12 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That §§ 46.2-100, 46.2-821, 46.2-826, 46.2-834, 46.2-835, 46.2-836, 46.2-904, 46.2-908.1, 46.2-925, 13 14 and 46.2-933 of the Code of Virginia are amended and reenacted and that the Code of Virginia is amended by adding sections numbered 46.2-923.1, 46.2-924.1, and 46.2-924.2 as follows: 15

§ 46.2-100. Definitions.

The following words and phrases when used in this title shall, for the purpose of this title, have the 17 18 meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section except in those instances where the context 19 clearly indicates a different meaning:

20"All-terrain vehicle" means a three-wheeled or four-wheeled motor vehicle powered by a gasoline or 21 diesel engine and generally characterized by large, low-pressure tires, a seat designed to be straddled by 22 the operator, and handlebars for steering that is intended for off-road use by an individual rider on various types of unpaved terrain. The term does not include four-wheeled vehicles, commonly known as 23 24 "go-carts," that have low centers of gravity and are typically used in racing on relatively level surfaces, 25 nor does the term include any "utility vehicle" as defined in this section or any "farm utility vehicle" as 26 defined in this section.

27 "Antique motor vehicle" means every motor vehicle, as defined in this section, which was actually 28 manufactured or designated by the manufacturer as a model manufactured in a calendar year not less than 25 years prior to January 1 of each calendar year and is owned solely as a collector's item. 29

"Antique trailer" means every trailer or semitrailer, as defined in this section, that was actually 30 31 manufactured or designated by the manufacturer as a model manufactured in a calendar year not less than 25 years prior to January 1 of each calendar year and is owned solely as a collector's item. 32

33 "Automobile or watercraft transporters" means any tractor truck, lowboy, vehicle, or combination, 34 including vehicles or combinations that transport motor vehicles or watercraft on their power unit, 35 designed and used exclusively for the transportation of motor vehicles or watercraft.

36 "Bicycle" means a device propelled solely by human power, upon which a person may ride either on 37 or astride a regular seat attached thereto, having two or more wheels in tandem, including children's bicycles, except a toy vehicle intended for use by young children. For purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 38 39 et seq.) of this title, a bicycle shall be a vehicle while operated on the highway.

40 "Bicycle lane" means that portion of a roadway designated by signs and/or pavement markings for the preferential use of bicycles, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds. 41

42 Business district" means the territory contiguous to a highway where 75 percent or more of the property contiguous to a highway, on either side of the highway, for a distance of 300 feet or more 43 44 along the highway, is occupied by land and buildings actually in use for business purposes.

"Camping trailer" means every vehicle that has collapsible sides and contains sleeping quarters but 45 46 may or may not contain bathing and cooking facilities and is designed to be drawn by a motor vehicle.

'Cancel" or "cancellation" means that the document or privilege cancelled has been annulled or 47 48 terminated because of some error, defect, or ineligibility, but the cancellation is without prejudice and 49 reapplication may be made at any time after cancellation.

50 "Chauffeur" means every person employed for the principal purpose of driving a motor vehicle and 51 every person who drives a motor vehicle while in use as a public or common carrier of persons or 52 property. 53

Commission" means the State Corporation Commission.

54 "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicles of the 55 Commonwealth.

"Crosswalk" means that part of a roadway at an intersection included within the connections of the 56 57 lateral lines of the sidewalks on opposite sides of the highway measured from the curbs or, in the

58 absence of curbs, from the edges of the traversable roadway; or any portion of a roadway at an 59 intersection or elsewhere distinctly indicated for pedestrian crossing by lines or other markings on the

60 surface.

61 "Decal" means a device to be attached to a license plate that validates the license plate for a 62 predetermined registration period.

63 "Department" means the Department of Motor Vehicles of the Commonwealth.

64 "Disabled parking license plate" means a license plate that displays the international symbol of access65 in the same size as the numbers and letters on the plate and in a color that contrasts with the66 background.

⁶⁷ "Disabled veteran" means a veteran who (i) has either lost, or lost the use of, a leg, arm, or hand;
⁶⁸ (ii) is blind; or (iii) is permanently and totally disabled as certified by the U.S. Veterans Administration.
⁶⁹ A veteran shall be considered blind if he has a permanent impairment of both eyes to the following
⁷⁰ extent: (i) central visual acuity of 20/200 or less in the better eye, with corrective lenses, or central
⁷¹ visual acuity of more than 20/200, if there is a field defect in which the peripheral field has contracted
⁷² to such an extent that the widest diameter of visual field subtends an angular distance no greater than 20
⁷³ degrees in the better eye.

