previously delivered in a sealed envelope to the clerk of the court or
administrative agency will not be returned to the provider *health care entity*;

b. All filed motions to quash have been resolved by the court or administrative agency and the
disclosures sought in the subpoena duces tecum are consistent with such resolution and that, since no
medical *health* records have previously been delivered to the court or administrative agency by the
provider *health care entity*, the provider *health care entity* shall comply with the subpoena duces tecum
by returning the medical *health* records designated in the subpoena by the return date on the subpoena
or five days after receipt of certification, whichever is later;

c. All filed motions to quash have been resolved by the court or administrative agency and the disclosures sought in the subpoena duces tecum are not consistent with such resolution; therefore, no medical *health* records shall be disclosed and all medical *health* records previously delivered in a sealed envelope to the clerk of the court or administrative agency will be returned to the provider *health care entity*;

479 d. All filed motions to quash have been resolved by the court or administrative agency and the 480 disclosures sought in the subpoena duces tecum are not consistent with such resolution and that only 481 limited disclosure has been authorized. The certification shall state that only the portion of the *health* records as set forth in the certification, consistent with the court or administrative agency's ruling, shall 482 483 be disclosed. The certification shall also state that medical health records that were previously delivered **484** to the court or administrative agency for which disclosure has been authorized will not be returned to the provider health care entity; however, all medical health records for which disclosure has not been 485 486 authorized will be returned to the provider health care entity; or

487 e. All filed motions to quash have been resolved by the court or administrative agency and the

disclosures sought in the subpoena duces tecum are not consistent with such resolution and, since no
medical *health* records have previously been delivered to the court or administrative agency by the

508 I. Providers Health care entities may testify about the medical health records of a patient an individual in compliance with §§ 8.01-399 and 8.01-400.2.

510 § 37.1-67.3. Same; involuntary admission and treatment.

A. The commitment hearing shall be held within forty-eight hours of the execution of the temporary
detention order as provided for in § 37.1-67.1; however, if the forty-eight-hour period herein specified
terminates on a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday, or day on which the court is lawfully closed, such
person may be detained, as herein provided, until the next day that is not a Saturday, Sunday, legal
holiday or day on which the court is lawfully closed.

516 B. The judge, in commencing the commitment hearing, shall inform the person whose involuntary 517 admission is being sought of his right to apply for voluntary admission and treatment as provided for in 518 § 37.1-65 and shall afford such person an opportunity for voluntary admission. The judge shall ascertain 519 if such person is then willing and capable of seeking voluntary admission and treatment. If the person is 520 capable and willingly accepts voluntary admission and treatment, the judge shall require him to accept 521 voluntary admission for a minimum period of treatment and after such minimum period, not to exceed 522 seventy-two hours, to give the hospital forty-eight hours' notice prior to leaving the hospital, during 523 which notice period he shall not be discharged, unless sooner discharged pursuant to § 37.1-98 or 524 § 37.1-99. 527 C. If a person is incapable of accepting or unwilling to accept voluntary admission and treatment, the 528 judge shall inform such person of his right to a commitment hearing and right to counsel. The judge 529 shall ascertain if a person whose admission is sought is represented by counsel, and if he is not 530 represented by counsel, the judge shall appoint an attorney-at-law to represent him. However, if such 531 person requests an opportunity to employ counsel, the court shall give him a reasonable opportunity to 532 employ counsel at his own expense.

533 D. A written explanation of the involuntary commitment process and the statutory protections 534 associated with the process shall be given to the person and its contents explained by an attorney prior 535 to the commitment hearing. The written explanation shall include, at a minimum, an explanation of the 536 person's right to retain private counsel or be represented by a court-appointed attorney, to present any 537 defenses including independent evaluation and expert testimony or the testimony of other witnesses, to 538 be present during the hearing and testify, to appeal any certification for involuntary admission to the circuit court, and to have a jury trial on appeal. E. To the extent possible, during or before the commitment hearing, the attorney for the person whose admission is sought shall interview his client, the petitioner, the examiner described below, the community services board staff, and any other material witnesses. He shall also examine all relevant diagnostic and other reports, present evidence and witnesses, if any, on his client's behalf, and otherwise actively represent his client in the proceedings. *A health care provider shall disclose or make available all such reports, treatment information and records concerning his client to the attorney, upon request.* The role of the attorney shall be to represent the wishes of his client, to the extent possible.

