3. Committee: Courts of Justice

4. Title: **Outpatient treatment; compliance.**

5. Summary: Outpatient treatment; compliance. Provides that the community services board, behavioral health authority, or designated provider charged with monitoring a person's compliance with an involuntary outpatient treatment order shall report any material noncompliance with that order to the judge or special justice. Upon receipt of a report of material noncompliance, the judge or special justice shall issue a temporary detention order and then proceed to hold an involuntary commitment hearing, as a result of which the court may revoke outpatient treatment and order the person's involuntary commitment.

7. Budget Amendment Necessary: No

8. Fiscal Implications: Under current law, approximately 1,000 individuals per year are ordered into involuntary outpatient treatment, or an average of 25 per Community Services Board. Assuming that treatment lasts 90 days, Each CSB would require approximately .25 FTE at a cost of \$12,500. If treatment for each individual lasts 180 days, each CSB would require .5 FTE at a cost of \$25,000. The estimated range of fiscal impact system-wide is therefore \$500,000 - \$1.0 million per year. If additional legislation is passed that would increase the number of individuals committed to involuntary outpatient treatment, the cost of this legislation would increase as well. The Governor's proposed budget includes \$8.8 million to phase in the addition of 106 case managers over the course of the biennium.