74 "Driver's license" means any license, including a commercial driver's license as defined in the
75 Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.), issued under the laws of the
76 Commonwealth authorizing the operation of a motor vehicle.

"Electric personal assistive mobility device" means a self-balancing two-nontandem-wheeled device
that is designed to transport only one person and powered by an electric propulsion system that limits
the device's maximum speed to 15 miles per hour or less. For purposes of Chapter 8 of this title, an
electric personal assistive mobility device shall be a vehicle when operated on a highway.

81 "Electric power-assisted bicycle" means a vehicle that travels on not more than three wheels in
82 contact with the ground and is equipped with (i) pedals that allow propulsion by human power and (ii)
83 an electric motor with an input of no more than 1,000 watts that reduces the pedal effort required of the
84 rider. For the purposes of Chapter 8 of this title, an electric power-assisted bicycle shall be a vehicle
85 when operated on a highway.

86 "Essential parts" means all integral parts and body parts, the removal, alteration, or substitution of87 which will tend to conceal the identity of a vehicle.

88 "Farm tractor" means every motor vehicle designed and used as a farm, agricultural, or horticultural
 89 implement for drawing plows, mowing machines, and other farm, agricultural, or horticultural machinery
 90 and implements including self-propelled mowers designed and used for mowing lawns.

91 "Farm utility vehicle" means a vehicle that is designed for off-road use and is used as a farm,
92 agricultural, or horticultural service vehicle, generally having a gasoline or diesel engine, four or more
93 wheels, bench seating for the operator and a passenger, a steering wheel for control, and a cargo bed.
94 "Farm utility vehicle" does not include pickup or panel trucks, golf carts, low-speed vehicles, riding
95 lawn mowers, or all-terrain vehicles.

96 "Federal safety requirements" means applicable provisions of 49 U.S.C. § 30101 et seq. and all97 administrative regulations and policies adopted pursuant thereto.

98 "Financial responsibility" means the ability to respond in damages for liability thereafter incurred
99 arising out of the ownership, maintenance, use, or operation of a motor vehicle, in the amounts provided
100 for in § 46.2-472.

101 "Foreign market vehicle" means any motor vehicle originally manufactured outside the United States,
102 which was not manufactured in accordance with 49 U.S.C. § 30101 et seq. and the policies and
103 regulations adopted pursuant to that Act, and for which a Virginia title or registration is sought.

104 "Foreign vehicle" means every motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer that is brought into the
 105 Commonwealth otherwise than in the ordinary course of business by or through a manufacturer or dealer
 106 and that has not been registered in the Commonwealth.

107 "Golf cart" means a self-propelled vehicle that is designed to transport persons playing golf and their108 equipment on a golf course.

109 "Governing body" means the board of supervisors of a county, council of a city, or council of a 110 town, as context may require.

111 "Gross weight" means the aggregate weight of a vehicle or combination of vehicles and the load 112 thereon.

113 "Highway" means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way or place open to the use 114 of the public for purposes of vehicular travel in the Commonwealth, including the streets and alleys, 115 and, for law-enforcement purposes, (i) the entire width between the boundary lines of all private roads 116 or private streets that have been specifically designated "highways" by an ordinance adopted by the 117 governing body of the county, city, or town in which such private roads or streets are located and (ii) 118 the entire width between the boundary lines of every way or place used for purposes of vehicular travel 119 on any property owned, leased, or controlled by the United States government and located in the 120 Commonwealth.

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121 "Intersection" means (i) the area embraced within the prolongation or connection of the lateral 122 curblines or, if none, then the lateral boundary lines of the roadways of two highways that join one 123 another at, or approximately at, right angles, or the area within which vehicles traveling on different 124 highways joining at any other angle may come in conflict; (ii) where a highway includes two roadways 125 30 feet or more apart, then every crossing of each roadway of such divided highway by an intersecting 126 highway shall be regarded as a separate intersection, in the event such intersecting highway also 127 includes two roadways 30 feet or more apart, then every crossing of two roadways of such highways 128 shall be regarded as a separate intersection; or (iii) for purposes only of authorizing installation of 129 traffic-control devices, every crossing of a highway or street at grade by a pedestrian marked or 130 unmarked crosswalk.

"Law-enforcement officer" means any officer authorized to direct or regulate traffic or to make
arrests for violations of this title or local ordinances authorized by law. For the purposes of access to
law-enforcement databases regarding motor vehicle registration and ownership only, this term shall also
include city and county commissioners of the revenue and treasurers, together with their duly designated
deputies and employees, when such officials are actually engaged in the enforcement of §§ 46.2-752,
46.2-753 and 46.2-754 and local ordinances enacted thereunder.