548 F. The petitioner shall be given adequate notice of the place, date, and time of the commitment

hearing. The petitioner shall be entitled to retain counsel at his own expense, to be present during the
hearing, and to testify and present evidence. The petitioner shall be encouraged but shall not be required
to testify at the hearing and the person whose admission is sought shall not be released solely on the
basis of the petitioner's failure to attend or testify during the hearing.

553 G. 566 All such examinations shall be conducted in private. The judge shall summons the examiner who 567 shall certify that he has personally examined the individual and has probable cause to believe that the 568 individual (i) is or is not so seriously mentally ill as to be substantially unable to care for himself, or 569 (ii) does or does not present an imminent danger to himself or others as a result of mental illness, and 570 (iii) requires or does not require involuntary hospitalization or treatment. Alternatively, the judge, in his 571 discretion, may accept written certification of the examiner's findings if the examination has been personally made within the preceding five days and if there is no objection sustained to the acceptance 572 573 of such written certification by the person or his attorney. The judge shall not render any decision on 574 the petition until such examiner has presented his report either orally or in writing.

575 *H*. Except as otherwise provided in this section, prior to making any adjudication that such person is 576 mentally ill and shall be confined to an institution pursuant to this section, the judge shall require from 577 the community services board which serves the political subdivision where the person resides a 578 prescreening report, and the board or clinic shall provide such a report within forty-eight hours or if the 579 forty-eight-hour period terminates on a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday or day on which the court is 580 lawfully closed, the next day that is not a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday or day on which the court is 581 lawfully closed. If it is impossible or impractical to obtain a prescreening report from the community 582 services board which serves the political subdivision where the person resides, the judge may obtain such report from the community services board of the political subdivision where the person is located. 583 584 The report shall be admissible as evidence of the facts stated therein and shall state whether the person 585 is deemed to be so seriously mentally ill that he is substantially unable to care for himself, an imminent 586 danger to himself or others as a result of mental illness and in need of involuntary hospitalization or treatment, whether there is no less restrictive alternative to institutional confinement and what the 587 588 recommendations are for that person's care and treatment. In the case of a person sentenced and committed to the Department of Corrections and who has been examined by a psychiatrist or clinical 589 590 psychologist, the judge may proceed to adjudicate whether the person is mentally ill and should be 591 confined pursuant to this section without requesting a prescreening report from the community services 592 board.

I. After observing the person and obtaining the necessary positive certification and any other relevant 593 594 evidence which may have been offered, if the judge finds specifically (i) that the person presents an 595 imminent danger to himself or others as a result of mental illness or has been proven to be so seriously mentally ill as to be substantially unable to care for himself, and (ii) that alternatives to involuntary 596 597 confinement and treatment have been investigated and deemed unsuitable and there is no less restrictive 598 alternative to institutional confinement and treatment, the judge shall by written order and specific 599 findings so certify and order that the person be placed in a hospital or other facility for a period of 600 treatment not to exceed 180 days from the date of the court order. Such placement shall be in a hospital 601 or other facility designated by the community services board which serves the political subdivision in 602 which the person was examined as provided in this section. If the community services board does not 603 provide a placement recommendation at the commitment hearing, the person shall be placed in a 604 hospital or other facility designated by the Commissioner.

J. After observing the person and obtaining the necessary positive certification and any other relevant
evidence which may have been offered, if the judge finds specifically (i) that the person presents an
imminent danger to himself or others as a result of mental illness or has been proven to be so seriously
mentally ill as to be substantially unable to care for himself, and (ii) that less restrictive alternatives to
institutional confinement and treatment have been investigated and are deemed suitable, and if,
moreover, the judge finds specifically that (i) the patient has the degree of competency necessary to

understand the stipulations of his treatment, (ii) the patient expresses an interest in living in the 611 **612** community and agrees to abide by his treatment plan, (iii) the patient is deemed to have the capacity to 613 comply with the treatment plan, (iv) the ordered treatment can be delivered on an outpatient basis, and **614** (v) the ordered treatment can be monitored by the community services board or designated providers, 615 the judge shall order outpatient treatment, day treatment in a hospital, night treatment in a hospital, outpatient involuntary treatment with anti-psychotic medication pursuant to § 37.1-134.21, or such other 616 617 appropriate course of treatment as may be necessary to meet the needs of the individual. Upon failure of 618 the patient to adhere to the terms of the outpatient treatment, the judge may revoke the same and, upon 619 notice to the patient and after a commitment hearing, order involuntary commitment for treatment at a 620 hospital. The community services board which serves the political subdivision in which the person 621 resides shall recommend a specific course of treatment and programs for provision of such treatment. 622 The community services board shall monitor the person's compliance with such treatment as may be 623 ordered by the court under this section, and the person's failure to comply with involuntary outpatient 624 treatment as ordered by the court may be admitted into evidence in subsequent hearings held pursuant to 625 the provisions of this section.

