Patron—Houck 6 7 Referred to Committee on Local Government 8 9 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: 1. That § 15.2-2223 of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows: 10 § 15.2-2223. Comprehensive plan to be prepared and adopted; scope and purpose. 11 The local planning commission shall prepare and recommend a comprehensive plan for the physical 12 13 development of the territory within its jurisdiction and every governing body shall adopt a 14 comprehensive plan for the territory under its jurisdiction. In the preparation of a comprehensive plan the commission shall make careful and comprehensive 15 surveys and studies of the existing conditions and trends of growth, and of the probable future 16 requirements of its territory and inhabitants. The comprehensive plan shall be made with the purpose of 17 guiding and accomplishing a coordinated, adjusted and harmonious development of the territory which 18 will, in accordance with present and probable future needs and resources, best promote the health, 19 safety, morals, order, convenience, prosperity and general welfare of the inhabitants. The comprehensive plan shall be general in nature, in that it shall designate the general or 20 21 22 approximate location, character, and extent of each feature shown on the plan and shall indicate where 23 existing lands or facilities are proposed to be extended, widened, removed, relocated, vacated, narrowed, 24 abandoned, or changed in use as the case may be. 25 The comprehensive plan shall include a transportation element that designates a system of 26 transportation infrastructure needs and recommendations that shall include roadways, bicycle 27 accommodations, pedestrian accommodations, railways, bridges, waterways, airports, ports, and public 28 transportation facilities. 29 The plan, with the accompanying maps, plats, charts, and descriptive matter, shall show the locality's 30 long-range recommendations for the general development of the territory covered by the plan. It may 31 include, but need not be limited to: 1. The designation of areas for various types of public and private development and use, such as 32 33 different kinds of residential, business, industrial, agricultural, mineral resources, conservation, recreation, 34 public service, flood plain and drainage, and other areas; 35 2. The designation of a system of transportation facilities such as streets, roads, highways, parkways, 36 railways, bridges, viaducts, waterways, airports, ports, terminals, and other like facilities; 37 32. The designation of a system of community service facilities such as parks, forests, schools, playgrounds, public buildings and institutions, hospitals, community centers, waterworks, sewage 38 39 disposal or waste disposal areas, and the like; 43. The designation of historical areas and areas for urban renewal or other treatment; 40 41 54. The designation of areas for the implementation of reasonable ground water protection measures; 42 65. An official map, a capital improvements program, a subdivision ordinance, a zoning ordinance and zoning district maps, mineral resource district maps and agricultural and forestal district maps, 43 44 where applicable; and 76. The location of existing or proposed recycling centers. 45 The plan shall include: the designation of areas and implementation of measures for the construction, 46 47 rehabilitation and maintenance of affordable housing, which is sufficient to meet the current and future needs of residents of all levels of income in the locality while considering the current and future needs 48 49 of the planning district within which the locality is situated.

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