137 "License plate" means a device containing letters, numerals, or a combination of both, attached to a
138 motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer to indicate that the vehicle is properly registered with the
139 Department.

"Light" means a device for producing illumination or the illumination produced by the device.

"Low-speed vehicle" means any four-wheeled electrically-powered vehicle, except a motor vehicle or
low-speed vehicle that is used exclusively for agricultural or horticultural purposes or a golf cart, whose
maximum speed is greater than 20 miles per hour but not greater than 25 miles per hour and is
manufactured to comply with safety standards contained in Title 49 of the Code of Federal Regulations,
§ 571.500.

146 "Manufactured home" means a structure subject to federal regulation, transportable in one or more 147 sections, which in the traveling mode is eight body feet or more in width or 40 body feet or more in 148 length, or, when erected on site, is 320 or more square feet, and which is built on a permanent chassis 149 and designed to be used as a dwelling with or without a permanent foundation when connected to the 150 required utilities, and includes the plumbing, heating, air conditioning, and electrical systems contained 151 therein.

"Marked crosswalk" means any portion of a roadway at an intersection or elsewhere distinctively
 indicated for pedestrian crossing by lines or other markings on the highway surface.

"Moped" means every vehicle that travels on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground that has (i) a seat that is no less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the ground and (ii) a gasoline, electric, or hybrid motor that displaces less than 50 cubic centimeters. For purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.) of this title, a moped shall be a vehicle while operated on a highway.

"Motor-driven cycle" means every motorcycle that has a gasoline engine that (i) displaces less than
150 cubic centimeters; (ii) has a seat less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat
perpendicular to the ground; and (iii) has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number.

162 "Motor home" means every private motor vehicle with a normal seating capacity of not more than 10 persons, including the driver, designed primarily for use as living quarters for human beings.

164 "Motor vehicle" means every vehicle as defined in this section that is self-propelled or designed for 165 self-propulsion except as otherwise provided in this title. Any structure designed, used, or maintained 166 primarily to be loaded on or affixed to a motor vehicle to provide a mobile dwelling, sleeping place, 167 office, or commercial space shall be considered a part of a motor vehicle. For the purposes of this title, 168 any device herein defined as a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted 169 bicycle, or moped shall be deemed not to be a motor vehicle.

"Motorcycle" means every motor vehicle designed to travel on not more than three wheels in contact
with the ground and is capable of traveling at speeds in excess of 35 miles per hour. The term
"motorcycle" does not include any "electric personal assistive mobility device," "electric power-assisted
bicycle," "farm tractor," "golf cart," "moped," "motorized skateboard or scooter," "utility vehicle" or
"wheelchair or wheelchair conveyance" as defined in this section.

"Motorized skateboard or scooter" means every vehicle, regardless of the number of its wheels in contact with the ground, that (i) has no seat, but is designed to be stood upon by the operator, (ii) has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number, and (iii) is powered by an electric motor having an input of no more than 1,000 watts or a gasoline engine that displaces less than 36 cubic centimeters.
The term "motorized skateboard or scooter" includes vehicles with or without handlebars, but does not include "electric personal assistive mobility devices."

181 "Nonresident" means every person who is not domiciled in the Commonwealth, except: (i) any 182 foreign corporation that is authorized to do business in the Commonwealth by the State Corporation 183 Commission shall be a resident of the Commonwealth for the purpose of this title; in the case of 184 corporations incorporated in the Commonwealth but doing business outside the Commonwealth, only 185 such principal place of business or branches located within the Commonwealth shall be dealt with as 186 residents of the Commonwealth; (ii) a person who becomes engaged in a gainful occupation in the 187 Commonwealth for a period exceeding 60 days shall be a resident for the purposes of this title except 188 for the purposes of Chapter 3 (§ 46.2-300 et seq.) of this title; (iii) a person, other than a nonresident student as defined in this section, who has actually resided in the Commonwealth for a period of six 189 190 months, whether employed or not, or who has registered a motor vehicle, listing an address in the 191 Commonwealth in the application for registration shall be deemed a resident for the purposes of this 192 title, except for the purposes of the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.).

193 "Nonresident student" means every nonresident person who is enrolled as a full-time student in an 194 accredited institution of learning in the Commonwealth and who is not gainfully employed.

195 "Off-road motorcycle" means every motorcycle designed exclusively for off-road use by an individual 196 rider with not more than two wheels in contact with the ground. Except as otherwise provided in this 197 chapter, for the purposes of this chapter off-road motorcycles shall be deemed to be "motorcycles."