626 \tilde{K} . The judge shall make or cause to be made a tape or other audio recording of the hearing and 627 shall submit such recording to the appropriate district court clerk to be retained in a confidential file. 628 Such recordings shall only be used to document and to answer questions concerning the judge's conduct 629 of the hearing. These recordings shall be retained for at least three years from the date of the relevant 630 commitment hearing. The judge shall also order that copies of the relevant medical records of such 631 person be released to the facility or program in which he is placed upon request of the treating 632 physician or director of the facility or program. Except as provided in this section, the court shall keep 633 its copies of relevant medical records, reports, and court documents pertaining to the hearings provided 634 for in this section confidential if so requested by such person, or his counsel, with access provided only upon court order for good cause shown. Such records, reports, and documents shall not be subject to the 635 Virginia Freedom of Information Act (§ 2.2-3700 et seq.). L. The procedures required by this section shall be followed at such commitment hearing. The judge
shall render a decision on such petition after the appointed examiner has presented his report, either

for that person's placement, care and treatment. These reports, if not contested, may constitute sufficient
evidence upon which the court may base its decision.

646 *M.* The clerk shall certify and forward forthwith to the Central Criminal Records Exchange, on a
647 form provided by the Exchange, a copy of any order for involuntary commitment to a hospital. The
648 copy of the form and the order shall be kept confidential in a separate file and used only to determine a
649 person's eligibility to possess, purchase or transfer a firearm.

650 § 37.1-134.9. Appointment of guardian ad litem.

A. On the filing of every petition for guardianship or conservatorship, the court shall appoint a guardian ad litem to represent the interests of the respondent. The guardian ad litem shall be paid such fee as is fixed by the court to be paid by the petitioner or taxed as costs, as the court directs.

B. Duties of the guardian ad litem include: (i) personally visiting the respondent; (ii) advising the respondent of rights pursuant to §§ 37.1-134.12 and 37.1-134.13, and certifying to the court that the respondent has been so advised; (iii) recommending that legal counsel should be appointed for the respondent, pursuant to § 37.1-134.12, if the guardian ad litem believes that counsel for the respondent is necessary; (iv) investigating the petition and evidence, requesting additional evaluation if necessary, and filing a report pursuant to subsection C; and (v) personally appearing at all court proceedings and conferences.

C. In the report required by subsection B (iv), the guardian ad litem shall address the following **661 662** major areas of concern: (i) whether the court has jurisdiction; (ii) whether or not a guardian or 663 conservator is needed; (iii) the extent of the duties and powers of the guardian or conservator, e.g., 664 personal supervision, financial management, medical consent only; (iv) the propriety and suitability of the person selected as guardian or conservator, after consideration of geographic location, familial or 665 666 other relationship with the respondent, ability to carry out the powers and duties of the office, 667 commitment to promoting the respondent's welfare, any potential conflicts of interests, wishes of the respondent, and recommendations of relatives; (v) a recommendation as to the amount of surety on the 668 669 conservator's bond; if any; and (vi) consideration of proper residential placement of the respondent.

670 D. A health care provider shall disclose or make available to the guardian ad litem, upon request, 671 any information, records, and reports concerning the respondent that he determines necessary to

perform his duties under this section. **672**

673 § 37.1-134.12. Counsel for respondent.

674 The respondent has the right to be represented by counsel of the respondent's choice. If the 675 respondent is not represented by counsel, the court may appoint legal counsel, upon the filing of the petition or at any time prior to the entry of the order upon request of the respondent or the guardian ad 676 677 litem if the court determines that counsel is needed to protect the respondent's interest. Counsel 678 appointed by the court shall be paid such fee as is fixed by the court to be taxed as part of the costs of 679 the proceeding.

680 A health care provider shall disclose or make available to the attorney upon request any 681 information, records, and reports concerning the respondent that he determines necessary to perform his duties under this section, including a copy of the evaluation report required under § 37.1-134.11. **682**

§ 37.1-134.21. Judicial authorization of treatment and detention of certain persons. **683**

684 A. An appropriate circuit court, or judge as defined in § 37.1-1, may authorize on behalf of an adult 685 person, in accordance with this section, the provision, withholding or withdrawal of a specific treatment or course of treatment for a mental or physical disorder, if it finds upon clear and convincing evidence **686** that (i) the person is either incapable of making an informed decision on his own behalf or is incapable **687** 688 of communicating such a decision due to a physical or mental disorder and (ii) the proposed action is in 689 the best interest of the person. 690

B. For purposes of this section:

691 "Disorder" includes any physical or mental disorder or impairment, whether caused by injury, 692 disease, genetics, or other cause.