198 Operation or use for rent or for hire, for the transportation of passengers, or as a property carrier for 199 compensation," and "business of transporting persons or property" mean any owner or operator of any 200 motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer operating over the highways in the Commonwealth who accepts or receives compensation for the service, directly or indirectly; but these terms do not mean a "truck 201 202 lessor" as defined in this section and do not include persons or businesses that receive compensation for delivering a product that they themselves sell or produce, where a separate charge is made for delivery of the product or the cost of delivery is included in the sale price of the product, but where the person 203 204 205 or business does not derive all or a substantial portion of its income from the transportation of persons 206 or property except as part of a sales transaction.

207 "Operator" or "driver" means every person who either (i) drives or is in actual physical control of a 208 motor vehicle on a highway or (ii) is exercising control over or steering a vehicle being towed by a 209 motor vehicle.

210 "Owner" means a person who holds the legal title to a vehicle; however, if a vehicle is the subject of 211 an agreement for its conditional sale or lease with the right of purchase on performance of the conditions stated in the agreement and with an immediate right of possession vested in the conditional 212 213 vendee or lessee or if a mortgagor of a vehicle is entitled to possession, then the conditional vendee or 214 lessee or mortgagor shall be the owner for the purpose of this title. In all such instances when the rent 215 paid by the lessee includes charges for services of any nature or when the lease does not provide that title shall pass to the lessee on payment of the rent stipulated, the lessor shall be regarded as the owner 216 217 of the vehicle, and the vehicle shall be subject to such requirements of this title as are applicable to vehicles operated for compensation. A "truck lessor" as defined in this section shall be regarded as the 218 219 owner, and his vehicles shall be subject to such requirements of this title as are applicable to vehicles of 220 private carriers.

221 "Passenger car" means every motor vehicle other than a motorcycle designed and used primarily for 222 the transportation of no more than 10 persons including the driver.

223 "Payment device" means any credit card as defined in 15 U.S.C. § 1602(k) or any "accepted card or 224 other means of access" set forth in 15 U.S.C. § 1693a(1). For the purposes of this title, this definition 225 shall also include a card that enables a person to pay for transactions through the use of value stored on 226 the card itself.

227 "Pedestrian" means any person on foot, in a wheelchair, or who uses a means of conveyance 228

propelled by human power other than a bicycle or moped. "Pedestrian control signals" means any device, whether manually, electronically, or mechanically 229 230 operated, by which pedestrians are alternately directed to stop and permitted to proceed.

"Pickup or panel truck" means every motor vehicle designed for the transportation of property and 231 232 having a registered gross weight of 7,500 pounds or less.

233 "Private road or driveway" means every way in private ownership and used for vehicular travel by 234 the owner and those having express or implied permission from the owner, but not by other persons.

235 "Reconstructed vehicle" means every vehicle of a type required to be registered under this title 236 materially altered from its original construction by the removal, addition, or substitution of new or used 237 essential parts. Such vehicles, at the discretion of the Department, shall retain their original vehicle 238 identification number, line-make, and model year.

"Replica vehicle" means every vehicle of a type required to be registered under this title not fully 239 240 constructed by a licensed manufacturer but either constructed or assembled from components. Such 241 components may be from a single vehicle, multiple vehicles, a kit, parts, or fabricated components. The kit may be made up of "major components" as defined in § 46.2-1600, a full body, or a full chassis, or 242

a combination of these parts. The vehicle shall resemble a vehicle of distinctive name, line-make, model, 243 244 or type as produced by a licensed manufacturer or manufacturer no longer in business and is not a 245 reconstructed or specially constructed vehicle as herein defined.

246 "Residence district" means the territory contiguous to a highway, not comprising a business district, 247 where 75 percent or more of the property abutting such highway, on either side of the highway, for a 248 distance of 300 feet or more along the highway consists of land improved for dwelling purposes, or is 249 occupied by dwellings, or consists of land or buildings in use for business purposes, or consists of 250 territory zoned residential or territory in residential subdivisions created under Chapter 22 (§ 15.2-2200 et seq.) of Title 15.2. 251

252 "Revoke" or "revocation" means that the document or privilege revoked is not subject to renewal or 253 restoration except through reapplication after the expiration of the period of revocation.

254 "Roadway" means that portion of a highway improved, designed, or ordinarily used for vehicular 255 travel, exclusive of the shoulder. A highway may include two or more roadways if divided by a physical 256 barrier or barriers or an unpaved area.

257 "Safety zone" means the area officially set apart within a roadway for the exclusive use of 258 pedestrians and that is protected or is so marked or indicated by plainly visible signs.