693 "Incapable of making an informed decision" means unable to understand the nature, extent or **694** probable consequences of a proposed treatment, or unable to make a rational evaluation of the risks and **695** benefits of the proposed treatment as compared with the risks and benefits of alternatives to that 696 treatment. Persons with dysphasia or other communication disorders who are mentally competent and 697 able to communicate shall not be considered incapable of giving informed consent.

698 C. Any person may request authorization of the provision, withholding or withdrawal of a specific 699 treatment, or course of treatment, for an adult person by filing a petition in the circuit court, or with a 700 judge as defined in § 37.1-1, of the county or city in which the allegedly incapable person resides or is located, or in the county or city in which the proposed place of treatment is located. Upon filing such a 701 702 petition, the petitioner or the court shall deliver or send a certified copy of the petition to the person 703 who is the subject of such petition and, if the identity and whereabouts of the person's next of kin are 704 known, to the next of kin.

705 D. As soon as reasonably possible after the filing of the petition, the court shall appoint an attorney 706 to represent the interests of the allegedly incapable person at the hearing. However, such appointment 707 shall not be required in the event that the person, or another interested person on behalf of the person, 708 elects to retain private counsel at his own expense to represent the interests of the person at the hearing. 709 If the allegedly incapable person is indigent, his counsel shall be paid by the Commonwealth as 710 provided in § 37.1-89 from funds appropriated to reimburse expenses incurred in the involuntary mental 711 commitment process. However, this provision shall not be construed to prohibit the direct payment of an 712 attorney's fee either by the patient or by an interested person on his behalf, which fee shall be subject to 713 the review and approval of the court.

714 E. Following the appointment of an attorney pursuant to subsection D above, the court shall schedule 715 an expedited hearing of the matter. The court shall notify the person who is the subject of the petition, 716 his next of kin, if known, the petitioner, and their respective counsel of the date and time for the 717 hearing. In scheduling such a hearing, the court shall take into account the type and severity of the 718 alleged physical or mental disorder, as well as the need to provide the person's attorney with sufficient 719 time to adequately prepare his client's case.

720 F. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections C and E above regarding delivery or service of the 721 petition and notice of the hearing to the next of kin of any person who is the subject of such petition, if 722 such person is a patient in any hospital at the time the petition is filed, the court, in its discretion, may 723 dispense with the requirement of any notice to the next of kin. This subsection shall not, however, be 724 construed to interfere with any decision made pursuant to the Health Care Decisions Act (§ 54.1-2981 et 725 seq.).

726 G. Evidence presented at the hearing may be submitted by affidavit in the absence of objection by 727 the person who is the subject of the petition, the petitioner, either of their respective counsel, or by any 728 other interested party. Prior to the hearing, the attorney shall investigate the risks and benefits of the 729 treatment decision for which authorization is sought and of alternatives to the proposed decision. The 730 attorney shall make a reasonable effort to inform the person of this information and to ascertain the 731 person's religious beliefs and basic values and the views and preferences of the person's next of kin. A 732 health care provider shall disclose or make available to the attorney, upon request, any information, 733 records, and reports concerning the person that the attorney determines necessary to perform his duties 734 under this section.

H. Prior to authorizing the provision, withholding or withdrawal of treatment pursuant to this section,the court shall find:

1. That there is no legally authorized person available to give consent;

738 2. That the person who is the subject of the petition is incapable either of making an informed
739 decision regarding a specific treatment or course of treatment or is physically or mentally incapable of
740 communicating such a decision;

741 3. That the person who is the subject of the petition is unlikely to become capable of making an informed decision or of communicating an informed decision within the time required for decision; and

4. That the proposed course of treatment is in the best interest of the patient. However, the court
shall not authorize a proposed course of treatment which is proven by a preponderance of the evidence
to be contrary to the person's religious beliefs or basic values unless such treatment is necessary to
prevent death or a serious irreversible condition. The court shall take into consideration the right of the
person to rely on nonmedical, remedial treatment in the practice of religion in lieu of medical treatment.
I. The court may not authorize the following under this section:

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1. Nontherapeutic sterilization, abortion, or psychosurgery.