259 "School bus" means any motor vehicle, other than a station wagon, automobile, truck, or commercial 260 bus, which is: (i) designed and used primarily for the transportation of pupils to and from public, private or religious schools, or used for the transportation of the mentally or physically handicapped to and 261 262 from a sheltered workshop; (ii) painted yellow and bears the words "School Bus" in black letters of a 263 specified size on front and rear; and (iii) is equipped with warning devices prescribed in § 46.2-1090. A 264 yellow school bus may have a white roof provided such vehicle is painted in accordance with 265 regulations promulgated by the Department of Education.

266 "Semitrailer" means every vehicle of the trailer type so designed and used in conjunction with a 267 motor vehicle that some part of its own weight and that of its own load rests on or is carried by another 268 vehicle.

269 "Shared-use path" means a bikeway facility that is physically separated from motorized vehicular 270 traffic by an open space or barrier and is located either within the highway right-of-way or within a 271 separate right-of-way. Shared-use paths may also be used by pedestrians, *bicyclists*, skaters, users of 272 wheel chairs or wheel chair conveyances, joggers, and other nonmotorized users.

273 "Shoulder" means that part of a highway between the portion regularly traveled by vehicular traffic 274 and the lateral curbline or ditch.

275 "Sidewalk" means the portion of a street between the curb lines, or the lateral lines of a roadway, 276 and the adjacent property lines, intended for use by pedestrians.

277 "Snowmobile" means a self-propelled vehicle designed to travel on snow or ice, steered by skis or 278 runners, and supported in whole or in part by one or more skis, belts, or cleats.

279 "Specially constructed vehicle" means any vehicle that was not originally constructed under a 280 distinctive name, make, model, or type by a generally recognized manufacturer of vehicles and not a 281 reconstructed vehicle as herein defined.

282 "Stinger-steered automobile or watercraft transporter" means an automobile or watercraft transporter 283 configured as a semitrailer combination wherein the fifth wheel is located on a drop frame behind and 284 below the rearmost axle of the power unit. 285

"Superintendent" means the Superintendent of the Department of State Police of the Commonwealth.

286 "Suspend" or "suspension" means that the document or privilege suspended has been temporarily 287 withdrawn, but may be reinstated following the period of suspension unless it has expired prior to the 288 end of the period of suspension.

289 "Tow truck" means a motor vehicle for hire (i) designed to lift, pull, or carry another vehicle by 290 means of a hoist or other mechanical apparatus and (ii) having a manufacturer's gross vehicle weight rating of at least 10,000 pounds. "Tow truck" also includes vehicles designed with a ramp on wheels 291 292 and a hydraulic lift with a capacity to haul or tow another vehicle, commonly referred to as "rollbacks." "Tow truck" does not include any "automobile or watercraft transporter," "stinger-steered automobile or 293 294 watercraft transporter," or "tractor truck" as those terms are defined in this section.

295 "Towing and recovery operator" means a person engaged in the business of (i) removing disabled 296 vehicles, parts of vehicles, their cargoes, and other objects to facilities for repair or safekeeping and (ii) 297 restoring to the highway or other location where they either can be operated or removed to other 298 locations for repair or safekeeping vehicles that have come to rest in places where they cannot be 299 operated.

300 "Toy vehicle" means any motorized or propellant-driven device that has no manufacturer-issued 301 vehicle identification number, that is designed or used to carry any person or persons, on any number of wheels, bearings, glides, blades, runners, or a cushion of air. The term does not include electric personal 302 303 assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, mopeds, or motorcycles, nor does it include

304 any nonmotorized or nonpropellant-driven devices such as bicycles, roller skates, or skateboards.

305 "Tractor truck" means every motor vehicle designed and used primarily for drawing other vehicles 306 and not so constructed as to carry a load other than a part of the load and weight of the vehicle attached 307 thereto.

308 "Traffic" means pedestrians, ridden or herded animals, vehicles, and other conveyances either singly 309 or together while using any highway for purposes of travel.

310 "Traffic control device" means any sign, signal, marking, or device, not inconsistent with this title, placed or erected by authority of a public body or official having jurisdiction, for the purpose of 311 regulating, warning, or guiding traffic. 312

"Traffic control signal" means any device, whether manually, electrically, or mechanically operated, 313 314 by which traffic is alternately directed to stop and permitted to proceed.

315 "Traffic infraction" means a violation of law punishable as provided in § 46.2-113, which is neither a 316 felony nor a misdemeanor.

"Traffic lane" or "lane" means that portion of a roadway designed or designated to accommodate the 317 318 forward movement of a single line of vehicles.