750 2. Admission to a mental retardation facility or a psychiatric hospital, as defined in § 37.1-1. 751 However, the court may issue an order under this section authorizing the provision, withholding or 752 withdrawal of a specific treatment or course of treatment of a person whose admission to such facility 753 has been or is simultaneously being authorized under §§ 37.1-65, 37.1-65.1, 37.1-65.2, 37.1-65.3, or 754 § 37.1-67.1, or of a person who is subject to an order of involuntary commitment previously or 755 simultaneously issued under § 37.1-67.3 or Article 1.1 (§ 37.1-70.1 et seq.) of Chapter 2 of this title.

756 3. Administration of antipsychotic medication for a period to exceed 180 days or electroconvulsive 757 therapy for a period to exceed 60 days pursuant to any petition filed under this section. The court may 758 authorize electroconvulsive therapy only if it is demonstrated by clear and convincing evidence, which 759 shall include the testimony of a licensed psychiatrist, that all other reasonable forms of treatment have 760 been considered and that electroconvulsive therapy is the most effective treatment for the person. Even if the court has authorized administration of antipsychotic medication or electroconvulsive therapy 761 762 hereunder, these treatments may be administered over the person's objection only if he is subject to an 763 order of involuntary commitment, including outpatient involuntary commitment, previously or simultaneously issued under § 37.1-67.3 or Article 1.1 (§ 37.1-70.1 et seq.) of Chapter 2 of this title, or 764 765 the provisions of Chapter 11 (§ 19.2-167 et seq.) or Chapter 11.1 (§ 19.2-182.2 et seq.) of Title 19.2.

766 4. Restraint or transportation of the person, unless it finds upon clear and convincing evidence that 767 restraint or transportation is necessary to the provision of an authorized treatment for a physical disorder. 768 J. Any order authorizing the provision, withholding or withdrawal of treatment pursuant to subsection 769 A shall describe any treatment or course of treatment authorized and may authorize generally such 770 related examinations, tests, or services as the court may determine to be reasonably related to the 771 treatment authorized. The order shall require the treating physician to review and document the 772 appropriateness of the continued administration of antipsychotic medications not less frequently than 773 every 30 days. Such order shall require the treating physician or other service provider to report to the 774 court and the person's attorney any change in the person's condition resulting in probable restoration or development of the person's capacity to make and to communicate an informed decision prior to 775 776 completion of any authorized course of treatment and related services. The order may further require the treating physician or other service provider to report to the court and the person's attorney any change in 777 778 circumstances regarding any authorized course of treatment or related services or the withholding or 779 withdrawal of treatment or services which may indicate that such authorization is no longer in the 780 person's best interests. Upon receipt of such report, or upon the petition of any interested party, the court 781 may enter such order withdrawing or modifying its prior authorization as it deems appropriate. Any 782 petition or order under this section may be orally presented or entered, provided a written order shall be 783 subsequently executed.

784 K. Any order hereunder of a judge, or of a judge or magistrate under subsection M, may be appealed
785 de novo within 10 days to the circuit court for the jurisdiction where the order was entered, and any
786 such order of a circuit court hereunder, either originally or on appeal, may be appealed within 10 days
787 to the Court of Appeals.

788 L. Any licensed health professional or licensed hospital providing, withholding or withdrawing 789 treatment, testing or detention pursuant to the court's or magistrate's authorization as provided in this 790 section shall have no liability arising out of a claim to the extent such claim is based on lack of consent 791 to such course of treatment, testing or detention or the withholding or withdrawal of such treatment, 792 testing or detention. Any such professional or hospital providing, withholding or withdrawing treatment 793 with the consent of the person receiving or being offered treatment shall have no liability arising out of a claim to the extent it is based on lack of capacity to consent if a court or a magistrate has denied a petition hereunder to authorize such treatment, and such denial was based on an affirmative finding that
the person was capable of making and communicating an informed decision regarding the proposed
provision, withholding or withdrawal of treatment.

798 M. Based upon the opinion of a licensed physician that an adult person is incapable of making an 799 informed decision as a result of a physical injury or illness and that the medical standard of care 800 indicates that testing, observation and treatment are necessary to prevent imminent and irreversible harm, 801 a magistrate may issue, for good cause shown, an emergency custody order for such adult person to be 802 taken into custody and transported to a hospital emergency room for such testing, observation or 803 treatment.