319 "Trailer" means every vehicle without motive power designed for carrying property or passengers 320 wholly on its own structure and for being drawn by a motor vehicle, including manufactured homes.

321 "Truck" means every motor vehicle designed to transport property on its own structure independent 322 of any other vehicle and having a registered gross weight in excess of 7,500 pounds.

323 "Truck lessor" means a person who holds the legal title to any motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer 324 that is the subject of a bona fide written lease for a term of one year or more to another person, 325 provided that: (i) neither the lessor nor the lessee is a common carrier by motor vehicle or restricted 326 common carrier by motor vehicle or contract carrier by motor vehicle as defined in § 46.2-2000; (ii) the 327 leased motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer is used exclusively for the transportation of property of the 328 lessee; (iii) the lessor is not employed in any capacity by the lessee; (iv) the operator of the leased 329 motor vehicle is a bona fide employee of the lessee and is not employed in any capacity by the lessor; 330 and (v) a true copy of the lease, verified by affidavit of the lessor, is filed with the Commissioner.

331 "Unmarked crosswalk" means that part of a roadway that is formed at an intersection by extending the edges of the sidewalks on opposite sides of the highway measured from the curbs or, in the absence 332 333 of curbs or sidewalks, from the edges of the roadway.

334 "Utility vehicle" means a motor vehicle that is (i) designed for off-road use, (ii) powered by an 335 engine of no more than 25 horsepower, and (iii) used for general maintenance, security, agricultural, or 336 horticultural purposes. "Utility vehicle" does not include all-terrain vehicles as defined in this section, 337 riding lawn mowers, or any other vehicle whose definition is included in this section.

338 "Vehicle" means every device in, on or by which any person or property is or may be transported or 339 drawn on a highway, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively on stationary rails or tracks. For the purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.) of this title, bicycles, electric personal 340 assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds shall be vehicles while operated 341 on a highway. 342

343 "Wheel chair or wheel chair conveyance" means a chair or seat equipped with wheels, typically used 344 to provide mobility for persons who, by reason of physical disability, are otherwise unable to move 345 about as pedestrians. The term includes both three-wheeled and four-wheeled devices. So long as it is 346 operated only as provided in § 46.2-677, a self-propelled wheel chair or self-propelled wheel chair conveyance shall not be considered a motor vehicle. 347 348

§ 46.2-821. Vehicles before entering certain highways shall stop or yield right-of-way.

349 The driver of a vehicle approaching an intersection on a highway controlled by a stop sign shall, 350 immediately before entering such intersection, stop at a clearly marked stop line, or, in the absence of a stop line, stop before entering the a marked or unmarked crosswalk on the near side of the intersection, 351 352 or, in the absence of a marked crosswalk, stop at the point nearest the intersecting roadway where the 353 driver has a view of approaching traffic on the intersecting roadway. Before proceeding, he shall yield 354 the right-of-way to the driver of any vehicle approaching on such other highway from either direction.

Where a "Yield Right-of-Way" sign is posted, the driver of a vehicle approaching or entering such 355 356 intersection shall slow down to a speed reasonable for the existing conditions, yield the right-of-way to the driver of another vehicle approaching or entering such intersection from another direction, and, if 357 358 required for safety, shall stop at a clearly marked stop line, or, in the absence of a stop line, stop before 359 entering the a marked or unmarked crosswalk on the near side of the intersecting roadway where the 360 driver has a view of approaching traffic on the intersecting roadway, and shall yield the right-of-way to the driver of any vehicle approaching on such other highway from either direction. 361

362 § 46.2-826. Stop before entering or exiting public highway or sidewalk from or to private road, etc.; 363 vielding right-of-way.

364 The driver of a vehicle entering or exiting a public highway or sidewalk from or to a private road, driveway, alley, or building shall stop immediately before entering or exiting such highway or sidewalk 365

and yield the right-of-way to vehicles approaching on such public highway and to pedestrians, *bicycles*,or vehicles approaching on such public sidewalk.

The provisions of this section shall not apply at an intersection of public and private roads controlled
by a traffic signal. At any such intersection, all movement of traffic into and through the intersection
shall be controlled by the traffic signal.

371 § 46.2-834. Signals by law-enforcement officers and crossing guards.

A. Law-enforcement officers may assume control of traffic at any intersection *or marked or unmarked crosswalk*, regardless of whether such intersection *or crosswalk* is controlled by lights,
controlled by other traffic control devices, or uncontrolled. Whenever any law-enforcement officer so
assumes control of traffic, all drivers of vehicles, *bicyclists, and pedestrians* shall obey his signals.

B. Law-enforcement officers and uniformed school crossing guards may assume control of traffic
 otherwise controlled by lights *traffic control devices*, and in such event, signals by such officers and uniformed crossing guards shall take precedence over such traffic control devices.

C. UniformedThe driver of any vehicle and every pedestrian crossing a roadway shall stop and yield
the right-of-way according to the direction of uniformed school crossing guards may control controlling
traffic at any marked school crossing, whether such crossing is at an intersection or another location.
Uniformed school crossing guards who are supplied by their local school division with hand-held stop
signs shall use such signs whenever controlling traffic as authorized in this subsection.

384 § 46.2-835. Right turn on steady red light after stopping.

385 Notwithstanding the provisions of § 46.2-833, except where signs are placed prohibiting turns on
386 steady red, vehicular traffic facing a steady red signal, after coming to a full stop, may cautiously enter
387 the intersection and make a right turn.

388 Such turning traffic shall yield the right-of-way to pedestrians lawfully within an adjacent *marked or* 389 *unmarked* crosswalk and to other traffic using the intersection.

390 § 46.2-836. Left turn on steady red after stopping.

391 Notwithstanding the provisions of § 46.2-833, except where signs are placed prohibiting turns on
392 steady red, vehicular traffic facing a steady red signal on a one-way highway, after coming to a full
393 stop, may cautiously enter the intersection and make a left turn onto another one-way highway.

394 Such turning traffic shall yield the right-of-way to pedestrians lawfully within an adjacent *marked or* 395 *unmarked* crosswalk and to other traffic using the intersection.

\$ 46.2-904. Use of roller skates and skateboards on sidewalks and shared-use paths; operation of
bicycles, motorized skateboards or scooters, motor-driven cycles, electric power-assisted bicycles, and
electric personal assistive mobility devices on sidewalks and crosswalks and shared-use paths; local
ordinances.

400 The governing body of any county, city, or town may by ordinance prohibit the use of roller skates 401 and skateboards and/or the riding of bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, motorized 402 skateboards or scooters, motor-driven cycles, or electric power-assisted bicycles on designated sidewalks 403 or marked or unmarked crosswalks, including those of any church, school, recreational facility, or any 404 business property open to the public where such activity is prohibited. Signs indicating such prohibition shall be conspicuously posted in general areas where use of roller skates and skateboards, and/or bicycle, 405 406 electric personal assistive mobility devices, motorized skateboards or scooters, motor-driven cycles, or 407 electric power-assisted bicycle riding is prohibited.

408 A person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, motorized skateboard or scooter, motor-driven cycle, or an electric power-assisted bicycle on a sidewalk, shared-use path, or across a roadway on a *marked or unmarked* crosswalk, shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian and shall give an audible signal before overtaking and passing any pedestrian.

412 No person shall ride a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, motorized skateboard or 413 scooter, motor-driven cycle, or an electric power-assisted bicycle on a sidewalk, or across a roadway on 414 a *marked or unmarked* crosswalk, where such use of bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility 415 devices, motorized skateboards or scooters, motor-driven cycles, or electric power-assisted bicycles is 416 prohibited by official traffic control devices.

417 A person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, motorized skateboard or 418 scooter, motor-driven cycle, or an electric power-assisted bicycle on a sidewalk, shared-use path, or 419 across a roadway on a *marked or unmarked* crosswalk, shall have all the rights and duties of a 420 pedestrian under the same circumstances.

421 A violation of any ordinance adopted pursuant to this section shall be punishable by a civil penalty 422 of not more than \$50.

423 § 46.2-908.1. Electric personal assistive mobility devices, electrically powered toy vehicle, and electric power-assisted bicycles.

425 All electric personal assistive mobility devices, electrically powered toy vehicles, and electric 426 power-assisted bicycles shall be equipped with spill-proof, sealed, or gelled electrolyte batteries. No 440

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427 person shall at any time or at any location drive an electric personal assistive mobility device, or an 428 electric power-assisted bicycle faster than twenty-five miles per hour. No person less than fourteen years

429 old shall drive any electric personal assistive mobility device, motorized skateboard or scooter, or 430 electric power-assisted bicycle unless under the immediate supervision of a person who is at least 431 eighteen years old.

432 An electric personal assistive mobility device or motorized skateboard or scooter may be operated on 433 any highway with a maximum speed limit of twenty-five miles per hour or less. An electric personal 434 assistive mobility device shall only operate on any highway authorized by this section if a sidewalk is 435 not provided along such highway or if operation of the electric personal assistive mobility device on such sidewalk is prohibited pursuant to § 46.2-904. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the operation of 436 437 an electric personal assistive mobility device or motorized skateboard or scooter in the marked or 438 unmarked crosswalk of any highway where the use of such crosswalk is authorized for pedestrians, 439 bicycles, or electric power-assisted bicycles.