804 Prior to issuance of an emergency custody order pursuant to this subsection, the magistrate shall 805 ascertain that there is no legally authorized person available to give consent to necessary treatment for 806 the adult person and that the adult person (i) is incapable of making an informed decision regarding 807 obtaining necessary treatment, (ii) has refused transport to obtain such necessary treatment, (iii) has 808 indicated an intention to resist such transport, and (iv) is unlikely to become capable of making an 809 informed decision regarding obtaining necessary treatment within the time required for such decision.

810 An opinion by the licensed physician that an adult person is incapable of making an informed 811 decision as a result of physical injury or illness shall only be rendered after such licensed physician has 812 communicated electronically or personally with the emergency medical services personnel on the scene 813 and has attempted to communicate electronically or personally with the adult person to obtain 814 information and medical data concerning the cause of the adult person's incapacity, has attempted to 815 obtain consent from the adult person and has failed to obtain such consent.

816 If there is a change in the person's condition, the emergency medical services personnel shall contact
817 the licensed physician. If at any time the licensed physician determines that a person subject to an order
818 under this subsection has become capable of making and communicating an informed decision, such
819 physician shall rely on the person's decision on whether to consent to further observation, testing or
820 treatment.

821 Upon reaching the emergency room, the person shall be evaluated by a licensed physician. If the
822 physician determines that the person meets the requirements of subsection N, the physician may apply
823 for a temporary detention order pursuant to that subsection. If the physician determines that the person
824 does not meet the requirements of subsection N, the person shall be released from custody immediately.
825 The person shall remain in custody until this evaluation is performed, but in no event shall the period of
826 custody under this subsection exceed four hours.

827 The law-enforcement officer may lawfully go to or be sent beyond the territorial limits of the county,
828 city or town in which he serves to any point in the Commonwealth for the purpose of executing an
829 order for emergency custody pursuant to this subsection. Nothing herein shall preclude a
830 law-enforcement officer from obtaining emergency medical treatment or further medical evaluation at
831 any time for a person in his custody as provided in this subsection.

832 If an order of emergency custody is not executed within four hours of its issuance, the order shall be
833 void and shall be returned unexecuted to the office of the clerk of the issuing court or, if such office is
834 not open, to any judge or magistrate thereof.

N. Upon the advice of a licensed physician who has attempted to obtain consent and upon a finding 835 836 of probable cause to believe that an adult person within the court's or a magistrate's jurisdiction is 837 incapable of making an informed decision regarding treatment of a physical or mental disorder, or is 838 incapable of communicating such a decision due to a physical or mental disorder, and that the medical 839 standard of care calls for testing, observation or treatment of the disorder within the next 24 hours to 840 prevent death, disability, or a serious irreversible condition, the court or, if the court is unavailable, a 841 magistrate may issue an order authorizing temporary detention of the person by a hospital emergency room or other appropriate facility and authorizing such testing, observation or treatment. The detention 842 843 may not be for a period exceeding 24 hours unless extended by the court as part of an order authorizing 844 treatment under subsection A. If before completion of authorized testing, observation or treatment, the 845 physician determines that a person subject to an order under this subsection has become capable of 846 making and communicating an informed decision, the physician shall rely on the person's decision on 847 whether to consent to further observation, testing or treatment. If before issuance of an order under this 848 subsection or during its period of effectiveness, the physician learns of an objection by a member of the 849 person's immediate family to the testing, observation or treatment, he shall so notify the court or 850 magistrate, who shall consider the objection in determining whether to issue, modify or terminate the 851 order.

852 O. The provisions of § 37.1-89 relating to payment by the Commonwealth shall not apply to the cost853 of detention, testing or treatment under this section.

P. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect the right to use, and the authority conferred by, any other applicable statutory or regulatory procedure relating to consent, or to diminish any common law authority of a physician or other treatment provider to provide, withhold or withdraw services to a

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857 person unable to give or to communicate informed consent to those actions, with or without the consent

858 of the person's relative, including but not limited to common law or other authority to provide treatment859 in an emergency situation; nor shall anything in this section be construed to affect the law defining the

860 conditions under which consent shall be obtained for medical treatment, or the nature of the consent861 required.

Q. Judicial authorization pursuant to this section for providing, withholding or withdrawing treatment need not be obtained for a person for whom consent or authorization has been granted or issued or may be obtained in accordance with the provisions of Article 8 (§ 54.1-2981 et seq.) of Chapter 29 of Title

865 54.1 or other applicable statutes or common law of this Commonwealth.