§ 46.2-923.1. Drivers to stop for pedestrians at crosswalks; pedestrian responsibilities.

A. When traffic control signals are not in place or not in operation:

442 1. The driver of a vehicle shall stop and remain stopped to allow a pedestrian to cross the roadway 443 within a marked or unmarked crosswalk when the pedestrian is upon or within one half of the roadway 444 on which the vehicle is traveling or onto which it is turning where the legal maximum speed is 35 miles 445 per hour or less.

446 2. The driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way, slowing down or stopping if need be, to a 447 pedestrian crossing the roadway within a marked or unmarked crosswalk when the pedestrian is upon **448** or within one half of the roadway upon which the vehicle is traveling where the legal maximum speed 449 exceeds 35 miles per hour.

450 For purposes of this section, "half of the roadway" means all traffic lanes carrying traffic in one 451 direction of travel and includes the entire width of a one-way roadway.

452 B. Pedestrians shall obey the instructions of official pedestrian control signals as provided in 453 § 46.2-925, unless otherwise directed by a law-enforcement officer.

454 C. No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path 455 of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to stop, nor shall any pedestrian cross 456 an intersection in disregard of traffic control devices.

457 D. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections A and B, a pedestrian who crosses a highway shall 458 yield the right-of-way to any approaching emergency vehicle, as defined in § 46.2-920, that is using 459 audible and visible signals.

460 E. Whenever any vehicle is stopped at a marked crosswalk or at any unmarked crosswalk to permit a 461 pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not 462 overtake and pass such stopped vehicle.

463 F. The governing body of any county having the urban county executive form of government, any county having the county manager plan of government, the City of Fairfax, the County of Loudoun and 464 465 any town therein, and any city with a population between 110,000 and 115,000, may by ordinance provide for the installation and maintenance of highway signs at marked crosswalks specifically 466 requiring operators of motor vehicles, at the locations where such signs are installed, to stop for 467 468 pedestrians crossing or attempting to cross the highway. Any operator of a motor vehicle who fails at 469 such locations to stop for pedestrians as required by such signs shall be guilty of a traffic infraction 470 punishable by a fine of no less than \$100 or more than \$500. The Commonwealth Transportation Board 471 shall develop criteria for the design, location, and installation of such signs. The provisions of this 472 subsection shall not apply to any limited access highway where pedestrian access is restricted by the 473 Commonwealth Transportation Board. 474

§ 46.2-924.1. Pedestrians crossing at other than crosswalk.

475 A. Every pedestrian crossing a highway at any point other than within a marked or unmarked 476 crosswalk shall yield the right-of-way to any vehicle approaching on the highway.

477 B. The governing body of any town or city or the governing body of a county authorized by law to 478 regulate traffic may by ordinance permit pedestrians to cross an intersection diagonally when all traffic 479 entering the intersection has been halted by lights, other traffic control devices, or by a law-enforcement 480 officer. 481

§ 46.2-924.2. Drivers to exercise due care.

482 Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, every driver of a vehicle shall exercise due care 483 to avoid colliding with a pedestrian.

484 § 46.2-925. Pedestrian control signals.

485 Whenever special pedestrian control signals exhibiting the words, numbers, or symbols meaning "Walk" or "Don't Walk" are in place such signals shall indicate and apply to pedestrians as follows: 486

487 Walk. - Pedestrians facing such signal may proceed across the highway in the direction of the signal and shall be given the right-of-way by the drivers of all vehicles. 488

489 Don't Walk. - No pedestrian shall start to cross the highway in the direction of such signal, but any pedestrian who has partially completed his crossing on the Walk signal shall proceed to a sidewalk or safety island and remain there while the Don't Walk signal is showing.

492 § 46.2-933. When vehicles to stop for pedestrian guided by dog or carrying white, red-tipped white,493 or metallic cane.

Whenever a totally or partially blind pedestrian crossing or attempting to cross a highway in accordance with the provisions of <u>§ 46.2-923</u> § 46.2-923.1 is guided by a dog guide or carrying a cane which is predominantly metallic or white in color, with or without a red tip, the driver of every vehicle approaching the intersection or place of crossing shall bring his vehicle to a full stop before arriving at such intersection or place of crossing, unless such intersection or place of crossing is controlled by a law-enforcement officer or traffic light. Any person violating any provision of this section shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor.
